Langenburg students visit Rocanville ski trails

Around 250 students from Langenburg Central School came out to Rocanville Cross Country Ski trails from March 8 to 10, as part of their outdoor physical education

During the pandemic, teachers and parents from Lan-genburg Central School fundraised \$30,000 worth of skiing equipment, snow shoes, and built a shed at the school to store all of the equipment.

"Over Covid, when we were getting pushed outdoors for phys-ed because of all of the things going on, we de-cided to turn it into an initiative at our school where we did this outdoor recreational project," said Luke Krienke, physical education teacher at Langenburg Central School.

"We reached out to some of our big sponsors, Mosaic, Brooks Mack Law, Family and Friends, and we had a few other locals as well. "We ended up raising about \$30,000. We got 75 sets of

cross country skis for our kids, 65 sets of snowshoes, and

our shop kids built us a shed. We paid for the materials for the shed out of that fundraising. "We have a shed outside of our school building now.

Our shop teacher has built us a groomer for us to groom our school yard because we don't have anything like this

"If we lived a little closer to these trails, we could come out here for classes, but now we just do an annual trip every year where we come out." All of the Grade 1 to Grade 10 students from the

school came out to the trails with their own equipment in groups, from Wednesday to Friday. We came out here last year and it was our first time,

said Krienke.

"We just brought out our middle years and our senior kids last time. This year we've got our elementary kids down to Grade 3 as well."

Layne McFarlane, president of Rocanville Cross-Country Ski Club, said it's great to see the trails be used by students

"It's wonderful to see," McFarlane said smiling

"We're just a small group that volunteers to create the trails, and to see them used like this and appreciated, is really amazing. "It's sort of like you're coaching hockey or figure skat-

ing or something else, and you see a lot of interest in it.

It's really encouraging." Krienke said introducing students to an activity such as cross-country skiing is great for physical education. "Part of the curriculum is our outdoor education piece,

for getting out to other environments," he said. "This, basically costs the kids nothing to come out and

do. We do go downhill skiing too, but the cost is high. It's a good experience for the kids too, but this is just an experience the kids can come and do. "It's low impact, it's not quite as scary for some of

the younger ones to come out. And, it's something they don't get the chance to do that often either. It's a different experience for them to get out and get active as well. Continued on page 43 🖙



SARM aims to attract the next generation to rural government

BY SIERRA D'SOUZA BU The Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities (SARM) is aiming to attract the next generation to get involved through the rural municipal government.

As more young families are calling rural Saskatchewan home, recruitment of the next generation is vital to maintaining a healthy rural municipal govern-ment, SARM stated.

"This is something our IRM board has been SARM board has talking about for a while, said Ray Orb, President of SARM.

"Also, we can see what's happening in rural Sas-katchewan. We can see the demographics of our councils.

We have a lot of older councillors, I'm one of them. I've been involved with council for quite a few years, also with SARM too. I think we would like to see more young people or new people being attracted to council, and to getting elected into coun-

cil. "We put this out for people to start thinking about, and to be able to help us come up with some solu-tions on how to attract

people. "We have some ideas of but we would our own, but we would really like to talk to our members too.

During SARM's 118th Convention on March 15th, members will hear from current RM council members about bridging the aging demographic with SARM members and recruiting future diverse young leaders in rural Sas-teatherway katchewan.

Orb spoke about a few of the ideas he has in mind for attracting young people to council.

"I have ideas and our board does too," he said. "Perhaps career fairs

and things like that would help. Even going to lo-cal high schools, getting people that are in the later grades especially who are interested in maybe get-ting elected into a council. know there's some RMs that had some junior members sitting at their council meetings as advi-


sorv members. 'They're not elected, but they're sitting as an advi-sor. It could be as a youth

councillor, maybe a 4H councillor, things like that.

Orb spoke about the ad-

vantages and differences he has seen from being a part of a rural municipal government. "I think it's really imin rural Saskatchewan to see what the role is for the council and reeves, and the administration as well," he said.

through SARM there's a development into your rural areas too. Even right now, attracting rural doctors and nurses, there's a role for the mu-nicipal council to be able to do that. "Also the RCMP and

policing, sub-committees provide housing for some of these people. Veterinar-ians are another one. For a number of years there have been quite a few RMs that have jointly owned veterinary clinics

"It all helps in the speed of things to work together. I think that's the role that I see, good governance is the other thing. Getting that message out of what the M is doing, what they plan to do, like infrastruc-ture and improvements. Communicating to the members to really make sure that they understand what's going on, and also to get feedback from them.

"That's one of the rea-sons why we put out this press release. We wanted to draw attention to that."

Aside from aiming to involve more young people in rural municipal govern-ment, Orb said they hope to get more women involved as well.

