# Moosomin second in Sask for Smile Cookie Sales as of last Thursday

At the end of the day last Thursday, Moosomin was second in the province for Holiday Smile Cookie sales, selling over \$11,000 worth of cookies. In first place was Humboldt with \$14,446 in sales.

There were still three days left of sales to go before the

Holiday Smile Cookie Campaign wrapped up as of mid-

night on Sunday.

Greg Crisanti, the owner of Tim Hortons in Moosomin, said sales in Western Canada had been so robust that the warehouse that supplies the Holiday Smile Cookie batter in Winnipeg had run out.
""We are really close, it's amazing, and for the first time

in a long time we actually drained our GFS warehouse out Winnipeg, so Winnipeg has told owners that we don't have anymore Holiday Smile Cookies left that are with the red and green sprinkles and that we will have to move to our chocolate chunk," he said.

But now with the holiday cookie I think it has been going for four or five years, maybe longer, and we thought we had it, but it's just a bunch of restaurants selling a ton. I know in Manitoba, Steinbach is right on our tail too. Again Dauphin, they have

always done really good.

# **Moosomin Dairy** Queen recognized for **Miracle Treat Day**

Blizzard sales in Moosomin on Miracle Treat Day have been increasing every year. In 2024 Moosomin DQ sold 5,118 blizzards and raised \$27,746.21.

This year Morgan and Heather Kerr not only canvassed the town of Moosomin for Blizzard orders but spent time going door to door at local businesses in some of the surrounding towns, asking for orders.

Along with their staff, local volunteers help make the

# 11 lifeguards hired for aquatic centre

At their meeting on Wednesday, Rocanville town council passed a motion to hire 11 lifeguards for the Universe Satellite Aquatic Centre, which will be opening very soon, as its refurbishment is nearly complete.

The town has hired six junior lifeguards two senior.

The town has hired six junior lifeguards, two senior lifeguards, and three senior instructor guards. This brings the pool close to full staffing levels for lifeguards, with the town still open to accepting some applications for daytime staff.

### Eco centre grand opening planned

for Friday, November 28

The town will be holding a grand opening of its new eco centre at the transfer station in the afternoon on Friday, November 28, letting people know that they can recycle used oil during regular transfer station hourse.

Used oil can be dropped off at that location, and anyone in the region can use the recycling centre, not just Rocan-

Previously, an eco centre was located at the Kin Ability Centre in Moosomin, however when the Kin Ability decided they could no longer manage the eco centre, Saskatch-

ewan Association for Resource Recovery Corp (SARRC) began looking for a new location in the area and approached the town of Rocanville who decided to take it on.

SARRC has a province-wide collection network of

nearly 130 collection points and eco centres in communities that accept used oil, used oil filters, used antifreeze, antifreeze and Diesel Exhaust Fluid (DEF) containers.

#### **Development permit for** residential properties approved

Council approved a development permit for residential housing at 216 Pelly Street. The property was a tax enforcement property. A purchaser approached the town about buying the land and will be building two residential units on the lot.

**New HR policy approved**The town passed a motion for a progressive discipline policy. The new HR policy applies to anyone employed by the town of Rocanville.

"It's just to be more consistent," says administrator Tanya Strandlund. "It makes everything clear as to expectations and repercussions and to have a consistent process for any sort of issues."

Roto rooting cost covered

The town passed a motion to refund 100 per cent of the cost of having tree roots roto rooted in a sewer line at 316 Fort Street. The town covers the costs of any sewer line issues with roots 20 feet out from the house.

#### Housing authority share

The town of Rocanville's five per cent share to the Sask Housing Corporation for operation of the Rocanville Housing Authority in 2024 is \$554.93—lower than what the town had budgeted, which was \$5,000.

#### Tankless water heating system for rink

Council passed a motion to approve a tankless water heating system to be installed by Tag's Plumbing and Heating in the zamboni room at the rink.

#### TD pool savings account closed

The town passed a motion to close their pool savings account with the TD Bank. The TD bank closed its branch in Rocanville and the town has moved their account to Conexus Credit Union instead.

