



Moosomin Thrift Store and Food Share is all about givin back to our community. As a non-profit organization, we strive in helping others, not only in Moosomin, but also in the surrounding areas. The success of both the thrift store and the food share

relies on the community and donations. Everything from clothing to housewares to miscellaneous items that are sold at the thrift store are items that were donated. In re-turn the money collected from the sales for the donated goods are put back into the store to keep it functioning and to pay for some of the food products that go into the food hampers, such as milk, bread and eggs.

Our mission when we first started was to eventually be able to give back to our community and to organizations in need. In addition to our donation last year to the Kin-Ability to help with the purchase of the liberty swing, we presented the Legion with \$1,000 from the proceeds from our fall silent auction and door prize to put towards their veteran plaques. We have also sponsored the healthy lunch program at Playfair Daycare. Now in our second year at our new location at 609 Gor-

don Street, we are grateful for continued donations and patronage. We live in such a caring community. We regu-larly receive donations for both the thrift store and the food share. #### The 802 Pipestone Air Cadets **Teaching youth how to** become productive and positive leaders and citizens

The Moosomin 802 Royal Canadian Air Cadet Pipestone Squadron is a youth pro-gram that has operated in the Moosomin area since forming in 1971. The cadet pro-gram is open to all youth in the area be-tween the ages of 12 years to 18 years of constructions for Name and the revolution age, with no fees. New cadets are welcome at any time of the year and there is no set registration deadline. The cadet program is a collaboration between the Air Cadet League of Canada

and Department of National Defense, with the main goals of the program focusing on the promotion of positive citizenship, leadership and fostering an interest in the military

Cadets meet every Monday throughout the school year at the Moosomin Convention Centre. During the weekly sessions, cadets will learn about the fundamentals of flight, survival skills, how to maintain care of their uniforms, marksmanship, and learn about the Canadian Armed Forces and the roles they play interna-tionally, just to mention a brief few of the topics covered. During the training year the cadets will also get to experience sur-vival campouts, gliding, and participation in Remembrance Day ceremonies, drill, marksmanship and effective speaking competitions, as well as visiting various military institutions. Squadron is going to start off in a big way. The squadron has a survival campout and a familiarization to flying day, which all takes place this October, as well as upcoming Remembrance Day ceremonies and various scheduled trips.

The Saskatchewan Wildlife Federation: **Enhancing fish and wildlife** habitat since 1929

The Wildlife Federation is a non-profit, non-govern-ment, charitable organization of over 33,000 members in 122 branches across Saskatchewan represent-ing every walk of life.

Per capita, we are the largest wildlife conser-vation organization of its kind in the world. Established in 1929, the SWF has become an acknowledged leader in the conservation field.

Our mission is "To en-sure the wild life legacy we leave to our children surpasses that which we inherited."

Our objectives are as fol-

• To acknowledge first and foremost that the wildlife of the province is a public resource belong-ing to all Saskatchewan residents, and to ensure the resource remains equally accessible to all residents of the province.

 To promote conservation, fishing, trapping, hunting, the shooting sports, and wildlife-oriented activities. · To practice and pro-

mote wise management and use of our natural resources. • To develop and main-



tain conservation policies. To develop and maintain conservation and edu-To acquire and enhance

habitat for wildlife.

 To accept donations of real estate, monetary funds, and materials for the purpose of furthering the sustainability of our fish and wildlife resources. • To keep provincial measuring records of big game heads, recognizing the Henry Kelsey record keeping association as and ancillary body of the SWF.

In 1929 the Saskatch-wan Fish & Game Protective Association was formed through the initiative of three individuals, Mr. Judge Bence and Mr. Tom Coburn from North Battleford and Mr. Stan Naden from Regina. They recognized the need for a united provincial voice for Saskatchewan's anglers and hunters to protect our unparalleled natural resources

On February 1, 1932 at a meeting of the organiza-tion, the name was changed to the Saskatchewan Fish & Game League, and by 1934 boasted 14 branches with 839 members who paid a membership fee of 25 cents. Due to the League's ex-

panding scope and activi-ties, the name was changed in 1966 to The Saskatch-ewan Wildlife Federation and finally was registered as a non-profit organiza-tion in 1982 as Saskatch-

ewan Wildlife Federation. In 1968, the Federation adopted the whooping crane, a species that was clawing its way back from the brink of extinction, as its official emblem.

#### The Voice of the Organized Sportsman

Youth Outdoor Leadership & Conservation School - Qualified instructors teach youth outdoor skills and the development of an outdoor ethic as the basis of facilitating leadership skills.

