Dr. Crouse named SMA 2025 Physician of the Year

Local doctor Ettiene Crouse was awarded Family Physician of the Year by the Saskatchewan Medical Association. He was nominated by local colleagues and

Ettiene and Josande Crouse.

accepted the award in at the SMA Awards Banquet in Saskatoon October 24.

In the past, both Dr Schalk van der Merwe and Dr. Ross Kerkhoff, who have also served the community for decades, have been similarly recognized for their contributions.

Dr Crouse immigrated to Canada and began practicing medicine in Moosomin over 30 years ago.
"I was born is South Africa and came to Canada in 1994 as an immigrant to Moosomin, and I'm still here thirty-one years later. I studied in South Africa and worked for a few months in the UK. At the time when we came here it was more for travelling, but I loved it here and my wife loved it here, so we ended up coming back and staying.

"I was in surgery at the time, and my brother-in-law was telling me about helping somebody out in Moosomin. There wasn't much work to be done back home, so I agreed to fly out for three or four months and it turned into over thirty years."

Perfect fit in Moosomin

Dr Crouse says the community influenced his wife and him to stay in Moosomin three decades ago. "My wife and I both grew up in small towns and the size of Moosomin is perfect for us. The people and community are also so a mazing. You can live anywhere in the world if you only care about temperature and weather, but it's the people around you that make it home.

Becoming a doctor

Dr Crouse says he always knew he wanted to be a doctor. "It was something I always wanted to do, and we actually lived right next to a doctor's office in South Af-

rica, so I sometimes went over there and would help out. rica, so I sometimes went over there and would nelp out. Once I got to Canada, I applied for my medical licence here and got in, and from there it was pretty straightforward. I enjoy the community and knowing that my patients are my friends too. Knowing that I'm helping my friends every day makes me want to help and go for as long as I can. I've been a family physician in Moosomin for thirty years, and I think as long as my health allows, I'll stay working in medicine." I'll stay working in medicine.'

SMA Family Physician of the Year

Dr Crouse says local colleagues at the hospital and clinic nominated him for the award.

"The SMA has a nomination program for the Family Physician of the Year award, so a colleague must nominate you for you to be considered. It's for all of Saskatchewan, and to be nominated by my colleagues in an hon-

"When they told me that I had won a prestigious award I wasn't that interested because I'm not really someone for the limelight. But they insisted and sent me some details, and once I read further, I was shocked that I was selected."

He says he has been committed to improving rural

medicine over his decades of being a doctor in the area.

"I think that it was mainly for starting a successful family practice in a more rural community, and also for getting up to Saskatoon and Regina, trying to improve rural medicine."

The Saskatchewan Medical Association (SMA) awards night was held in Saskatoon October 24, where Dr Crouse accepted his award alongside his family and some colleagues.

Canada's best ever, Brad Gushue, to retire

Curling in Canada through the years has been dominated by players from Manitoba, Alberta, Ontario and Saskatchewan, but No. 1 on the all-time list of Canadian greats is from St. John's, NL.

Brad Gushue announced recently that the 2025-26 sea-

son would be his last, but he doesn't have to worry about his legacy in the roaring game. He's No. 1 all-time. Six Brier titles, a world championship, four silvers at the worlds, 15 Grand Slam titles and an Olympic gold medal

worus, 10 Grand Slam titles and an Olympic gold medal will secure his spot as Canada's best all time.
Putting Gushue at the mountaintop of Canadian curling skips is easy, but how do the rest of Canada's ice kings rate?

rate?

Rankings are from 1980 through today, because the game has changed so much over the years. Today, the world's best play the game on a full-time basis. Ice conditions are perfect, sweeping techniques have been perfected and the best curlers from around the world compete regularly against each other. (A shoutout to the legendary Ernie Richardson of Regina, who should be included on any list ranking the country's best curlers but he was on any list ranking the country's best curlers, but he was from a bygone era. Other greats from that era were Hec Gervais and Matt Baldwin of Alberta, and Don Duguid and Ken Watson of Manitoba.)



Redvers Town Council

Lots of work on capital infrastructure projects

Local Journalism Initiative Reporter
Redvers Town Council held their regular meeting on
Oct. 22. Mayor Brad Bulbuck says the town has been
working a number of capital infrastructure replacement

working a number of capital infrastructure replacement projects, and is making steady progress on those projects. "This has been our largest infrastructure maintenance plan as long as I can remember. We finished the sidewalk on the north side of Souris Avenue between the post office and the cenotaph. That was done by Northstar Concrete. "Also Northstar Concrete has completed the swales. There were four in town in a bad state of repair. All of

them are completed at the corner of Broadway and Dr. Arthur and two at Souris Avenue and Rhodes Street.

"We put in a rolled curb on Warren Street heading south from the Activity Centre parking lot to McDonald

"In a joint effort with the Redvers Lions Club we also put a new sidewalk in and a new inclusivity ramp at the Hancock lot. The Lions club paid for that project.

