## Grace and Gather opening on Main Street in Moosomin this Saturday

Kody Wolf and Jalisa Miller are opening a new business on Main Street in Moosomin this Saturday, March 28. The two sisters are excited to offer a new, unique small business to the community and area.

"Grace and Gather is a retail space focusing on women's clothing, home goods, stationery and party goods, and our upstairs will be a rental space that will accommodate small event gatherings, pop-up events, photography studio space, etc," Wolf explained.

Wolf has past experience working in retail and was interested in opening her own retail business.

"I have been in and out of retail for much of my teenage and adult life, and when we saw this building for sale, we saw an opportunity to bring something unique to the community and build a space that feels intentional and warm."

### Behind the name

Miller says their mom was the inspiration behind the businesses name.

"Grace is our mother's middle name, so we knew from the start that we wanted to include her in some capacity," she says. "She was our inspiration from the start. As well as seeing 'grace' as warmth and intention while 'gather' is bringing people together."

Miller explains Wolf brought the idea to her about the opportunity last December.

"It was really Kody's idea starting it. She has always been involved in retail and I think it was time she felt like doing something on her own, so the retail idea came from Kody, and then I got involved to help with the business side of things and helping get it set up. I feel like some people think going into business with your sister isn't a good idea, but we get along well, and we are just excited to do this together. Kody has her areas of expertise and I have mine. It has been going really well."

### Planning started in December

Wolf explains they started looking at buildings in town last December and began renovating shortly after.

"We started looking at the building last August and we went through the motions for a few months going back-and-forth looking at it and deciding if it was something we wanted to do. We purchased the building in December, and we've been renovating it, starting as soon as we purchased it, since the second half of December, and our opening date is this Saturday, March 28 so we are coming to the end."

She adds, "We saw an opportunity to bring something unique to the community and wanted to fill the space that felt intentional. We love how fast Moosomin is growing, and the community has been so supportive, and it really has an uplifting culture when it comes to small businesses."

### Opening day March 28

Grace and Gather, located on Main Street beside New Sky Nail Salon, is hosting their grand opening this Saturday. The event includes drinks and snacks to celebrate the new business.

"It will be an all-day event," said Wolf. "We are going to have snacks and drinks, some special discounts, and a giveaway. We will be open from 10 am to 5:30 pm Monday to Saturdays."

"We are located right beside the nail salon, it was the building that used to be Brazen. We looked at a few different locations in town and we kept coming

back to this one because it really is the perfect location. We are right on Main Street and in a busy area, so we will be able to attract a lot of people here and that is important obviously for any business."

"We post on Instagram with updates as our main social media. We do have a Facebook page, but our following is quite a bit larger on Instagram, so that is where we are posting most of our information."

### Interest in rental space

Miller says they have had interest in the rental space already.

"We've actually had quite a bit of interest already for that. Initially they have been messaging on Facebook or Instagram, but as we start to advertise that more, it will be just a phone call or text. We are hoping when our website goes live, there will be a booking directly on the website. It goes live on opening day

on March 28."

### Background in business

Wolf explains her experience in retail, which includes working at the clothing store Kari's Closet in Moosomin.

"Throughout my teenage years I worked at Brazen when it first opened, I worked at Hillberg and Berk for three years in their retail space both online and in-store, and I worked at Kari's Closet and worked on her website with her, so it is something I have done for quite a few years now as a side-hustle. When we saw this opportunity, I thought it could be something I wanted to do."

Miller adds, "I don't really have a business background, but I have worked at the mine for almost 15 years now and I've been involved in a lot of project management settings, but starting a small business was definitely still a learning curve for me."

## What to expect at Grace and Gather

Wolf explains the uniqueness the new business offers for the community.

"I think the inventory and products we brought to the store are different from where you can find anywhere else in town. There is already such good shopping in the community and we wanted to make sure we were bringing in something very different and not the same brands as anyone else, so shoppers can expect different styles.

"There will be clothing, but also a lot of giftware and fun crafts. With no Dollar Store in town, we saw that as an opportunity to bring in unique and more elevated party supplies and entertainment stuff.

"The vibe is a very calm, relaxed, and curated environment. We hope people can find our store as something different, very unique, a very different aesthetic vibe you wouldn't get from other stores in town, and I think it is really unique that we have the rental space upstairs," adds Miller.

# Rockets fall to Lumsden in Provincial A South Final

The Big Six Hockey League's Redvers Rockets' Provincial run is over, but there is no doubt that the team proved it is one of the best in the province.