Operation Respect - Program provides signs to the landowner that are designed to encourage the hunter to "Respect the Landowner's Rights - Ask Permission to Hunt.'

Wildlife Tomorrow - To preserve habitat in its natural state for all species of wildlife.

Habitat Trust - Habitat Trust is a special fund established in 1978 for the purchase, retention, and enhancement of critical wildlife habitat across the province.

Youth - A "Wonders of Wildlife" Manual has been developed, with the co-operation of other programs and conservation groups.

Hide Collection - S.W.F. Local branches collect donated hides and the proceeds are used to secure Wildlife habitat through the Habitat Trust

Fisheries - S.W.F. branches conduct local fisheries projects (fish stocking, stream enhancement, trout ponds, etc.) throughout the province in conjunction with the provincial governments Fish & Wildlife Development Fund. With assistance from biologists, the branches are the main force behind securing much of Saskatchewan's fisheries habitat.

Habitat Enhancement - Over one million trees have been planted on cuftivated parcels of wildlife land throughout the province to provide food and shelter for wildlife.

Henry Kelsey - An annual listing is kept of all qualifying big game heads, with a Records Book published every few years.

# **MFRC** a fantastic resource for kids and caregivers

The Moosomin Family Resource Centre (MFRC) was imagined and created in 2002 by a group of hard working and very com-mitted moms. Their vision uses to have a conceptor was to have a space for children to learn through play with their parents/ caregivers. Over the years, some faces and the location has changed, but MFRC's commitment to supporting and promoting child devel-opment and healthy family connections has remained the core of the centre. The Moosomin Family

Resource Centre is located at 802 Gordon St. in the lower level of Bethel Unit-ed Church. The facility houses a large indoor play space with large windows for tons of natural light-ing. The playroom floor is covered with safety flooring, which cushions all of falls that children take MFRC has added two resident guinea pigs named Chester and Kona. The children love the guineas, giv-ing them loads of cuddles and extra treats during program times by participants. MFRC has a wide variety of toys that most children do not normally have access to such as giant foam blocks, such as giant foam blocks, riding toys, play structures, dress up clothes, sensory bins and a puppet theatre. They also have a reading corner, building block area and baby/toddler area. The various areas of the centre are often changed to provide variety in exploration and play-based activities. The large kitchen is a favor-ite place during snack time where we all sit and enjoy healthy snacks and amus-ing conversations. Tod-dlers do say the funniest things! The facility also has two washrooms and a fully stocked baby changing sta-tion available for all of our

patrons. MFRC strives to meet the needs of all families with a wide variety of programs and clinics throughout the year. During school months, our centre offers Partners in Play on Mon-day, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings from 9:30-11:30 am. The program offers a wide variety of toys and experience centres that encourage parents/care-givers and their children to explore and learn together through play, but also gives children an opportunity to develop early friend-ships and develop socially. Children take part in daily crafts that allow them to get messy and create their own works of art. Often these activities focus around themes of interest or relate to science. A daily snack is offered that follows Cana-da's Healthy Food Guide as well as some fresh bak-ing! On special holidays we plan parties to celebrate. Our Valentines and Easter arties were so much fun and we are looking forward



to next week's Halloween party. fered . This program is of-at no charge for all families in Moosomin and the surrounding areas.

the surrounding areas. Time for Baby is offered every Tuesday morning from 9:30-11:00am for par-ents of babies 0-18 months. Siblings are always wel-come to attend. This is a quieter morning that al-lows new parents the op-portunity to connect with other parents in the same other parents in the same life stage. A facilitator from Parenting Plus regularly joins us to offer advice and support. A public health nurse also attends to pro-vide information and support on a variety of topics including breast feeding, vaccination and maternal mental health information. Snacks are always provid-ed and great conversations

are always part of Iuesday mornings. Learning Time is a popu-lar program offered most Tuesday afternoons from 1:15-2:45 pm. It is a drop off program for children 3-5 years old. Children must be pre-registered for this program and it has a small program and it has a small session fee of \$5 to cover the cost of supplies. Chil-dren take part in a variety of activities that include crafts, songs, dancing and of course exploration play! A healthy afternoon snack is always provided for the children. Please note that children are required to be fully potty trained to at-tend this program. Updates are posted to our Facebook page, including monthly dates.

