People who live along the Saskatche-wan-Manitoba boundary says that poor cell service along the border causes many issues, including uneven access to emer-gency services, and puts people's health and safety at risk. According to one First Responder in Welwyn, coverage is so bad that calls to First Responders' cell phones often do not go through, or messages come through on

go through, or messages come through on the cell phones hours too late.

Some people have had trouble making 911 calls from along and near the border,

as the calls are continually dropped. SaskTel says the issue has to do with Manitoba.

Patron found guilty of willful promotion of hatred

Continued from front Crown Prosecutor Ryan

Snyder said that in the video, Patron had repeated "pretty much every antisemitic trope in the history of antisemitic tropes."

During his closing argu-ment Monday, Snyder read from a transcript of one of Patron's statements: "What we need to do,

perhaps more than any-thing, is remove these peo-ple, once and for all, from our country," the transcript read.

The Crown alleged that The Crown alleged that Patron had publicly, and outside of private conver-sation, wilfully promoted hatred against an identifi-able group, that group be-ing Jews. Patron had argued that there had been new idence

there had been no evidence to prove that the comments in the video had been directed at Jewish people. The judge informed the

jury that promotion of ha-tred is a high bar.

"Hatred is more than simple dislike. It is an extreme emotion, associated with the vilification or de-testation of a group," the judge said. The jury took less than

an hour to find that Patron was guilty after they be-gan their deliberations on gan then uc... Wednesday. When the verdict was

delivered in the courtroom, Patron, who had said in his closing argument that his freedom of speech had been limited by the state,

sat silently. Judge Robertson will hear sentencing submis-sions in Estevan Court of King's Bench on October 20 20

The Crown will be suggesting a sentence of a year in prison, which would mean about six further months in prison for Pa-tron, after he receives credit for time served waiting for the trial.

Depending on how the judge rules, it's possible Patron could be released without further incarceration, as a result of the credit

it. Patron has served sen-tences for other recent convictions, including one for mischief and breach of undertaking in December 2021 and for two counts of assault causing bodily hearm in tune harm in June. In that case, he was

found guilty of assault-ing two women after he'd shared an evening out with them in downtown Regina. One of those women broke her wrist, apparently trying to break her fall after Patron struck her in the face. The other suffered a concussion from the incident.

of charges Patron has had a long string of run-ins with the law, from assault charges in eastern Canada to the assault charges from the assault charges from the 2019 incident in Regina, in which the two women were assaulted, to incidents in which Patron was charged for entering the Redvers Legion Hall, to an incident at the CBC building in Regina, in which police were called to remove him from the property, to an incident on February 22 of last year at the Saskatchewan Legislature, in which Patron was charged with four offences after he was detained by security at the legislature and Regina City Police had to be called to remove him from the building

Concerns about SaskTel service issues along provincial border

People who live along the Saskatchewan, Manitoba bor-der say they face daily issues with cellphone reception and internet connection

internet connection. Barb Cuthill of Welwyn expressed her concerns about the poor cell reception she has from her home. "We cannot be the only community because Fleming, Maryfield and Spy Hill, all those people in that area must be going crazy," said Cuthill. "The first responders in town can't even get calls. The people in Toronto had a meltdown when the Rogers ser-vice went down, we live like that every day." A first responder from the Welwyn area said often, she is unable to receive emergency calls because the network connection is so bad. connection is so bad.

connection is so bad. "There's spots where you hit dead zones around here in Welvyn. It's really ridiculous," said Amber Hamilton, a first responder from Welvyn. "We have a good first responder team here, I'm a first responder too, but I don't receive a lot of the calls. That's the problem, you don't get a lot of the calls, or if you do get them, they're 12 hours late. "I work in the village of Welwyn, I'm the village supervi-sor. When I complained to SaskTel about it they told me to oet a hooster because I'm constantly roaming around the

sor. When I complained to sask lei about it they told me to get a booster because I'm constantly roaming around the village. What am I supposed to do? Have a booster on my head or attach it to my body? There's no reason for it." The ongoing problem of poor network connections has an impact to the safety for the community of Welwyn, Horniber crited

"There's times where people just don't get the calls. In

the first responders instances, you have people who don't have landlines anymore and can't call out because they only have cellphones

only have cellphones. "There was one call about a year and half ago, the man was trying to call 911, but he kept being disconnected. Then he finally phoned me and said I'm trying to phone 911, but it keeps disconnecting. I ran over there and checked it out, then came home and called 911 myself (through my land-line). It's just horrible." Hamilton said majority of the people in her community heavily rely using their landlines as their main source of communication.

communication.

