Moosomin's new commander

As some of you may know, Moosomin Detachment has been without a Sergeant for sometime now. We have managed to scrape by without a leader, but it came time to assign a new one. The polls are in and I am happy to announce Sergeant Damien Grouchy will be Moosomin's new detachment commander! Sgt. Grouchy has been at Moosomin Detachment since July 2020 as the Corporal and has been recently promoted as the boss. If you see Sgt. Grouchy out and about be sure to congratulate him on such a great accomplishment!

I also want to take this time to apologize to all the readers as Sgt. Grouchy will be taking back the job of writing the news report. I hope paper sales keep going up but if you see Cst. Pomeroy out and about be sure to get a laugh out of her.

Zero tickets in Moosomin

Drivers must have been on their best behaviour this past week, there were zero tickets written in the Moosomin Detachment area, warnings were still written. Good job folks. That doesn't mean drivers can start slacking off, if you do the crime you gotta pay the fine.

Several traffic collisions

Members responded to several traffic collision this past week. With worse weather brings worse road conditions, if you are travelling any distance be prepared for the road conditions. There are several things you can do to be prepared: keep an eye on the changing highway hotline updates, pack warm clothes, have snacks/water.

Collision with deer near Fleming

On November 11, members responded to a deer collision near Fleming. The vehicle occupants were okay, the vehicle had to be towed from the scene and the deer sadly did not walk away from the incident.

Moose collision near Welwyn

On November 12, members responded to a moose collision near Welwyn. The driver of the vehicle was okay and able to continue driving the vehicle. The moose was put down by members on scene.

Suspicious male near residence

On November 12, members responded to a call about a suspicious person trying to go into different houses in Moosomin. The male did not make entry to the residence

and left shortly after. Members made attempts to locate the male but were unsuccessful.

Fraud on Facebook Marketplace

On November 12, members received a complaint about a fraud on Facebook Marketplace. The complainant said she tried to purchase different items off the page and the items were not delivered as promised. The file is still under investigation.

If you are purchasing anything from a person or site of unknown reliability and think it might be a scam, do some research. If you think it might be a fake person, google search it, google is your friend. If you are unsure about sending money to a person, wait until you can see the item to send the money. If you believe you are a victim of fraud reach out to your local bank.

Stolen vehicle found

On November 13, members received a complaint about a stolen vehicle near Moosomin. The vehicle was stolen from a shop and located 2 days later near Esterhazy. The file is still under investigation.

Kids prank calling 911

On November 13, members received three 911 hang-up calls from a business in Moosomin. Members responded and determined that kids were playing with the phone and kept calling 911 as a prank. If you call 911, even if it was by accident, make sure to stay on the line and speak with the dispatcher so they know you are okay.

Impaired driver in Moosomin

On November 13, members were making patrols in Moosomin and conducted a traffic stop with a vehicle. Through the members interaction with the driver, they determined the driver to be impaired by alcohol and they were subsequently arrested. The driver provided breath samples which showed them being impaired by over double the legal limit of alcohol. The driver was later released for court date.

Stolen vehicle in Moosomin

On November 14, members responded to a stolen vehicle in Moosomin. The vehicle was stolen from a business in Moosomin and attempted to enter the United States. Members from neighbouring detachments made attempts to locate the vehicle but were unsuccessful. The file is still under investigation.

Customer didn't want to pay

On November 15, members responded to a business in Moosomin where a customer did not want to pay for their services. Members spoke with both the subject of the complaint and the complainant and learned the subject of the complaint had already paid for their services and was leaving the facility.

Vehicle ramming door

On November 15, members received a complaint of a vehicle ramming the door of a business in Rocanville the evening prior. The file is still under investigation.

Medical attention from EMS

On November 15, members received a 911 hang-up from a residence in Moosomin. Members attended the residence and determined that the home owner was receiving medical attention from EMS and was going to be okay.

Break and enter

On November 15, members received a complaint about a break and enter that occurred earlier in the day. The file is still under investigation.

Person acting strange

On November 16, members responded to a complaint of a suspicious person at a business in Moosomin. The male subject of the complaint was acting strange in the business and had left in a vehicle. Members made patrols in an attempt to locate the male but were unsuccessful.

