





First female coach in NHL: **Rocanville showing its pride in Jessica Campbell**

BY ASHLEY BOCHEK Jessica Campbell made history on October 8 as the first full-time female coach in the NHL and her home town of

Rocanville is showing its pride. There's an inspirational quote from Campbell that peo-ple see when they enter the Rocanville rink, the town is working on a plan for a sign to honor Campbell, and the town is asking people to decorate in Seattle Kraken colors for Christmas to show their pride.

A career of firsts

Born in Moosomin and raised in Rocanville, Campbell's path to coaching in the NHL started with a successful

hockey career. Campbell's hockey career took off with Team Saskatch-Campbell's hockey career took off with Team Saskatch-ewan, where she spent three years on the ice and served as a captain twice, representing the province in the National Women's Under-18 Championship for three consecutive Bockey Tournament, she was named the team's MVP. The following year, Campbell reached new heights, amassing 57 goals and 47 assists for 104 points in just 41 games. She then played at Cornell University, playing for the Cornell Big Red, in the NCAA from 2010 to 2014. Her innact on the team was noticeable starting the first

Her impact on the team was noticeable starting the first year when she made a hat trick against the Robert Morris Colonials and delivered key goals during the Eastern Col-lege Athletic Conference semifinals. She finished her fresh-

Her professional career was spent playing in the Cana-dian Women's Hockey League (CWHL). In the 2014-2015 season, Campbell became the first rookie to captain Team White at the CWHL All-Star Game.

In 2016 she helped the Calgary Inferno capture their first-ever Clarkson Cup championship, scoring two goals in a 8-3 victory over Montréal. Following her playing career, Campbell moved into

coaching. After retiring from the Canadian national team

in 2017, Campbell began her coaching career with high school girls' hockey before starting her own business, JC Powerskating. In 2021, she became an assistant coach for the Nürnberg

Ice Tigers and the German national team, marking the first time a woman coached at the men's world championship.

First in AHL

In July 2022, Campbell was hired as an assistant coach for the Coachella Valley Firebirds, the top minor league af-filiate of the NHL's Seattle Kraken.

This was yet another first for her, as she made history as the first full-time woman behind the bench coach in the American Hockey League. She worked with head coach Dan Bylsma, a Stanley Cup

winner, with Coachella Valley. With Campbell's and Bylsma's coaching, the Firebirds

were able to reach the Calder Cup Finals two seasons in a

row. Bylsma was named coach of the Kraken in May of this year and shortly afterwards brought Campbell on as as-sistant coach, the first woman to hold that role in the NHL.

sistant coach, the first woman to hold that role in the NHL. "The year ahead is going to be a lot of fun. But to know and to understand that obviously there's still at the fore-front the thoughts of other women and other people who have the same aspirations as I do," she told NHL.com when she was named to the coaching position with the Kraken. "So, to carry that torch every day and keep my focus on be-ing a coach, but it definitely puts meaning into the work." Campbell is a member of the NHL Coaches' Associa-tion's Female Coaches Program, which supports female coaches with skills development, leadership strategies, communication tactics, networking, and career advance-ment opportunities. Now in its fifth year, the NHLCA Female Coaches Program has more than 100 women, the largest membership in the program's history. This season, they welcomed 34 new women to the program. they welcomed 34 new women to the program.

Community pride There always been a lot of pride in Rocanville around Campbell's career, and there is a lot of excitement in the community since she has been behind the bench with the Kraken. The sign at the rink, the holiday decorating theme,

Andrea Logan, the Recreation Director in Rocanville, says the community is proud of her. "What she has done throughout her career is impressive, and becoming the first female coach in the NHL is a major accomplishment," says Logan. "As a community, we want to recognize her accomplishments and support her. Rocan-ville is very proud of Jessica. The fact that she is a female that has made it so far in the hockey world and the NHL, and showing young girls that their dreams can be reached is fantastic, and the signs are just a reminder of all of that." is fantastic, and the signs are just a reminder of all of that.'

Logan explains the plans for the signs and the unveiling event in the spring. "The main sign is going up on the north side of town coming in from Yorkton along Highway 8. The sign will be going up in the spring and we will have some kind of unveiling event. We are making some plans of what that is going to look like, but we don't have anything set in stone at this point."

"It was council's idea to do the holiday decorating,"

she said. "They thought that would be a great way to show our pride in what Jessica has done and encourage people to add in Seattle Kraken colors and make Rocanville Krakenville for the winter."

Logan says Campbell is a reminder that everyone's dreams can be achievable. "It is a reminder to the rest of us that our dreams can be achievable. It is great to acknowledge an individual's hard work and efforts from our community and show that their efforts paid off and got her to where she is now and a reminder to the rest of us that with hard work and dedication we can get to where we want to go too. "In a small town you really have to work and be a part of your community. If we

want something in this town, we have to rally together to work for it."