The problem I have with it is we have to pay the same price as everyone else for our cellphones, but we have to keep landlines because our cellphones don't work enough to communicate," she said. "We're customers, we're paying more than the average

person because we're paying for cell service, which can't be used most of the time. A lot of us still have to keep our landlines.

When my kids started home schooling I had to get RF-NOW, which is a fabulous service, but hat's another \$150 a month to get internet. I have a household of five, \$150 a month, plus five people with cellphones, plus a landline, we're paying a lot to communicate." Hamilton said she has been a first responder for eight

vears

years. "We have a great group of first responders here that aren't always getting the calls," she said. "It shouldn't be this bad, all they need to do is put up a booster or something, but they really don't care.

"It seems there is not enough people, I guess, in their eyes. It just doesn't seem fair that everyone has to get dou-ble billed or tripled billed."

SaskTel says

they are looking into the matter

SaskTel stated that they have been made aware of the service connection issues along the Saskatchewan Manitoba border.

"Although our wireless network reaches over 99 per cent of the population of the province, we are aware that ac-cessing a wireless signal can be a challenge in some areas, especially for those who live and work very near to our provincial borders," said Greg Jacobs External Communi-cations Manager for SaskTel.

Jacobs explained what the primary reason is for the com-mon network issues.

mon network issues. "As a regional wireless service provider, the wireless license we have been issued by Innovation, Science, and Economic Development Canada (ISED) prohibits us from emitting a wireless signal in any province outside of Sas-katchewan and as such, we must do everything possible to ensure our wireless signals do not leak across any of our provincial borders. "This unfortunately means that Carl."

This, unfortunately, means that SaskTel is unable to provide comprehensive wireless coverage to all areas along our border with Manitoba and results in some of these areas having less than ideal wireless coverage. "While we are limited by our wireless license, it is worth

noting that we are planning to upgrade our entire wireless network to 5G over the next few years, including the towers that serve customers near our provincial borders." In 2022-2023, SaskTel will be investing \$110.6 million into wireless network enhancements, including \$103.6 million

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for expanding 5G coverage. By the end of 2022, 5G will cov-er approximately 50 per cent of Saskatchewan's population, according to SaskTel.

It can be as simple as following the road rules yourself, teaching your kids about traffic safety, or taking a driving course if you don't feel confident on the road. 
"It will be cool to see if tables come dressed up as one


Schwean said people are encouraged to buy their tickets as soon as possible, as there are already 26 tables booked.

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Semi hijacked, driver pulls air brake before being thrown out of cab, semi erupts into flames before hitting spike belt Firefighters dousing down a semi that was stolen and then started on fire while the drivers ran from police in the early morning hours on Sept. 29. Two suspects were taken into custody and charged with a long list of charges, including robbery, kidnapping, assault, and flight from police. The semi was carrying newsprint.

Multiple charges after semi hijacked, driver ejected

Around 1 am on Thursday, September 29, Moosomin RCMP received a report from Manitoba RCMP that a pick-up truck towing a trailer—both of which were re-ported stolen in Ontario—was travelling

Westbound on Highway 1. Officers from both Manitoba RCMP and Moosomin, Broadview and Indian Head RCMP responded as the vehicle travelled west.

The truck pulled into the weigh scale on

The truck pulled into the weigh scale on the Trans-Canada Highway east of Moo-somin, almost hitting an RCMP vehicle. Two individuals then exited the truck, approached a semi which had been parked at the weigh scale, threatened the adult male semi driver and got inside, driving the semi onto Highway 1. The adult male semi driver was then

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thrown from the semi, which continued driving on Highway 1. The driver was taken to hospital with injuries described as non-life-threatening in nature. The owner of the semi managed to pull the air brakes before he was pushed out of the vehicle which caused the back tires to lock up and eventually start on fire.

lock up and eventually start on fire. Officers set up a spike belt to disable the semi. As it approached the spike belt, the trailer caught fire. The semi then swerved to avoid the spike belt and came to a stop is the orthogonal in the centre median.

