## Women Entrepreneurs event in Moosomin held to gather and celebrate women in business

Celebrating International Women's Day by gathering and connecting women entrepreneurs

Women Entrepreneurs of Saskatchewan (WESK) is hosting an evening spotlighting local women entrepreneurs in Moosomin and their business experiences March 12 at the MCC.

Everyone is welcome to listen to stories and ask questions from four experienced women entrepreneurs in the area. Kari Kosior of Kari's Kloset, Kari Meyers of Kari's Pharmacy, Alyssa Jeannot of Jeannot Electric, and Nicole Campbell of Yorkton Concrete will be speaking about their experiences as rural women entrepreneurs.

Owner of House of Hearing, Chelsea Stewart, and Danielle Rhodes of Broadhead Construction, are hosting the event in Moosomin on behalf of WESK.

"With WESK, we do a variety of different events and different webinars throughout the year to try to support women entrepreneurs," Stewart said. "I am a rural ambassador for WESK. My role is to bring opportunities for business owners to rural Saskatchewan because in the past it seems like a lot of support and programming was primarily based out of Regina and Saskatoon.

"In the last year, we have been trying to provide that support to business owners throughout all of Saskatchewan and especially rural Saskatchewan. The International Women's Day event that is in Moosomin is about celebrating International Women's Day by gathering women and supporters of women in business. It doesn't just have to be women or business owners—everybody is welcome. The whole purpose of the event is to celebrate International Women's Day by connecting, having conversations, and learning through other like-minded individuals and business owners."

WESK Member Danielle Rhodes of Broadhead Construction explains details of the night at the MCC.

"The event is about sharing stories of local women entrepreneurs and is open to everyone. The panelists—local women entrepreneurs—will be asked questions that are tailored to their business attributes and their background

and their experience," she says. "They will be answering those accordingly, as well as any other panelist can feel free to jump in. Nicole Campbell, one of the panelists, is based out of Yorkton, however that is a sister community to ours, so we were happy to invite her just to make sure we had a diverse panel of female entrepreneurs for this event.

"The panelists are the subject matter experts within their respective business. I was asked to co-host this event and I wanted to have a diverse group of women who can cater to all interests for those who are in business already or looking to start a business or even at a manager level to get a better insight on some of the struggles that those folks had when they opened their business, or going through the stages of developing and growing their business, so that is why I chose a panelist in retail, pharmaceuticals, someone in construction, and also someone in commercial and residential construction."

Rhodes says WESK is working toward expanding resources to rural Saskatchewan women entrepreneurs. "This is relatively newer to rural Saskatchewan. Nearly three decades ago in 1995, Women Entrepreneurs of Saskatchewan, also known as WESK, opened in order to be able to ensure that women specifically within our province can grow and scale their businesses, because there wasn't a lot of services or opportunities out there. It was more geared to our male-dominated industry, and at the time, women entrepreneurs across the province were creating remarkable companies from nothing and had no support systems in place, so this way, by opening their doors, WESK was able to provide equal access to capital through additional networks to specifically tailor business support so that it would prevent any additional structural barriers for women trying to start a business or grow their business."

### Successful women entrepreneur community in Moosomin

Rhodes says Moosomin has a lot of successful businesses owned and run by women within the community. "Moosomin was chosen because I am a WESK member myself and a co-owner of Broadhead Construction, so I have been a member of WESK since 2024, and in discussing how diverse our town is and how many amazing establishment businesses that are already owned by women, I thought it was an absolutely great opportunity to host it in our town, so the town continues to prosper and thrive."

### Details about event

The event will be held at the Moosomin Convention Centre and is open to socializing and building connections throughout the night.

"The doors will open just before 6:30 pm on March 12 at the MCC Centre," Rhodes explained. "That will automatically entail networking, getting everyone a seat, getting comfortable, there will be appetizers and beverages that Witch's Brew's Sandra Garret is providing to us. At approximately 7 pm, the moderated panel discussion will start and go for about an hour or so just depending on questions. After the panel discussion, where there are segmented questions for our women entrepreneurs, the moderator will open it up to the floor to the guests that are in attendance to see if they have any questions for the panelists and see what advice or stories the panelists are willing to share with the audience in addition to the prepared questions. After 8 pm, folks are absolutely invited to stick around afterwards to continue networking if they have any additional questions they want to ask in private.

