"It's nice. Lot's of times I think we have had over 20 floats in the parade. We really want to get more of the community involved, more businesses. We would like to have a lot more than we have more businesses. We would like to have a lot more than we have had previous years. The first year, I think because everyone was so excited, it was very full but then it kind of dwindled, but it is hard to make a float in the winter. We hope to have more businesses go in this year. We have a few new participants, Kenosee Lake Bible camp is going to come. Hopefully we can get a lot more people even if it's from surrounding communities."

This year's food drive will support the Moosomin Food Share, which Russell said is serving a growing number of clients. "The Food Bank has around 90 clients to feed at around \$75 per client," said Tracy. "The season can be challenging for donors. It's hard too because the school does a week of food collection, so we know it's tough for people to give again, but we would like to see people donate if they can.

"Usually around Christmas there is a lot more food needed just because they are trying to give clients ham and potatoes and ev-erything they need for Christmas hampers. Samantha Campbell (with the Food Share) did say that she likes to remind people that everyone is 'just one bad life altering moment away from using the food bank,' so she hopes people can still give even though everyone is still of tight for money," said Russell.



17-year-old is third person charged in relation to Carry the Kettle murders in February

Murder charges have been laid against a third individual—a 17-year-old male—in relation to the February murders of two men and two women on Carry the Kettle Nakoda Nation

On December 10 police officers with Saskatchewan RCMP's Major Crimes Unit and Indian Head RCMP Detachment executed a search warrant at a residence on Carry the Kettle Nakoda Nation with the assistance of officers from File Hills First Nations Police Service. RCMP officers arrested a 17-year-old male youth at

the residence. The youth can not be identified as per the Youth Criminal Justice Act.

The youth has been charged with four counts of first-degree murder in relation to the deaths of Tracey Hotomani, Sheldon Quewezance, Shauna Fay and Terry Jack.

The youth is also charged with one count, attempted murder. Investigation determined an altercation occurred between the youth and a fifth individual at the

The youth is scheduled to appear in Regina Provincial Court on December 11, 2025, at 9:30 a.m.

"This investigation didn't end when the initial charges were laid. For the past 10 months, our investigators have kept working to provide answers to the victims' fami-lies, and to the community of Carry the Kettle Nakoda Nation," says Insp. Ashley St. Germaine, Senior Investigative Officer with the Saskatchewan RCMP's Major Crimes Branch.

"Through this ongoing and complex investigation, the Saskatchewan RCMP constantly assessed risks to public safety. As the investigation progressed, officers identified a third person involved. After consulting with Crown prosecutors, investigators developed a plan to safely arrest the youth and proceed with charges. This result reflects the commitment of Saskatchewan RCMP officers across the province, whose hard work and ex-

pertise kept this case moving forward." On February 4, 2025, File Hills First Nations Police Ser-

vice received a report of sudden deaths at a residence on Carry the Kettle Nakoda Nation. Officers responded and located four deceased persons in the residence. Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes took carriage of the investigation and investigated the deaths as homicides. Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes located and arrested 18-year-old Darrius Racette in Yorkton, SK on February 18-2025. A 15-year-old part us to the weather the contract of the contract of

Darrius Racette and the male youth are each charged with four counts of first-degree murder in relation to the deaths of Tracey Hotomani, Sheldon Quewezance, Shauna Fay and Terry Jack.

File Hills First Nations Police Service, Regina Police Services and Saskatchewan RCMP's General Investigation Section, Forensic Identification Services, Historical Case Unit, Saskatchewan Enforcement Response Teams, Indigenous Policing Services, and local RCMP detachments all assisted with this investigation.

Shooting of Tanya Myers

Fahlman appeared in court Tuesday

Chris Fahlman, the man charged in the shooting death of Tanya Myers on a highway near Weyburn in September, appeared in Weyburn Provincial Court

on Tuesday, December 9.
Fahlman has been charged with second-degree murder in the shootof Tanva Myers on Highway 39 north of Wey-burn on September 12. Myers was travelling with a friend when a bullet en-tered the vehicle they were in and killed her.

At Fahlman's court appearance on December 9, there were discussions about setting a preliminary inquiry date

Fahlman has also been charged with intentionally discharging a firearm while

being reckless as to the life safety of another person. Fahlman remains in custody. His next court appearance is set for December 18 in Weyburn.

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Kipling town council

Council picks location for new splash park

At their meeting on Monday, Kipling Town Council chose a location for the town's new splash park.
After looking at the costs of bringing water and sewer infrastructure to the splash park at a number of locations in town, the town decided the splash park will be located on the east side of the tennis courts facing 5th Avenue behind the community centre.

CAO Brenna Ackerman says the decision was based on a number of things including the costs of the infrastruc-ture, the fact that the location gets a lot of sun exposure, and also because there is adequate room in that location for the splash park

The splash park is an joint effort of the town and the

Kipling Lions Club, who are actively fundraising for the project. While the town is unsure of when ground will break for the new splash park, planning is underway.

Repairs to WTP pump, curling rink compressor

At their meeting on Monday, council passed a mo-tion to spend \$16,750 with Municipal Utilities to repair the column on the town's water treatment plant backup pump. The current column is pitted and cracking, and the replacement will be stainless steel. The money will come

out of the town's water reserves.

The town also discussed repairs that were needed to the compressor at the curling rink in order to get the compressor started for the season. Stevenson Industrial Refrigeration was hired to do the repairs.

Old street sweeper purchased

After purchasing a new street sweeper, council received an offer for their old sweeper and accepted the offer at their meeting on Monday. The offer was for \$5,000.

Request for new curling rocks

Council received a request from the curling club for new curling rocks for the curling rink. The cost would be \$4,500 to buy three sets or \$2,500 to rent three sets.