#### In shooting of Tanya Myers

### Fahlman charged with second degree murder Trial relocated to Weyburn provincial court

Chris Fahlman has been charged with second degree murder in relation to the shooting of Tanya Myers on

murder in relation to the shooting of Tanya Myers on Highway 39 north of Weyburn.
Fahlman has also been charged with intentionally discharging a firearm while being reckless as to the life or safety of another person.
Fahlman was previously charged with manslaughter, careless use of a firearm, carrying a weapon for the purpose of committing an offence, and occupying a vehicle knowing there is a firearm inside. Those charges have been stayed and Fahlman appeared in Regina provincial court on November 12 on the new charge of second degree murder.

gree murder.

Tanya Myers was travelling with a friend on Highway
39 north of Weyburn on September 12 when a bullet entered the Ford Explorer they were in, hitting Tanya in the back and killing her. A second vehicle that was travelling close behind the vehicle that Myers was in was also struck

by bullets that night.
Fahlman was arrested on November 1.
Fahlman is from Regina and owns a home inspection company. RCMP say Fahlman and Myers were not

known to each other.
Chris Fahlman's trial has also been relocated to Weyburn Provincial Court. Fahlman's first appearance in Weyburn will be on December 9.

Fahlman remains in custody pending a bail hearing.

# Canada's biggest policy mistakes come from treating complex systems as simple math

Here is an old story with a valuable message. In the directed economy of the USSR, it was the government, not markets, that decided what and how much was

Take metalware for the kitchen: mugs, mixing bowls, pots, pans, dishpans and washtubs. The government decided how much people needed and ordered the industry to produce that many tons at the lowest possible price.

Quotas were met, the appropriate tonnage was produced and costs were controlled. But no mug, pot or dishpan was to be found. The industry found that the easiest way to meet its cost and quantity requirements was to produce nothing but

It is a valuable reminder today for Canada: when policymakers rely on a single number to steer complex systems, they almost always get the wrong results.

There are at least three reasons why we need better analysis in policymaking.

There are at least three reasons why we need better analysis in policymaking. The first is that the things inside a total number are not all the same. Mugs and washtubs are not interchangeable.

The second is unintended consequences. How did devoting metal to domestic products affect other metal-using sectors like automobile production? The same pattern appears in modern Canadian policy: shifting one number often disrupts systems we depend on elsewhere.

Third, picking a number to solve a problem is often an easy way to avoid doing a rigorous cost-benefit analysis that would offer a clear indication of the overall effectiveness and impact of any decision. Too often, our debates jump straight to targets instead of evidence.

treetwines and impact of any decision. Too dirty, our decisions jump studies targets instead of evidence.

We like to think that policy decisions in Canada are decided on more than just picking a magic number and waiting for it to solve a problem. That is not always the case. Policies for both the housing market and labour market could benefit from more detailed analysis.

more detailed analysis.

Canada faces a severe housing shortage, not only in the major cities, but also in smaller centres as people move there from metro areas and push up home prices. One-number thinking has led the government to drastically cut back the number of people coming into Canada on a permanent or temporary basis believing that thousands of fewer new arrivals will make available thousands more housing units.

This is not likely, especially when considering temporary workers. Many of these

are international students. The number of housing units freed by their absence is significantly lower than the reduction in student visas issued. Many students stay in dorms or other student housing. Others crowd together in apartments or houses to save costs. Not much housing is freed to deal with the shortage.

One serious unintended consequence of cutting back student visas is the negative impact on educational institutions which have been relying on the generous fees that foreign students pay to deal with the constrained fees and limited funding

imposed on them by governments.
Cutting back on the number of temporary foreign workers (TFWs) will also have a minimal effect on the supply of housing in the major centres where shortages are most severe. TFWs are most needed in industries like agriculture and in smaller centres where their absence will be sorely felt.

Looking at the labour market, it is unrealistic to expect unemployed Canadians Looking at the labour market, it is unrealistic to expect unemployed Canadians to fill these job gaps. People in major cities rarely move to remote areas to take lower-paying work. Cutting back TFWs will harm the sectors and places that rely on them. Differences in geography, occupations and preferences ensure that workers are not interchangeable.

