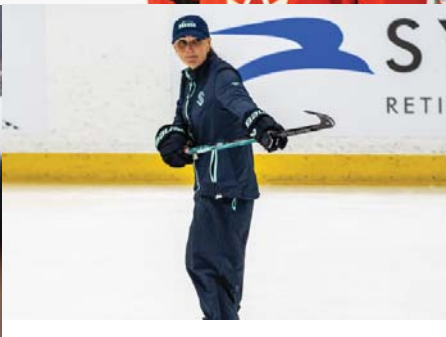
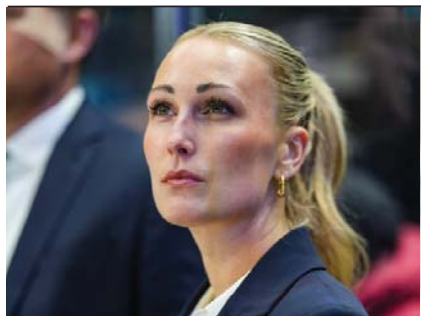

## First female coach in NHL: Rocanville showing its pride in Jessica Campbell

Jessica Campbell made history on October 8 as the first full-time female coach in the NHL and her home town of Rocanville is showing its pride.

There's an inspirational quote from Campbell that people see when they enter the Rocanville rink, the town is working on a plan for a sign to honor Campbell, and the town is asking people to decorate in Seattle Kraken colors for Christmas to show their pride.

### A career of firsts

Born in Moosomin and raised in Rocanville, Campbell's path to coaching in the NHL started with a successful hockey career.

Campbell's hockey career took off with Team Saskatchewan, where she spent three years on the ice and served as a captain twice, representing the province in the National Women's Under-18 Championship for three consecutive seasons. At the 2009 Kamloops International Bantam Ice Hockey Tournament, she was named the team's MVP. The following year, Campbell reached new heights, amassing 57 goals and 47 assists for 104 points in just 41 games.

She then played at Cornell University, playing for the Cornell Big Red, in the NCAA from 2010 to 2014.

Her impact on the team was noticeable starting the first year when she made a hat trick against the Robert Morris Colonials and delivered key goals during the Eastern College Athletic Conference semifinals. She finished her freshman year with 26 points in 31 games.

Her professional career was spent playing in the Canadian Women's Hockey League (CWHL). In the 2014-2015 season, Campbell became the first rookie to captain Team White at the CWHL All-Star Game.

In 2016 she helped the Calgary Inferno capture their first-ever Clarkson Cup championship, scoring two goals in an 8-3 victory over Montréal.

Following her playing career, Campbell moved into coaching. After retiring from the Canadian national team

in 2017, Campbell began her coaching career with high school girls' hockey before starting her own business, JC Powerskating.

In 2021, she became an assistant coach for the Nürnberg Ice Tigers and the German national team, marking the first time a woman coached at the men's world championship.

### First in AHL

In July 2022, Campbell was hired as an assistant coach for the Coachella Valley Firebirds, the top minor league affiliate of the NHL's Seattle Kraken.

This was yet another first for her, as she made history as the first full-time woman behind the bench coach in the American Hockey League.

She worked with head coach Dan Bylsma, a Stanley Cup winner, with Coachella Valley.

With Campbell's and Bylsma's coaching, the Firebirds were able to reach the Calder Cup Finals two seasons in a

row. Bylsma was named coach of the Kraken in May of this year and shortly afterwards brought Campbell on as assistant coach, the first woman to hold that role in the NHL.

"The year ahead is going to be a lot of fun. But to know and to understand that obviously there's still at the forefront the thoughts of other women and other people who have the same aspirations as I do," she told NHL.com when she was named to the coaching position with the Kraken. "So, to carry that torch every day and keep my focus on being a coach, but it definitely puts meaning into the work."

Campbell is a member of the NHL Coaches' Association's Female Coaches Program, which supports female coaches with skills development, leadership strategies, communication tactics, networking, and career advancement opportunities. Now in its fifth year, the NHLCA Female Coaches Program has more than 100 women, the largest membership in the program's history. This season, they welcomed 34 new women to the program.

