


ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT: A CONSTANTLY EVOLVING ROLE

The role of administrative professionals, formerly known as secretaries, seemed doomed to disappear with

the development of new technologies. The first "admins" date from before the birth of Christ. Often called scribes or clerks, these admins were exclu-sively men. This occupation was still a male dominated area even when stenography first appeared in the nine-teenth century. In fact, it was only with the invention of the typewriter that women began to enter the scene, at the end of the 1800s.