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Not easy picking Canada's team

The hardest aspect of choosing the players for Canada's team in the 4 Nations Faceoff tournament in February is not necessarily who will make the team, it's the angst involved in leaving some truly great players off the roster. As an example, Connor McDavid and Nathan MacK-

inon are slam-dunk selections. Should veteran Sidney Crosby be a sentimental pick? Or should he be on the team because he's still among the Canadian elite? Deci-sions, decisions. Will the rookie phenom Connor Bedard make the team based on his reputation and his potential superstardom, or should another Connor, McMichael of the Washington Capitals, who scored 12 goals in his first 16 games, be chosen instead? The 4 Nations Faceoff is a contrived, mid-February

competition featuring teams representing Canada, the U.S., Finland and Sweden and those who follow the NHL know that the largest vacancy is the absence of a team from Russia. Today's sporting universe excludes the Rus-sians from almost every organized event, and this is no different. But would Nikita Kucherov, Kirill Kaprizov, Alex Ovechkin and Artemi Panarin form a fairly solid

Politics being politics, however, the Russian players get an 11-day break to vacation in some warm, seaside resort while 92 of their colleagues play for a trophy and national pride

Back to Canada's team. Don Sweeney and Jim Nill are the co-general managers of the team, ostensibly in charge of selecting the 23-player roster, but they have a battalion of scouts scouring NHL arenas seeking to guarantee the right choices.

So who gets a spot on the team? Mark Scheifele of the Jets or the Leafs' Mitch Marner? Or both? For the purpose of this analysis, a forward is a forward, whether they're designated a centre or winger.



BY NORM PARK Whitney Paul-Joseph is now in her fifth year as president of the South East Cornerstone Teach-ers' Association. It's the third term in that office for the Redvers based educa-tor who is given a half-time schedule for classroom duties and half-time allocation to carry out the various presidential du-ties and visitations.

Paul-Joseph met with Cornerstone board members on October 15 in the division's head office in Weyburn as they conduct-ed their public business meeting following their morning in-camera gathering. Paul-Joseph

outlined various action items on her agenda that includ-ed face-to-face visits in schools to continue en-gagement with division instructors. She noted this "will always be a top pri-

ority since the teacher's voice is the foundation for the work we do." Supporting the release time to do this work is

appreciated, she told the board.

Advocacy is another big part of what she and her committee do and they face a lot of obstacles, she said, noting the changes she has observed over her

she has observed over her 16-year teaching career. "Last year was one of the hardest I have expe-rienced as a local leader and I think our SECTA executive will attest to that. However, it was also one of the most humbling one of the most humbling and uplifting, from what we were able to learn and experience alongside others. I am so proud of our teachers and I hope you are too," she said.

Paul-Joseph said sup-port for members was at an all time high, "as we navigated sanctions. Not

being in our classrooms was extremely difficult, but the strength of being together, surrounded by not only fellow co-workers but students and fami-lies was a feeling like we had never experienced before," she said, refer-ring to the brief job actions and government sancand government sanc-tions placed before the group as teachers sought a new contract and some answers regarding class-

The SECTA met with local Members of the Leg-islative Assembly and it was a strenuous endeavvas a strenuous endeav-our, but enlightening, she said, noting that she felt quite sure the board understood the situation based on their own advocacy efforts. "It also shows who has

an understanding of the needs of our schools and who could use a little more education in the realities of today's class-rooms," she added. The world of education

has evolved and schools has evolved and schools need to support that sce-nario she said, and that is why conversations with the MLAs and board members is so important. Paul-Joseph said having the opportunity to attend several legislative ques-tion periods opened her eves even more acutely tion periods opened her eyes even more acutely and being included in the budget day experi-ence was another that she could not take for granted because it "allowed me to bring awareness to the issues and struggles our teachers face and how we can better advocate for





The male at the business then got mad and smashed and dented the door. This is still under investigation.

Causing a disturbance

On November 14, RCMP were called to an intoxicated male causing a disturbance at a residence on Kahkewist-ahaw First Nations. The male was trying to fight people and would not calm down. RCMP attended and placed the male under arrest and provided him with a room at the RCMP Bed and Breakfast until he was sober.

Pedestrian collision

On November 15, RCMP were called to a pedestrian collision at the Co-op Gas Station at Whitewood. The driver of the vehicle was travelling approximately 40 km/hr with fogged up windows and did not see the female pedestrian until it was too late. The female suffered non-life-threatening injuries and was transported to the hospital. The male has been charged with dangerous driving causing bodily harm.

Female assaulted in Grenfell On November 15, RCMP were called to a bar in Grenfell

where a male assaulted a female and then vandalized her truck that was outside. The intoxicated male was arrested and charged with assault, uttering threats, and mischief. The female was extremely scared for her safety.


Scam of

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