The Rockets fell to the Lumsden Monarchs in the Provincial A South final in Game 2 in Lumsden on March 14. They lost Game 1 by a score of 3-1 in Redvers, then fell in the second game, 7-3.

"We're definitely proud of where we made it," said Rockets coach Brian Magotiaux. "Top four in the province in Senior A is definitely a pretty good accomplishment. It was our first year in it, and the group of local guys that we had did very well. We're proud, and I think we represented southeast Saskatchewan and small-town teams well."

"These guys are all community members and are good people. They raise families, run businesses in town. I'm not sure how many teams in the A bracket can say they're almost all local."

The Rockets entered the A bracket of the Hockey Sask Provincial Championships for the first time this year. They previously won the Senior D Provincial Championship in 2025. Along with that, the team has also been strong for years in the Big Six Hockey League.

"Our players aren't coming from the city, playing the game, and then going back to the city. They're guys that are from Redvers and Carlyle, and they're playing where their roots are. It's tough, because you're playing against some teams out there that are pretty stacked."

The first-round match-up for the Rockets was the top team in the neighboring Sask East Hockey League, the Langenburg Warriors. At the time of the series start, Redvers led the Big Six, while Langenburg was at the top of the South division in the SEHL. Game 1 was on February 6 in the Bumper Arena in Langenburg. When the final buzzer went, Redvers had come away with a 4-2 win. Going back to their home barn with a series lead was a major confidence boost against a strong team like Langenburg. Game 2 was also a close one, but the Rockets were able to end the series with a 5-3 win, moving onto the second round of the Senior A bracket.

"Going into that series, no one knew what to expect. It was kind of going into the unknown, and it was a goale battle. [Zane] Winter got us through to the next round. After Game 1, we kind of knew what to expect, and we managed to win in two."

In the next round, Redvers faced another formidable opponent. The Round Lake Bears had a stacked roster with many former professionals and junior players and were coached by Calgary Flames legend Theoren Fleury. The Bears had defeated Redvers' perennial Big Six rival, the Moosomin Rangers, in a roller-coaster three-game series that Round Lake came out on top of. Game 1 took place in Redvers on February 21, and it remained a de-

fensive battle for most of the game. The Rockets managed a 2-1 win to put Round Lake's back to the wall. In Game 2 in the Chief Denton George Memorial Multiplex in Ochapowace, Round Lake needed a win to stay alive and even the series. That night, Round Lake took back the momentum with a win at home by a 2-1 score. Game 3 would be winner-take-all back in Ochapowace, and Redvers found a way to snag the game and series win, 5-4. The Rockets moved on to the Provincial Senior A South Final. "After Game 3, I said in the room that once it goes to sudden death, anything can happen, and we got the bounce to win. It was a very close series, and it could've gone either way, but we pushed through and got the job done." In the third round, Redvers would be taking on another top-ranked team in the province, the Lumsden Monarchs. Lumsden went undefeated in the regular season of the Qu'Appelle Valley Highway Hockey League with an 18-0 record, along with only one loss through the provincials to that point. The Monarchs had defeated the Davidson Cyclones and Kindersley Klippers on their path and had outscored their opponents 32-10. Game 1 of the Redvers-Lumsden series was on March 7 in Redvers, and the visitors took the game 3-1. One week later, Red-

vers made the trip up to Lumsden for Game 2 with hopes to stay alive. Unfortunately, the Rockets couldn't manage a win on the road and were eliminated from provincials with a 7-3 loss.

"I told the guys to keep their heads held high and that we had played as well as we could the whole way there. They're a very strong team, and they play solid hockey. I just worry about coaching my team, but they are solid from one end of the ice to the other."

"I still like to have the argument with Hockey Sask; there's a difference between guys that have played elite hockey and are 35 years old living in your community, and guys that have played elite that are 23 and coming out of the city to play. But I'm proud to say that we did as well as we did this Provincials. I think that as long as we can, we'll keep playing strong hockey," said Magotiaux.

In the Provincial Finals, Lumsden will play the Raymore Rockets in an all-QVHHL match-up. Raymore took down the number one-ranked Foam Lake Flyers in the North Final. Game 1 took place in Raymore on March 22, and Games 2 and 3 will be in Lumsden on March 28 and 29.