Male refused to pay

On November 16, members responded to a business in Moosomin for a report of a theft. The male gassed up his vehicle and consumed goods from the business and refused to pay. Members attended and arrested the male for theft. The male was later returned to the store to pay for the items. The male was released with no charges.




"We've got the services," Tomlinson said. "We have the hospital. We have the services, and we're ready for more people to come to town. I think it'll continue to grow."

"I know there's a lot more potential for business growth in Moosomin. I know there's more stuff in the works, and if it comes to fruition it'll be great for the whole area."

"It looks really promising. I think we'll do nothing but grow."

Census being redone

The rise in the health numbers come at the same time as Statistics Canada showed a decline in population in Moosomin in the 2021 Census. The 2016 census showed a 10.4

per cent population growth in five years in Moosomin, the highest growth rate in rural Saskatchewan, but the 2021 census, which Statistics Canada is planning to redo, showed a decrease in Moosomin's population. Many Moosomin residents told the World-Spectator they had not been contacted for the 2021 census. Several individuals who live in seniors housing said no one in their entire buildings had been included in the census, which showed more than 100 unoccupied residences in Moosomin, and showed fewer total residences in Moosomin than the number of residences the town of Moosomin sends water bills to.

The town has asked Statistics Canada to redo the census, which it has committed to do before the end of this

year.

"It will be nice to see what the new census shows," Tomlinson said.

"It's supposed to happen by the end of the year. When we checked around after the census, none of the seniors homes got a census form, and none of the people in the Elks senior houses got counted. I think they missed a lot of the seniors. Even at my house, no one came to our door and nothing was left at our place. It was a complete failure. I don't know what the system was, but it sure didn't work. I'm hoping we can get the census numbers back where they should be."

"I'm sure the health numbers are closer than what the census is."

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Cobblestone House should be ready in May

A new 42 unit long-term care and assisted living facility should be ready for people to move into by late spring.

Cobblestone House is being built next to Pipestone Villas on Wright Road in Moosomin.

The project involves local investors, Bridge Road Construction, Care by Design, and Kohr Capital.

The plan came together as a way to offer seniors of Moosomin and surrounding area a home where they can age in place in their community, close to family and friends.

The project has endured a couple of setbacks to date. The biggest was the two months of rain during the foundation stage of the project.

This occurred back in March and April and made it very difficult to gain momentum and complete the foundations.

In order to allow the site to dry as quickly as possible, workers were pumping out water from trenches and puddles every day.

Another setback is an ongoing hurdle that the construction industry is dealing

with—elongated lead times on materials. The builders are mitigating this as much as possible by ordering in advance.

This is the current state of construction: The building is now weather tight. Shingles are complete. Siding is nearly complete and should be finished in the next week.

All windows are installed except for two, where buildings are using the openings to load material into the building.

All framing is complete. Electrical rough-in is complete on the third floor. They expect to have the first and second floors completed in four weeks.

Main electric service was received last week and is in the process of being installed.

Rough-in for the plumbing has been ongoing for the last month and will be completed in the next few weeks.

The sidewalk and curbs are nearing completion.

The storm sewer, sanitary sewer and water are complete.

Rough landscaping was started prior to the snowfall.

With the exception of a few seasonal items such as paving and sod that will need to be completed in the spring after occupancy, the builders expect to be complete for occupancy in May.

SaskTel invests additional \$100 million into Fiber optic network program

On Nov. 15, the Government of Saskatchewan announced that SaskTel will invest an additional \$100 million in its Rural Fibre Initiative to expand its infiNET service program.

The infiNET service delivers internet speeds reaching close to a Gigabit per second (Gbps). Through their Rural Fibre Initiative, the crown corporation is aiming to bring infiNET service to over 110,000 residents and businesses living and operating in more than 130 rural communities across the province, by March 2025.

The additional investment of \$100 million will be for Phase 5 and Phase 6 of the project.

"This announcement is to really address the great need for broadband connectivity in today's world," said Greg Jacobs External Communications Manager for SaskTel.

"We currently serve over 400 communities with our DSL copper network, but as that infrastructure is starting to age out, it can't really keep up with the demands that more connectivity needs, require.