**Tri Valley Trails Snowmobile Club** New members and volunteers are needed

Every winter a group of dedicated volunteers maintains hundreds of miles of nowmobile trails from Fleming to Spy salowino in this in the fing to opy hill, ensuring local snowmobilers have a safe and scenic ride. Tri Valley Trails is a local snowmo-

bile club providing safe, groomed trails for riders. The club is also affiliated with Saskatchewan Snowmobile Association (SSA). Since TVT formed 18 years ago it (b)A), Since I'V formed to years ago it has maintained several miles of trail sys-tems which connect three valleys—the Qu'Appelle, Assiniboine, and the Pipe-stone. The trail system also joins up with the SnoMan trails (Manitoba system). However we have not run our trail to St. Lazare due to the floods and the washing out of the bridge crossing the Qu'Appelle River.

River. The Tri Valley Trials are designated SSA trails, therefore trail users are required to register their snowmobile. The club currently maintains 300 kilo-metres of trail in the Moosomin, Fleming, Rocanville, Welwyn, Tantallon and Spy Hill areas. There are three groomer opera-tors who spend hours grooming the trails each winter, plus a number of volunteers who go out onto the trails at the beeinning who go out onto the trails at the beginning of the season to stake signs along the trails.

While there are young members and new members who use the trails each year, Tri Valley Trails is looking for people to serve on the board or as volunteers. There are about 10 committee members currently doing much of the work with Tri Valley Trails, and the club is hoping more values frails, and the club is hoping more young members who are passionate about snomobiling get involved. There is good cause to join the club. One challenge is finding volunteers to install the signage along the trail each year—a large job, but one that ensures



sledders ride safely all winter. The trails provides 300 kilometres of trails for ridprovides 300 kilometres of trails for rid-ers and it's a safer way to ride. However the club has not been able to maintain all of the trails the last few years as we do not have the help for the signing and trail maintenance. Signing trails is a big part of the trail system, and SSA provides an on-line training course so anyone can sign up to take it lust gives than a call at Universe to take it. Just give Stan a call at Universe Satellite at 306-645-2669 and we will get it set up!

When you buy a membership, you are also helping your local club out. Signage is expensive; grooming involves both fuel and repair costs. The club also has insurance expenses which includes insuring the warm-up shacks. These shacks are available to everyone. Local support also al-lows the club to update and purchase additional equipment required to maintain the trail system. Every time a rider purchases a membership with the club, that money goes back to the club to help cover the costs of maintaining the trails.

Tri Valley Trails is thankful for the local businesses that have sponsored the club over the years. The annual membership meeting will

be held in early November. Anyone is wel-come to attend.

In 1913, with the First World War looming, Moosomin Armoury was built to become a recruiting and drill training hall for the area. The Armoury was called into service again for World War II. A new metal roof with upgraded insulation was our first major improvement. The ever busy kitchen has been upgraded to make it more serviceable. The original windows have been opened up to allow natural light to flood in and add to the classic beauty of the old building. We have upgraded the lighting and raised and replaced the acoustical ceiling tiles as well as giving the main hall a fresh coat of paint. Always looking at improvements for comfort and convenience, this past summer we added new forced air furnaces and much appreciated air conditioning.

Not only is curling fun, it's a way to keep healthy and active in the winter. It provides a great way to foster social interation during the long, cold winter months, and it's also a great workout!

Some of the main benefits of curling are as follows:

Aerobic fitness: Working out in the cold can burn more calories, and since curling is played on ice and players are constantly competing and running back and forth from end to end, it will definitely increase your heart rate and improve the cardiovascular system.

Strengthens your muscles: Sliding on the ice and being in a constant squatting position strengthens the calves, glutes and

You can also get a good core workout by practicing curling and sweep-ing vigorously ahead of the stone. *Social interaction:* In many communi-ties, curling clubs are among only a few recreational resources available. Flexibility: The team member who de-livers the stone in a curling game often stays very low to the ice before pushing the stone. Staying this low to the ice re-quires a great deal of flexibility. *Precision:* Curling requires precision. It has been nicknamed as "chess on ice" for the amount of strategy involved in win-ning a game. This is one of the reasons it is so oppular among both players and ense. so popular among both players and spec-

Stretching and toning legs: Stretching and toning your legs is a way the play-ers workout before playing the game. The stretching and toning not only helps with flexibility for the game but it also carries out in day-to-day activities.

Promotes weight-loss: Sliding on ice burns a lot of calories, yet because you are playing on ice, you don't perspire as much. Curling requires a lot of sliding back and forth, which burns calories It can be done by anyone, including the

disabled: Curling is a sport that can be en-joyed by everyone, no matter the age or ability. In fact, the Paralympic Games fea-ture a Wheelchair Curling event. *Fun and interactive:* It is a sport for both men and women and is played by both adults and kids of all ages. Not only is it a great way to meet people who have the same interest in curling, but it can be a great networking medium. In addition, many people with depression turn to-wards curling because it's a fun and in-teractive sport that opens up their social realm. realm.



