# Today is election day, 250,000 ballots already cast

Today—Monday, October 28—is Election Day in Saskatchewan, but more than 250,000 people had already voted in the 2024 provincial election by the end of Friday, more than 30 per cent of eligible voters.

There are 811,779 eligible voters

across the province, casting ballots in 61 constituencies.

More people than ever are voting before Election Day. About 60,000 people a day voted last week. On the first day of voting, Tuesday, there were 60,739 votes cast. That compares to 41,458 on the first day of voting in 2020, 24,615 on the first day of voting in 2020, 24,616 and 16,006 on day of voting in 2016, and 16,096 on the first day of voting in 2011.

**Election day voting** takes place from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Monday,

# Town may be eligible for more housing incentive funding

The town of Moosomin could be eligible for more money through the Housing Accelerator Fund—that was the news at Moosomin's Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday when Moosomin EDO Casey McCormac gave a report on the town's progress in reaching its housing goals

Moosomin made headlines in early August after announcing it was offering a \$30,000 up-front cash incentive for every new housing unit built in town, plus \$8,000 for each additional door on multi-unit properties. McCormac found herself fielding calls from all over Canada, and even a few international calls.

The project was made possible due to a federal grant through the Housing Accelerator Fund totalling \$1 million. In collaboration with the Moosomin Community Builders Alliance, a plan was created for how to use the million-dollar grant. To simplify the process, those funding dollars are put up front when someone builds a home Continued on page 3 ™

# Town may be eligible for more housing incentive funding

Once approved and the residents move in, the town gives the cash to the developer.

McCormac told those gathered at last week's Chamber of Commerce meeting that she's confident in the town's the target of 43 building permits by the end of 2025.

dent in the town's the target of 43 building permits by the end of 2025.

"We're sitting at 31 building permits—27 multi unit/ other, three multi unit/ missing middle, and one single family home," McCormac said. "So that leaves 12 spaces."

While the town has until 2027 to spend the

money, McCormac anticipates not only hitting the goal ahead of time, but possibly the prospect

of more funding.
"I had a training session for the yearly reporting, which we have to do in February, and they said that if we're ahead of our initiatives, we will probably be eligible for more funding, and we are definitely ahead," McCormac told those gathered for the Chamber meeting on Oct. 22. "So we may be able to get some more funding and put in

may be able to get some more funding and put in some more spots in our incentive program."


Funding through the HAF program is split into four installments, as McCormac pointed out.

"We got the first and then at the next year mark, in 2025, we'll get the next one," she said.
"It iust comes every year, our payment was split." It just comes every year, our payment was split

At the same time, the town of Moosomin learned it would be receiving funding through the HAF, announcements were also made for the Buffalo River Dene Nation, City of Humboldt, and Town of Outlook for a total of more than 140 housing units over three years, projected to spur over 560 homes in the next 10 years.


Comparatively, Humboldt and Outlook are not enjoying the same success as Moosomin. During another meeting, McCormac learned that Hum-boldt's program has netted 36 permits of a 120 goal, while Outlook is sitting at four of 26.

The centre opened earlier this year, after the idea became a solid plan last





With Wednesday's meeting being the last meeting of Mossomin Town Council before municipal elections on November 13, councillor Garry Towler thanked councillors Chris Davidson and Ron Fisk for their service on council. Davidson and Fisk will not be running in the up-

Davidson is one of the town's longest serving council-lors. First elected in October 2003, he has served 21 con-secutive years on council. He received a 20-year service award at last year's SUMA convention.

Mayor Larry Tomlinson also thanked everyone on council for their service over the last four years.

"I really want to thank this whole council for standing behind me and for what we've done over the last four years," he said. "I think we've accomplished a pile of stuff and we've kept the taxes at a half decent level and we're in good financial shape.

"I want to thank everyone for all of their help. It's been reat working with everybody. I'm going to miss Ron and Chris seeing as they are not running. I just want to thank everybody. It's been great working with everybody."