"In order to ensure that our customers and the residents of the province have access to the infrastructure they need to connect to the world, we're making this investment to upgrade that existing copper infrastructure to fibre optic technology.

"This will not only allow us to deliver significantly better connectivity and significantly faster internet speed today, but the real beauty about fibre is that we should be able to upgrade the speeds we can offer over that network for decades to come, to continue to meet and keep pace with the evolving world."

Jacobs explained how replacing the current cables with fibre optic cables in communities will work.

"We would be replacing the existing copper cable that is connected to your home that's providing home phone service and internet service with a fibre optic cable," said Jacobs.

"That fiber optic cable really opens up the amount of band that we can push to a home, which then allows us to deliver faster internet speeds.

"It allows you to use the internet in a more seamless way, less buffering and better options from speed profiles and packages to choose from."

Construction underway in Esterhazy, and will start in Moosomin soon

Since the project was announced in 2020, Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the Rural Fibre Initiative have been completed.

Construction has already started in a few communities for Phase 3 of the program, such as the Town of Esterhazy.

Jacobs said in the next few weeks, SaskTel will begin working in Moosomin.

"We've already started construction in Esterhazy. What we were doing there is primarily buried construction work," he said.

"We are starting buried construction in Moosomin very shortly in the next couple of weeks."

Jacobs explained how the fibre optic broadband network will provide faster internet speed to people.

"Essentially, in communities, towns, and villages across the province there are really two ways that your communication services are delivered," he said.

"It's either with a cable that's running from your home to a power pole in the back alley or back easement, or it is underground and it's run in the back easement of your backyard, then underground to the home.

"When I speak about buried construction it means that we are replacing infrastructure that is currently underground in either a back alley or in the backyard. Then we will get to the aerial portion of construction in the coming weeks and month."

A few of the communities that will be included in Phase 4 of the Rural Fibre Initiative include Kipling, Oxbow, Rocanville and others across the province.

"We're expecting to start construction in the majority of Phase 4 communities in our next fiscal year, which will begin on April 1, 2023 and goes until March, 2024," said Jacobs.

"We're expecting to start within that time frame. I can't give more of a firm estimate right now because it is an incredibly complex project and there are a number of variables that could impact when we're going to start construction in one community over another, the availability of equipment, contractors, weather.

"We are in a very difficult time when it comes to outdoor construction right now, winter is not a great time to be doing all of this outdoor work. So all of those factors will impact our ability to start construction in all those communities and when we'll be doing that."

ing that."

Some of the communities that will be included in Phase 5 of the project are Carnduff, Grenfell, Stoughton, Churchbridge, Langenburg, Wolseley. The areas planned for Phase 6 are still being finalized by SaskTel.

Construction for Phase 5 is expected to start within the fiscal year of April 2023 to March 2024, however it is not guaranteed.

Although the exact timeline is not finalized, all phases of the project, including Phase 6, are expected to be fully completed by the project's deadline.

"It is a massive undertaking, and incredibly complex project that we're working on, but really to meet the end date of March 2025, we really do need to pull out all the stops and go as fast as we can to ensure that we get the service to our customers as fast as possible."

He spoke about why it is important to provide good connectivity to residents living in rural areas across the province.

"Our world is rapidly becoming more reliant on broadband connectivity and connectivity in general," said Jacobs.

"We're really entering an age of the digital economy and digital experience. You need a broadband connection or internet connection that can deliver the type of connectivity you need to engage in all the opportunities that are available in our modern world.

"In all settings, in urban and rural, broadband is incredibly important. You could argue that broadband and connectivity is more important in rural settings where residents and customers are more reliant on that connection to engage with the outside world, social interaction, and economic opportunities. Having that connectivity gives you the ability to take advantage of those opportunities that the modern world has to offer."

The total investment for the Rural Fibre Initiative program is \$200 million.

"We're going to invest \$200 million in the program in total, and that is for Phases one through six," said Jacobs. "The first four phases are included in the first \$100 million and Phase 5 and Phase 6 are included in the second \$100 million."

Originally announced in 2020, the Rural Fibre Initiative is a multi-phase program that will see SaskTel invest a total of \$200 million to bring infiNET service to over 110,000 residents and business living and operating in more than 130 rural communities.

