Town hires engineering firm to do water treatment plant assessment

At their meeting on Wednesday, Rocanville Town Council reviewed proposals from three companies for a water treatment plant assessment and awarded the assessment to Associated Engineering for \$20,500.

Town Administrator Tanya Strandlund says the assessment will give the town an idea of the lifespan of their current water treatment plant, and a plan moving forward on what needs to be done in order to keep the water treatment plant in good operating order.

"This might help us decide if we are headed in the direction of a repair or a rebuild in future," she says. "We have been having some water issues and are trying extremely hard to address them."

Strandlund says Associated Engineering just did an assessment on a plant similar to Rocanville's, which is part of the reason they went with them for the assessment.

McAuley to the rescue

After having some zamboni issues on the weekend of Feb. 7, McAuley, Manitoba came to the rescue, lending Rocanville their zamboni for the weekend.

"McAuley lent their machine for the weekend and we can't say thank you enough to all the volunteers and people who have helped," says Administrator Tanya Strandlund.

Councillor Stan Langley took a trailer to McAuley to load the machine and Strandlund said they had volunteers working to get parts and fix the Rocanville zamboni in the meantime to get it up and running again.

Street sweeping company hired

The town will be hiring Virtue Construction to do street sweeping again in the spring. The town has used Virtue Construction for a number of years and is happy with

them. The town was quoted \$11,800 including taxes, but Administrator Tanya Strandlund noted that cost usually comes down as Virtue picks up a few other communities along their sweeping circuit in the area.

New furnace at rink

Flatland Plumbing and Heating will install a new furnace at the rink at a cost of \$6,972. There are two furnaces at the rink, with the first one going down last season, and the second one going down this season about three weeks ago.

Pool staff well trained

In the rec report it was mentioned that a number of pool staff have completed their NLS National Lifeguard Courses, meaning that about half the guards at the pool are now senior lifeguards. "So our staff is very well trained," says Administrator Tanya Strandlund.

RCMP arrived, and with information and statements provided, placed the 43-year-old male under arrest for aggravated assault, breaking and entering with intent, and possession of a weapon for dangerous purpose. He was remanded into custody and appears in court again this month. EMS attended and transported a single victim to hospital for treatment.

Vehicle collision in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth

On February 4, Westman RCMP were dispatched to a motor vehicle collision in the RM Wallace-Woodworth. A vehicle rear-ended another, causing it to go into the ditch and roll over. EMS attended the scene and treated minor injuries on scene. There were no signs of alcohol or drug use. Both vehicles were towed from the scene.

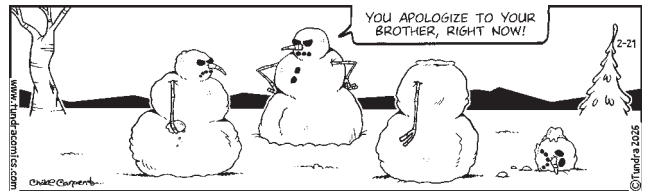
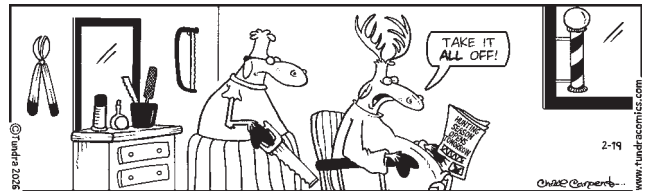
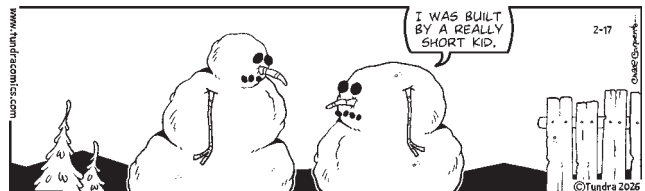
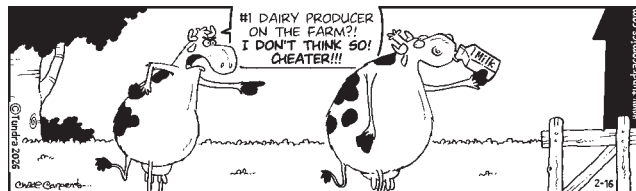
Novice driver caught under the influence of THC, cocaine and alcohol

Did you know?

