# **Moosomin Food Share wins award from Second** Harvest for accepting so many big food donations

Moosomin Food Share is the winner of the Frontline
Impact Award from Second Harvest for the Food Share's

Impact Award from Second Harvest for the Food Share's role in accepting large surplus food donations and putting that food to use feeding the community.

Over the last year and a half, Moosomin Food Share has accepted eight large shipments from Second Harvest, and organization that takes surplus food and tries to find a use for it so that it doesn't go to waste.

Moosomin has accepted a large shipment of bagged scrambled eggs, 38,000 pounds of apples, 1,700 boxes french fries, two shipments of 55,000 pounds of potatoes, 8,400 pounds of tomatoes, 25,200 dozen eggs, and most recently, a shipment of 11 pallets of bananas. In each case the Food Share was able to get rid of all the food quickly, and Samantha Campbell with the Food

Share says in almost every case, people were still calling days later asking if the food was still available.

"They pick one organization from each province to win, and it's for non-profits that demonstrated an incredible level of engagement that aligns with Second Harvest's mission, and also has an outstanding impact on the community," she says.

"It's because of all of our shipments that we've been eathing, and can distribute in a very feet type year.

"It's because of all of our shipments that we've been getting, and can distribute in a very fast turnaround period. They were really impressed. Katie Hepp from Second Harvest is our rep from Regina, and she came out for the potato shipment when the potatoes got stuck in the truck (due to a broken conveyor belt). She saw the things that went on with it and how we had to improvise and get the high school students out to help us, and she was really impressed, so when they were doing their awards, she nominated us and said we were com-

pletely deserving of it.

"In that case, the potatoes came in a truck, and the truck was supposed to have a belt where you push a button and the potatoes move out of the truck. We had all of these bins from Flaman's that they donated. First they blew something and then we had to get Todd Davidson in to fix it, and I guess the truck wasn't equipped to handle that much load, and so the potatoes were

'So we had to climb into the back of the truck and push thousands of pounds of potatoes down into the conveyor belt. We used our feet, our hands, we were black. And we were getting tired so we had to call the high school students to come, climb into the back of the truck and do the bins, it was crazy.

# WestmanRCMP Report

#### 80 calls for service

From November 16 to 22, the Westman RCMP received a total of 80 calls for service. #### Removing tokens of love and remembrance at the Wapella cemetery

I never imagined I would have to write a letter like this, but the events at Wapella Cemetery have left me deeply disturbed. By now, most peo-ple are likely aware of the shocking decision by a few people to remove flowers and solar lights from the vases attached to the headstones and on top of the graves.

on top of the graves. This practice of removing all tokens of love and remembrance has not happened in all the years I have had loved ones interred at the cemetery. What is even more upsetting is that we found out that notice that this was to happen was only communicated via a brief notice in the local newsletter and a Facebook post on the Town of Wapella page. Additionally, no due date was specified for the items to be removed. This is especially frustrating since I no longer live in the area, but I still have many family members and friends who do, and none of them were aware of this sudden decision either. Their flowers and other items were removed and thrown out at the dump as well. I know I'm not alone

were removed and thrown out at the dump as well. I know I'm not alone in feeling that this was an unforgivable act of vandalism. There is simply no reason for someone to discard the memories we've placed at the

ply no reason for someone to discard the memories we've placed at the gravesites of our loved ones. In this day and age, it can't be that difficult to make a concerted effort to contact family members about such changes. I've lived away from Wapella for 35 years, but I'm sure that with just a little effort, someone could have tracked me down. I still have relatives in the area who weren't even made aware that their parents' graves were going to be affected. My family, especially on my mother's side (the Lydia Restau family), is quite large, so I know it would have been possible to reach out if proper effort had been made.

Additionally, it's not just the items placed in front of the headstones

Additionally, it's not just the items placed in front of the headstones that were removed. Items attached directly to the stones, such as solar lights and vases of flowers, were also taken. These items are part of how families honor their loved ones. How could that possibly be a problem for the caretaker? I visited the cemetery on November 22, 2025, and I was horrified by the state of the grounds. The place looked bare, with only broken tree branches scattered across the ground and uncut grass. There are also talks of not allowing any items at gravesides moving forward. Each family purchases their own plots, and they should be allowed to maintain them in a respectful manner—within reason, of course. In all my years visiting Wapella Cemetery, I've never seen anyone "overdoing it." If rules need to be put in place, they should be voted on by the council, clearly communicated, and posted at the cemetery. Ideally, this should be done in the spring when the snow melts, giving people plenty of time to comply. If items aren't removed by the due date, they should be carefully collected and stored somewhere. Efforts should then be made to contact the owners, because not everyone lives within two hours of Wapella.