The two individuals inside were then ar-rested without incident.

This agreement, signed with eight First Nations represented by the Gwayakocchigewin Limited Partnership (GLP) for the Waasigan Transmission Line project, shows that the appetite for industry to work with First Nations is there. In total, nine First Nations will have the opportunity to invest in a 50 per cent stake in the Waasigan Transmission Line project, putting those Nations that invest in a financially independent position

This partnership is a step in the right direction. As Indigenous people, we sometimes see development and projects take place without receiv-ing any benefits. Industry working with First Nations is a step forward in reconciliation.

This is not the first time an equity agreement has happened between industry and First Nations. In March this year, Coastal Gaslink signed a

10 per cent equity option with First Nationa along the pipeline corridor. Chief Justin Napoleon of Saulteau First Nations said of that agree-ment: "We want to be partners; we want to be involved in the lifecycle of the project from ground-breaking to reclamation. Having the option to get involved in equity opens up the opportunity to have long-term economic benefit from a project that will be there for years."

Having this long-term economic benefit provides opportunities for our First Nations that we could not have considered 10 years ago.

Our communities can no longer rely on the federal government to provide Indigenous with quality and culturally-centred education and health care services. Often at times, federal funding agreements come with strings attached, forcing First Nations to spend more on admin-istration and professional services. Generating our own revenue with ownership in projects gives us control and allows us to spend our rev-enue how we see fit. That is what real self-determination looks like. Additionally, equity ownership in projects allows us to have control of the projects on our land, allowing our people to determine the trajec-tory of a project wing us a set at the table with industry. Not only

tory of a project by giving us a seat at the table with industry. Not only will First Nations be partners in the project we will also be environmental regulators.

Our people know best when it comes to taking care of the land. What the Creator has provided us is sacred to our people and our culture. It is essential for our people that when we develop our natural resources, we do so responsibly and ensure the project meets our high environmental standards. We are keepers of the land, and we have a responsibility to

ensure that the projects we engage in are reliable and sustainable. This equity deal with Hydro One is just the beginning for our First Nations in Ontario. There will be more opportunities like this as long as the government gets out of the way and lets First Nations and industry work together.

However, some Nations have a hard time raising the capital to invest in projects. Having a National Indigenous Guaranteed Loan Program will help Nations raise the capital necessary to invest in projects taking place on their land.

If we want to see First Nations truly thrive and experience genuine self-determination, we must allow for equity agreements to happen and invest in tools that facilitate growth and access to capital. Early last year, the Indigenous Resource Network announced its 'ownership changes everything' campaign. This campaign advocated for a National Indigenous Guaranteed Loan Program, a tool the government can implement right now to offer more Nations access to capital to invest in resource development. A guaranteed loan program can be a very helpful tool for

Nations as they raise the capital necessary to invest in projects. Our people are faced with a choice between development and poverty. We are looking for solutions for our people, and this one is staring us in the face. We hope other Canadians and Indigenous can come together to support Indigenous ownership in these projects. We believe it is a real win-win for industry and our Indigenous communities.

\$58 million and counting for the useless ArriveCan App

The federal government paid \$58 million for absolutely nothing with the ArriveCan App. The Globe and Mail tallied up the cost of the Ar-riveCan App after the government released mis-leading and incomplete numbers previously for the cost of developing and maintaining the app. The useless mobile app has gone from man-datory to optional, which means no one will likely ever, ever, ever use it again. I never thought the app was the evil invasion of privacy some people painted it as, I just thought it was useless.

Twice, Kara and I filled out the information in the app as we arrived back in Canada from out of the country, coming back from Mexico in March and from London in June. In both cases, we filled out the basic arrival in-

formation that we used to fill out on arrival cards when flying back to Canada, along with proof of

vaccination. The app then produces a QR code you suppos-edly needed to enter the country.

In both cases we filled out the information, and in both cases absolutely no one looked at the app, scanned the QR code, or even asked if we had filled it out. No one asked as we showed up for flights back to the country, no one asked as we arrived in

back to the country, no one asked as we arrived in the country. If you have ever flown into Toronto, you know Customs now consists of answering a few ques-tions on a computer terminal, which then prints out a receipt including your photo. When we arrived back in Canada in June, we answered the questions on the terminal, some of which were the same already answered on Ar-riveCan, then along with everyone else waited for an hour for a border agent to glace at the print-out, confirm that it was us in the photos (who else would it be, it was taken by a computer terminal 20 feet away) and wave us through, and again, just to reiterate, absolutely no one asked anything about ArriveCan. ArriveCan.

