

Fairlight's Doug Sauter will lead Moosomin Parade with his appaloosa horses

Doug Sauter of Fairlight will be waving the Canadian flag and riding one of his appaloosa horses to lead the Moosomin Parade this Saturday, July 13. Sauter lives in Oklahoma and travels with horses to different events all over North America.

Sauter says he always dreamed of having his own horse ranch one day.

"I grew up on a farm at Fairlight. I am very proud of where I am from and my family roots. Horses were not a big part of our farm, but we always had some around, and it was one of my dreams growing up on a farm to someday have a horse ranch. After coaching hockey for 41 years my dream came true. My wife Brenda, and I have a 40-acre horse ranch in Oklahoma. We have 14 horses on it and one longhorn calf. It is a bit of a sanctuary for these horses—every horse has a story of where they came from and they're I think very lucky horses to be raised on our little ranch. I work for a company called Express Ranches and Express Employment Professionals. They're leaders in agriculture in North America. I am an ambassador for their ranch."

Sauter says a friend gave the horses to him. "A gentleman by the name of Wayne Spears, he reenacted Pawnee Bill. Pawnee Bill was a promoter of the Wild West show. They had the Pawnee Bill Ranch and had a leopard appaloosa called "Y"—all of the horses only have one letter names. On this trip in Airdrie and Calgary right now we have Y, X, Z, and T. He got me hooked on leopard appaloosas and he eventually gave me his horse after 22 years. Over the years I have had close to a dozen leopard appaloosas."

Sauter says appaloosa horses are rare and are some of the crowd's favourites.

"The leopard appaloosas have a rare colouring and kids call them a dalmatian—they're spotted horses. They have an unusual look. Our one horse, X, he is a leopard mule—half donkey and half appaloosa. He came out with all these spots and he is very rare."

He says his wife and himself have travelled to many different parades with their horses. He led the Calgary Stampede parade with the horses for 20 years.

"We just finished the Ponoka Stampede Rodeo, and Airdrie," Sauter said. "They're two bigger rodeos that we were part of. A lot of smaller rodeos around, the Moose Mountain Kennedy Rodeo, the ones in Oklahoma—the Oklahoma State University Parade they have 89er days. There is probably around 15-20 parades that we have participated in our home state of Oklahoma."

"We have a promotional six-horse hitch of Clydesdales. The Clydesdales are the second most famous hitch in the United States behind Budweiser



and we would go every other year. The Budweiser team would go one year and then we go the next. Four years ago we quit showing the Express Clydesdale in competitions and we brought percherons. Now we have Express Ranch Percherons and we are one of the top three hitches competitively in all of the United States."

Sauter and his team of horses have recently travelled from Oklahoma to the Prairies for events.

"We have been on the road now for seven days. We stay at my wife's family ranch and farm at Wawota, the Dorrance ranch. On our way up here from Oklahoma we went on a little holiday. We visited Fort Robinson, Nebraska to ride horses on trails and the Moose Mountain Provincial Park here in Southeastern Saskatchewan—all the ski-doo trails become equestrian trails in the summer and they have got a beautiful facility there where you can keep your horses in a pen, camp at the park, and ride all the trails. It is probably one of the biggest and most beautiful secrets in Southeast Saskatchewan that they have trails that are all groomed and safe."

Sauter says he is excited to return to his roots and visit Moosomin again this summer for the parade.

"Moosomin was the big town when I was growing up. One of the highlights when I was younger was going to Dairy Treat. It was located on the Trans-Canada highway with soft ice cream and you didn't go to Moosomin in the summer time and not stop there."

"I have to congratulate Moosomin on how progressive you have been. It starts with communication—with your paper. It's amazing just how important Moosomin is to a lot of people. You got a beautiful town."

He said he is looking forward to leading the Moosomin Chamber of Commerce parade.