Homes are not interchangeable either. They have to be in the places where people choose to live, and they have to be affordable. In many places like Vancouver, the actual and potential number of homes is enough to house everyone who needs one especially if the development permits pow being sought result in actual one.

one, especially if the development permits now being sought result in actual construction. But in cities like Vancouver and Toronto, the benchmark price of a home has risen far faster than wages for more than a decade, making many new units

has risen far faster than wages for more than a decade, making many new units unaffordable even when supply increases.

Builders are now having trouble filling existing units because they did not pay enough attention to affordability. The cost of producing a housing unit is higher than what most Canadians can pay, even after the size of a home has shrunk below what most Canadians are used to. As a result, builders are lowering prices and rents and offering other inducements to potential residents. Builders are now lowering prices and rents and/or offering other inducements to potential residents. Let us hope that our educational institutions will be able to produce, and our immigration policies will allow us to admit, qualified people who can develop and implement policies based on more than one number.

# Sask expands grief and trauma counselling services

The Government of Saskatchewan is providing \$200,000 in annual funding to Caring Hearts to expand its grief and trauma counselling services for residents

trauma counselling services for residents across the province.

Caring Hearts is a community-based organization that provides a range of specialized support services for people experiencing grief and trauma due to situations such as the loss of a loved one to

Services include counselling; support groups; healing circles; kids camps; and support to communities affected by tragedies such as homicides, suicides and workplace deaths.

workplace deaths.

"It is crucial for people who are grieving and in distress to know that supports are available and that it is okay to reach out for help," Moosomin-Montmartre MLA Kevin Weedmark said at the announce-

ment on Thursday.

"Today's expansion of grief and trauma counselling services at Caring Hearts makes it easier for Saskatchewan residents to access critical support when they may

need it most."

Approximately 75 per cent of Caring Hearts' clients receive support in person and 25 per cent receive virtual support.
"Caring Hearts extends its sincere appreciation to the Government of Saskatchewan for this funding," Caring Hearts Executive Director Keely Wight-Young said.
"With this investment we will reduce

"With this investment, we will reduce wait times, respond more rapidly to criti-cal, immediate needs, and continue delivering culturally informed care.

"Together, we are building a more resilient Saskatchewan, where healing can begin, and no one must face grief or trauma alone."

#### Annual funding

MLA Weedmark said the investment comes at a time when many people are

comes at a time when many people are seeking mental health support.

"Today I am pleased to announce \$200,000 in annual funding to Caring Hearts to expand its counselling services for individuals and families struggling with grief and trauma," he said at the announcement Thursday.

"This service will be available to citizens across the province, in person in Regina and virtually across the rest of the prov-

"People experiencing grief and trauma may be uncertain of where to go for psyinay be uncertain of where to go for psy-chological support. By expanding Caring Hearts, we want to make it easier for peo-ple to access the supports they need dur-ing difficult times."

Weedmark said mental health remains a

major provincial priority.
The government has budgeted \$624 mil-

lion for mental health and addictions in 2025–2026, including \$487 million specifically for mental health services.

"We all know someone who has experienced trauma, loss and grief," he said "The effects reach far beyond the indi-vidual. I appreciate the work being done at Caring Hearts. This is very important work that truly does change lives for the

better."
Weedmark said he first learned about Caring Hearts during World Suicide Prevention Awareness Day in September.

"I knew nothing about Caring Hearts until September when I went to their World Suicide Prevention Awareness Day event," he said.

"I was very impressed by their organization and I spoke with people who have benefited from their services at that event and explained to me just how important that was to them. I met with the group and with ministry officials over their funding application in October.

"They are providing a service that really isn't provided anywhere else, so our government decided we could support them, and that support is immediate, within the

current fiscal year."

Weedmark said the province spends more than \$600 million annually on mental health and addictions.