I spoke to one person at the Toronto airport who had come back to Canada 10 times since ArriveCan had been made mandatory and was only asked to show his QR code it generated once.

So while some painted it as a massive invasion of privacy, it was really just a massive invasion of time, collecting the same information that you would traditionally have filled out on an arrival card, su-per secret information like the flight number you were arriving on, which is of course of absolutely

were arriving on, which is of course of absolutery no use to anyone. The frustrating thing about ArriveCan is that the government spent millions on it for absolutely nothing. The biggest chunk of spending on ArriveCan went to a company called GCStrategies, whose other greatest hit was the CovidAlert App. If you look through GCStrategies list of clients, there is

really only one: The clients are Environment and Climate Change Canada, Treasury Board of Can-ada, Transport Canada, Economic Development Canada, Invest Canada, Canada Border Services

Canada, Invest Canada, Canada Border Sérvices Agency, Government of Canada. . . . okay, so really just the Government of Canada. I am suspicious of a company whose stellar repu-tation mostly just gets it government contracts, just as I am suspicious of a company that has a bunch of anonymous testimonials on its site attributed to people like "VP, Cloud Services, Major Crown Cor-poration." What kind of Crown Corporation presi-dent is willing to provide a testimonial but ask that his name not be shared. I am also suspicious when these senior officials

I am also suspicious when these senior officials all have one thing in common—basic spelling and grammar is beyond every one of them. I wonder how they got where they are when they can't write a sentence that make sense.

a sentence that make sense. "Their strategic thinking and the ability to con-nect the dots in very complex projects and govern-ment environment." That is supposedly a complete sentence by "Assistant Deputy Minister (Govern-ment of Canada)" who doesn't know that the sen-

er," says "Chief Data Officer, Public Service." "GCStrategies have a unique ability to compli-ment our global teams with industry leading inde-pendent talent" says "VP of Client Services, Global Software Solutions Provider." Okay, I can forgive this individual for not knowing the difference be-tween the words complement and compliment, but they are seriously saying that there is something "unique" about providing consulting services to companies, which tens of thousands of companies do.

And what does GC Strategies actually do for mil-lions in federal contracts? GCStrategies is based in Ottawa and has "between one and four" employ-ees, so it gets the contracts from the government and then contracts other companies to do the work. But not all of it, as Canada Border Services Agen-cy (CBSA) submitted documents in Parliament that

list 27 contracts involving 23 different companies to work on ArriveCan, one of which is GCStrategies.

This brings the current total for the 2022-23 fiscal year to \$34,188,370.54 in revenue for the province. The single exploration license and 72 of the 78 parcels

posted received acceptable bids. The Estevan area saw the

ling 4,125.495 hectares. The highest bonus bid received in this offering is

\$608,172.96 for a 161.287 hectare lease south of Oxbow, which was awarded to Adonai Resources II Corporation. A parcel north of Lampman received highest dollar per hectare bid of \$6,433.42 per hectare with Scout Energy Ltd. bidding \$419,414.00 for the 65.193 hectare lease. The single exploration license received a bonus bid of \$352,333.55 for a 4,345.505 hectare block of land west of Kindersley. The successful bidder was Millenium Land (333) Ltd.

The October sale is the fourth of six oil and gas public offerings scheduled for this fiscal year. The next sale will be held on December 6, 2022, and will feature 133 leases covering 18,541 hectares and three exploration licenses covering 5,349 hectares.

SaskEnergy helps community groups through Share the Warmth grant program

EQUAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER Registered non-profit organizations can apply for SaskEnergy's Share the Warmth grant program to help with their own community group initiatives.

The program offers cash grants of up to \$1,000 for grass-roots community initiatives that provide food, clothing, and shelter support to families, children, seniors, homeless persons, and others who may need a hand.