"We don't have a lot of we don't have a lot of women on council, but we'll be pushing for that at our convention," he said. "We have about seven per cent of women on council ly a policid our

council I've noticed over the years we have more women now than we did five or 10 years ago, but it's not increasing as much

"For the administra-tion side it has changed a lot. Now we have a lot of women that are administrations whereas 20 years ago we had mostly men." Orb was asked if he

thinks bringing in younger and new people on council will improve governance. "It's diversity that we're saying we need more of,

saying we need more or, and a part of that is young people being involved as well, women being in-volved as well," he said. "They bring in a differ-ent point of view in a lot of

"People like my own age, you know, I'm get-ting to the stage where I'm getting to the end of ľm my own municipal career. Obviously that all helps in the decision making because different points of view, lead to different outcomes."

Upcoming projects in Redvers: new SARCAN building, Kubota dealership underway

With a few ongoing projects being developed in the Town of Redvers, the owner of Evergreen Construction said he is excited for his business to have a dedicated facility in town, and for the community to have a new

SARCAN building. "The front 85 feet of the building will be for the new SARCAN, and then the back 60 feet will be for our construction company and for restoration company," said

Tyson George, owner of Evergreen Construction. The total size of the building is 7,400 square feet. Due to the town's old SARCAN building not having enough room to crush the recycled bottles and cans that are being brought in, the need for a bigger facility in the com-

ing brought in, the need for a bigger facility in the com-munity became apparent. "The front of the SARCAN building will be where guests can bring in their bottles then at the back they can do all of the crushing," said George. "The other SARCAN building is in dire need for some upgrades and renovations. Before I bid on it, I went to the new Melville one and I took a look around to get an idea of what they wanted and what kind of quality of stuff they wanted, all of that. "I talked to the workers there and they said a new facility for them to work in that's clean and where ev-

fality for them to work in that's clean and where ev-erything is up to date, instead of working with old stuff where everything takes longer, that a new building is just better for everyone.

"That's why they needed a new building here. They're getting bigger and more volume, so they can handle more with the bigger building." Aside from the building being used for SARCAN, it will also serve as Geroge's first dedicated space for his

"I've been running my business out of my farm be fore this. We do have an office on Main Street right now where our bookkeeper is, and we have a few houses that we work out of, but this will be our first work building. said George.

"This is a big step for us, but it's definitely exciting. It's something to look forward to. "Our space will mainly be for equipment. We do a lot of cabinets and home projects. This will be a place to get everything from, and get organized with our staff in the morning.

morning. "Our restoration company needs a huge spot to clean all of our equipment and stuff like that. This will be a location for the starting point of everyday as well." George said he expects the construction of the build-ing to be finished by May. He said he is looking forward to the period being to maletade the second start of the seco

"This will be practically may have a subtract to the project being completed. "This will be year eight since I started the business. This will definitely grow our business, and for SAR-CAN, a cleaner and newer building is going to be great." he said.

"We plan to do a lot of landscaping around it, once we get the building made, to make it more appealing be-cause there's going to be a lot more people coming in. The closest SARCAN to here is in Moosomin, all of our in-laws are out by Carievale and Gainsborough so a lot of them come here.

"There's a lot of people that are going to see it, that's why we want to put some curb appeal out front just to add a little bit, because there's going to be lots of people coming in and out."

Progress on Kubota dealership

Another ongoing project that is happening in the com-munity of Redvers is the building of a new Kubota dealership

Redvers Ag took on the Kubota brand two years ago The owner, Perry Dangstorp, said having the new busi-ness in town will be a great addition to the community and surrounding area.

"We would be the only Kubota dealership between Es-tevan and Yorkton. It's pretty much our job to service a 60 mile radius of Redvers," he said.

"For the town, we've added three staff which is good because it's added more jobs. Then from the previous stuff we sold there was no product overlap. It's all new stuff that we're selling." Dangstorp said the construction for the dealership

is expected to be finished by the end of summer and should be in use by December

Being a part of a family business that has been in Red-vers for 60 years, Frank Bedecs said he is proud to see local businesses in the community continue to grow and







Investors often ask: Is now a good time to invest?

The real meaning behind the question is more likely that investors want to know if their investment will go up rather than down. In truth, it's impossible to know when the "perfect" time to invest is. Rather, if investors are nervous about when to invest, we would suggest buying in regular increments—perhaps monthly or quarterly—as trying to time the market is an exercise in futility.


One of the main reasons to avoid market timing is that it's incredibly difficult to predict when the market will rise or fall. Even the most experienced analysts and economists cannot predict market movements. By trying to time the market, you're essentially trying to predict the unpredictable, and success is improbable.