"We have Kari Kosier of Kari's Kloset, Kari Meyers of Kari's Pharmacy, Alyssa Jeannot of Jeannot Electric, and Nicole Campbell of Yorkton Concrete who are our panelists who will be asked questions based on their careers and businesses."

The event is posted on Facebook for the public to get more information.

"We have created an online Facebook registration events page for anyone interested in the event. It is called 'International Women's Day: Moosomin,'" said Rhodes. "For the Facebook registration page, it is not mandatory to register, but it is nice to know roughly the numbers of people so we can have appropriate accommodations."

### Connection to WESK

Rural Ambassador of WESK Chelsea Stewart credits the organization to helping her in the beginning stages of opening her business, House of Hearing.

"When I opened my business in Esterhazy about five years ago because my husband was transferred to Esterhazy for work, and we were living in Regina, and I was working for public health, it was weird trying to make the decision that if we move to Esterhazy, what am I going to do for work. I found WESK when I was starting to look into how to start a business. I basically had no business background and had no idea where to start.

"I reached out to WESK for business advising as my first step. I was paired with a business advisor, and she helped me through the process of the start-up checklist as far as creating a strong business plan. She helped me with different cashflow predictions, spreadsheets, and all of the incorporation process, basically everything from the absolute start-up until I opened my doors and still now.

"I honestly do credit for being able to open my business to the help from WESK. They gave me all of the resources, even the confidence that the business idea was feasible. They also offer different expert advice for marketing and legal questions."

"Now, even five years into my business I still meet with my business advisor, and she helps me with hiring, human resources, performance-management for employees, and contracts or job offers. There is a whole bunch of different things WESK has helped me with for my own business in Esterhazy.

"I have been a WESK rural ambassador for about a year. I believe the WESK Rural Ambassador Program plays a vital role in empowering women entrepreneurs in rural Saskatchewan by fostering meaningful connections, networking, and shared learning. WESK has been instrumental in the start-up of my business and supporting the growth of my business through ongoing advising and resources. As a solo entrepreneur, the journey can often feel isolating, so the opportunity to engage with like-minded business owners is invaluable. I'm excited to help bring these opportunities to southern Saskatchewan so more women can access the tools and support that have made such a difference for me and have helped my business thrive."

### Positive feedback on previous WESK events

Stewart has hosted previous WESK events in rural communities in Saskatchewan and has received many positive comments on the events.

"I did host a WESK Connect event in Esterhazy a while ago and that was with Prairie Girl the Label in Esterhazy, and we brought in business owners, and it ended up being a great night of people chatting and networking and people were so excited to have that opportunity. Then, the second event I did was for Women Entrepreneurship Day in November, similar to the event that is going to be in Moosomin.

"There were about 30 people at the Esterhazy event. I am not super familiar with Moosomin because I am from Regina, and we just moved to Esterhazy five years ago, so that is where Danielle Rhodes has really helped me with being my touchpoint in Moosomin. She is a member of WESK and has taken advantage of a lot of things WESK has to offer for women entrepreneurs, and so she has been helping me with sharing the information about the event and trying to get the word out there. Whether you are a brand-new business owner or have a business idea or are dreaming of having a business someday, it is not specific to people who are experienced in business, and it is not specific to people who are new in business, it is really open to all who are interested in business, who want to learn about business, and connect with like-minded individuals. Everyone is welcome. It is very open and accepting. Anyone and everyone can benefit from it."

Rhodes says she was asked by rural ambassador Chelsea Stewart to help co-host the event.

"WESK has representatives throughout Saskatchewan to cater to the more rural areas of the province, so Chelsea Stewart, a representative of WESK, asked if I could co-host this event with her. I am local to Moosomin. My husband and I moved to Moosomin from Alberta over a decade ago and we believe that this town showed a lot of vibrance, ingenuity, and growth alongside the importance of having a sense of community. Being a part of Moosomin over the last 10 years has been a privilege to see it thrive and grow even more."

Rhodes speaks on the importance of the event.

"It is absolutely critical because we already have so many amazing, thriving women-owned businesses within Moosomin and I often hear how many women have ideas to start a business or they would love to start a business, but are afraid to, or don't know where to start, or what resources are out there and who to reach out to, so this event is geared to bring everyone together that is interested, or starting a businesses, or trying to grow their business so that they are aware of the resources out there to build that networking community in our own town and to hopefully grow and expand it in the near future."