SaskTel anticipates all communities included in the program will be fibre-ready by March 2025.



Moosomin Food Share puts on Reverse Advent Calendar up until Christmas

With more families and people to give to around the winter time, Moosomin Food Share is hosting a Reverse Advent Calendar to help with donations to give to people in the community.

The Reverse Advent Calendar has a food item matched to each day of the month to encourage people to add an item a day to a box at home. People can then bring the box of collected items over the 24 days to the food bank to help with its monthly food hampers.

"We started our Reverse Advent Calendar last year, just to see if it would take off during Covid because we weren't really getting that many donations and people weren't coming in to drop stuff off," said Samantha Campbell, manager of the Moosomin Food Share.

"We saw another food bank do this so we thought we would give it a try. Last year we did have a few people participate and try it out.

"We had this one lady who wanted to teach her daughter about the importance of giving back. Instead of buying a present for them, this is what they did. Her daughter was seven years old and was really happy to be donating to the food bank. It was really good to see."

Campbell said the items selected on the calendar are everyday food items that people can donate straight from their pantries at home.

"Because everyone has these items in the pantry or at home, our idea for it was that you can take an item out of your pantry and put it aside into a box," she said.

"Or, if you're at the grocery store and an item is on sale, grab one more of it to put it in your box. With those items, we thought people can drop it off daily, weekly, bi-weekly, or at the end of the 24 days when you have everything, you can just drop it off then.

"We are seeing low donations at this time, our hope was to inspire people to donate more and hopefully get us through, not just December, but the coming months of January, February and March, to help put us through and make it last a little more."

Throughout the year, Moosomin Food Share provides monthly food hampers to about 30 families. Yet, during the holiday season, they see an increase of local people and families in need.

"We usually help between 20 to 30 families that we give hampers to a month,"

said Campbell.

"Last month we had about 25 or 27 hampers. Christmas time we see at least 35 to 40, sometimes even more. Also at Christmas time they do get a bigger box of food."

Campbell mentioned why it's important for people to help out, if they can,

with donations, especially around this time of the year.

"It's so important. I like to say that you don't expect to be in a situation needing a food bank, but times are tough and you never know if you lose your job tomorrow you could be the one to have to access that food bank," she said.

"For you to think that you don't need to give it because you're not using it or you don't know anyone who is, someday you might have to. This way it's just giving, you're sort of putting back into the community that you might need from, hopefully you don't, but you just never know."

"This is a way to give back to those who do need it."

Campbell said organizations and businesses are also encouraged to participate in this year's Reverse Advent Calendar.

The food share used to use banana boxes and other recycled boxes for their monthly hampers, however Campbell said because of a grant they recently received, they were able to purchase reusable boxes for the hampers now.

"We actually got a grant from SaskTel that we were able to purchase some bins with, now everyone will be getting the same amount of food," she said.

"Obviously families will still get a bigger portion, but with the boxes we had before some were smaller sizes and bigger sizes so we just filled them based on how big they were. This way everyone is going to get the same amount."

"They get the non-perishables, which are the soups and pastas. Then at Christmas time we add potatoes, Christmas oranges. We usually get someone to donate hams or turkeys, we'll be reaching out to a few organizations for those."

"Then we do stuffing, some sort of dessert, coffee or tea, mixed vegetables, everything. Plus they're still getting their milk, eggs, bread, and then we do the frozen foods they usually get."

Campbell said the food items on the list are foods they go through every day and give out often.

"People can mix up the days. For example, on the first day if you don't have a box of cereal sitting at home and you're not going to the grocery store, but you have an extra peanut butter, you can switch the days," she said.

"These are the types of foods we use the most often and at Christmas time as well. We're just hoping we get enough food to carry us into the New Year as well, so that we're not going to have to purchase it."

Campbell said people can start collecting items from the Reverse Advent Calendar list as soon as they want, whether it's in the middle of November or at the beginning of December.

Moosomin town council: Co-op raises concerns over Municode

Concerns raised by Borderland Co-op over the company that provides the town of Moosomin with building inspection services were discussed at the latest meeting of Moosomin town council.

"Over the years, Borderland Co-op has invested significant capital into people, facilities, and new/expanded product/business lines in the communities we serve," Borderland CEO Jason Schenn wrote to council. The same email went to the towns of Whitewood, Rocanville, and Broadview.