On October 10th, stakeholders gathered at the Pipestone Hills Golf Club to discuss and learn about Moosomin Lake and Moosomin Dam operations. The event was a response to common questions the Lower Souris Watershed Committee (LSWC) re-Souris Watershed Committee (LSWC) re-ceives about dam operations and timing of releases. The meeting was hosted by the Lower Souris Watershed Committee. Greetings were brought to the meeting by Minister Lyle Stewart who recognized the value provided by this sort of event. the value provided by this sort of event. Presentations were given by Ron Wood-vine and Rayna Belyk with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC), Curtis Hallborg with the Water Security Agency (WSA), Emily Cavaliere, with University of Saskatchewan Global Institute for Wa-ter Security (GIWS), and Dr. Allan Preston representing the Ascinibione River Basin representing the Assiniboine River Basin Initiative (ARBI). Moosomin Mayor Larry Tomlinson also gave a tour of the Dam.

#### PRESENTATION 1: HISTORY OF MOOSOMIN

DAM – RON WOODVINE AND RAYNA BELYK • In the 1930s, heavily affected by the dust bowl, the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act (PFRA) received royal assent with a

Act (FFAA) received rolyal assent with a mandate to develop and promote practices to better manage lands.
The PFRA with the RMs of Maryfield, Martin, Moosomin, Walpole, and town of Moosomin created an agreement in 1953 for the construction of Moosomin Dam and it trues completed in 1964.

it was completed in 1954. • Reservoir area is 389 hectares with a capacity of 11 million cubic meters of water for planned irrigation, recreation, low level outlet flows, and urban water supply.

· According to the 1969 Master Agreement on Apportionment, Manitoba is en-titled to 50% of apportionable flow arising within Saskatchewan however usually receives more than 95%

In 2017, Moosomin Dam was trans-ferred to the WSA.

#### PRESENTATION 2: MOOSOMIN DAM OPERATION, HYDROLOGY OVERVIEW, AND TRANSFER- CURTIS HALLBORG, P.ENG

Median (1:2 year) annual runoff to Moosomin Lake is 28 million cubic meters,

2.5 times the total reservoir storage · Moosomin Lake is not large enough for

food protection. In a hypothetical scenario, had water levels been lowered by 4 meters in 2017 to create storage capacity, it would have only reduced peak flows downstream from 45 cubic metres per second to 42 cubic metres per second metres per second. • 95% of precipitation in the reservoir's

gross drainage area (GDA - the topographi-cal area that slopes to the reservoir) does not make it to Moosomin Lake. It is infiltrated into soils, passed through plants in a process called evapotranspiration or lost to evaporation.

There is typically a release of 0.75 cubic metres per second for two weeks in the fall to provide water downstream. This is to allow for water sources on the creek to be replenished in a typically dry time of year and before winter sets in.

#### PRESENTATION 3: MOOSOMIN LAKE WATERSHED, LAND USE AND WATER QUALITY STUDY – EMILY CAVALIERE, PHD

The Lower Souris Watershed commis-sioned a study of Moosomin Lake to under-

stand water quality risks, assess current nu-trient loading, and potential for reductions though agricultural beneficial management practices. This study was completed by the University of Saskatchewan's Global Insti-

tute for Water Security. • Phosphorus concentrations are in the trigger range for a hyper-eutrophic (ex-tremely rich in nutrients and minerals) lake


and the lake could benefit from phospho-

 BMPs with the highest benefit were re-locating wintering livestock from streams, restoration of wetlands, and fertilizer management. There are uncertainties but they have

been considered with recommendations and shown in the data.

Afterwards, the group headed out to the dam and had a look at the reservoir and spillway. Larry Tomlinson answered ques-tions and was able to outline the physical operation of the dam. Larry has operated the dam on contract for many years on be-half of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC). Dr. Allan Preston, Chair of the As-siniboine River Basin Initiative (ARBI) gave an update on that organization. ARBI is an organization of stakeholders in the basin, encompassing parts of Manitoba, North Dakota, and Saskatchewan that want to help shape the future direction of the basin through cooperation and working together. The event was capped off with a supper and a chance for attendees to have a visit.

The Lower Souris Watershed Commit-tee is dedicated to promoting economic, environmental and social balance to sustain and improve the watershed for future generations. This event is a prime example of the work done in order to help residents understand and contribute to the conver-sations around water in the Lower Souris Watershed. 