### Excited for upcoming event

Stewart says she is excited to host the upcoming event in Moosomin March 12.

"I am very excited. I am excited to meet new people. Danielle and I haven't actually met in person yet, we've just been chatting via email, so I am excited to meet her and learn about her business and also meet a lot of other women in the area that I don't know and make new connections. I always look forward to the events and getting

to learn about other people's stories of what they have experienced in business. People don't always know what to expect when they come, and usually the feedback is they leave with definitely a lot more than they planned on learning from it. It has been very positive feedback on the events we have held so far, so I am excited for this one in Moosomin."

### Kari Kosior

Kari Kosior of Kari's Kloset in Moosomin is among of the four panelists speaking the WESK event on International's Women's Day in Moosomin on March 12.

Kari's Kloset is a clothing store that has been serving the community and surrounding communities for the past 17 years.

Kosior says she is excited to share her entrepreneurial background at the upcoming event.

"I'm really looking forward to the evening and was honoured to be asked to speak. It's always meaningful to have the chance to share experiences and connect with other women in business," she says.

"It means a lot to share my experience with other women building businesses. Running a business can sometimes feel isolating, so opportunities to connect and support each other are incredibly valuable."

She says events such as WESK are important for rural entrepreneurs to build relationships with other business owners in the province.

"In rural Saskatchewan, we learn a lot from each other. Sharing stories helps build connections, inspire ideas, and reminds people that successful businesses can grow right here in our communities. I was part of a panel hosted by Community Futures at a convention for economic developers, where three other business owners from across Saskatchewan shared our experiences and key takeaways from the Destination Business program, and it was amazing. Events like these, I usually come away feeling energized and inspired after connecting with other women in business. That's what I'm most looking forward to."

### Alyssa Jeannot

Alyssa Jeannot of Jeannot Electric in Moosomin will be speaking at the WESK event and sharing her experience of learning ways of business after becoming an entrepreneur in 2014.

"I am super excited and looking forward to the WESK event. I think it is a really good event to host and bring into our community," she says. "Not a lot of people know about WESK—I actually had to do my own research on them as well, but I am really looking forward to it."

Jeannot says she was shocked to be asked to speak at the event among the four panelists.

"I honestly wasn't expecting it at all. This will be the first time I do anything like this, so I am excited. I have zero business background. I am a paramedic by trade, so I have no business background and I basically learned on the fly when we started our business in 2014."

She says it is important for women to have leadership roles in business. "I think women have a different perspective on how to do business and different ideas that are unique to being a woman and bring different things to the table when it comes to doing business. I think it is

important in every business to have women leading in some shape or form.

"I am looking forward to being in the room with like-minded people, sharing experiences, ideas, and collaborating. I think that is the most important part about this, getting women together and like-minded women together and collaborating to make some dreams come to life or continue working and doing things the way we do them as women."

# Kenosee Superslides water park being demolished

The Kenosee Superslides water park—which served as a popular spot for decades for people in Southeast Saskatchewan during their summers—is being demolished.

Demolition work on the water park started in February, and is expected to be wrapped up this spring.

The land that the water park sits on is located in Moose Mountain Provincial Park, on the east side of Highway 9 across from Kenosee Lake.

Demolition work for the site was tendered by Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport with Demolition Operations Inc. from Saskatoon awarded the tender on February 16 in the amount of \$130,910.

The Kenosee Superslides closed due to the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020.

After the pandemic, the facility no longer met health and safety standards and closed when they were unable to obtain a license from the Saskatchewan Health Authority. After operations ceased, the facility deteriorated and

was deemed a public safety risk by the Ministry of Parks, leading the ministry to seek demolition of the site.

The ministry is removing the abandoned building and other assets. Once demolition is complete and the area is cleared, the ministry says it will “assess future opportunities for the site to ensure the land is used in a way that benefits park visitors.

“When the lease was not renewed, the site was abandoned. As such, the government will take measures to clear the land.”