"The purpose of the program is to support non--profit organizations who provide services to those in need," said Allix Schweitzer, Supervisor of Community Engagement of SaskEnergy. "Our focus on SaskEnergy's Share the Warmth program

"Our focus on SaskEnergy's Share the Warmth program is just in time for the heating season. It's a good natural fit, it has been in our organization for a long time to focus on helping with warm clothing, shelter, and food. "We all know that in Saskatchewan it gets pretty cold here during the winter. The program is a focused effort to help non-profit organizations who focus on those types of projects for people in need, to be able to do that." projects for people in need, to be able to do that." This year, the program will provide \$1,000 grants to as

many as 40 non-profit organizations across the province. In order to apply for the grant, community groups and organizations must be registered as a non-profit. Applications for this year's Share the Warmth program

are being accepted now. The deadline for groups to apply is October 31.

Grant recipients are required to implement their projects between November 2022 and March 2023.

"The Share the Warmth grant program, I think, will help these communities and organizations, and the peo-Ple of Saskatchewan prepare for winter, that is the main focus of the program," said Schweitzer. "There's 40 of the \$1,000 grants available. The idea is that these organizations use those funds to leverage stuff

they might not be able to do otherwise, and work together with other partners to maybe even create larger programs,

to help as many people as possible.

"Some of the types of projects we've seen in the past are groups who are able to purchase warm clothing, boots, or winter coats for kids. We've also seen projects of clothing exchanges for children where you can bring something in and able to take something out to make sure your chil-dren are dressed appropriately for winter."

The program is dedicated to support organizations who

look to help families for the upcoming Christmas season. "There's also community cooking programs, breakfast programs, holiday hamper programs," Schweitzer said.

"We've definitely seen some applications for organiza-tions who are putting together a holiday hamper to ensure that a nice, warm, awesome Christmas meal is available for people who may not have that opportunity.

"We're accepting applications right now. We're excited to be able to do this program again. I think it honestly helps people prepare for winter. Personally, I've volun-teered in some of these projects throughout the province and it's a really good, warm feeling being able to help people with these necessities.

"Our focus is to be able to help people, in all places, but

Schweitzer said the program also expanded to include projects that help people in Saskatchewan during winter."

"We expanded the program, last year, to also include mental health initiatives," she said.

"With Covid being brought to the forefront over the last few years, we thought expanding it to mental health initiatives would be a nice thing as well. "This is an important program for SaskEnergy because

we see ourselves as a community-minded organization. We have customers throughout all of Saskatchewan, we

We have classified and uncertain and a service to most of the province and we're just so proud of this program... "The fact that it helps ensure the people in Saskatch-ewan who might need a little extra help to prepare for the winter season

munities in rural southeast Saskatchewan, specifically those who are in immediate need of stronger service con-nections, will be at to be top of the list for upgrading its service towers.

"Given the intricate planning and complex work needed to upgrade the more than 1,000 towers we have across the province, I do not have an exact timeframe as to when the towers serving Maryfield and Welwyn will

Maryfield and Weiwyn Will be upgraded," he said. "That said, once we do upgrade these towers to 5G, our customers in these areas will be able to enjoy increased data speeds and better overall reliability of their wireless service."

Many face cell issues

Kendra Lawrence, CAO of the RM of Moosomin, said residents have complained to her about poor cell reception.

"Cell reception is very poor all along our Saskatch-ewan-Manitoba boundary," Lawrence said. "I live in Fleming myself

and our cell service is ex-tremely poor. On a clear day we can see the Moosomin tower, but we can't pick it up. I have a long-distance package on our phone be-cause most of the time we pick up the Manitoba tower.

"We get dropped calls, you're in dead areas along the provincial border. The RM of Moosomin equip-ment is equipped with CB radios because we can't guarantee the cell service along the border. That way we can confirm our guys have communication at all times

Lawrence said she per-sonally addressed the issue with SaskTel this past year. 'From my own personal

experience, it's just coming on a year ago where I lost my son in an accident just directly south of Fleming,"

"I have expressed the concerns to SaskTel myself. concerns to SaskTel myself. They had indicated there was a tower to be placed in Fleming. We thought it would be going into place this year, but with their plan for 5G upgrade, that has now been pushed back and could be two to three years in the future, before we see it placed in Fleming." Lawrence said she be-lieves SaskTel should move up the 5G intallations in

up the 5G intallations in border communities, where it can make a real difference. "When we are seeing these dead zones that are

causing issues for the safety and lives of people, they need to move those projects to the top of the list." "Even some sort of com-

pensation on our cellphone bills, for the fact that we have such poor reception or poor connectivity. That part, is frustrating because we pay the same price for the service, and we're not get-ting the service."