CP Holiday train returning
CP Rail sent a letter to the town informing them that the CP Holiday Train is returning to Moosomin. The train will be in Moosomin on Friday, December 6 at 11:55 am on the north side of the tracks at 1001 Front Street.

"CP will encourage community members to make do-nations to the local food bank of your choice in the lead

up to and at the event," said the letter from CP. "In the past, your chosen organization was the Moosomin and District Food Bank."

## Rider Express expanding its bus routes

Council received a letter from Rider Express, an intercity bus company, informing them of their plans to expand their routes to include service from Calgary to Winnipeg starting in April 2025. "We recognize the strong demand for this connection among residents in your communities," read the letter.

The letter said that in the second week of March, they would be actively promoting the new route in all communities along the way. They asked to arrange a meeting with the town council and residents to provide more information about their routes, which will extend from Vancouver to Winnipeg.

## O'Rourke joins EDC

Council received an email from Tyler Thorn with the Community Builders Alliance informing them that Mark O'Rourke with MNP would be replacing Kevin Weedmark as the CBA's representative on the Economic Development Committee.

Weedmark has stepped down to run in the provincial election as the Sask Party Candidate for the Moosomin-Montmartre riding. The EDC is made up of members of the CBA, town council and RM of Moosomin council.

# **Business license bylaw approved**

He also said the outdoor pickleball court project at Bradley Park is progressing, and is about 70 per cent complete. Work completing the outdoor basketball court near the pool has been pushed back to next year.

## **Boda says** Voting Week went well

Today, Oct. 28, is the last day of voting in Saskatchewan's 30th general election, and Voting Week numbers showed a healthy turnout going into the weekend.

After the first two days, 119,406 ballots were cast by voters—numbers that Chief Electoral Officer Dr. Michael Boda is encouraged by.

There were around 810,000 registered voters this year, who had the task of choosing 61 MLAs from a pool of 243 candidates (up from 236 in 2020). "On the last day of vot-

ing, Monday, Oct. 28, voting locations will be open from 9 am to 8 pm and our first preliminary count will take place as soon as the polls close on the last day of voting," explained Boda last Friday morning. We've made every effort to ensure that voting loca-tions are accessible and convenient for any voter who chooses to access them as well."

In speaking with reporters last week, Boda noted more than 32,400 applicants were approved by mail, which decreased from 56,000 in 2020.

"We debuted vote by mail during the last elec-tion, during the Covid pandemic," Boda said, adding the application deadline for vote by mail was Oct. 19. "However, the goal was really not to introduce vote by mail until 2028. Covid by mail until 2028. Covid really expedited that, and we have been receiving paper and online applica-tions for vote by mail since June of this year. Our por-tal opened up in June, we were working in advance of that the prepared year by of that to promote vote by

Mobile polls during Vot-ing Week were also held in 369 nursing homes across Saskatchewan, and Boda also touched on other unique voting situations, such as hospital and even

remand voting.
This prompted a question regarding homeless and unhoused voters, as

typically the first question at a polling station is for a voter to present identification containing an address.
"There is an opportunity

for people who are home-less to vote," Dr. Boda said. "They would work through a shelter, and we have connected with shelin that regard. This is a challenge...because of the identification issue, but if they're working with the shelter, the shelter can pro-vide identification to them in the way that we do that for nursing homes, for example, we have a process that we can go through, and we have been reaching out to shelters."

## First-ever Voting Week

"We're feeling very com-fortable with the first ever voting week," Boda said.

"We understand that this has been a transition over a couple of cycles, so we have been preparing for this, however, what we are seeing is that voters are leaning into this."

Turnout numbers over the first few days of Voting Week showed a significant increase from early voting in previous years, something Boda believes draws back to convenience.