## Budget will strengthen access to primary care

Saskatchewan Finance Minister Jim Reiter introduced a budget Wednesday that will protect Saskatchewan in many important ways. It will protect Saskatchewan people through lower taxes, improved access to health care, safer communities and infrastructure investments to maintain a strong and growing economy.

This budget will strengthen access to primary care through the introduction of the Patient's Medical Home model. This is a transformative approach to delivering care. It is about continuity. It is about co-ordination.

I am proud to say that Moosomin is one of 10 communities selected to participate in this initiative. The Ministry of Health is investing \$768,000 to support the collaborative efforts between the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) and physicians at the Moosomin Family Practice (MFP) clinic to expand the Patient Medical Home model in Moosomin. This funding allows the SHA to recruit up to 6.2 FTE new positions, including 2.5 FTE Registered Nurse B, 1.25 FTE Dietitian, 1.25 FTE Behaviour Therapist, 0.2 FTE Pharmacist, and 1.0 FTE Medical Office Assistant. As of March 19, 2026, the SHA has recruited the 1.0 FTE Dietitian, who started on March 11, and 2.0 FTE RNB positions (one began on March 16, and the second is expected to start on April 6). The SHA continues to recruit to fill the remaining positions.


This is a significant investment, and it will make a real difference. It means patients will have better access to care. It means more services will be available locally. And it means that people in Moosomin and the surrounding area will have a medical home—a place they can turn to for comprehensive, co-ordinated care. This is exactly the kind of innovation we need in our health care system.

Another meaningful change in this budget is the reduction in the local community share of capital funding for health facilities from 20 per cent to 10 per cent. This is a major step forward. And to fully understand its importance, we need to remember where we came from. Under the previous NDP government, the local share was 35 per cent.

We in the Moosomin area know from experience just how difficult that was. When we built the Southeast Integrated Care Centre, our community was responsible for raising that 35 per cent share. It took years of hard work. Our community came together in remarkable ways, including hosting the world's longest hockey game—not once, not twice, but three times—to raise funds. Those games alone raised approximately \$1 million. That is a testament to the spirit of our community.

But it also underscores the scale of the burden that was placed on local residents. That \$1 million, as significant as it was, represented only a small portion of what was required. That is why the change in this budget matters so much. Reducing the local share to 10 per cent makes projects more achievable. It reduces the pressure on volunteers. And it ensures that communities are partners in building health infrastructure—but not overburdened by it.

I saw firsthand how important this change is when I met with the Grenfell Health Foundation. This is a dedicated



group of volunteers working to support the construction of a new long-term care home in Grenfell. They spoke candidly about the challenges they faced. They spoke about the demands on their time and resources. And they made it clear that reducing the local share would make a real difference.

I was pleased to bring the Minister of Rural and Remote Health, Lori Carr, to Grenfell to meet with the foundation. I was also pleased to bring the Premier to that community so he could hear directly from them.

This government listened. This government heard. And this government acted.

And that action will benefit not only Grenfell, but communities across Saskatchewan.

### New AI data centre is massive investment in Saskatchewan

More than 1,600 jobs will be added in Saskatchewan thanks to a new \$12 billion AI data centre project announced Monday.

Premier Scott Moe joined Mirko Bibic, President and CEO of BCE Inc and Bell Canada to announce one of the largest projects in Saskatchewan's history that will generate up to \$12 billion in economic value. That's the third-largest investment in the history of Canada. (The second-largest is the BHP Jansen mine, also under this government.)

The 90,000 square foot data centre development is expected to begin construction this spring in the Rural Municipality of Sherwood. The centre's primary power needs will be serviced through SaskPower and would also utilize generation in part generated through a natural gas contract with SaskEnergy.

In fall 2025, the Government of Saskatchewan released the Saskatchewan First Energy Security Strategy & Supply Plan which confirmed the province's plans for its net-zero future through nuclear power; the attraction of data centres and related knowledge economy businesses is a component of this plan.

This project, and associated partnerships with Bell, will position Saskatchewan as a national leader in sovereign AI infrastructure. AI workloads will use Bell's and their tenant's AI computing platforms and stored within Bell's sovereign AI cloud. Bell will reserve a significant portion

of the compute power for sovereign workloads, ensuring data remains within Canada, meeting strict chain-of-custody and residency requirements.

Saskatchewan's Crown corporations are collaborating to support the project by:

SaskPower is working with partner Crowns to support the project. Work has already begun on the first phase of the transmission interconnection, which is expected to be complete by the end of 2026. This will allow SaskPower to provide reliable power for the facility.