Lawrence has contacted SaskTel to address the issue herself.

"I have followed up with them numerous times in regards to the complaints from Welwyn about the ser-

vice," she said. "Now I'm trying to work with the mayor of Fleming as well in regards to where the tower was at.

"Recently I phoned Sask-Tel to see where (installing the new tower in Fleming) was at because we had been told it was supposed to be coming this year. Now I have been told over the phone that it can be up to three years, now that they are installing 5G.

"There are some areas that don't have reception at all. I understand that those could you have none at all, then the focus would be to those areas versus where we have some service, it's just poor." She said people on the Manitoba side have also

complained about their ser-vices being interrupted by cell reception from the Sas-katchewan side. "I don't want to say that we are more important than someone else who doesn't have service, because everyone should be able to have

this," said Lawrence. "I just hope there could be some communication be-tween the provinces. That if SaskTel is unable to provide that output of reception themselves, that they could speak with the Manitoba counterparts that we could tap into their towers without long distance charges or any extra data charges that would give us the service up until they (SaskTel) could upgrade theirs. "There seems to be that

argument' between the two provinces. They probably have to turn our reception down so it doesn't affect Manitoba, and Manitoba had probably turned down

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affect Saskatchewan. Yet, those of us who are right along the border are fighting between the two. "People in Manitoba com-

plain they pick up Saskatch-ewan signals all the time."

ewan signals all the time." Fleming mayorTrent Green, said there have been at least 20 people in the com-munity who have spoken out about connection issues. "We still have a land-line just for the fact that we don't have cell service." said Green

Green.

He said it is important that when emergency re-sponders are out in the field, that they have service. "It's a safety concern.

We're far enough away from Moosomin that to wait for an ambulance is an issue, yet alone the time it takes to get somewhere to make a call, to even call the ambu-lance. Safety is our biggest concern."

Residents who have complained about service issues to the town council have been asked to submit their complaints to SaskTel di-rectly. "We directed people to SaskTel because we figured

if you can get 20 to 50 peo-ple complaining versus one letter from one municipal-ity, I think would have more impact," Green said. "Ten years ago it was fair-

ly common for connection to be spotty, but it's 2022. Everyone has a cellphone, for what you pay for you should have service." Green reception is along

the entire border. "I run a crew that works for SaskPower, we work up to Langenburg to as far down to the States border, and anything along High-way 8 going east is a prob-lem," he said.

"That whole strip to the Manitoba border has poor coverage. It's not just direct-ly east of Moosomin, but it's that whole side of the province in this corner.

"I run a cell booster in my truck on the job just to have better service."

The Mayor of Spy Hill stated that residents in town have commented about slow internet connections, but have not experienced

cellphone service issues. However people in the RM of Spy Hill face issues with reception often.





Women in Trades workshops at Rocanville

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER In partnership with Goodman Steel, Nixon Electrical Service, and Sask Polytechnic, the Nutrien Rocanville site has completed two of their three Women in Trades (WIT) exploratory workshops this past September.

The final workshop will be held on Oct. 15 and 16 with a focus on welding and machining. "I'm hoping these workshops make

these girls aware of not only these trades that we're going through with them, but to let them know about the different oppor-tunities that exist out there," said Taniesha Ohnander, automation project co-ordina-tor at Nutrien Rocanville.

"There's lots of girls and people in school where the jobs are very narrow. They assume that teaching and nursing are the only opportunities, but there's so much more

The purpose of the program is to expose young women, ages 15 to 19, to different trade opportunities that are available.

Many of the mentors involved in leading the program came from Nutrien's WiNTER (Women in Nontraditional Environments and Roles) mentorship program, BERG (Black Employee Resource Group), and Allies of these women.

"Going through these workshops we've also had volunteers from different careers not only just mechanics, welders, and electricians who have come, but we've also had some lab technicians come, I'm an electrical technologist that's there too," Ohnander said.

"We're showing them what's out there, and if anything piques their interest that they want to pursue, they can ask us any questions, so we help support them through that, and worse case scenario, at least they know what they don't like.

"The workshops will give them some good idea of what's out there and show the light that there are other jobs out there."