There are many historic sites from Round Lake to the Manitoba border as you travel along the north side of the valley, one of them being approximately six miles south of Spy Hill.

A historic marker indicates the former community of Hamona, site of the first co-operative established in Saskatchewan. The Harmony Industrial Association was formed in 1895 in Manitoba, with the view to establish-

ing a new order of society based on co-operation. By 1898, about 50 members had moved to this idyllic spot in the Qu'Appelle Valley. But by 1901, the colony disbanded due to the disagreements and disappointment that the promised railway had taken another route. The railroad instead came up the valley at a different location and ended up going through Spy Hill. While the community itself was short-lived, some of the Hamona's residents went on to play a major role in Saskatchewan's co-operative movement. To this day, a picnic area exists with plaques and signs giving you the history of the area.

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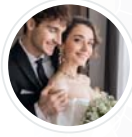

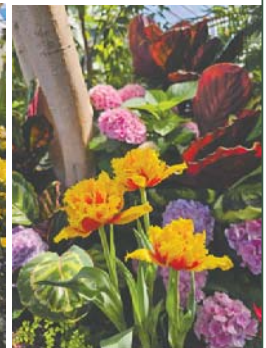

Basil John Holyer has had a full life, and he still enjoys the things he loves with his daughter Chris White. He moved in with Chris a year ago and now lives at White Bear First Nation.

Holyer was born in Weyburn on January 9, 1925, and he just turned 101 years old. He farmed four quarters of land in grain all his life and raised his three daughters Judy Holyer, Joy Holyer and Chris White after he was divorced.

Chris is the youngest and she has close connections with her dad and has many fond memories of being on the farm. She said her dad would take them sledding down the Souris River to Nickle Lake or to a gravel pit that was located near Weyburn. Back in the day there were no trails and they made do with what they had.

Holyer kept his daughters entertained not only with work on the farm but with go carting and minibikes. There

was always fun to be had on the farm after the work was done.

In the summer months the land work was taken care of first and with four quarters it kept Holyer busy, but once the work was completed it was time to have some fun. In the winter months equipment was prepared for the following season, and the snowmobiles came out for winter fun.

Holyer stayed on the farm until he was around 86 years old. He moved to Weyburn. Every weekend Chris picked up her dad and took him to her home in White Bear. A year ago, Chris and Holyer decided to have Holyer move in with Chris. Up until last year Holyer lived on his own.

Chris is very close to her father, so this transition was easy for her. Chris said her dad is still very good at 101 years of age.

When Holyer found out that Chris had bought a new-

to-her 800 snowmobile, he was very excited. It had been a while since he had been on one, but he had to try out the machine.

They geared up and set out on the trails for a short ride. They also went out on White Bear Lake. Chris said he loved it, and it was a great birthday gift. He plans to do the same thing for his 102nd birthday next year.

In Holyer's spare time he does puzzles and loves watching the Toronto Blue Jays baseball and does not miss a game. He was pretty disappointed when they lost in the world series, but he remained positive with his motto "There is always next year."

Holyer believes that his clean living has contributed to his long and fulfilled life. He looks forward to another season of Blue Jays baseball and doing puzzles. But next winter he is excited about taking another rip on Chris's snowmobile to celebrate another year of life.

Five years ago, 2021:

Rocanville's Jessica Campbell competed on CBC's Battle of the Blades. Campbell and her partner Asher Hill finished in second place, winning \$70,000, putting it forward to Do it for Daron and Freedom School Diversity initiatives; Students were sent home after a widespread power outage happened in Moosomin, Whitewood, Rocanville, Wapella, and Fleming. The kids were sent home because there was no estimated time when the power would come back on.

Ten years ago, 2016:

Wapella Pipestone Wildlife held their 29th annual banquet with awards, dinner and a fundraiser at the Wapella School; The Town of Moosomin offered to swap lots along Wright Road with land on Gordon Street to allow condo developer Albert Van Leeuwen to proceed with another 12 unit condo building in Moosomin.

Fifteen years ago, 2011:

The loonie was up to 101.82 cents US. The highest level the Canadian dollar had been in almost three years; Red Lily Wind Farm started producing power. One by one the turbines were activated which consisted of 16 wind turbines between Moosomin and Wapella. Red Lily can produce 26.4 megawatts of power, enough to power 9,000 to 10,000 homes.

