Rural and Remote Health Minister Tim McLeod: 'We've identified a path forward to have a CT Scanner in Moosomin'

AND KEVIN WEEDMARK Saskatchewan Rural and Remote Health Minister Tim McLeod told the World-Spectator Wednesday that the govern-ment has found a path forward to have a CT Scanner in Moosomin. McLeod and Moosomin MLA Steven

Bonk met with community representatives Tuesday, and spoke with the World-Spec-tator following the budget on Wednesday. "I was really excited to have that meeting with the community and MLA Steven Bonk. We were happy to find a place where we've identified a path forward to have a CT scanner in Moosomin," said McLeod.

He said he believes the local reps at the meeting were excited about the scanner proposal. "The mood at the meeting was generally excitement and we certainly are happy to continue to work with the community," he

McLeod sad a lot of details still have to be worked out. 'At this point what we're doing is we're working to gether with the community and the ministry to establish a framework and we're still working on those details. It's still being worked on as we speak. We're happy to continue to work together with the community and the foundation to build that framework that allows us a path forward.

forward." The CT Scanner would be community or privately owned, and SHA would pay for the scans. "It's something that we're actively working on right now but we could expect it in a few weeks—we're start-ing to see a clearer picture of the framework."

Whether the proprietor would have the right to provide private scans as well as serving the public system is an-other detail that has yet to be worked out, said McLeod. That will be one of the criteria being established with

in the framework but we certainly anticipate that, yes. "The location of the CT scanner would be part of the framework and we're still working on that but we're pleased with the conversations that we've had at this point and we're really excited that we've identified a path

forward that will result in a CT Scanner for Moosomin." He said Moosomin didn't meet the criteria for a CT Scanner under current SHA rules, so the government wanted to come up with a framework that would work for Moosomin and could be applied in other communi-

ties as well. "Where Moosomin falls didn't meet the criteria SHA has, so we've had to work together with the community to identify a framework that can be consistently applied, not just for Moosomin, but across Saskatchewan for all communities that fit under the same category as Mooso-

we'll have something more concrete in the camegory as Mooso-min. We're working more concrete in the coming weeks. "We're trying to identify some guidelines and some cri-teria that can be applied fairly across the province, so that when other communities come forward, then we have a consistent approach. So that if a community like Mooso-min is looking for the same type of service, then we've got some type of framework that can be consistently applied for everyone."

He said Estevan will have a similar framework devel-oped, as a local person had offered to purchase an MRI for St. Joseph's Hospital in Estevan, which didn't fit into any program until now.

McLeod said the government has to work on unique solutions for communities like Mossonin, which has some unique aspects to its health care, such as having 14 doc-tors, far more than any other community its size, being the smallest community in Saskatchewan to offer chemo-

the smallest community in Sakatchewan to other chemo-therapy, but provides it to more patients than larger cen-tres, and offering a medical residency program. "That's a great question, and it is the reason we're de-veloping the framework," he said. "And there's not an easy answer to that. As you know, it's something we've been working on for some time. It's taken us a while to get to this point, and we are really excited to be able to reach this point, where we can at least communicate to the com-munity that we have found a positive path forward." ate more creative problem solvers, so that's awesome for anything you choose to do in your life, too. People who practice art are hap-pier people, usually," said Krista Crellin, MVAC chair. "We just want to give the kids that are interested in art an opportunity to create in a safe space. We obvious-ly love art, and I think it's important to the growth of our kids and community." The task at hand is to

"We hope to deepen heir understanding of design elements and com-position and all the differ-ent materials that we have available to them," Crellin explained. "Just really give them a chance to explore their creativity far more than what they would get than what they would get in school."

Crellin anticipates space for 10 students each day under the guidance of retired teacher Melissa Magnusson.

"She's a creative person, too, so I think they'll have a lot of fun with her," Crel-

a lot of fun with her," Crel-lin said. While programs such as this may seem grassroots, exposure to artistic free-dom at a young age can propel one's mind, creat-ing learning skills often drawn unon later in life. ing learning skills often drawn upon later in life.