## From Moosomin to Ochapowace to Saskatoon

We are back in session and I am busy. Monday started with a House Leadership meeting, caucus, session, and I had a meeting with a health care professional who would like to practice in our area. Tuesday I was part of a Government Operations Committee meeting, followed by house leaders meeting, caucus, an announcement on funding for Ukrainian Canadian students, our afternoon session in the house, a Farm Credit Canada reception where I met with many ag professionals, followed by a Saskatchewan Sheep Development Board meeting on traceability changes. Wednesday I attended a reception with Inclusion Saskatchewan after session, then attended the opening of the Think Indigenous conference at the Conexus Arts Centre. Thursday after session I had two stakeholder meetings in Regina, then returned to the Think Indigenous conference for the evening. Friday I met with constituents in Moosomin, Saturday I attended an event in Regina on behalf of the Minister of Parks, Culture and Sport—the final concert of the Saskatchewan Youth Choir. Saturday night I attended the Evening in Greece fundraiser in Regina. And Sunday I was in Saskatoon to speak on behalf of our government at the College of Pharmacy and Nutrition awards, and planned to stay Sunday night for a health care announcement in Saskatoon Monday morning, racing back to Regina after the announcement for the start of session. Every minute is filled on my schedule and every minute is fulfilling.

### RM of Moosomin council meeting

I had a great meeting with the RM of Moosomin council and administrator on February 27 on a wide range of issues, from health care to highways to cell coverage along the Manitoba border. I will be following up and setting up a couple of meetings to address concerns.

### Provincial playoffs


It was great to be there at Ochapowace First Nation on Saturday, February 28 for the final game of the second round of provincials pitting two of the best teams in Southeast Saskatchewan—Round Lake and Redvers. It was an exciting game with Redvers winning 5-4 in overtime.

It was great to be there with 1,200 other fans at the Chief Denton George Multiplex on Ochapowace First Nation Saturday night for the final game of the second round of provincials. Redvers and Round Lake are two incredible teams, and Redvers won the right to move on to the provincial A South Final against Lumsden.

### Saskatchewan uranium deal with India

Premier Scott Moe's leadership has helped deliver a massive new agreement for the export of Saskatchewan uranium to India. On Monday, Premier Scott Moe, Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney and Indian Prime Minister Modi witnessed the signing of a \$2.6 billion agreement for Saskatchewan uranium to be sold to India.

The agreement between Saskatchewan-based Cameco



and India's Department of Atomic Energy commits Cameco to supply fuel for use in India's growing nuclear power generating industry.

"We understand Saskatchewan's potential to supply the world with the fuel it needs to power the economies of tomorrow and it's great to see India value the energy security we can provide," Premier Moe said. "This agreement is thanks in no small part to Cameco for their dedication to our uranium industry, and the governments of Saskatchewan, Canada and India for their priority on a productive and mutually beneficial relationship. Today marks a great day for this longstanding partnership and holds a lot of promise for a bright future together."

With this agreement, Cameco expects to ship \$2.6 billion worth of uranium to India over a nine-year term. The agreement replaces a five-year agreement from 2015 and is nearly 10 times the value at the time of the announcement in 2015.

"The global demand for secure, carbon-free nuclear power is rising rapidly, and India is at the forefront with ambitious expansion plans for its civil nuclear energy program," CEO of Cameco Tim Gitzel said.

In Saskatchewan, in 2024, the uranium mining sector employed more than 2,300 people and contributed more than \$2.5 billion to the provincial GDP. With the ongoing global shift to nuclear power, jurisdictions around the world are continuing to source more uranium from responsible, reliable and geopolitically stable regions like Saskatchewan.

India currently has 24 operating reactors along with plans to deploy dozens more to reach 100 GW of generating capacity by 2047. Deliveries under the contract are expected to begin in 2027 and run through 2035.

### Tuition relief for Ukrainian post-secondary students

Great news for Ukrainian post-secondary students in Saskatchewan—they will continue to receive tuition relief from the Government of Saskatchewan until 2030.

I met some Ukrainian university students at the announcement last week who are thrilled with the news.

The extension allows those who arrived under the Canada-Ukraine Authorization for Emergency Travel (CUAET) program to continue paying domestic tuition rates instead of international rates at post-secondary institutions in the province. Saskatchewan is the only province in Canada that offers this level of support.

