Saskatchewan wholesale trade growth on top

On December 12, Statistics Canada announced Saskatchewan experienced a 12 per cent increase in wholesale trade (excluding petroleum, petroleum products, and other hydrocarbons and excluding oilseed and grain) from October 2024 to October 2025. This ranks first among the provinces. Month-over-month also increased 4.6 per cent, ranking second in Canada.

"Our government remains committed to fostering a competitive business environment while improving quality of life, making our province the destination of choice to live, work and raise a family," Trade and Export Development Minister Warren Kaeeding said. "An increase in wholesale trade shows increased consumer confidence, which allows us to attract more investment into the province and in turn spend more on the programs, services and infrastructure citizens rely on."

In October 2025, the total value of wholesale trade (excluding petroleum, petroleum products, and other hydrocarbons and excluding oilseed and grain) was \$4 billion.

Wholesale trade is a measure of the value of goods purchased in large quantities with the intention of being sold to resellers, but not to final consumers.

Statistics Canada's latest GDP numbers indicate that Saskatchewan's 2024 real GDP reached an all-time high of \$83.6 billion, increasing by \$2.5 billion or 3.1 per cent. This ranks Saskatchewan second in the nation for real GDP growth and above the national average of 1.7 per cent.

Private capital investment in Saskatchewan increased last year by 17.3 per cent to \$14.7 billion, ranking first among provinces. Private capital investment is projected to reach \$16.2 billion in 2025, an increase of 10.1 per cent over 2024. This is the second highest anticipated percentage increase among the provinces.

Last year, the Government of Saskatchewan unveiled its new Securing the Next Decade of Growth - Saskatchewan's Investment Attraction Strategy. This strategy, combined with Saskatchewan's trade and investment website, InvestSK.ca, contains helpful information for investors and outlines why Saskatchewan is the best place to do business in Canada.



Westman RCMP Report

60 calls for service

From December 7-13, the Westman RCMP received a total of 60 calls for service. Some of these calls for service include 18 traffic offences, six mischief call, seven well-being checks, five Mental Health related call, one suspicious persons call, one false alarms, two 911 Acts, three intoxicated persons, two assaults and one operation while impaired file.

Speeding in the RM of Pipestone & RM of Wallace-Woodworth

On December 8 and 9 during routine traffic patrols within the RM of Pipestone and RM of Wallace-Woodworth, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 118 km/hr in a 90 km/hr zone. RCMP initiated a traffic stop, and the driver was issued a Traffic Offence Notice for speeding, which carries a fine of \$416. RCMP also observed a second vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 124 km/hr in a 100 km/hr zone. RCMP initiated a traffic stop, and the driver was issued a Traffic Offence Notice for speeding, which carries a fine of \$364.

Victim hit in head with metal pipe

On December 9, RCMP responded to a report of an assault with a weapon in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth. Members attended and located a victim with physical injury to their head. Members obtained a statement and learned the victim was hit with a metal pipe to the head. The victim was transported to the hospital for medical treatment. Members attended a separate address and located the accused who was arrested and charged for assault with a weapon, assault causing bodily harm, failing to comply with probation and failure to comply with two counts of release order. The accused was remanded into custody and is scheduled to appear in court.

Domestic assault in the RM of Two Borders

On December 11, RCMP responded to a report of a domestic assault in progress in the RM of Two Borders. Members attended and located a male and a female who both denied the allegations. Members investigated further and collected evidence, and both were charged for assault and were released on an undertaking to appear in court in February 2026.

Impaired driver stuck in snow

On December 13, RCMP responded to a report of a suspicious activity in the town of Virden. Members attended and located a vehicle stuck in the snow. Upon arrival, RCMP completed a sobriety check with a 20-year-old female. The driver showed signs of impairment and blew WARN on two separate samples. The driver was issued a three-day license suspension, and the vehicle was towed by Virden Towing.

Speeding in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth

On December 13, during routine traffic patrols within the RM of Wallace-Woodworth, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 144 km/hr in a 100 km/hr zone. RCMP initiated a stop, and the driver was issued a Traffic Offence Notice for Speeding, which carries a fine of \$626.

Construction approaching 70% completion on Saskatoon's New Urgent Care Centre

Construction of the new Saskatoon Urgent Care Centre (UCC) continues to progress, nearing 70 per cent completion. The project has completed essential aspects including the structure, roofing and interior framing. Drywall installation is actively progressing with electrical and mechanical work ongoing.

"It is exciting to see the progress on the new Saskatoon Urgent Care Centre, knowing the impact it will have in improving access to care for Saskatoon families dealing with illnesses and injuries that require immediate attention," Health Minister Jeremy Cockrill said.

When complete, the UCC will offer treatment for minor illness, injuries, mental health and addiction supports, that are non-life-threatening but typically require urgent same day treatment.

The UCC will be located near St. Paul's Hospital and will be operated by the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) through a long-term lease agreement with Ahtakakooop Cree Developments (ACD), who has partnered with the government on the project. Substantial completion is anticipated in Fall 2026.

Since opening in July 2024, the Regina UCC has provided same-day care to over 57,000 patients. Planning is underway to add UCCs in Prince Albert, Moose Jaw, North Battleford and second locations in both Regina and Saskatoon.