"Hopefully, they find an area of art that really interests them and continue to practice throughout their lives," remarked Crellin lives," remarked Crelin when asked about what the intended take away is for the students. "That's why we hope to engage them in all these different opportunities, to try different materials and different techniques so they find

what they love. "We want to encourage kids young to love the arts, and hopefully they stick to it," she continued. "We want to see them through-out their lives coming to the Art Centre and practic-

ing." The Moosomin Visual Arts Centre has been a

Cell service upgrades to 5G around Moosomin

Service around border remains the same

Cell phone coverage received a boost recently as Sask-Tel announced 5G services in 30 more areas around the province

"At SaskTel, we're firmly committed to being the best at connecting our customers to the world," said Charlene Gavel, SaskTel President and CEO in a media release. "The continued rollout of our 5G network will strengthen the technological foundation of our province and help support the development of exciting innovations that have the power to transform nearly every aspect of modern life.

Currently, 5G coverage is available to more than 50 per currently, SG coverage is available to more than 50 per cent of the provincial population, spanning major centres and highways plus many rural and resort communities. The 5G network boasts speeds of up to 1.2 Gigabits per second, which is anticipated to increase in the future. Included in the announcement was an area around

Moosomin now upgraded to the faster service. "There are two cell tower sites around Moosomin,

there's one off Carlton Street and there's one just west of town off of Wright Road," said Lindsay Mazenc, external communications manager with SaskTel. The Wright Road tower was actually turned up to 5G back in October while the Carlton Street tower boosted a 5G signal in February. "So residents would have noticed 5G on their phones for the last little bit."

A coverage map on the SaskTel website shows 5G along the TransCanada spanning from Red Jacket to Fleming, north almost to Welwyn and south to the Moosomin and District Regional Park. Wapella, Whitewood, Broadview and Grenfell are also 5G clusters along the highway The expansion of both 5G and fibre networks across Saskatchewan stems from SaskTel's financial commit-ment off L billion is nearital word the networks across

"Our government is pleased that more families and businesses who live and work in rural communities now have access to the same wireless network and technologies as those in our larger urban centres," said Alana Ross, MLA for Prince Albert Northcote. "The efforts be-ing put forward by SaskTel to expand their cutting-edge wireless and fibre networks across the province will help said Alana improve the quality of life and drive economic activity in all corners of Saskatchewan."

Coverage near border stays the same However, while the bump to 5G technology on many

towers has been received graciously, some areas continue to lack coverage. People in the Welwyn area will not see a change to coverage, something that has been a great con-



cern for some time. "We are aware that coverage in Welwyn, and really along the Saskatchewan and Manitoba border, can be challenging at times," said Greg Jacobs, External Commu-nications Manager with SaskTel. "Specifically with Wel-wyn, coverage there would be what we consider limited. Unfortunately, at this time, we don't have any plans to install a tower there any time soon." The closest cell tower to Welwyn is located in Rocan-ville, and SaskTel doesn't have any plans for new con-struction in the foreseeable future. "When you're installing a large cell tower, the signal

"When you're installing a large cell tower, the signal will generally travel between 15 and 20 kilometres, de-pending on other structures or obstructions that may pre-ven a signal from traveling that far," said Jacobs.

vent a signal from traveling that far," said Jacobs. This comes as frustrating news to area residents, espe-cially since there have been rumblings of a possible tower project near Fleming three years ago. Back in 2021, SaskTel reached out to the Town of Fleming about the possibility of placing a tower in order to expand the latest technol-ogy of the time, being the 4G wireless network. Once the emerging 5G network began, the idea was scrapped with an estimated three to five year timeline tentatively placed

emerging 5G network began, the idea was scrapped with an estimated three to five year timeline tentatively placed before construction plans would be revisited. With the close proximity to the Manitoba border, Sask-Tel needs to abide by certain limitations. "What we're limited by is our license as a wireless ser-vice provider. Our spectrum licenses allow us to offer wireless service within Saskatchewan, and within Sas-katchewan only," Jacobs explained. "What we must do is basically everything in our power to prevent our signals from escaping

any of our borders, north, south, east or west. That puts a community like Welwyn in an awkward spot because they're so close to the border that we don't really have a good solution to offer service there without running afoul of our sneetrum licence."

good solution to the service there without fulfilling alon of our spectrum licenses." Essentially, the message remains the same—we know the issue, but don't hold your breath. "Given the current situation, we don't have a good so-

lution today," acknowledged Jacobs. "That doesn't mean that there won't be a good solution tomorrow, and we continue to look at every opportunity, every potential to improve connectivity all across the province."