"I feel very proud to come back and be a part of the parade. I will recognize a lot of people and see some friends. My wife, Brenda, rides with me—she is a big part of our group of horses and she's got lots of ties in that area. Her mother came from Wapella. It is just a cool deal. I have some friends of mine that usually ride the extra horses, it is just a wonderful time and experience."

Jessica Campbell first female assistant coach in NHL

Jessica Campbell, who grew up in Rocanville, has made history by becoming the first female assistant coach in NHL history.

On Wednesday, the Seattle Kraken announced that the 32-year-old — who spent time growing up in Rocanville and Melville — has been named to Dan Bylsma's coaching staff for the 2024-25 season.

For the past two seasons, Campbell was an assistant coach with Seattle's American Hockey League affiliate, Coachella Valley Firebirds, where she worked alongside Bylsma, who was promoted to head coach of the Kraken earlier this off-season.

"During our tenure in Coachella Valley, I saw firsthand Jessica's commitment to player development," Bylsma said in a release. "Her ability to establish relationships with her players, specifically Tye Kartye, Shane Wright and Ryker Evans, was an important factor in this hire."

"I'm looking forward to continuing to work with her at the NHL level."

"She has the ability to relate to players about their games and what they bring to a team."

When Campbell joined the Firebirds during their inaugural season in 2022-23, she became the first female to be behind the bench in AHL history.

Prior to that, she spent time as an assistant coach and skills coach in Germany with the Nürnberg Ice Tigers, while also serving as an assistant for Germany's national men's team at the 2022 world championships, where she became the first female to be behind the bench at men's world.

Campbell got her start in coaching as an assistant with the Pursuit of Excellence's women's under-18 team in Kelowna for two

seasons from 2017 to 2019.

She was an assistant coach with the Okanagan Hockey Academy's under-18 women's team for one season in 2019-20 before the pandemic hit.

During the pandemic, Campbell served as a power skating and skills coach for several NHL players who sought out her training, JC Power-skating, in Kelowna. She was also the skating coach for the Malmo Redhawks in Sweden's professional league in 2020-21.

Before getting into coaching, Campbell suited up for the Rocanville Jr. Tigers in minor hockey before playing for the

Melville Prairie Fire in the Saskatchewan Female AAA Hockey League.

She went on to play two seasons with the Pursuit of Excellence squad, while also suiting up for Team Canada's under-18 women's team, captaining the team to a gold medal at worlds in 2010.

Campbell attended Cornell University from 2010 to 2014, captaining the women's hockey team in her final season, finishing off with 100 points in 131 career NCAA games.

She played three seasons for the Calgary Inferno in the Canadian Women's Hockey League from 2014 to 2017, while

also suiting up for the Canadian women's national team in 2014 for the 4 Nations Cup before winning a silver medal at the 2015 IIHF World Women's Championship.

The Kraken also hired veteran assistant coach Bob Woods, originally from Leroy, Sask. product who played with the SJHL's Nipawin Hawks

and WHL's Brandon Wheat Kings prior to a lengthy minor pro career.

The 56-year-old, who also had a stint coaching the Saskatoon Blades from 2014 to 2016, has been an assistant coach with the Minnesota Wild for the last seven years.

"This is an important day for our organization," Kraken general manager

Ron Francis said in a release. "We're bringing in valuable coaching experience to our staff and are confident that both Bob and Jessica will make an immediate impact for our team."

Rounding out Seattle's coaching staff is returning assistant Dave Lowry and goalie coach Steve Briere.

Rocanville Town council

Rocanville cracking down on weedy yards

Rocanville Town staff have been heading off complaints about nuisance properties, mainly landowners letting grass and weeds growing beyond the allowable 20cm limit.

"What we've been dealing with a lot recently in the office is complaints in regards to nuisance properties - basically, letting weeds and grass get really long and unruly," said Rocanville Administrator Tanya Strandlund. "So we're going to be doing some nuisance bylaw enforcement."

Any growth over 20cm contravenes the town bylaw and properties not abiding by the rule are either noticed by Town Staff or highlighted to them via resident complaints.

