Desperate Man, 2021 Canadian Horse of the Year, has retired from the track

When Kathy Cecchin talks about her standardbred gelding, Desperate Man (Slick), she beams with pride over what this horse has accomplished in his career.

Kathy Cecchin was raised in the village of Welwyn north of Moosomin. When Cecchin was in her 20s she moved to Arthur, Ontario and she now has a ranch outside of this town.

Cecchin and her husband John own standardbred horses. In 2019 they purchased a yearling named Desperate Man from the Lexington Selected Yearling sale form the Winbak Farm consignment. They wanted his bloodlines and paid \$20,000 for the young horse. He was trained by Cecchin and to this day is the only horse she has trained, and she is proud of how Slick turned out.

In 2021 Slick won the Pepsi North America Cup, a prestigious race, driven by Trevor Henry. He beat future hall of famer Bulldog Hanover and two-time Dan Patch Award winner, Perfect Sting. This was going to be the beginning of a great career for the young horse. He was then named 2021 Canadian Horse of the Year.

Slick had 89 races as a pacer, and won 33 of them, placed second in 15 races and came in third for 13 of them. But last September he began to show some discomfort in his walk. He was placed on stall rest right away.

After having his ankle joint x-rayed, they felt he may have taken a bad step, as nothing showed in the x-rays. The discomfort continued with Slick. "He just was not himself," said Cecchin. They figured maybe he was tired and needed some time off.

Slick was in New York and Cecchin had not seen him for two years. They brought the now seven-year-old gelding home to Arthur, Ontario. "We could not take the

chance on racing him and Slick getting hurt," she said.

Dr. Melissa McKee did further testing, and another series of x-rays called floor scopes were performed, and it was at this time they showed a chip on his ankle that did not appear on the earlier x-rays. According to McKee this chip was causing a great deal of pain in the horse. It also showed that the ankle joint also had significant changes.

In order to remove the chip, surgery was needed and this was performed on January 5, 2026, which was done by Dr. Orlaith Cleary at the King Animal Hospital in New Market. Three small incisions were done, two for cameras and one to remove the chip. The surgery itself was not long, but it was a very delicate procedure. The chip was found immediately and removed.

It was also noted that during the surgery, Slick's cartilage had deteriorated 40 per cent. This was not caused by an injury, it was basic wear and tear on his legs. Slick is not a small horse; he is 17 hands tall and weighs 1352 pounds. Most standardbred horses are around 1,000 pounds.

He is now on the road to recovery. It will require 12 weeks of complete stall rest, only leaving his stall to be cleaned. After this, he may be hand walked for a short period and gradually this will be increased. The overall recuperation time is eight months.

"He is such a positive horse, and he looks great," said Cecchin. "But his racing days are over, and he will live like royalty on the farm until his last day."

Slick has earned nearly \$2.4 million in his career.

"He is a superstar," said Cecchin. "He deserves a life without pain and to be pampered."

Slick, once healed, will enjoy green grass, a warm barn on cool days, and being loved for the rest of his life during his retirement from the track.

Redvers Town Council

Council approves building permit for water treatment plant upgrade

At their meeting on Wednesday, Redvers town council approved the building permit for the water treatment plant upgrade. The town will now be sending the plans for the water treatment plant upgrade to Municode in order to obtain a building permit from Municode.

CAO Tricia Pickard said last week the town hopes to see shovels in the ground in the spring. The tender for construction of the new water treatment plant closes this Thursday, January 27.

"Our engineer will put a document together of all the tenders and contractors and council will review it and then that tender will be awarded to a contractor," she says.

"We are hoping things can get rolling in the spring."

The town was approved for \$4.5 million through the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program for the water treatment plant upgrade, and is upgrading the existing water treatment plant with an reverse osmosis and green sand blend. The project will cost \$6.1 million with 73.33 per cent funded by grants, and the remaining 26.67 per cent funded by the town.

Town receiving grant for two new sidewalks

Under SGI's Provincial Traffic Safety Fund Grant, Redvers will receive \$50,000 for two new sidewalks near the Redvers Activity Centre.