Twenty years ago, 2006:

The Moosomin Kinsmen Club donated \$2,100 to the Moosomin Kids' Kollege to help pay the costs of enrollment for families who can't afford day care; The fourth annual Kinsmen Lottery raised \$30,000. People had the chance of winning the grand prize of \$1,000 every week for a year. The winning ticket belonged to the family of Curtis and Deena Offet.

On February 5, the local SAIL (Seniors Access to Independent Living) group had its 55-plus dance at the Elks Hall in Elkhorn. It was open for those under 55 as long as you like dancing. The event brought in a good crowd of dancers, both men and women, but it seemed by mid dance the men had to slow down a bit!

The crowd included Manitoba and Saskatchewan people. On the day of the event it was sunny and warm with the dance floor set up with tables and chairs, refreshments and some great chocolate chip cookies!

About a half hour into my play list of old-time waltzes, polkas and classic country and western hits, I noticed that not many people were dancing. I was told that many just

wanted to visit friends and neighbors after the very recent cold spell.

So I decided to change things up on my play list called "The Music of Your Life." I did some basic math (not my friend) and realized that I had a group of early rock and rollers under the tops of grey hair. I put on that 1955 rock and roll classic Rock Around The Clock by Bill Haley and His Comets, a song considered to be the first rock and roll song. I turned up the volume and the floor became alive with dancers, laughter and the group singing along with the music.

The rest of the afternoon I saw a new form of country and western line dancing that was given over to rock and roll dance steps! I began to mix it up with some country and western classics such as Ragtime Annie, Maple Sugar, Irene, Good Night, and The Auctioneer Song, and as always a few favorites, from an old friend from back home, Don Messier.

For the next two-plus hours the crowd danced to the '50s rock and roll classics such as Johnny B Goode, At The

Hop, Great Balls of Fire, Jail House Rock, Rockin' Robin, and Blue Suede Shoes to name a few. Some of the slow rock songs were Are You Lonesome Tonight, I'm Sorry, Oh Donna, and Blueberry Hill.

What made the afternoon dance even more unique was that all the music was played from 78 RPM vinyl records with some of the records being 80 years old and they still had that rock and roll magic!

Towards the end of the event a ticket draw was held for a Co-op \$25 gift card. After the show, a few people came up to thank me for the music and ask about a special request for a future SAIL dance.

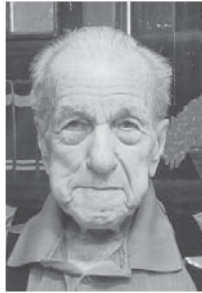

Koleen will be forever remembered for her huge heart, laughter and guidance and will be greatly missed. Koleen is lovingly remembered by husband,

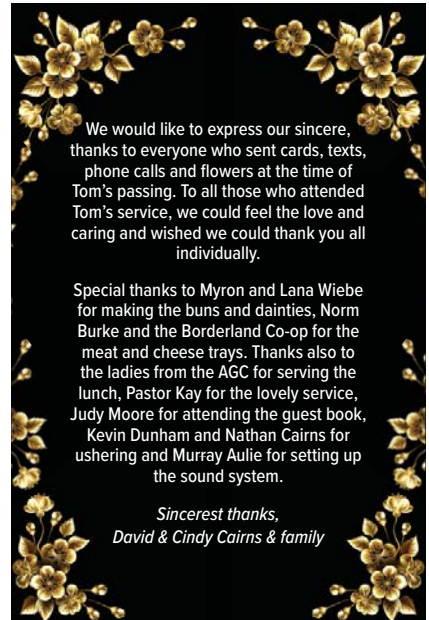

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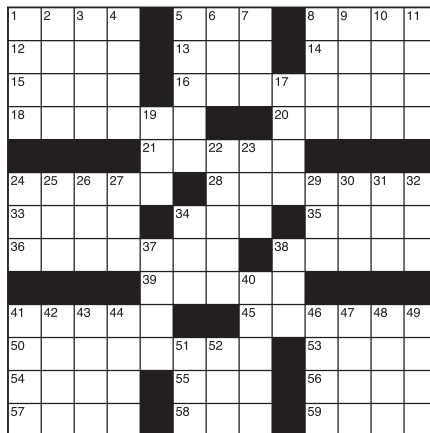