"It's about convenience for the voters. There's 56

for the voters. There's 56 hours of voting and they can come early," he said.
Reporting of election results will begin on the evening of Oct. 28 with a second preliminary count two days later, which is also when the vote by mail ballots will be counted.
Smaller locations will

Smaller locations will likely have results posted first on the last day of voting, with larger centres coming in later because there are more ballots to count.
"Much of the report-

ing of results early in the night will come from those smaller last day voting locations in rural constituen-cies," Boda said Friday. "So when the rural constituencies report first, and you're not seeing results from urban constituencies until

# Bot seeks mayor's seat in Esterhazy

After eight years as a town councillor, Randy Bot has his sights set on the mayor's seat in Esterhazy, challenging longtime mayor Grant For-ster in the election on Nov. 13.

ster in the election on Nov. 13.
"There's a lot of positive opportuny for change in the community, and instead of being 'a vote,' I kind of wanted to get more serious on going out there, making connections and trying to find opportunities for the community," he said when asked what made him decide to run for mayor. "I feel like I can do that better as the mayor than I could as a better as the mayor than I could as a councillor."

Bot sees the mayor position as a way to affect even greater change on

a municipal government level. "I enjoyed being a councillor, but I think it's time to move forward." he think it's time to move forward, ne said. "If you're not trying to bring it to the next step, then I'm just going to be standing still doing the same hing forever, right? I'm just more interested in building those relationships and connections outside of the community, to try to bring new things and positivity into the community.

Along with two people vying for mayor, there are nine candidates for the six councillor positions in this election.

"It's going to be good having dif-ferent people in those positions and some different opinions, bringing new ideas to the table," Bot said, "I hope that they're happy with what we've been doing so far, and we can build off the strengths of the other councillors that will be back. That's my biggest thing is excitement, some new faces in there, as it's been the same council for a long time now. Change is good, I think, and hope-

fully it will go on to a positive direc-

A main priority for Bot is drum-ming up ways to bring revenue into town, through attracting more resi-dents and businesses—therefore increasing the taxation base and ulti-mately lowering the overall burden for large-scale projects—and looking at ideas such as selling water once the new water treatment plant is fin-

isned.
"I feel like for so long, we get these big projects, and we're putting all that pressure onto the taxpayers because we don't have enough revenue sources aside from taxation," Bot said. "I just want to help try to drive down the cost of living, to make Esterhazy even more of an appealing place to be."

Maintaining roads and sidewalks is also top of mind for Bot, but equal-

ly important is fixing what he sees as a disconnect between council and

Taxpayers.
"You can't forget about the other things that are going on, like our aging infrastructure and our facilities and stuff like that that still needs upkeep," he said. "One of my biggest things is to get our paving program going again, to start getting our roads repaired. We have a lot of side-walks in town that really need some attention, so I want to make sure attention, so I want to make sure that we have a plan going forward to keep putting money into that in-frastructure and not be blinded by just that one project."

As for the disconnect issue, Bot feels it all boils down to increased

transparency.
"I just find that there's needs in the community that aren't being met," he said. "Usually, from watching sohe said. "Úsually, from watching so-cial media or hearing people on the streets, they just feel like they could get a little bit more transparency from council and the mayor."

If elected, Bot vows to keep those communication lines open, commit-ting office time in order to have that well-ability with the public.

# Political games taking priority over Canadians' rising food costs

Bloc Quebecois push to protect the dairy industry will raise food prices, limit trade opportunities, and harm businesses

More than half of Canadians are feeling the pressure of the rising cost of living. It is even affecting eating habits. Not only have many given up little luxuries like occasional restaurant meals, but they are now much more frugal in their grocery shopping, and some have even had to cut back on what they

Having enough money to buy food is a basic necessity, and you'd expect the Canadian government to take this issue seriously. Unfortunately, that the Canadian government to take this issue seriously. Unfortunately, that doesn't seem to be the case. For many politicians, playing political games seems to take priority. A clear example of this is the Bloc Quebecois, whose support in Parliament is now crucial to prevent a no-confidence vote and avoid triggering an election. This shows how politics can overshadow the well-being of the people.