The sidewalks will be installed on a portion of Warren Street, north of McDonald Avenue.

The town also applied for speed bumps and push button crosswalks on that portion of street. They did not receive grant funding for those but plan to apply for it again next year.

Decision on SK Recyclables will be made at special meeting

The town will be holding a special meeting before February 1 to decide whether they want to go with the Community Led or Program Led option under the new SK Recycles program that will see SK Recycles cover the entire cost of recycling services in Saskatchewan.

Under the program-led option, SK Recycles would



choose who does recycling collection for the town. Under the community-led option, it would be up to the town who does their recycling.

"Our biggest snag is they have a written section that talks about incentives, so if you sign with them you will get an incentive for the next two years," says CAO Tricia Pickard.

However the town is also looking at the community-led option in which a number of municipalities have signed on with Red Coat Waste Authority under the program to continue receiving recycling services from Loraas Disposal.

Pickard said last week she would be talking to SK Recyclables to get more information.

A decision must be made by February 1.

Town discusses how to move lots in Perreux Subdivision

Council is discussing ways to move lots in the Perreux Subdivision, as well as the town's 1997 subdivision, where there is one lot left. There are 29 lots in the Perreux Subdivision. While the town has tried a few different promotions over the years, none have sold and they are continuing to look at ideas.

Tender for empty lots accepted

A tender for 20 Eisenhower Street a tender was accepted. The two empty lots, which were tax title properties turned back over to the town, will go to Phil and Theresa Draper for \$10,000. The Drapers will be moving a house onto the property.

RFPs issued for new long-term care homes in Estevan, Watson

The Government of Saskatchewan has issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) seeking proponents to design, build, maintain and operate new long-term care homes in Watson and Estevan.

"Our government is committed to providing the best health care for Saskatchewan seniors and safe, comfortable homes for those requiring long-term care," Seniors and Rural and Remote Health Minister Lori Carr said. "The third-party approach will be the most efficient and cost-effective option

and is expected to expedite delivery of both Watson and Estevan long-term care home projects."

The new Estevan long-term care home will provide 65 more beds than the existing Estevan Regional Nursing Home, for a total of 135 long-term care beds. The preferred site previously announced remains an option. However, all viable site options submitted via proposals will be considered.

"My heart is warmed with the news that the new Estevan Regional Nursing Home project is moving

ahead with the issuance of a Request for Proposal to design, build, and operate our new facility," New Estevan Regional Nursing Home (NERNH) Committee Chair Don Kindopp said. "Our elders deserve to live in a more home-like environment supported by the continuation of the excellent care they now receive. The NERNH Committee looks forward to developing a strong new relationship with whoever is awarded the RFP. My thanks to our MLA, the Honourable Lori Carr, who has been such a strong

advocate, and to our Saskatchewan Government that has decided to take this new path."

Watson's Quill Plains Centennial Lodge is currently home to 52 long-term care residents and the new home will offer 60 long-term care beds.

Saskatchewan has a long history of strong partnerships with third party providers for the delivery of health care services and there are long-term care centres across the province operating under similar partnership models. The Watson and Estevan long-

term care homes will be owned and operated by the third parties but will be required to follow all Saskatchewan regulations and standards.

As the need for long-term care services continues to increase in Saskatchewan, the Watson and Estevan long-term care home projects are part of the government's overall commitment to improve long-term care services and facilities across the province.

The 2025-26 Provincial Budget allotted over \$400 million to support acute and long-term care facility

replacement and expansion projects, including \$4 million to advance the Watson and Estevan long-term care projects. Submissions will be reviewed and a contract for each facility is expected to be in place by summer 2026.

Westman RCMP Report

93 calls for service

During the past two weeks, Westman RCMP received a total of 93 calls for service. Some of these calls for service include 24 traffic offences, four wellbeing checks, six mental health related calls, five false alarms, seven 911 Acts, one Assistance to Canadian Agencies/General Public, two assaults, three Coroner's Act – sudden deaths, three utter threats, three failure to stop or remain at accident scene, three failure to comply with orders and six mischief files.