"Mental health and addictions are a pri-

ority," he said. "We really ority," he said.
"We really appreciate the work of groups like Caring Hearts, and in this case their application aligned with our goals so we were able to move the process forward fairly quickly."

"My husband Rick and Host our teenage son to suicide on Father's Day 2024," she said. "We immediately knew our family needed help. Caring Hearts called us back immediately and made arrangements for us to see a counsellor right away."
West said the organization offered coun-

selling, group therapy, and ongoing sup-

orr.



Wight-Young said Caring Hearts is the only organization in Saskatchewan dedicated exclusively to grief, loss, traumatic loss, and trauma support services and education.

The organization offers individual and family counselling, support groups, healing circles with a resident Elder, a therapeutic grief camp for children and youth, and outreach to communities and work-places affected by tragedy.

"By expanding services we are strengthening the overall mental health of our communities," she said. "This funding helps meet a critical service gap and ensures no one has to navigate grief and transpared to the contract of the contract o trauma alone.

Those who reside outside of the city can access our services online or through telephone," Wight-Young said. "In the past year alone, we have counselled over five hundred individuals and families. We hope to double that number over the next year."

## Redvers earns 5 blooms in Communities in Bloom non competitive category

The town also received special mention for community pride and community in-volvement, and received a Community Appearance Award for its Hometown History project—an ongoing signage project to honor Redvers residents past and present, for their achievements.

This means that the town will most likely enter the Communities in Bloom competition next year.

"We were in the non-competitive category and so we got five blooms which we were ecstatic about," says CAO Tricia

"Last year we had thee blooms and received a mark of 72 out of 100, and this year we received five blooms with a mark of 83 per cent.

"We were so thrilled with it-it's not just about the flowers, it's about so much

Pickard says the Bloom Committee wanted to enter the non-competitive cat-egory for two years before entering the competitive category, and the five bloom rating signifies the town is most likely

rating signifies the town is most likely ready to compete now.

"We were really thrilled and it's nice to get an outside perspective," says Pickard.
"To increase by 11 per cent, we were really happy with that. We've made some progress, planted trees, and are trying to focus on infrastructure as well and have a good balance with that and with our beautification and parks."

Mayor Brad Bulbuck says the Bloom Committee worked hard this year, and should be recognized.

"A huge shout out to all of the commu-nity volunteers who were involved in the Bloom Committee, because without them we can't do all this on our own," he said.

#### Transit bus rides open to anyone in community, school rides pilot launched

#### **CCBF** funding for sidewalk project

The town is applying to use its Canada Community Building Fund (CCBF) for the upgrade and rehabilitation of the sidewalk in front of Redvers School. The sidewalk is in disrepair, and the town is also planning to put in inclusive ramps. The cost of the project is \$167,675 and work will take place in 2026.

#### Two fallen heroes plaques commissioned

The town passed a motion to commission two plaques for the Canadian Fallen Heroes Foundation. The plaques will commemorate Wesley Glenn Bailey and James Oscar Way from Redyers and will be on display in Saskatoon. The town also puts up banners in Redvers for fallen service-

#### Town applying for grant for Redvers Medical Clinic project

The town has applied for \$12,000 under the Enabling Accessibility Fund - Youth Innovation Component for a \$19,000 project that would involved adding an accessi ble ramp and fixing a portion of the street in front of the Redvers Medical Clinic. The project was initiated by one of the local youth in Redvers

#### Town takes title of lots on Eisenhower Street

The town received notice from Informa-tion Services Corp that they have title of two lots on Eisenhower Street. The lots started out as a tax title property with the owner eventually moving a mobile home off the land and signing over title to the town. The town will need to decide whether to sell or tender the land.

#### Old transit bus sold by tender

After purchasing a new transit bus, the town tendered the sale of their old transit bus. Four offers were made with the town accepting the tender of Kent Brown from Red Light Autobody in the amount

#### Town won't use Derelict **Building Pilot to remove Bordertown Apartments**

Looking for a solution to remove the old Bordertown Apartments, the town explored using the Derelict Buildings Pilot Project which was initiated by the province recently. After doing some research, the town decided not to proceed with using the derelict buildings pilot project for the old apartment building, but will in-stead look at other options to have them demolished.