The Bloc has offered to support the Trudeau government subject to certain conditions. One of these conditions is that a law be passed by Oct. 29 ensuring that can be provided to the product of the product of

ing that supply management regulations for dairy and other products are not changed, nor used as bargaining tools in trade agreements or for securing similar benefits for Canada.

similar benefits for Canada.

Restricting milk and related production has long been a "sacred cow" for the Canadian government (pun intended). This system benefits the small number of producers who hold quotas but comes at a cost to everyone else. Not only do we have to pay higher prices for basic food items, but we're also limited in terms of choice. A more open industry could provide more options and variety, but the current system keeps those opportunities out of reach. If that weren't bad enough, the proposed legislation takes things a step further But demanding that steply mentageness every heavest of trade practice.

ther. By demanding that supply management never be part of trade negotiations, Canada's ability to negotiate with other countries is severely limited. With fewer options on the table, Canada will likely receive less from other nations in return, reducing our access to international markets and custom-

ers.

This means that not only Canadian consumers are being harmed, but so are businesses, employers, and workers. Canadian firms that currently export or have the potential to export in the future will face limited access to

international markets, restricting their growth and opportunities.

Canada relies heavily on exports due to its relatively small domestic market. Limiting our ability to reach international customers will lead to fewer and smaller producers within the country. This will result in fewer jobs, lower tax revenue, and a generally weaker economy.

As consumers, we will not only face higher prices and fewer options in the

dairy aisle but every product or service that could have benefited from freer and more open trade negotiations will now be less available.

Right now, many Canadians are concerned about the upcoming American presidential election, and rightly so. Some of the proposed policies could hurt Canada. One such policy mentioned by Donald Trump is particularly worrying. In addition to the 60 percent tariff he wants to impose on all imports from China, he is now discussing a 10 percent or even 20 percent tariff on all imports from other countries, including Canada.

Let's set aside the fact that such tariffs would devastate the American compared the consumers and feature or the property of the consumers and feature or the property of the consumers and feature or the property of t

omy and its consumers and focus on what it means for us. More than a third of Canada's economy depends on foreign trade, with the U.S. being our biggest trading partner. Imposing tariffs would close off, rather than expand, markets and trade opportunities. We know this would have serious negative offects or Canada.

We don't want others damaging our economy like this, yet the legislation roposed by the Bloc would do exactly that, even if on a smaller scale. The

proposed by the Bloc would do exactly that, even if on a smaller scale. The bill has already passed through the House of Commons and is now before the Senate. It's amazing that it has gone this far.

It's time for the Canadian government to demonstrate that it is governing for the benefit of all, or at least the majority, of Canadians. The interests of small pressure groups, like dairy farmers, must not be allowed to continue to squeeze our already strained budgets. Our international negotiators must be free to secure the best possible deals for us – whether as consumers seeking variety and affordable prices or as producers who need markets to grow their businesses, create jobs, and contribute to the economy.



# Lights installed at Moosomin airport

Runway can now be used 24 hours a day

"We're now a 24-hour airport for Sask Air Ambulance," confirmed Jeff St. Onge of the Airport Expansion Commitee, recalling the moment when he watched the temporary lighting system illuminate the Moosomin Airport runway. "When the lights lit up, I had a tear in my eyel"

It's a huge advancement for the Moosomin Airport to be accessible at night as the newly-paved runway could only be utilized during daylight hours previously, but a little ingenuity helped advance the ability for the local runway to be used at night.

"It is temporary winter lighting to get us through the

"It is temporary winter lighting to get us through the winter," St. Onge said. "An electrical tender is out, but for a variety of different reasons, it's been extended so that by the time it closes, there's no time to conduct the actual in-stallation before winter."

stallation before winter."

The committee researched several options before landing on an idea.

"What ended up happening was my daughter Carly—who is seven months pregnant—her husband Avi, my wife, myself, Dr. Van and his wife ended up installing them," St. Onge said of the temporary lights. Using light gauge wire buried a few inches underground, the crew installed LED lights on posts spaced along the edges of the runway.