"Since launching this program in 2023, we have seen firsthand how tuition relief can transform the futures of Ukrainian students who came here seeking refuge from war," Advanced Education Minister Ken Cheveldayoff said. "Extending this support to 2030 ensures learners have the stability, opportunity and encouragement they need to complete their education and potentially contribute to Saskatchewan's future."

Ukrainians who came to Canada under the federally regulated CUAET program are typically considered international students and face higher tuition rates when applying to post-secondary programs.

"When I arrived in Saskatchewan as a high school student, I hoped to continue my education here, but paying international tuition would have made that impossible for my family," University of Regina student Anton Merzliakov said. "The tuition relief program made university possible for me, and extending this support gives me confidence that I can complete my degree and continue building my future here."

Over 35 students have benefited from the Ukrainian Tuition Relief Program since its launch.

### Farm Credit Canada

We had lots of great discussions on agriculture Tuesday as my colleagues and I attended a reception with Farm Credit Canada, and later in the evening, my colleague, Daryl Harrison, Blaine McLeod, and myself attended a Saskatchewan Sheep Development Board town hall on new livestock traceability rules at Lumsden.

### Inclusion Saskatchewan

I learned a lot at the Inclusion Saskatchewan reception at the Legislature Wednesday afternoon. Thanks to the board members, self-advocates and staff of Inclusion Saskatchewan for sharing their stories with us!

### Think Indigenous Conference

It was such an honor to be invited to the Think Indigenous conference in Regina this week. The organizers did an amazing job, bringing 1,200 people from across North America to the Conexus Arts Centre in Regina for three days focusing on Indigenous education. Thanks to Chief Evan Taypotat of Kahkewistahaw First Nation and Dr. Christopher Scribe of Carry the Kettle Nakoda Nation for their leadership on this amazing conference.

## 71 calls for service

## Man in Melita resists arrest

On February 22, Members of Westman RCMP attended a residence in the town of Melita to arrest a wanted male. Upon arrival of the members to the residence, the wanted male attended to the door and was advised he was under arrest. The wanted male resisted arrest and assaulted two police officers prior to barricading himself inside the residence.

Additional members, including Emergency Response Team, Containment Team along with Police Dog Services, attended for assistance. The wanted male exited the residence and was taken into custody without incident. The male was remanded into custody with the following charges: Assaulting police officer twice, resist arrest, disarming a police officer and mischief under \$5,000.

# Redvers entering Communities in Bloom competitive category in 2026

After two years of entering Communities in Bloom in the "evaluated friends" non-competitive category, the town of Redvers has decided to enter Communities in Bloom in the competitive category for 2026.

This means the town will be judged, with the option of competing at a national level if it receives a high enough bloom rating in 2026.

Redvers entered Communities in Bloom in the evaluated friends non-competitive category two years ago, receiving three blooms in 2024, then entered it again in 2025 and received five blooms.

Inspired by the top-bloom rating in 2025, the town decided to enter the competition competitively in 2026.

CAO Tricia Pickard brought the application forms to the council meeting on February 26.

The town has also applied for the Miracle-Gro Best Garden Selection program, and the Gro For Good Garden Grant Program from Scotts Canada with the hope of receiving a grant to beautify an unused piece of land by Highway 8.

"There is a space by Highway 8 and it's open and vacant, and we'd like to plant a few trees there, we would like to have a community orchard or walking area with trees—a place to walk and have shade," says Pickard.

Pickard says the Bloom Committee will have its first meeting to discuss its plans for the 2026 contest on March 24.

Redvers is entered in the population 1,001-2,000 category.

## Town approved for accessibility grant to replace medical clinic sidewalk

Redvers has been approved for \$12,000 under the Youth Innovation Component of the Enabling Accessibility Fund.

In order to meet the conditions of the federal grant, the town appointed Katie Eilers as a youth ambassador, and met with Eilers to come up with a list of places in town where there are accessibility challenges.

It was determined that one of the most important areas of town to tackle was the sidewalk in front of the medical clinic.

"It's in really bad shape. The section we are replacing is really beat up," says CAO Tricia Pickard.

The town will be replacing part of the sidewalk and repairing a small portion of the street to make the medical clinic more accessible. The total cost of the project is \$19,000 with \$12,000 being covered by the grant.

## Support of SCC playground grant

Council penned a letter of support for the Redvers School Community Council in its application to the School Playground Equipment Grant for the 2025/2026 intake.