On a positive note, I would like to thank Heather Statz and every one who worked so hard to recover as many of the discarded items as possible. Thanks to their efforts, I was able to recover a few things that

belonged to my family. However, I fear many others were not so lucky. I'm writing this as a former resident who still cares deeply about this community and the people who are affected by these actions. I truly hope that the cemetery board will reconsider its approach and work toward a solution that respects the memories of the families who have loved ones buried there.

# Would McKenna spark a Flames' revival?

Should the Calgary Flames be gaggin' for Gavin? The big prize in next summer's National Hockey League amateur draft is expected to be Gavin McKenna, the pride of Whitehorse, Yukon, a former Medicine Hat Tiger superstar and currently a high-profile winger with Penn State, a National Collegiate Athletic Association becker program.

Next year, when he's 18, he's probably going to be a member of an NHL team, with McDavid- and Bedard-like expectations. Flames' fans hope he'll be wearing the flaming 'C' when he steps onto an NHL ice surface.

Thanks to the draft's lottery system, having the league's worst record is no guarantee of picking No 1. But it certainly enhances the opportunity, and the Flames, currently languishing near the bottom of the 32-team NHL,

rently languishing near the bottom of the 32-team NHL, may as well try to manoeuvre those odds in their favour. How? By losing as much as possible.

Drafting a franchise cornerstone like McKenna could be the beginning of a Flames' turnaround. They are not only among the worst teams in the league, but also one of the oldest. Four offensive leaders, Nazem Kadri, Jonathan Huberdeau, Mikael Backlund and Blake Coleman, are all on the wrong side of 30. Their team loog should be

are all on the wrong side of 30. Their team logo should be a rocking chair, not a flaming 'C'

A total rebuild is in order. A few younger pieces are already in place, such as goalies Devin Cooley and Dustin Wolf, who was a rookie-of-the-year finalist last season, Wolf, who was a rookie-of-the-year finalist last season, Matt Coronato, Connor Zary, Morgan Frost, Joel Farrabee and recent draft picks Zayne Parekh and Sam Honzek. Adding a star like McKenna and dispatching some of the aging deadwood via trades for younger players or draft picks would go a long way to righting the Flames ship. Tearing down and rebuilding has worked for other teams. The Oilers lucked out by getting McDavid in 2015 and they've been a Stanley Cup finalist two years in a row.

Chicago Blackhawks and San Jose Sharks, after years in the doldrums, are now contenders after selecting Connor Bedard and Macklin Celebrini, respectively. Anaheim Ducks are one of the big surprises of the current NHL season thanks to some astute drafting of players such as Leo Carlsson, Mason McTavish and Jackson Lacombe. Montreal Canadiens are another example of a team that put its fans through years of suffering before building a young, solid roster through the draft. Cole Caufield, Lane Hutson, Ivan Demidov and Juraj Slafkovsky all came through the draft, as did captain Nick Suzuki, who was picked in the first round by Vegas but abruptly traded to Montreal in the Max Pacioretty deal.

Being bad and drafting high doesn't work for everyone. Buffalo Sabres haven't made the playoffs since 2010-11, despite twice having the No. 1 pick in the draft — Rasmus Dahlin in 2018 and Owen Power in 2021. They also got Jack Eichel at No. 2 after McDavid in 2015.

The Sabres situation proves there are no guarantees. But a rebuild has to start somewhere, so keep losing Calgary and hope those draft lottery ping pong balls bounce Chicago Blackhawks and San Jose Sharks, after years in



# Whitewood building new rec park

#### Town received ICIP grant for \$623,142 for project it hopes to complete in 2028

BY DONNA BEUTLER Whitewood's dream of a new recreation park is on its way towards becoming a reality. The park would include new ball diamonds, a soccer field and track, disc golf and

an outdoor arena as part of its plan.

The space, located on what locals refer to as "The South Quarter," is on the south edge of Whiewood, adjacent to the most southernmost street (South Avenue) and Highway 9. The land will also become home to a playground and gathering spaces as well as walking trails, some of which already exist.

The idea for a new recreation park began when the town's previous Economic Development Committee (EDC) was discussing a number of ideas, having a 'wish list' type of discussion, a few years ago, based partly on the fact that Whitewood's current ball diamond location (off the main street on the north side of town) doesn't have room for another diamond. Some rough maps and ideas were put together by the group with the cohesive feeling of, 'wouldn't this be a dream come true.'

The idea was presented to the town's grant writer at the time who applied for the post-Covid Investing In Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) grant and, as Chief Administrator Office for the Town of Whitewood Lisa Istace said,

'Lo and behold, we got it!"

"The total contribution from the ICIP grant is \$623,142,"

Istace told the World-Spectator.
It took a year or two for the ground work to begin but this past summer, Springer Construction moved in with its heavy machinery, moving dirt and creating the spaces that

will become the new recreational park.

"Planting grass will be completed in the spring," Istace said. "Some weather delays didn't allow us to get that done this fall.

"The ball diamonds, concession and washrooms need to

be built and the outdoor arena will be installed in the summer so that will be ready to go next winter."