Those sentiments come as little comfort to RM of Mooand the sentiments come as intric confort to KM of Moo-somin CAO Kendra Lawrence who, while a Fleming resi-dent, has a long distance package on her cell as the phone picks up the tower in Foxwarren, Manitoba for service. "As the administrator for Welwyn, I spoke and phoned into SaskTel quite a few times asking about improved ser-vice over there [Welwyn] because we have first respond-tion that the second service the second service of the second the second second second second second second second second the second seco

Vice over there [Welwyn] because we have first respond-ers that are not receiving their alerts that there is an inci-dent that they have to respond to," she explained. Many people in the area have maintained a landline due to the lack of cell coverage, and Lawrence noted RM of Moosomin employees utilize CB radios in all equip-ment "to ensure the safety of the staff when they're out working along the boundary where they might be in a dead zone." dead zone.'

"We're struggling with 3G, so we would be content with that, and improve on it so that we could maybe get rid of the landlines," she said. A good swath of Saskatchewan is covered by SaskTel's

LTE network, which connects 99 per cent of the popula-tion according to the Crown corporation.

Manitoba is fortunate to not have teacher strikes

Manitoba is an oasis of stability in the midst of teacher labor strife in Canada

Saskatchewan students are not having a good school year. Teachers in that province are currently engaged in rotating strikes and there is a real possibility of a full teachers' strike in the near future

The Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation wants class size and complexity clauses in their collective agreement while the province insists that this issue is best handled at the local level.

Neither side appears likely to budge, raising the spectre of an extended strike.

Sadly, labour unrest among teachers is not uncommon. In late 2023, teachers in Quebec went on strike for several weeks

Ontario and British Columbia have also seen more than their fair of teacher strikes, with teachers in those provinces engaging in job

action multiple times over the years. Manitoba teachers' collective agreements expired in 2022. For the first time ever, bargaining is happening at the provincial level.

This means that whatever agreement is negotiated will apply to all teachers in the province.

However, significant differences remain between the two sides. The Manitoba Teachers' Society (MTS) has even accused the Manitoba School Boards Association of "contract stripping.

An impasse appears likely. And yet, we are still not hearing any talk about a potential teachers' strike in Manitoba.

That's because MTS voluntarily gave up the right to strike in 1956. In return, MTS received the guarantee of binding arbitration

as a dispute resolution mechanism Binding arbitration means that both sides submit their final con-

using this information, the arbitrators decide on a new collective agreement, which is then binding on both sides. There's a significant risk for both teachers and their employers

since neither side knows what the panel will decide This creates an incentive to hammer things out at the bargaining table before arbitration.

Once it goes to arbitration, anything can happen.

Fortunately, one group that is not at risk during this process is

students. Because strikes are forbidden, schools are not likely to close be-

cause of a teachers' strike. As a result, Manitoba is one of only two provinces (the other being Prince Edward Island) that is an oasis of stability in a sea of labour disputes.

However, we must not take this stability for granted. If MTS had its way, teachers would again have the option of going on strike.

Section 3.2(h) of the official MTS policy handbook states, "Mem-bers should have the ability to choose their dispute resolution mechanism - binding arbitration or strike."

In other words, MTS would like to renege on the deal it made with the province back in 1956.

This would be a serious mistake.

For one, strikes are harmful to students. Closing schools harms students' academic and social development, as we clearly saw during the extended COVID-19 school closures.

The last thing students need is more time away from school In addition, binding arbitration has gotten superior results for teachers

Not only do Manitoba teachers not have to worry about losing pay due to extended strikes, but their current salaries and benefits are similar to what teachers in other provinces currently receive.

Manitoba is fortunate not to have teacher strikes

Let's hope that the province and MTS see the wisdom in preserving the labour peace we've had since 1956.