### Community pride

There always been a lot of pride in Rocanville around Campbell's career, and there is a lot of excitement in the community since she has been behind the bench with the Kraken. The sign at the rink, the holiday decorating theme, and the plan for a highway sign are some of the ways that excitement is being shown.

Andrea Logan, the Recreation Director in Rocanville, says the community is proud of her.

"What she has done throughout her career is impressive, and becoming the first female coach in the NHL is a major accomplishment," says Logan. "As a community, we want to recognize her accomplishments and support her. Rocanville is very proud of Jessica. The fact that she is a female that has made it so far in the hockey world and the NHL, and showing young girls that their dreams can be reached is fantastic, and the signs are just a reminder of all of that."

Logan explains the plans for the signs and the unveiling event in the spring.

Rocanville currently has a mural at the community rink in honour of Jessica Campbell.

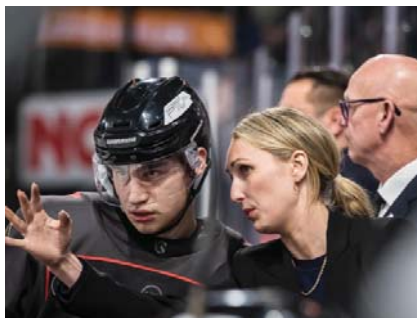

"In a small town you really have to work and be a part of your community. If we want something in this town, we have to rally together to work for it."

# Not easy picking Canada's team

The hardest aspect of choosing the players for Canada's team in the 4 Nations Faceoff tournament in February is not necessarily who will make the team, it's the angst involved in leaving some truly great players off the roster.

As an example, Connor McDavid and Nathan MacKinnon are slam-dunk selections. Should veteran Sidney Crosby be a sentimental pick? Or should he be on the team because he's still among the Canadian elite? Decisions, decisions. Will the rookie phenom Connor Bedard make the team based on his reputation and his potential superstardom, or should another Connor, McMichael of the Washington Capitals, who scored 12 goals in his first 16 games, be chosen instead?

The 4 Nations Faceoff is a contrived, mid-February competition featuring teams representing Canada, the U.S., Finland and Sweden and those who follow the NHL know that the largest vacancy is the absence of a team from Russia. Today's sporting universe excludes the Russians from almost every organized event, and this is no different. But would Nikita Kucherov, Kirill Kaprizov, Alex Ovechkin and Artemi Panarin form a fairly solid nucleus to build a team around?

Politics being politics, however, the Russian players get an 11-day break to vacation in some warm, seaside resort while 92 of their colleagues play for a trophy and national pride.

Back to Canada's team. Don Sweeney and Jim Nill are the co-general managers of the team, ostensibly in charge of selecting the 23-player roster, but they have a battalion of scouts scouring NHL arenas seeking to guarantee the right choices.

So who gets a spot on the team? Mark Scheifele of the Jets or the Leafs' Mitch Marner? Or both? For the purpose of this analysis, a forward is a forward, whether they're designated a centre or winger.

Canada should be strong up front and on the blueline, but relatively weak in goal.

Teams will consist of 13 forwards, seven defencemen and three goalies.

Forwards (13): McDavid, MacKinnon, Bedard, Crosby, Sam Reinhart, Scheifele, Brayden Point, Marner, Jared McCann, Matt Duchene, Sam Bennett, Brad Marchand and Mark Stone.

Defencemen (7): Cale Makar, Josh Morrissey, Alex Pietrangelo, Shea Theodore, Morgan Rielly, Evan Bouchard, Owen Power.

Goal (3): Stuart Skinner, Jordan Binnington and one of either Darcy Kuemper, Cam Talbot, Adin Hill and Connor Ingram.

So who gets left home if this roster turns out to be accurate? Well, there'd be no Mathew Barzal of the Islanders, no Dylan Strome of Washington (top 10 in scoring all season so far), no McMichael, no Travis Konecny, no John Tavares. Defencemen on the bubble include Mike Matheson of Montreal, Dougie Hamilton of New Jersey, Travis Sanheim of Philadelphia, MacKenzie Weegar of Calgary and Noah Dobson of the Islanders. Quality players all.