"We put in 12 feet of pavement, all the way from the post office on the north side from Souris Avenue from the post office to the cenotaph, and by the cenotaph that is

post office to the cenotaph, and by the cenotaph that is now an inclusive ramp there as well.

"The final pavement project was cleaning up from the activity centre where the rolled curb was put in on the concrete.

"There has been accounted."

"Those have fixed our worst water spots in town.
"Under the CCBF, we are allocating funds toward a sidewalk in front of the school. It's in a bad state of repair. These projects are being evaluated so that we can determine how to prioritizing them.

"There is an SGI grant we are applying for and we are looking at putting a sidewalk down the west side of Warren Street with crosswalks going to the group home for special needs people there. It is for safety of people crossing street there from the main building to Warren House.

ooking at derelict building pilot for Warren Avenue apartments

Earlier this year, the government of Saskatchewan an-nounced a voluntary pilot project to allow municipalities to burn municipally owned derelict buildings for fire-

to burn municipally owned derenct buildings for fire-fighting training.

Redvers has a derelict apartment building on Warren
Avenue, however Bulbuck says the town still has some
questions about the pilot project, and won't be moving to burn down the apartments until they have a few more questions answered.

Remembrance Day ceremony
This year the town's Remembrance Day ceremony will take place at 10:45 am at the cenotaph.

To honor the town's veterans, a red and white cross-walk with the shadow of a soldier will be painted from the cenotaph to the CIBC building. The Redvers School art class will be doing the painting. However Bulbuck says that project will be on hold until next year due to the paving and construction that was taking place around town this year. town this year.

Truck replaced

We reviewed our asset management plan with respect to replacing our crew half tons
"And based on our asset management plan we were

supposed to replace our 2008 in 2024. It's at the end of its life so we replaced with a 2023 Ram half ton. We purchased it for \$48,000 on an advertised price of \$66,000, so we saved about \$20,000. It only had 1,100 km on it. It's a demo truck.

"We also have a 2013 that we purchased used in 2022. Planned replacement was to be 2028. We pushed that out to 2030. Our goal is to keep these trucks 10 to 15 years from the date of the model year and stagger replacement every five to 7.5 years

Rocanville's economic development board hosted a lunch meeting on Thursday, October 23 to discuss future goals for the community.

Regional development has been at the forefront in recent communications and the organization wanted to meet with the businesses currently operating in Rocanville to discuss their own goals and how REDO can help them to continue growing within the community.

After discussing the outcome of the career fair in Octoer, a discussion was started to get ideas, problems and goals out on the table. Rocanville sees a fair bit of traffic to the mine daily as well as those travelling through on Highway 8, and yet, the town is not pulling much of that

Highway 8, and yet, the town is not pulling much of that traffic into the community according to our businesses.

Comments were raised on the lack of signage when passing by and when entering Ellice Street, Rocanville's main business street downtown. The town administrator, Tanya Strandlund, made note of the issue and stated the town could help with making that happen.

This starting point for discussion led to more conversation and questions like: What attractions could Rocanville have here that would draw people to the main street? What hours do the businesses need to consistently

observe to keep consumer loyalty? How does Rocanville attract the right people to town so they have the labour force to keep these businesses running? The conversation was very productive and flowed very

The REDO leads are working to put them into goals that the members will be able to vote on at the next meeting so they can set clear goals and also have a guideline for their next community meeting.

New washrooms and canteen building for McAuley sports ground

The McAuley community sports grounds has a new building. A 16-foot y 40-foot ready made unit was installed that has three washrooms that will be wheelchair accessible and a veranda covered food concession area. The building will also have a storage area.

will also have a storage area.
The unit was pre-made by a RTM company in Newdale, Manitoba and delivered and installed by a single employee.
The unit was placed on a concrete pad that was poured by local contractor Joel

The new facility is a joint project be-tween The Archie Committee for Excellence and The McAuley Hoedown Committee that started off as a community

idea in the spring.

Now that the building is secure on its metal anchor plates, work will begin on the insulation of the electrical system, kitchen and washroom units. This will be hopefully ready for the spring.

Trisha Huberdeau, the Archie and area CAO was on hand for the building installation and said. "This building is a collaborative project with a total estimated cost of \$ 75,000," she said, adding that a wheelchair accessible ramp will be installed between the supervisiding and the stalled between the new building and the covered picnic table area for easier access between the two areas to the north. This area is very popular for rodeo events and people in the camping area. It has also be-come a popular place for family reunions and other family events too.

"We were thrilled to see the building

arrive today, it's a major milestone for our community," said Barry Lowes, head of the new building project. "The project has been a true team effort and seeing it come together is very exciting. The new concession booth and washrooms will make a huge difference for everyone who uses the campground and rodeo grounds. We are proud of what our community has accomplished working together."