Harpauer delivers last budget as finance minister

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER After 17 years serving as an MLA in the Humboldt-Watrous constituency, Minister of Finance since 2017 and the Deputy Premier for the last four years, Donna Harpauer delivered her final budget last week. She's one of 10 sit-

delivered her final budget last week. She's one of 10 sit-ting MLAs not seeking re-election this year. Surrounded by not only her colleagues in the Saskatch-ewan Party, but also friends and family members (includ-ing a grandchild just eight days old), Harpauer took a breath and began her budget presentation. "It is my honour today to present the 2024/25 Saskatch-ewan budget, our government's 17th budget and my sev-enth budget as Finance Minister," she said on the after-noon of March 20. The \$19.9 billion revenue forecast for the 2024-25 Bud-

The \$19.9 billion revenue forecast for the 2024-25 Bud-get is up \$184.2 million from last year. The increase is primarily due to growth in all revenue categories, except non-renewable resources largely due to the moderation

of potash prices. Total expense is projected at \$20.1 billion in the 2024-25 Budget, an increase of \$1.5 billion, or 7.9 per cent, over last year's budget.

last year's budget. The 2024-25 Budget has a projected deficit of \$273.2 milion, but is expected to return to a surplus position in 2025-26 due to increasing revenues driven by a growing population, labour force and economy. The 2024-25 Budget supports students and teachers through a record investment of \$3.3 billion for the Minis-try of Education, up 8.1 per cent over last year's budget. This is an increase of \$247.8 million to support Prekinder-garten to Grade 12 students, early learning, child care and libraries. Saskatchewan's 27 school divisions will receive \$2.2 bil-

Saskatchewan's 27 school divisions will receive \$2.2 billion in school operating funding for the 2024-25 school year—a record increase of \$180.0 million, or an 8.8 per

cent increase over the previous year. The budget provides the Saskatchewan Health Au-thority with nearly \$4.7 billion, including an operating increase of \$248.3 million, or a 5.6 per cent increase compared to last year.

The 2024-25 Budget includes an increase of \$5.1 million for specialized medical imaging services to add essential CT and MRI capacity in the province. The World-Spectator spoke with Harpauer after the

budget last week:

This was the last budget that you presented. What were your thoughts in that moment, as you were pre-senting that last budget?

senting that last budget? I did not allow my mind to go to the fact that this is the last budget, so I wouldn't get sentimental. I just thought, I'm delivering the budget, just like always,' and I'll let that all sink in once I get done the whole circuit after-wards; that this is indeed the last budget. I wish it was balanced, but I do feel very confident and comfortable with whet we choose to do. with what we chose to do.

When you've got a growing province, which we do, then you've got more kids in classrooms, you've got more people needing health care, so you've got to step up and address that, and be there for those. But what is exciting is when you've got a growing province, and you've got some pretty substantive investments committed to our province. The economy going forward will be critical, and I think it will happen to support those higher expenditures

vestment, and attracting even more investment means more revenue for the province to maintain and sustain what we've got. It becomes self sustaining going forward, and that's going to be really critical.

I remember from your comments yesterday, we're starting in a deficit position, but you're anticipating ending on a positive note, and you made reference to the resource industry as playing a huge role in that posi-tive security. tive growth.

It truly does, it plays a massive amount and I'm hop-ing that the next finance minister uses it towards that! But you know, as you have more people, you have more people buying stuff, and that means more PST.

So that's why all of that becomes very critical and not everybody knows that it goes beyond just having the feedstock you need for what you want to do. nances better than when you first came in?

What I think I will be able to have pride in is that there's stability. Keeping in mind I was the Finance Min-ister through a pandemic, where basically the economy was shut down. So we had that massive swing. I was the Finance Minister when we had the largest catastrophic drought in agriculture, which is a huge industry in our province. So I got to live through that swing. But now that I'm projecting a more normal year, the foundation of our budget's solid, and we have three revenue sources we've got taxes, we've got resource revenue, and we have transfers on the federal government, which of course,

they can do because they collect taxes from us as well. We need to base our expenses a very limited amount on the resource revenue, because resource revenues go up and down. It's so volatile. So I want to keep budgets and I've really stressed that with my government col-leagues—of less than 15 per cent to be reliant on resource revenue. And above that, we need to invest it somewhere revenue. And above that, we need to invest it somewnere else than a one-time spend and I've been able to basically entrench that into our psyche. And happy to note in this budget, only 13.5 per cent of the expenses are paid for by resource revenues, so that when resource revenues go down, you're not devastated. You're not scrambling for where the money's going to come from.

I think overall, we're positioned with our resource cusp of something hage. I couldn't agree with you more!

One statistic that was mentioned vesterday was that you've delivered the most budgets by a single provin-cial Finance Minister in 60 years—what is your thought on that?