The first workshop focused on carpen-try and automotive. Participants learned about a variety of common hand and power tools within the carpentry trade, basic maintenance of automotive vehicles, and

maintenance of automotive venices, and how to use them safely. In the second workshop, girls learned about information on electrical and plumbing. They focused on how to run wires in a residential setting, and learned how to run and instell generalized near how to run and install crosslinked polyethylene electrical outlet.

Óhnander works as an electrical engineering technologist at the Nutrien Rocanville site

From being one of the lead co-ordinators for the workshops, Ohnander said the program encouraged girls to sign up for all three workshops in order to introduce them to multiple fields of work.

"When they signed up they actually signed up for all three weekends," she said.

"Originally we had it where you could sign up for separate weekends, but my concern was that if a girl didn't like carpentry or plumbing and they skip it, then there's the potential that they missed out

"I'm hoping these workshops make these girls aware of . . the different opportunities that exist out there'

on a passion that they may have actually loved from that day.

"Having them sign up for all six weeks, has not forced them into it, but made sure they got to try all the different workshops.

The workshops originally had 12 spots available, but by the time Nutrien was done promoting the program in Rocan-ville and surrounding communities, more than 20 young women were interested. "We extended it to 14 kids, but by the

time we got to the end of the week we had 12 additional girls who were hoping to get into it," Ohnander said

More women have shown an interest in trades

Based on how the first two workshops went and speaking about the program to people in the community, Ohnander noticed an increase of women who sparked an interest in trades.

"I have noticed an interest and honestly not just with the younger girls" she said. "With the SaskPolytech exploratory program we're putting on right now, they originally offered this at their campuses and we just put it out here in Rocanville, but originally it's hosted for women ages 15 and up. They've seen women up to the age of 60 participating in these events. "From that, and when I was trying to build the awareness to get these kids ex-

cited, I'm hoping we can do more of this not only for women, but even for men and people of all ages because I think the av-erage person changes their career seven times in their life.

"How many adults are still going through those seven career changes that workshops like these, can be an opportunity for them to try it out and see if one of these things, are what they want to pursue

Ohnander said the first two workshops

"In general we have a wicked group of girls," she said.

"Right from day one they sparked this adorable friendship that by the fourth day, they were giving each other copper rings out of the electrical scraps that we had, and they were all married

"They've been so fun, they've been so engaged to the point that anytime there's a question or someone is asked to par-

a question or something, their hands are just shooting up saying they want to do it. "It's been so fun, I can't say enough about how great it's all gone so far. No one has been injured either, we all go home safe every time which is obviously a good bonus that we all hope to see every time." In the final workshop, happening on Oct. 15 and 16, participants will learn the basics about gas welding where MIG

welding will be specifically covered.

The women in the workshop will also

learn to assemble and tack weld steel, use assorted shaping methods, as well as use cleaning, finishing, and cutting tools at Goodman Steel.

"I hope they have a good time, I know that there's a few girls in there that love welding, personally anytime I work with the welder underground I want to do it," Ohnander said.

"I'm expecting this next shop to be the most fun out there. I'm really hoping they just have fun, if we get a pile of machin-ists and welders out of it, that's a huge win too

"I hope we get to go home with some goodies, because I think they'll be welding dice, sort of a cube, and I believe they'll be machining a hammer.

"I also hope I get some long time friend-ships with these kids and that I don't just see them for these few weekends and they disappear forever because, again, they've

been a blast to hang out with." With the success from the program, Ohnander said the organization may host another series of workshops in Spring 2023.

"I've planted the seed to have more workshops (in the future), obviously it's just going to be the funding that we have to make sure is in place to do this again, she said.

"SaskPoly isn't making money off of this, it's really just to cover their expenses. Between expenses, supplies, gas and in-structor fees, it does add up. As long as we can get funding I'm more than happy to. "Once this last workshop is done, I hope

to start looking into potentially a spring class, but nothing is in place, that is just my hope.

She started off by noting increases in grant funding to accommodate in-creased enrolment (\$793,604) and main-tenance (\$99,000) plus ventilation projects (\$183,163).