SaskTel's extensive fibre optic transport network will provide resilient, diverse, and reliable connectivity, linking the state-of-the-art facility to Bell's national fibre backbone. In addition, SaskTel and Bell will explore collaboration options regarding the development and delivery of AI powered products and services.

SaskEnergy would develop natural gas infrastructure for Bell's on-site gas-fired power generation to support the data centre's peak operational demand as well as backup power generation. This would include construction of a new high-pressure pipeline and a high-volume meter station.

The project uses a closed loop cooling system that does not draw from municipal water resources. Bell is also partnering with participating post-secondary institutions to explore new internship and apprenticeship opportunities and is working with George Gordon First Nation on procurement and workforce development opportunities along with the potential for reuse of heat generated from the site.

In 2024, the Government of Saskatchewan unveiled its new Securing the Next Decade of Growth - Saskatchewan's Investment Attraction Strategy. Private capital investment in Saskatchewan continues to rank the best in the country.

# Moosomin/Broadview RCMP Report

## 69 calls for service

From March 13 to 19, 2026 the Broadview/Moosomin RCMP responded to 69 calls for service. Some of the calls for service included five 911 calls, four assault calls, 13 traffic related calls, two impaired calls, eight Mental Health Act calls, amongst numerous others.

## Domestic disturbance

Members were dispatched to a domestic disturbance at a residence located on Kahkewistahw First Nation. Upon further investigation members learned there had been an argument between two parties over a child. The argument turned physical and the suspect was later arrested and charged with assault.

## Injured male on Ochapowace First Nation

Members were dispatched to a report of an assault at a residence located on Ochapowace First Nation. Members arrived at the residence and located a male with laceration to their head. EMS were dispatched and members were advised the male had fallen. None of the parties involved would provide a statement of what transpired.

## Suspicious vehicle check leads to arrest

While patrolling on Ochapowace First Nation, members came upon a vehicle parked in a strange manner. Members conducted a traffic stop and learned the driver had an outstanding warrant and was a disqualified driver. The male was subsequently arrested and processed.

## Driver had valid license

Members received a complaint of a person driving without a valid license in Moosomin. The complainant advised they had evidence of the person driving. Members ran index checks on the individual and confirmed they had a valid license.

## Aggressive driver near Burrows

Members received a traffic complaint on Highway 1 near Burrows. The caller reported that a male driving a black truck with a flat deck trailer was driving aggressively, cutting her off, brake checking her and yelling at her on the highway before taking off at a high rate of speed. Members located the vehicle and the driver was issued a traffic ticket.

## Failure to comply with release orders

Members received a complaint about an individual failing to comply with their release order. Upon investigation members learned the male who was on electronic monitoring had left their residence. The male was subsequently arrested and remanded for court.

## Vehicle swerving near Whitewood

Members were dispatched to a possible impaired driver on Highway 1 near Whitewood. The vehicle was a white Dodge swerving on the highway. Members located the vehicle and performed a roadside demand. Members concluded the driver was sober, and he was given a warning.

# Rocanville Town Council Town donates to Envision Counselling

With Envision Counselling operating in Rocanville one day a week, Rocanville Town Council made the decision to support them with a donation of \$1,200.

"As a service that is now in town, they are renting an office at our medial centre and we want to help support them and make sure they stay here and provide this service to our community," says Town Administrator Tanya Strandlund.

"We are essentially donating back the rent they pay us which is \$1,200 annually.

"They are here every Tuesday and in Moosomin the other four days of the week."

## Town will start charging fire fees

The town has made the decision to start charging fire fighting fees for fire calls within town limits, and will be reviewing those fees to determine what they should be.

"Previously, the town never charged home owners for any fires happening in town limits. Going forward, we will be. If our department has to respond, there are fees for it," said Administrator Tanya Strandlund last week.

Strandlund said it's common for other towns to charge fees for fire calls, as it costs the department thousands of

dollars. She said people are often able to cover those costs with their home insurance.

## Two GICs re-invested

The town passed a motion pull two GICs out of SUMA Invest and re-invest them with Conexus Credit Union. Both are one-year non-redeemable GICs at a rate of three per cent.

The first GIC is \$72,870 and will be used for lagoon drainage costs. The second GIC is for \$48,401.41 and will be used for machinery costs.