As for this winter, the walking trails are and will be open, and once the snow arrives, the toboggan hill will

The plans for the old ball diamonds will likely see the decommissioning of Diamonds 2 and 3, and in their place there could be an expansion to the campground which currently sits adjacent to the diamonds. While there isn't an exact timeline on some of the plans, the ideas have been on the table since the grant was first applied for three

years ago.

Groundwork for the proposed future fire hall in Whitewood also took place this past summer. The location of this facility is adjacent to the new park area and just south of South Avenue.

The town is presently looking for sponsorship to help bring their vision to life. This sponsorship would support both equipment and infrastructure as it works towards completing all areas by 2028, the timeline specified by the

grant.
"This (plan for the new park) is exciting," Istace added.

# Moosomin Food Share wins award from Second Harvest for accepting many big food donations

Why does the Food Share keep accepting so many shipments from Second Harvest?

"Because I know we can get rid of them!" says Campbell. "It's awesome that we can serve not just our community but the communities around us as well. We're a non-profit, and we have to rely on people donating to us, so to be able to give back to the other communities and people that have helped us along the way, that's why we keep doing it"

"It's wonderful. I was very surprised when Katie called and told us we'd been nominated for the award and had won it. When you think of Regina and Saskatoon and bigger places like that, you think Moosomin's not really on the map. These shipments and getting nominated is really putting us on the map so it feels great."

Campbell says the Food Share will continue accepting shipments from Second Harvest because they know the food will be used.

"I told Katie, anything they are willing to give, we will take," she says.

"She told me some cities will only accept two pallets of food. It doesn't matter what kind of food it is, that's what their capacity is that they can get rid of,

and she said it's amazing that Moosomin compared to the cities can move 25,000 dozen eggs."

Campbell says the Vice-President of Second Harvest was dubious about a town the size of Moosomin being able to get rid of that many eggs, but Hepp assured her that Moosomin was the right place for the shipment. Campbell says the eggs were gone within a day.

"It feels good because Regina just does Regina, but we serve most of the southeast," she says. "We have people come from as far away as Spy Hill, Redvers, Carlyle, Kipling, Grenfell, Virden, Cowessess, from Elkhorn. And for days after we have people calling or showing up asking "is there still bananas, are there still eggs."

The Frontline Impact Award will be presented at an awards ceremony in Toronto in February and Campbell says she will be traveling to Toronto to accept the award.

Each year, The Second Harvest Food Rescue Awards aim to highlight the incredible work of individuals and organizations that have made significant contributions to food rescue efforts across Canada," says Katie Hepp with Second Harvest. frontline impact "The award recognizes agency partners that have demonstrated an incredible level of engagement with Second Harvest's mission, and have a truly outstanding impact in their com-

munity.

"Moosomin Food Share is the provincial winner of Second Harvest's 2026 Frontline Impact Award for Saskatchewan.

"In a town of around 3,000 people, Moosomin Food Share has rescued over 195,000 pounds of food since October of 2024.

Led by their incredible administrator, Sam Campbell, they have consistently rallied theirs, as well as surrounding communities, and worked closely with schools and other local organizations, to ensure these food donations are widely known and reach those who need them as quickly as possible.

quickly as possible.
"They are incredibly resourceful, having taken on several large-scale donations this year, upwards of 30,000 pounds each. When a 55,000-pound potato delivery had a malfunction, conveyor Sam and her team of volunteers climbed into the truck themselves to push potatoes out, then called reinforcements from local high school students to help unload, bag, and distribute the donation across the region.

"We are thankful for Moosomin Food Share's relentless dedication and the countless hours they pour into caring for their community and we are so proud to work alongside them in the fight against food waste and food insecurity here in our province.

"46.5 percent of all food in Canada is wasted every year. That's nearly half of all the food, that our farmers, producers and manufactures are working tirelessly to provide to communities across this country, ending up in the landfill. No one who spends weeks or months or years producing food is doing so with the hope that it ultimately ends up

in the garbage. The goal is for it to be eaten and enjoyed. When Moosomin food share is able to accept these full trailer load donations, often upwards of 30,000 pounds, that's tens of thousands of pounds of food that gets to end up on people's plates instead of becoming landfill."

Hepp says it has been a pleasure working with Moosomin Food Share.

"Getting to know and work with the Moosomin Food Share, their volunteers and the residents within the community has been an absolute privilege.

"When we reach out to Sam with large donation offers, she never shies away from them. These are massive donations, and they're a huge undertaking to receive and redistribute, but her instinct is always 'yes, we will make this work' and she does make it work, 100 pre cent of the time.

"What really stands out to me is how quickly they are able to turn these donations around. The way the entire community comes together to rally around these donations is really a sight to behold. Volunteers and community members show up, the food gets unloaded, and it doesn't remain there for long. It's received, sorted, and back out into the community at an extraordinary pace.