As an example, we assume three investors make annual lump-sum equity investments of \$10,000 each year over 20 years. The first, let's call him Always Right, times the market perfectly every year and buys at the market low. The second, Always Wrong, has terrible timing and invests at the market high for the year, every year. The third investor, Always Consistent, makes his investment on the last trading day of December, every year, like clockwork. We looked at the historical outcomes of

We looked at the historical outcomes of each investor on a 20-year basis from 1962 to 1982 and roll forward for every 20-year period ending 2022. The best 20-year period fell between 1979 and 1999. Yet the annualized difference in return between Always Right and Always Wrong was only 3.1%.

Looking at Always Consistent, he fell roughly in the middle. More importantly, the likelihood of timing the investment on the best trading day in a year is 1/250. To try and execute this perfectly for 20 years is a near impossibility—just as it is to have the worst timing every year.

Another point to consider is that trying to time the market can lead to emotional 20-year rolling annualized return of lump-sum investments on the year's low (Always Right), high (Always Wrong) or December 31 of each year (Always Consistent) S&P 500 Index 1982-2022

biases, such as fear of missing out (FOMO) or fear of losing money (FOLM), which can cause you to make irrational decisions. Consistently investing in the market—

Consistently investing in the market either monthly or quarterly, regardless of the current price—can help you avoid these emotional biases and ensure a steady investment outcome.

This strategy may not be as exciting as trying to time the market, but it's been proven to be the most effective way to grow your wealth over the long-term.

On March 3, RCMP were contacted by Co-op Grocery store in Grenfell. They provided video footage of a female hitting and assaulting an elderly male in the store. RCMP are in the process of following up with the male to obtain a statement so charges can be laid on the female in question.

Scam of the week

On March 4, RCMP received another "sextortion" complaint. This occurred when a male from the community thought he was "snapchatting" with a female who lived in Saskatchewan. The person turned out to be recording and making copies of the sexual photos and conversation. The scammer threatened to share the explicit content online and to his friends and family if the male refused to pay money. In this case the male had already sent the fraudster \$3,665.81 to a PayPal account. Sextortion seems to becoming more and more common with today's social media (Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat). Scammers create fake profiles on social media accounts and dating websites. They use these profiles to lure victims into a sexual relationship and coerce them into performing sexual acts on camera. Often these scammers will have very attractive women or men on the other side of the video performing sexual acts to add credibility. The scammer records these video and photo sessions and threatens to send the images or videos to all your friends and family unless you pay them or provide more sexual content.

I have dealt with these scams where victims have sent money and then once the money is sent and received they demand more money. Whether you send money to the scammer or not, the scammer can still send the video to your friends and family members on the social media. The victims of these crimes usually feel immense pressure to pay the scammer as they do not want the embarrassment of their spouses, family or children seeing the photos or videos. Please be safe online

Town approved for New Horizons for Seniors grant

At their regular meeting on Wednesday, it was reported to Redvers town council that the town has been approved for a grant under the New Horizons for Seniors Program. The town was approved for

\$13,519 under the program. The town applied for the grant so that it can be used for excursions on the town's transit bus to help enhance the quality of life for local seniors. The outings can or function local seniors. The outings can be for fun, such as going to an event or a performance, or for necessities, such as go-ing to see a doctor. The excursions will be planned by the town and the town's tran-sit bus driver.

Town will look into program for electric vehicle chargers

The town is looking into putting electric vehicle chargers in Redvers after being contacted by Jason Praski from Exa Energy

Consulting in Saskatoon about applying for a program to install chargers. Praski wrote to the town saying he was assisting Eco-West Canada from Winnipeg to distribute NRCan's ZEVIP (Zero Emis sion Vehicle Infrastructure Program) funding for Saskatchewan that pays up to 50 per cent of the cost to install Level 2 (240 volt) electric vehicle chargers up to \$5,000

volt) electric vehicle chargers up to \$5,000 in funding. He said they are looking to sign up those interested in this round of funding by spring of 2023. Council decided to look into the pro-gram further with the thought that the town and another organization, like tour-ism, could potentially partner on the proj-ect ect

Tax abatement

for restaurant approved

Council approved a tax abatement for the new owners of the Optimist Eatery. The abatement falls under the town's Property Tax Incentives and Penalties By-law. Under the bylaw, there is an incentive for businesses making use of vacant com-mercial property. In the case of an existing business sitting vacant for more than one year, if it is sold to a new owner and a busi-ness is started, the town provides a 100 per cent tax abatement in the first and second year, and a 75 per cent abatement in the third year.

Town won't purchase Warren Street lot

The town decided not to move forward with the purchase of a lot at 9 Warren Street from the Redvers and District Arts Council. The town had considered purchasing

the empty lot from the arts council to store snow. The arts council offered the lot for sale to the town for \$25,000, just under a

rate of \$3 a square foot. Council discussed it but decided against purchasing the lot at that price just for snow storage



For over 30 years now, McFarlane and Dennis Hack— equipment co-ordinator of the club—have voluntarily