Following a recent safety inspection conducted by Suncorp, several existing playground components were identified as having failed inspection standards and they requiring replacement.

The SCC wants to replace the failed equipment with new, inclusive play structures that meet the current Canadian Standards Association Standard for Children's Play-spaces and Equipment, and has applied for the School Playground Equipment Grant to do that. The new design will also enhance accessibility by incorporating wheelchair-accessible and universally accessible features.

## Town no longer issuing marriage licenses

Due to time restraints on office staff, the town made the decision not to continue issuing marriage licenses.

CAO Tricia Pickard says it leads to lots of extra paperwork and time, which has been challenging for staff to work in with other town duties.

"If someone else could take that on, it would be great," she said.

## Letter regarding nurse practitioner

Council made note of a letter from the South East Medical Group to Health Minister Jeremy Cockrill and Rural and Remote Health Minister Lori Carr about sponsoring the training of a local nurse practitioner under the agreement that she would return to offer services at the Redvers Health Centre and Tony Day Family Medical Clinic in Carnduff.

The letter said the trainee was planning to finish her education with a practicum under a current nurse practitioner operating out of the Tony Day Family Medical Clinic in August 2026. Upon her graduation she would like to continue to operate out of the Tony Day Family Medical Clinic, the Redvers Health Centre, and the Gainsborough Health Centre.

The South East Medical Group asked that the health ministers consider granting her a contract of the same model as their current nurse practitioner at the Tony Day Family Medical Clinic so that they can continue to put together a stable team of health care professionals within their rural facilities.

## Town looking at grain bin gazebo for campground

Council was contacted by Dawn Eilers with Redvers Tourism about replacing the gazebo at the campground. The current gazebo is in disrepair.

Eilers suggested the town look at a grain bin gazebo to replace the existing gazebo. Eilers said she has found someone willing to donate a grain bin.

Council contacted Municode and found out that a building permit would be required for the structure along with engineered drawings for the structure and the founda-

tion. They will be looking at their options for the structure.

## Tender accepted for Larsen Road lots

A new business will be coming to Redvers after the town accepted a tender to purchase two lots on Larsen Road where the Western Star hotel used to be located.

The town decided to tender the sale of the lots after they were turned over to the town as a tax title property.

Two tenders were received with the winning tender going to post frame construction company Goodon Industries out of Boissevain, Manitoba for \$40,000.

Goodon Industries will construct a 60-foot by 152-foot by 18-foot building on the land.

## Request to support wheelchair accessible van

Council received a request from the Redvers Activity Centre to donate toward the purchase of a wheelchair accessible van.

While the town will not donate to the project directly, they have applied for a grant in 2026 for a push button crosswalk and speed bumps near the Activity Centre to help with street safety in that area, and recently received a \$50,000 grant to replace the sidewalk in that area.

The town administrative staff will also be donating \$500 from their "Casual for a Cause" casual Friday contributions to the project.

## School transit program going well

CAO Tricia Pickard reported to council that the town's pilot project transit van program for school children is going over well. Under the program, students can ride the town transit van and buy a punch card giving them unlimited rides for the month for \$40. She told council the van has been well-used by students.

## Letter of intent supporting START program

Council approved a letter of intent supporting the START program, should it proceed in the Redvers area.

START stands for Stabilization, Transfer Readiness and Resuscitation Team. Under the program hospital-embedded Advanced Care Paramedics (ACPs) would provide emergency assessment, stabilization, resuscitation, and transfer preparation when no physician is on site. Care would be delivered under virtual physician oversight.

The idea would be to keep rural emergency departments open, even during physician unavailability, and create less service disruptions.

"Subject to regulatory approval and operational feasibility, our organization is interested in exploring funded service delivery models or pilot agreements should the START program proceed," wrote council in their letter of intent.

# Bienfait Rink looking at \$2.2 million in repairs to keep rink user friendly

Bienfait is a community of 820 people, located in the southeast corner of Saskatchewan. It is viable community that wants to keep its hockey arena in good condition so that it will have years of use for the next generations.

Dennis Gonas, a long-time resident of Bienfait, brought up the idea of having repairs done to the rink instead of building a new one. The cost of these repairs would come with a big price tag.