"We continue to have several projects in our queue across our entire geography that we would like to pursue over the next 10 years and have been actively planning for those, but we do have concerns as it pertains to the companies the municipalities use for code review/inspection services. Our assumption is that the reason they are contracted is to help municipalities ensure that buildings constructed are safe and meet Canadian building standards. We support that intent.

"I am sure you understand that the cost of engineers, architects, construction, renovation, and materials have increased significantly over the last five years (30 per cent plus) and there seems to be no change to that trajectory in sight. We accept code review as part of the process to ensure we build/renovate facilities that are safe and compliant with Canadian building standards. That is why we hire consultants/engineers that design to the codes.

"We often hear frustration from these consultants and engineers on rural projects where PBI and Municode are the authority. The tell us that they often apply costly standards or impractical code interpretations that are not common in urban development or jurisdictions where PBI/Municode do not have the authority. That in turn frustrates us because it costs us more than it should to build facilities in our smaller rural communities where the business cases are usually on the borderline of feasible to begin with.

"I want to make it clear that we are not upset with the municipalities and still want to build and create opportunities in the communities we serve. We just want to com-

municate to you that with the increased cost of materials, consultants, labour, inventory to bring a project to life, unnecessary costs from regulatory interpretation that don't need to be there are now tipping the scales to abandoning/pausing some projects we want to do.

"I would be more than happy to attend a council meeting or appropriate committee meeting to discuss this in deeper detail if you wish."

"We've heard the same thing about Municode from other businesses," Councillor Chris Davidson said. "It seemed excessive when we worked with them."

Councillor Garry Towler suggested that Co-op could take any specific questions about Municode's interpretations of building codes to the provincial building standards branch for their opinion.

Council discussed the Co-op's concerns and decided to suggest that Borderland raise the issues directly with Municode, which the town contracts to provide its building inspection services.

The town of Rocanville has also received multiple complaints about Municode, including the letter from Borderland Co-op, and at their meeting last week, Rocanville town council made the decision to start looking at other options for building inspection services.

Town will continue charging business licences for all Realtors with listings in town

Realtor decided to send a second invoice with interest after an Esterhazy realtor questioned having to pay the town's \$150 business licence fee for having listings in town.

Councillors decided that since in-town realtors pay a business licence, out-of-town realtors with listings in town should also pay for a business licence to be fair, and have billed out-of-town realtors in the past when they have a listing in Moosomin.

At its latest meeting, council received a letter from the Saskatchewan Realtors Association suggesting that realtors should not be charged a business licence if they have

listings outside their home communities.

"It has recently been brought to my attention that one of our professional member was issued an invoice for a business licence due to the agent having a property listed for sale in your municipality," Cole Zawislak of the Saskatchewan Realtors Association wrote to the town.

"The Saskatchewan Realtors Association has received legal advice that municipal business licensing bylaws and the legislation on which they are based do not apply to individual listings by realtors whose business is located outside the municipality.

"There are numerous bases for this conclusion," Zawislak wrote. "They include, but are not limited to, the provisions of the governing legislation referring to a single transaction, merely create a prima facie case of engaging in business. This can be rebutted by showing that the person is in fact not engaging in business. The law is consistent that isolated transactions do not amount to carrying on business. The applicable common law provides that delivery of the subject matter of a transaction within a jurisdiction does by itself established (sic) that the transaction has occurred in that jurisdiction."

Councillors noted that they believe the same realtor had had multiple listings in Moosomin.

"I move that we send a bill with interest," Councillor Chris Davidson said.

That motion carried.

Councillor Ron Fisk, whose daughter is a realtor, left the meeting for the vote to avoid any potential conflict of interest.

Also at council . . .

Council agreed to send a letter of support for an applications from the Moosomin Thrift Store and Food Share for a grant from Tree Canada for 20 fruit trees and fruit bushes near the community garden . . . Community Futures Sunrise will fund a strategic planning session for the town of Moosomin . . . and the town crew will look at changes to brackets on downtown light posts to accommodate new Christmas decorations.