For now, the lights are powered by a generator, which requires someone to go to the airport and turn the lights on each time an aircraft wishes to land.

"SaskPower is bringing power in probably within the

"SaskPower is bringing power in probably within the next month, and at that point we'll be able to leave the

lights on permanently, or on a dusk-to-dawn timer type of deal," St. Onge said.

For the time being, a nighttime arrival will mean going to the airport, firing up the generator, and turning the lights on, but St. Onge doesn't see that as an inconvenience in the least.

in the least.
"In reality, if I get a phone call at two in the morning and it is minus whatever—the wind blowing—that is not much of a pain for me compared to whoever is getting onto that airplane," he said. "They're having a worse day than I am, so I'm happy to do it."

The temporary setup was estimated to cost around \$10,000, according to St, Onge, who also noted that the temporary system could be sold once a permanent lighting system is in place.

"If you save even one life, it's not even a significant cost to put this through the next six months," St. Onge said. "This is how we do stuff on the prairies. That's how we built the place. People roll up their sleeves and come up with creative, cost-effective solutions that help us do what

# Holiday Train coming to Moosomin Dec. 6

The CP Holiday Train will be returning to Moosomin this Christmas season, with a stopped planned for De-

Now in its 26th year, the holiday tradition continues to bring festive entertainment and raise money and food awareness for people struggling with food insecurity from Nov. 21 to Dec. 20.

This year, the train rolls through the area on Dec. 6, beginning with a 10:30 am stop in Virden (on the north side of the tracks on 5th Avenue South), then Moosomin at noon (on the north side of the tracks at 1001 Front Street), and Broadview at 2 pm (at the CP Train Station, Front

"Over the course of about five hours, you can watch

"Over the course of about five hours, you can watch three different shows, if the weather permits for some safe driving," said Terry Cunha, media relations manager with CPKC. "It'd be a great way to spend the afternoon!" Between the Holiday Train and its American counterpart, the Holiday Express, 12 artists will makes 160 stops during the campaign. While admission is free to take in the shows, a donation to the local food bank is encour-

"It's very similar to previous shows where each time that the Holiday Train stops, we will be having a 30 minute live performance with a very talented group of musicians, as has been done each year," Cunha explained. "It's just a great way to help raise funds and donations for local food banks, and we've been very fortunate for the outpouring of support that we get from everyone who comes out and watches these shows."

The support is overwhelming as Cunha explained how people across the country so freely give to the cause. "Over the course of our history, we've been able to raise over \$24 million in funds to local food banks and over five million pounds of food, and we're looking forward to continuing to build on that this year," he said. "So we just ask everyone who's coming out to bring a non-perishable food item that can be donated to your lo-cal food bank."

The highly visual campaign often brings food banks a much-needed replenishment to their shelves.

"From some discussions we've had, for many of the food banks across the way that we meet with in each of our stops they reach, many of them have acknowledged that the amount they raised during that one stop is very

much equivalent to some of the food they raise all year," said Cunha. "So it does have a positive impact."

"The shows across Virden, Moosomin, and Broadview are all going to be with Tyler Shaw and Shawnee Kish. Those two very talented artists will be performing at each of those three shows during the stops on December 6." Cunha confirmed. "Speaking to a lot of individuals, that's kind of how they kick off the holidays is when this holiday train comes in and stops in the community. It's kind of the official kickoff to the Christmas season. So it's great. There's so much enthusiasm from members of the community and the public."

When asked about his favorite part of the Holiday Train experience, Cunha was quick to answer 'the stops.' "I'm fortunate enough that in addition to emceeing

and introducing our musical acts, I'm introducing the lo-cal elected officials who are there as well," he said. "It's just an opportunity to walk around to talk to people, from meeting with members of the food bank who are dedicated members of the community, supporting those in need, to just talking to groups of individuals.
"I'm born and raised Canadian, and I get to see many

of the communities across the prairies now through the Holiday Train. It's just a great way to get out and see and what's going on in some of the other areas across Canada and what they do during the holiday season."