The arena was built in 1957 and has a round quonset-like roof. According to Gonas there was an upgrade done to the lobby in 2002, and a little insulation and metal replacement, but other than that, the rink has not seen any repairs.

Today the building has holes in the

wall, there are some beams rotting, the shell over the rink needs replacing and there is no room for spectators to stand to watch the activities on the ice.

"The ice is in good shape and that part is doing its job. Around the perimeter of the ice surface there are cracks in the cement which need repairing."

Gonas said they would like to add two dressing rooms, place new boards around the ice and glass to protect fans. "We do not wait to do netting, but rather have an old hockey look," said Gonas.

In making room for spectators, they will have to extend the building on the east side, offering five to seven rows

of bleachers and adding two tiers of bleachers on the west side. "We do not have a lot of room to expand as we do not have much land around the rink," said Gonas.

They want the rink to have a user-friendly appeal and keep the look bright and open. They also want to attract others to use the rink. Having heat for the fans is also important.

At one time they had a team in the Big Six League, and they are hoping that in the near future they will have the opportunity to have another team.

There Zamboni is a 1984 model. If it gets a flat tire, it is done as there are no parts to fix a model that old. Gonas said they will hold a separate fundraiser for this and hope to find a good used one.

The Town of Bienfait had proposed to build a new skate park, but at this time the project has been put on hold and will be looked at in the future, but for now they will focus on the rink and swimming pool.

The committee of 12 people have received quotes on the cost of the repairs for the rink, and the estimated cost is around \$2.2 million. Another meeting will be held to discuss the action plan on how to go about raising the funds. Anyone wishing to find out more information or wanting to join the planning committee can contact Sarah Yoner who is the treasurer and Recreation Director, Katie Turnbull who is the secretary, Celine Hegland who is vice president, and Dennis Gonas, the chairperson.

# Elkhorn Antique Auto Museum Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Elkhorn Auto Museum drew about a dozen people on February 26.

The full board was there and board chair Kevin Tutthill welcomed everyone and some time was spent on the 2025 museum financial report. The revenue was higher than projected but the year-end surplus was lower due in part to the needed repairs to a 100-foot roof section on the main display building that was constructed in 1967.

The report overall showed that the 2025 season reflected a capital project year in costs and not a typical operating year. In 2026, the museum expects to return to a stable and normalized operating year. For a more detailed financial report on the 2025 year, copies can be picked up at the community office.

After the financial reports, a special interactive video conference was held with the subject being the restoration of the museum's historic snow plane. Lisl Gunderman and Darrel Hunter via video conference gave a detailed report on the restoration work they have done on the historic snow plane that was built in the 1940s by Fudge Industries of Moosomin.

It was Lisl's grandfather, Doctor Joe Galloway, a rural Saskatchewan doctor, who bought the four-seat snow plane that was driven by an airplane engine and propeller over the snow. It cost the doctor \$1,304 in 1947. The doctor at the time saw it as a safe and quick way to provide medical service in rural Saskatchewan during the winter when deep snow would cover many of the rural roads for weeks at a time and before municipal snow clearing plows.

As a rural doctor, one of his duties was the home delivery of babies. Because of that, he had a picture painted on the side of the snow plane of a stork delivering a baby. The doctor ran the snow plane from the 1940s into the 1950s.

The couple who restored it went on to explain how they bought a long enclosed trailer to show the vehicle, along with history related to the snow plane restoration, medical equipment of the day and early photos of it and other snow planes, and information on the Elkhorn Auto Museum. They continued by saying once word got out on the

restoration plans, bits and pieces came in from all over and stories about snow planes were received. The couple who did the restoration and public presentation in the western provinces will return the vehicle to the Elkhorn Auto Museum for display after a five-year loan period.

After the video conference, the museum Annual General Meeting continued to discuss in detail the repairs done on the main building roof last fall.

Tutthill was pleased to announce that the repair was not only completed with no major issues and the revenue made by fundraising, grants and donations had paid for

it all. This enabled the museum to return bridging funds from other outside sources and interests. He added, "The roof repair project was a great community and museum success."

Further discussion was about future museum projects such as stabilizing the walls of the agricultural building and repairing some of the cement flooring in the main display building.

Discussion continued on the museum's biggest annual event, that being the community Canada Day events with the museum being the main activity center. Some new ideas were suggested to make it more of a family day for all ages.