The decision was made based on liabili-ty and some unknowns. The project would require the apartments to be removed by burning them down as a fire training exer-cise for local firefighters.

#### Request for home in subdivision tabled

Council received a request to move a 10-year-old home into the Perreaux Sub-division, however the town only accepts new builds in that subdivision. Council decided to seek more information and table a decision.

#### Town reports on how they used Lions donation for community improvements

The town provided a project comple-tion report to the Redvers Lions Club after the club gave \$20,000 to the town for a number of projects including completion of a cement path at the Hancock Lot, dog waste stations, benches throughout town, and an accessible picnic table at the Han-cock Lot. The report stated that all \$20,000 had been spend and the town was thank-ful for the donation.

### Applications open for Saskatchewan's Small and Medium Enterprise Investment Tax Credit

Warren Kaeding announced that applications are now open for the Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) Investment Tax Credit, a new program designed to help Sas-katchewan businesses attract investment and expand op-

erations.

"This new tax credit supports Saskatchewan's growing manufacturing sector by making it easier for small and medium-sized businesses to access the capital they need to expand," Kaeding said. "It encourages investment right here at home, helping companies purchase new equipment, upgrade facilities, and create good jobs for Saskatchewan people."

The SME Investment Tax Credit is a three-year pilot program offering a 45 per cent non-refundable tax credit

Saskatchewan-based small and medium-sized manufacturing enterprise.

Eligible businesses must operate within either the food Engine utilisesses must operate within critic increase or beverages manufacturing sector or the machinery and transportation equipment manufacturing sector. Approved investors can earn up to \$225,000 in tax credits per year, while eligible businesses can raise up to \$4 million

under the program.

Pile O' Bones, a craft brewery located in the heart of Regina, is one of these eligible businesses. Known for their handcrafted beers, ciders and kombucha, they are excited for the opportunities the tax credit will bring to the in-

"As a small Saskatchewan brewery, we know firsthand

how much heart and hard work goes into building a local business," Pile O' Bones CEO Glenn Valgardson said. "The SME Investment Tax Credit is a considerable boost for entrepreneurs who believe in this province and want to grow right here at home. Programs like this help turn local passion into lasting jobs and stronger communities, and that's something every Saskatchewan resident can raise a pint to.'

Applications for both businesses and investors are being accepted through the SME Tax Credit Online Applica-

tion Portal. Applications are open until June 2028.

The SME Investment Tax Credit supports the goals of Saskatchewan's Growth Plan by driving private-sector investment, creating jobs, and strengthening the province's manufacturing base.

# Government enhances legislation for animal protection in Saskatchewan

Last week, the Government of Saskatchewan introduced The Animal Protection Amendment Act, 2025, which will strengthen and create more transparency and public accountability around animal welfare enforcement.

"Our government wants to ensure provincial legislation reflects evolving changes to international trade requirements and changing expectations of the public regarding animal welfare enforcement," Agriculture Minister Daryl Harrison said. "These amendments provide the flexibility and enhancements needed to accomplish these goals."

Through consultations held earlier in 2025 with service

providers, producer groups and other stakeholders, the

Ministry of Agriculture determined that amendments to The Animal Protection Act, 2018 were required to ensure enforcement would be consistent and equitable across the province.

- Key changes include:
   Creating animal welfare inspector positions to provide education on animal care to the public and livestock industry members;
- Providing the authority to obtain telewarrants to relieve animal distress;
- Establishing a code of conduct for animal protection officers and animal welfare inspectors;
- Establishing a chief officer position to oversee officer conduct; and
- Providing the authority to create an appeals board to adjudicate matters of animal disposition and owner liabilities for expenses

Recently, a public Request for Proposal competition opened to allow organizations to consider involvement in animal welfare enforcement. Government will work with the successful service provider under a new legislative framework to create a sustainable enforcement model

and protect animal welfare.

The legislation is expected to be passed in spring 2026.