Council declined the request as the rocks were not budgeted for and as per the curling club lease, purchasing the rocks would fall to the responsibility of the curling club.

Moe shuffles cabinet

Five enter cabinet for first time, eight ministers remain in portfolios, four remain in cabinet but take on different responsibilities

Premier Scott Moe made changes to his cabinet Thurs-

day. Five MLAs are entering cabinet for the first time. All five were first elected in 2024.

"Nearly half of our government caucus was first elected in 2024, but I didn't want to bring too many brand new members into cabinet right after the election," Premier Scott Moe said.

"Those members now have more than a year of experi-

ence as MLAs and with today's changes, one-third of cabinet will be new members. That will give our government

a strong balance of experience and fresh perspectives."

Is Carney falling into the same fiscal traps as Trudeau?

Carney promised a fresh start. His budget makes it look like we're still stuck with the same old Trudeau playbook

It turns out the Trudeau government really did look at Canada's economy through rose-coloured glasses. Is the Carney government falling into the same

New research from the Frontier Centre for Public Policy shows that federal budgets during the Trudeau years "consistently overestimated [Canada's] fiscal health" when it came to forecasting the state of the nation's economy and finances

In his research, policy analyst Conrad Eder finds that, when looking specifi-cally at projections of where the economy would be four years out, Trudeau-era budgets tended to have forecast errors of four per cent of nominal GDP, or an average of \$94.4 billion.

Because budgets were so much more optimistic about long-term growth, they consistently projected that government revenue would grow at a much faster pace. The Trudeau government then made spending commitments, assuming the money would be there. And when the forecasts did not keep up, deficits simply

As Eder writes, "these dramatic discrepancies illustrate how the Trudeau gov-ernment's longer-term projections consistently underestimated the persistence of fiscal challenges and overestimated its ability to improve the budgetary balance." Eder concludes that politics came into play and influenced how the Trudeau

government framed its forecasts. Rather than focusing on the long-term health of Canada's finances, the Trudeau government was focused on politics. But presenting overly optimistic forecasts has long-term consequences.

"When official projections consistently deviate from actual outcomes, they obscure the scope of deficits, inhibit effective fiscal planning, and mislead policy-

makers and the public," Eder writes.

"This disconnect between projected and actual fiscal outcomes undermines the reliability of long-term planning tools and erodes public confidence in the government's fiscal management."

The public's confidence in the Trudeau government's fiscal management was so low, in fact, that by the end of 2024 the Liberals were polling in the high teens, behind the NDP.

behind the NDP.

The key to the Liberal Party's electoral survival became twofold: the "elbows up" rhetoric in response to the Trump administration's tariffs, and the choice of a new leader who seemed to have significant credibility and was disconnected from the fiscal blunders of the Trudeau years.

Mark Carney was recruited to run for the Liberal leadership as the antidote to Trudeau. His résumé as governor of the Bank of Canada during the Great Recession and his subsequent years leading the Bank of England seemed to offer Canadians the complete opposite of the fiscal inexperience of the Trudeau years.

These two factors together helped turn around the Liberals' fortunes and secured the party a fourth straight mandate in April's elections.

But now Carney has presented a budget of his own, and it too spills a lot of red ink.

ink.

This year's deficit is projected to be a stunning \$78.3 billion, and the federal deficit is expected to stay over \$50 billion for at least the next four years.

The fiscal picture presented by Finance Minister François-Philippe Champagne

was a bleak one.

What remains to be seen is whether the chronic politicking over long-term forecasts that plagued the Trudeau government will continue to be a feature of the

As bad as the deficit figures look now, one has to wonder, given Eder's re-earch, whether the state of Canada's finances is even worse than Champagne's

budget lets on.

As Eder says, years of rose-coloured budgeting undermined public trust and

As Leter says, years of rose-coolined rougeting underlimited public trust and misled both policymakers and voters. The question now is whether this approach to the federal budget continues under Carney at the helm.

Budget 2025 significantly revises the economic growth projections found in the 2024 fall economic statement for both 2025 and 2026. However, the forecasts for 2027, 2028 and 2029 were left largely unchanged.

If Eder is right, and the Liberals are overly optimistic when it comes to four-year forecasts, then the 2025 budget should worry Canadians. Why? Because the Carney government did not change the Trudeau government's 2029 economic projections by even a fraction of a per cent.


projections by even a fraction of a per cent. In other words, despite the gloomy fiscal numbers found in Budget 2025, the Carney government may still be wearing the same rose-coloured budgeting glasses as the Trudeau government did, at least when it comes to long-range fiscal planning.

If the Carney government wants to have more credibility than the Trudeau

government over the long term, it needs to be more transparent about how long-term economic projections are made and be clear about whether the Finance Department's approach to forecasting has changed with the government. Oth-erwise, Carney's fiscal credibility, despite his résumé, may meet the same fate as



Kipling Food Drive held December 7



Esterhazy Minor Hockey Theft

Cory Smith court date set for Jan. 13

The court date for Cory Smith, the man accused of stealing \$46,000 from the Esterhazy Minor Hockey Association, has been set for January 13, 2026 and the matter will be addressed that day.

Smith was due to appear in Esterhazy Provincial Court

on December 9, 2025.

Smith has been charged with one count of theft over \$5,000 after he was accused of stealing \$43,000 through e-transfer and \$3,000 in cash from Esterhazy Minor Hockey Association.
EMHA president Glen Simon said the board began in-

vestigating the theft in July before handing the investiga-

tion over to the RCMP. Smith was the treasurer for the Esterhazy Minor Hockey Association.
The EMHA also suspended the ability for any individ-

ual to do electronic funds transfers, and said they will be returning to the practice of using cheques with dual signatures to prevent similar incidents in the future.