Someone asked me 'how many budgets this?' and I didn't know! Well, now I know—seven that's crazy! But I loved it. I really do. I've loved this position, it's been such an honour to have had the confidence of my government on keeping me here

So what does life after politics look like? I don't know. I said to some people, the first thing I'm going to do is read a book that's meaningless, that I do not have to memorize it, analyze it, or fix the problem! And after that, I'll find something. I don't know what it is, but I can't see myself just doing nothing.

Moosomin MLA Steven Bonk: 'Our government is committed to having a CT Scanner in Moosomin'

AND KEVIN WEEDMARK Moosomin MLA Steven Bonk said he is excited about the prospect of a CT Scanner for the Moosomin region.

for the Moosomin region. "I'm extremely excited about the CT scanner coming to Moosomin," he told the World-Spectator following the provin-cial budget Wednesday. "Our government has committed to having a CT scanner in Moosomin and working with the local community. It falls outside the regular pro-currement process due to the fact that the curement process due to the fact that the Health Foundation has already raised so much money towards it. We will work to-wards a path forward on how we can make this work in a way that is best for the com-munity as well as falling under the SHA requirements.

"At this stage, what we're looking at, is the community or the Health Care Founda-tion, or an interested party, would purchase and run the CT business. SHA is looking at buying or contracting CT scans from that private company and staffing it with SHA workers"

Bonk said it could be a problem having the CT Scanner within the Southeast In-tegrated Care Centre if the company that

"It could be a problem and we're look-ing at that now," he said. "That's one of the things that we're not exactly sure of yet because there are some concerns around the unionized and non-unionized workers and Collective Bargaining Agreements. But we know it's in the best interests of the people of Saskatchewan to have a CT scanner in Moosomin and especially to have it in the hospital so that it will dovetail nicely with the air ambulance, for example, for stroke victims and trauma victims.

"We're looking at all options at the mo-ment and we've asked the community to come forward with a business proposal. With that, the Ministry of Health will look at that and decide what is the best way to move forward with this project, but we are committed to working with the community

mostly to make sure that a CT scan does end up in Moosomin." Bonk said the government had to come

up with a creative solution for Moosomin "Moosomin is not completely compliant

with some of the requirements of the SHA for a CT Scanner. This proposal, which comes from the Moosomin Health Care Foundation, in conjunction with the doc-tors in Moosomin, falls outside our normal proces

'So that's why we're trying to make a framework, so that if other communities in Saskatchewan have fundraising efforts and they want to place some sort of diagnostic imaging equipment in their community,

this way we can work with SHA to identhis way we can work with 51m of health foundations going off on their own and de-ciding what they need. If they can collabo-rate with the SHA I think we could have a much better, much more efficient system.

"This isn't unusual where communities "This isn't unusual where communities are raising money on their own for this equipment, we're trying to make a frame-work like I mentioned, so that the com-munities, before they decide what to buy, they're talking with SHA to make sure that it's needed in that area. That was a bit of a concern, we didn't want to set a precedent where Moosomin said that they wanted a CT scanner so the Health Foundation went

out and bought one and then the SHA says, 'Oh, but we could've used this more.' We need to make sure that we're doing every-thing as efficiently and as helpful to the province as we can.

"This proposal came together by the good work of Dr. Wessel Roets, the Moo-somin Health Foundation, Bill McPherson, Mayor Larry Tomlinaton, bin McFietson, Mayor Larry Tomlinson and the Communi-ty Builders' Alliance. This has been a long time coming but we've worked really well together and with the SHA, and in particu-lar the ministers in the Ministries of Health and of Rural and Remote Health to make

and of Kural and Remote Health to make sure that this happens. A lot of people did a lot of work behind the scenes for a long time to get to where we are today. "They were just excellent to work with. I have to give them credit because they didn't let this die either. They worked when I didn't even know that they were working on it So I really appreciate their efforts"

"Speaking with the minister yesterday when we had a meeting with all of the partners in Moosomin, he indicated they do want to use us more as a pilot project, because this is the first of this particular cituation to be arong and it or given to have a situation to happen and it's going to be in Moosomin. So they have a vested inter-est in making sure that this is a success so we want to make sure that we have all of the pieces in place and that we're working with the local community and the local organizations, with SHA and the Ministry of Health to make sure that this is successful.