## New heater at rec centre

Council passed a motion to install a new heater in the Rec Centre in the former curling ice surface area. The heater cost \$7,083 and will be installed by Flatland Plumbing.

## Thankful for RM of Moosomin donation

Town Administrator Tanya Strandlund said that the town was extremely happy to hear of the RM of Moosomin's donation to the Rocanville Universe Satellite Aquatic Centre. The RM decided to donate \$30,000 to the aquatic centre. "We are appreciative of the RM of Moosomin and the contribution to our pool. That was so very unexpected and appreciated," she says.

## Tax abatement for new house

Council approved a five-year tax abatement for 111 Alexander Street where a new home was built. Under the town's residential incentive program, the property will receive a 100 per cent abatement the first year, a 50 per cent abatement for the second and third year, and a 25 per cent abatement for the fourth and fifth year.

## CCBF funding

The town received its second installment of the federal Canada Community-Building Fund (CCBF) for \$28,270.20. The money will go toward the funding, installation and setup of a new backup generator at the lift station.

## 2026 census

Town Administrator Tanya Strandlund said that the town will be talking about the importance of being counted in the 2026 census at the community meeting being held on March 30. She said the town wants to impress upon people how census numbers affect the town's portion of revenue sharing they receive, as well as funding other grants and programs, and they want to encourage people to be vigilant about making sure they are counted in the census.

which resulted in a positive result. The driver was charged with operating a vehicle while having alcohol in their blood which carries a fine of \$113, driving without a valid driver's license which carries a fine of \$ 298, unlawful transportation of cannabis which carries a fine of \$237, and a 72 hours driver license suspension.

# New transmission project will link northern, southern SaskPower grids

The Government of Saskatchewan has approved SaskPower's North-South Transmission Systems Interconnection project. The new transmission lines, which will connect Saskatchewan's northern and southern electrical grids, will support reliability and growth in the province's far north.

Currently, Saskatchewan's grids operate independently and are connected through Manitoba, with the smaller northern system geographically distant from most of Saskatchewan's power generation sources in the south.

"Connecting Saskatchewan's grids is a key component of our provincial transmission strategy, which is in turn essential for our broader energy security strategy," Minister Responsible for SaskPower Jeremy Harrison said. "The north-south interconnection will help to keep

Saskatchewan's economy strong and growing by supporting new mining opportunities in our province's resource-rich north."

"SaskPower is continuing to prioritize investments that support reliability, safety and load growth in Saskatchewan," SaskPower President and CEO Rupen Pandya said. "This interconnection will boost energy security and reliability for northern communities and industry alike."

The project will include two new transmission lines approximately 250 kilometres in length, connecting the southern system near E.B. Campbell Hydroelectric Station to the northern system near Island Falls Hydroelectric Station.

Preliminary planning, design, and engagement with Indigenous Rights holders and the

public has begun. Pre-construction planning and design work for the interconnection project has received conditional approval for funding of up to \$18,075,000 under the First and Last Mile Fund from Natural Resources Canada (NRCan).

"Canada is ready to build," Federal Minister of Energy and Natural Resources Tim Hodgson said. "Strengthening Saskatchewan's transmission network is a critical step in unlocking the full potential of our resource-rich North. Supported by our new government, this project will create jobs, advance Indigenous partnership, and unlock new mining and critical minerals development that will make us an energy and natural resources superpower."

The transmission lines have an approximate in-service date of 2032.

# Secondary highways in southern Sask begin spring weight restrictions

Spring weight restrictions started Friday, March 20 on secondary highways in southern Saskatchewan to safeguard key links of the province's road network as temperatures begin to get warmer.

"As the ground begins to thaw, this measure is introduced each year to protect key transportation infrastructure for the long term," Highways Minister Kim Gartner said. "Highways play a pivotal role moving goods to support the province's export-based economy, which helps sustain Saskatchewan's quality of life."

The 2026 spring weight restrictions are effective at 12:01 a.m., Friday, March 20 in southwest Saskatchewan. As the weather moves from winter to spring conditions, the weight restrictions are expected to be phased in throughout the province. The spring restrictions will remain in place for up to six weeks.

These restrictions protect the surface and ground beneath these roads, which become wet and soften with spring thaw. This reduces allowable vehicle weights on rural municipal roads and secondary-weight provincial high-

ways by 10 to 15 per cent.

The newest order will be under the Spring Road Bans heading.

Truckers and shippers are reminded to check regularly.

Rural municipalities are responsible for their own roads and set their own weight limits.