Due to the higher enrolment, tuition revenue is above budget by over \$137,000,




advantage. The 2022 WBDGCU introduced the Rick Goraluk Memorial tablets for Second

"STARS air ambulance saved my life" Halbachs have a personal reason to support Elvis show in Moosomin

BY SIERRA D'SOUZA BUTTS LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER Seven years ago Cora Halbach almost lost her life in a car accident from hitting a moose. She said if STARS Air Ambulance did not rescue her at the moment of the accident, then she would not be alive today

"A lot of people probably think after seven years why now that I'm telling my story, but we will never forget it," said Cora

"STARS saved my life."

After the accident, Cora was taken to Regina General Hospital from York-ton. She was put on life-support for five days and was kept in the hospital for six weeks until she was healthy enough to leave leave.

"When they took me down the stairs afterwards in the hospital, I was pulled by this woman, I didn't know her, but I can remember her saying that I was very lucky," Cora said.

"I told her, you know I'm not lucky, I'm fortunate, and I still believe that today.

Her husband, Cliff Halbach, said he is forever grateful for STARS's help. "It took a road ambulance an hour and

a half to get to the scene at the time of the accident," said Cliff. "There was no way she would've made it by road ambulance, no way. The only

it by road ambulance, no way. The only thing that I think saved her from being in the cold for that long, was her body go-ing down to almost hypothermia." The accident happened in February, 2015. Cliff said they were driving on Highway 16 with their three grandchil-dren in the truck, and got in the accident about 20 minutes away from the city of about 20 minutes away from the city of Yorkton.

"She wouldn't have made it without STARS because STARS is equipped for life support, wheel ambulance is not," Cliff said.

"Without them putting her on life sup-port and keeping her alive, she would not be here today. I'm glad they were

around or otherwise I wouldn't have her, she wouldn't be here.' Since 1985, the Shock Trauma Air Res-

cue Society (STARS) has flown more than 50,000 missions across Western Canada.

During 2021-22 fiscal year, there were 1,075 STARS missions that were carried out across the province, from their bases in Regina and Saskatoon.

Cora said when she found out that Rory Allen, an Elvis Tribute Artist, was coming to perform a show in Mooso-min and that all proceeds from the show would be donated to STARS, that she had to be there.

"We donate money to STARS, but as soon as I saw in the paper about the

show, I said we have to go," she smiled.

"I'm an Elvis fan, I'm a very big Elvis fan. As soon as I heard about the show I knew we were going. We need to sup-port it because all the proceeds from that show goes to STARS." The two have been fans of Elvis for

decades. They grew up listening to his music and have been to many tribute

"We went to Alberta before Covid started and they had 17 different Elvis Tribute Artists out there," Cora said.

"I think (the show) does bring awareness for STARS because a lot of people are Elvis Presley fans."

are Elvis Presley fans." Having the opportunity to see a great performance while supporting a great cause means a lot, Cora said. "This way I get to meet some of the people from STARS too," Cora said. "Td like to just meet them, and I'd like to take my granddaughter too, she's 13 now. I want her to just talk to STARS, to ask them guestions, even just to let her

ask them questions, even just to let her know what they're about, to know what saved us."

Support for STARS goes a long way The Halbachs have been supporting

STARS ever since the accident.

without them. "If they don't get support they're not going to last. Someone has to help them to keep them up there. "There's lots of stories I've read of people, that were taken by STARS, who would not be alive today if it had not been for them."

Since the accident, Cora has worked hard to be in shape, to where she is at today.

"It took a while for her body to take over on its own after the tubes from life support were pulled," her husband said. "She spent six weeks in the hospital. She had to learn to talk, she had to learn

to feed herself, she had to learn how to walk after the accident."

walk after the accident." Cora said the upcoming show will help bring awareness for what STARS Air Ambulance does. "When I did get back to Esterhazy, af-ter the accident, I was in a wheelchair and we went back to our favourite res-taurant," Cora said. "That was a Thursday night, and peo-ple couldn't believe the shape that I was in.

in. "I thank God everyday that I'm alive." Cora and Cliff said the reason why they wanted to share their story was to help support STARS. "They (STARS) have been through all areas and have listed all the different

places they've gone to, it's remarkable," said Cora.

Rory Allen's solo-show in tribute to Elvis will be held at Moosomin Com-munity Theatre at 2 p.m. on Sunday Oct. 23. All proceeds from the event will go to STARS air ambulance.

RCMP were so thankful to have located the female and her child staying safely at a separate location. The male was lodged at the safely at a separate location.