New law to ease accessibility

The Government of Saskatchewan has introduced new legislation—The Accessible Saskatchewan Act—to help prevent and overcome any accessibility issues for people with dis-

abilities, in regards to built environments, information and communications, employment, transportation, service animals, procurement and service delivery.

"In 2015 the government came out with the Disability Strategy and this is

a major piece of that." Social Services Minister Gene Makowsky told the World-Spectator in an interview on Friday.

"We've brought together several different ministries to work on this, but also consultation with the dis-

ability community. We felt this legislation was needed by our outreach and what we're hearing. This is a result of that and a big piece of our 10 year strategy we brought forward in 2015." Makowsky explained how The Accessible Saskatchewan Act will help people with disabilities live more comfortably across Saskatchewan.

"This act will help prevention at the front end, but also dealing with situations as they arise as well," said Makowsky.

"There is already legislation out there on some of the barriers that are there with the building codes, with human rights codes, etc., but this will hopefully fill some of those gaps.

"We want to have a piece of this legislation be on the education side to prevent some of those barriers, to get people to think about those barriers that are out there, but also deal with those things as they arise in the future.

"There was no specific legislation prior, this is enabling legislation. It allows us to come up with regulations, that's where the details will come out as we move forward, and we'll continue to consult with the sector.

"With consultation, we decided with the built environments, information and communications, service delivery, procurement, service animals, employment, and transportation. Those were identified as some of the gaps that the other legislation hasn't addressed, which we'll begin to work on those with the regulations in the next little while here.

"With the government being first in trying to fill some of the gaps that are out there or may come up in the future."

The act also makes it easier for a person with a disability to make a request to have a place become more accessible to their needs.

"What the legislation calls for is to have that accessibility office that the ministry will staff with a certain amount of issues as they come up," he said.

"The idea is that education will be at the front of all this to have third parties, like governments, Crowns, or eventually down the road, private businesses understand the barriers that are there and work with them to try and prevent that. My understanding from previously is that anyone who had a barrier had to go through the Human Rights Tribu-

nal and that would take a certain amount of time to process.

"Hopefully this will smooth things out and we can compile all the complaints that are out there within that office within our ministry."

An Accessibility Advisory Committee will be appointed, with at least half of the members being persons with disabilities or from organizations that represent people with disabilities. This committee will advise government on the development of accessibility standards.

"This act will need to go through the legislature," he said.

"We just did a second reading, we'll have a chance for the opposition to scrutinize any bill that goes through. Then hopefully in the spring, we'll be able to pass it."

Looking Back

Ten years ago, 2012: After 37 years, Bruce Penton's moustache would be shaved off—November in reverse—if at least \$1,000 could be raised in support of research for prostate cancer before November 30, 2012. The mine and mill expansion would increase the mine's production by an estimated two million tonnes per year. The project would involve sinking a new service shaft somewhere to the west of the existing mine site and converting the existing service shaft to a production shaft.

Twenty years ago, 2002: The Dodge City Theatre Company was preparing to stage Wapella's first dinner theatre with the play Opening Night.

Construction began on the new building for the Moosomin museum.

Thirty years ago, 1992: Mr. Mason, a quiet, retired Moosomin farmer who passed away December 24, 1991 at the age of 68, left in his will more than \$300,000 to six Moosomin entities. The six recipients included Bethel United Church, Moosomin Union Hospital, Moosomin Curling Club, the Moosomin Masonic Lodge, Eastern Saskatchewan Pioneer Lodge and the Moosomin and District Seniors Group Inc.

Forty years ago, 1982: A 35-year-old Maryfield area farmer, James Lemon, was

killed in a plane crash. He was the only occupant of the plane and was headed from Maryfield back to his farm. He was survived by his wife and two children.

Fifty years ago, 1972: The Maryfield school soccer team reached the finals of the Saskatchewan soccer play-offs, losing a close final game to a team from Saskatoon. The final game was played at Maryfield on November 4, 1972. The team included T. Graham, B. Friesen (captain), E. Woodward, A. Davis, W. Pitt (coach), R. Sweeting, J. Fidelak, G. Goldsmith, R. Raisbeck, A. Adair, D. Hill, W. DeRoo, K. Kennedy, J. Skulmoski, P. Ketcheson and E. Magotiaux.