Failure to comply with curfew orders

On January 6, RCMP received a report that an 18-year-old male bound by a court ordered curfew was not at his residence during curfew hours. He was later located and placed under arrest for an outstanding warrant from another jurisdiction and remanded into custody for failing to comply with the conditions of his release. He will appear in court later this month.

Use of hand-held electronic device while driving

On January 9, during routine traffic patrols in the Town of Virden, an 18-year-old male was pulled over for use of a cellular telephone or other hand-operated electronic device while driving a vehicle. A Traffic Offence Notice was issued, which carries a fine of \$672 and a 72-hour licence suspension. Later in the day a 38-year-old male in the Town of Virden was also pulled over for use of a cellular telephone or other hand-operated electronic device while driving a vehicle. A Traffic Offence Notice was issued, which carries a fine of \$672 and a 72-hour licence suspension.

Driving while disqualified in Virden

On January 9 during routine traffic patrols in the Town of Virden, a 25-year-old male was pulled over for driving while disqualified. A traffic offence notice was issued, which carries a fine of \$672, and the vehicle was towed and impounded.

Driving under the influence of alcohol and prohibited drugs

On January 10 a traffic stop was conducted in the Settlement of Sioux

Valley Dakota Nation. The 35-year-old male driver admitted to consuming alcohol, cannabis, and cocaine. Roadside tests were completed which showed positive for cannabis and cocaine, as well as the alcohol. The driver was arrested and brought back to the Virden RCMP Detachment. The vehicle was towed and impounded for a minimum of 60 days. Breath tests conducted at the detachment yielded results of 190, 160, and 170 mg %. The driver was later released on an appearance notice for court in March. His license was also suspended for three months.

Speeding vehicles caught on radar

On January 11 during routine traffic patrols within the RM Wallace-Woodworth, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 166 km/hr in a 110 km/hr zone. RCMP initiated a traffic stop, and the driver was issued a Traffic Offence Notice for Speeding, which carries a fine of \$783. The driver was also issued a Serious Offence Notice. RCMP also observed a second vehicle in the RM of Sifton travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 130 km/hr in a 100 km/hr zone. RCMP initiated a traffic stop, and the driver was issued a Traffic Offence Notice for Speeding, which carries a fine of \$442.

Driving while disqualified in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth

On January 11, in the RM Wallace-Woodworth, a 32-year-old female was pulled over for also driving while disqualified. A Traffic Offence Notice was issued, which carries a fine of \$672.

Sask Animal Enforcement Agency to take over animal welfare services

Agriculture Minister David Marit announced that the Saskatchewan Animal Enforcement Agency (SAEA) will become the new animal welfare enforcement agency in Saskatchewan as of April 1, 2026. This decision is part of the government's continued commitment to the safety and welfare of all animals in the province.

"Our government's new partnership with the Saskatchewan Animal Enforcement Agency continues to ensure animal welfare enforcement in our province," Marit said. "Together, we are looking to the future of animal protection that continues to deliver effective and compassionate enforcement for Saskatchewan residents and their animals."

Following the decision of Animal Protection Services of Saskatchewan to discontinue its operations effective March 31, 2026, the Ministry of Agriculture opened a public competition for a new service provider. The SAEA was the successful organization with long-term operational plans that meet the ministry's expectations for enforcement of



The Animal Protection Act. The SAEA will provide animal enforcement services for Saskatchewan, excluding the City

of Regina where the Regina Humane Society provides services.

"The Saskatchewan Animal Enforcement Agency looks forward to working with the Ministry of Agriculture as well as other external stakeholders in the province," Board Chair Russ Austin said. "The SAEA was created with the focus of delivering education and enforcement services with integrity, professionalism and transparency in all that we do."

The Government of Saskatchewan is committed to the safety and welfare of all animals in the province. This is why the Ministry of Agriculture held public consultations in 2025 which led to the recent amendments introduced in The Animal Protection Amendment Act, 2025. These amendments will strengthen the protection of animals by creating a new animal welfare inspector position and establishing a code of conduct for animal protection officers, as well as other enforcement enhancements.



81 calls for service