It will be an honour for any player to be selected for the Canadian team but come playoff time, when the pace of play is ramped up and the best players are being counted on to produce, will they have enough left in the tank to make a legitimate chase for Lord Stanley's silver mug?

# SECTA president talks to board members during annual visit

Whitney Paul-Joseph is now in her fifth year as president of the South East Cornerstone Teachers' Association. It's the third term in that office for the Redvers based educator who is given a half-time schedule for classroom duties and half-time allocation to carry out the various presidential duties and visitations.

Paul-Joseph met with Cornerstone board members on October 15 in the division's head office in Weyburn as they conducted their public business meeting following their morning in-camera gathering.

Paul-Joseph outlined various action items on her agenda that included face-to-face visits in schools to continue engagement with division instructors. She noted this "will always be a top priority since the teacher's voice is the foundation for the work we do."

Supporting the release time to do this work is appreciated, she told the board.

Advocacy is another big part of what she and her committee do and they face a lot of obstacles, she said, noting the changes she has observed over her 16-year teaching career.

"Last year was one of the hardest I have experienced as a local leader and I think our SECTA executive will attest to that. However, it was also one of the most humbling and uplifting, from what we were able to learn and experience alongside others. I am so proud of our teachers and I hope you are too," she said.

Paul-Joseph said support for members was at an all time high, "as we navigated sanctions. Not

being in our classrooms was extremely difficult, but the strength of being together, surrounded by not only fellow co-workers but students and families was a feeling like we had never experienced before," she said, referring to the brief job actions and government sanctions placed before the group as teachers sought a new contract and some answers regarding classroom complexities.

The SECTA met with local Members of the Legislative Assembly and it was a strenuous endeavour, but enlightening, she said, noting that she felt quite sure the board understood the situation based on their own advocacy efforts.

"It also shows who has an understanding of the needs of our schools and who could use a little more education in the

realities of today's classrooms," she added.

The world of education has evolved and schools need to support that scenario she said, and that is why conversations with the MLAs and board members is so important.

Paul-Joseph said having the opportunity to attend several legislative question periods opened her eyes even more acutely and being included in the budget day experience was another that she could not take for granted because it "allowed me to bring awareness to the issues and struggles our teachers face and how we can better advocate for education."

The teacher/president also noted how the SECTA social media presence on Facebook and Instagram took off last year after a few years of experimentation. Managing the web-

site is difficult and time consuming, not only with the technology but the numerous ways of keeping tabs on engagement levels while promoting education and engaging with followers. She thanked Scott Kirkness the SECTA social media chair for the hours he put into the process that showed that their posts reached over 91,000 and post engagement was almost 16,000.

Communication with school staff representatives (SSR) and school staff liaisons (SSL) was another vital job for the president, she pointed out. The SSRs met in Carlyle for their first Talk and Task session that provided a format to talk about needs at local levels while interacting with teachers in nearby schools and the SECTA executive.

Reaching a local agreement with the board was

a positive experience, she said because of the respectful and transparent relationship they shared.

In conclusion, Paul-Joseph said "I wanted to showcase the incredible things that were happening for and with members, despite the obstacles we were facing in provincial negotiations. As teachers we will always stand up for education and for what our students and schools deserve."

She ended her presentation by saying "things got hard last year, really hard, but everyone rallied together to get the work done, to advocate and to educate. We, as a local association are pretty darn proud of that." With that said, she thanked the board for their support and was thanked in return by board members and chairwoman Audrey Trombley.

Trust me there is no get rich quick scheme out there that requires no special education or knowledge. If it sounds too good to be true, it is. Trust your instincts.

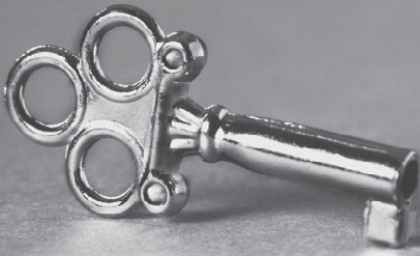