"There was a big issue at the beginning of the season with dandelions," said Strandlund, who has noted some properties with weeds 'up to your waist'. "It really affects everybody."

The first step in addressing those unsightly properties is a simple request from the Town, allowing a week for the property to be remedied. If the property is still not in compliance, further steps are then taken.

"Not a fine per se, but it'll be us coming in and doing it or having a third party do it and then they get stuck with the bill,"

Strandlund explained when asked if there are any monetary consequences. "They will get the bill, and if they don't pay the bill, it gets put on their property taxes because it is in regards to maintaining up the property."

"Mowing lawn isn't too hard, and there's tons of kids in town that are willing to do it," Strandlund said, adding that she knows of a group of youngsters showing their entrepreneurial spirit by offering their lawn mowing services. "Those kids can use that that money and if you don't want to do it, it's supporting them and you get your stuff done."

Hope Church to hold outdoor service

During their regular meeting on July 3, Rocanville Town Council approved a street closure for the Hope Church to accommodate their upcoming annual outdoor service.

"The Hope Church is having an outdoor service on August 25, and just need to block off some space on Ellice Street, so we just approved that," Strandlund said.

The church will hold their function from 9 am to 2 pm on that day.

"Once a year, they enjoy having one outside," said Strandlund of the special service.

Reinvested

Council approved re-investing GIC 44, an unspecified surplus of \$37,221.18, one-year redeemable at 4.25 per cent.

Administrator's report

As with many communities, Rocanville is taking another look at their Fire Bylaw.

"We're doing a lot of reading on fire by-laws and making sure our town is really safe when it comes to fires, fire bans, fireworks, burning, all that kind of stuff," said Administrator Tanya Strandlund. "We're looking into mutual aid agreements and how to get those started."

She explained that the conversation on mutual aid in particular began with neighbouring towns and RMs.

While still in the research stage, the new bylaw could come to pass next year.

"It just helps support everybody and make sure that everybody knows what's expected," Strandlund said. "Just makes it super clear cut."

Some other topics covered in her Administrator's Report included gopher control, as it has been a recognized concern.

"We're looking at some gopher control and a few spots in town. They're getting a little bit bad again this year," Strandlund remarked.

Council will also be taking a brief summer break from meetings, with only one

set date in August. The lone regular Council meeting for that month is slated for Aug. 14, returning to the regular schedule in September.

Work being done around town

Wilson Hometown Lawns will be doing some spraying around the Transfer Station, and Saskatchewan Asphalt Maintenance has been contracted for slurry seal and crack sealing on Rocanville streets.

Transfer station key policy

Town staff are working on a policy for keyholders of the Rocanville Transfer Station.

"There's a lot of businesses that hold a key for the transfer station for after hours access and we're just wanting to make sure that there's an agreement in place when they have those keys," explained Strandlund.

Zamboni repairs underway

Council approved a quote from Superior Forklift to repair the Zamboni, coming in at \$9,644.89 plus taxes.

"It needed cylinders, the auger needed to be balanced, and it needed a good tune up," Strandlund said. "When it comes to those kinds of machines, sometimes it's better just to let knowledgeable service people do it!"

Female assaulted by her boyfriend

On June 25, RCMP were dispatched to a domestic assault that had taken place at a residence in Sioux Valley Dakota Nation. Police attended and learned that a female had been assaulted by her boyfriend, who had since left the residence. After making multiple attempts to locate the suspect, a warrant has been issued for a 24-year-old male in relation to this incident.

38 km/hour over the limit

40 km/hour over the limit

On June 28, during a routine traffic patrol on Highway 257 in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 140 km/hr in a 100 km/hr zone. A traffic stop was conducted and the driver was issued a traffic offence notice for speeding which carries a fine of \$573.

Breath sample was a fail

On June 29, RCMP initiated a traffic stop on Third Avenue in the town of Virden. Police spoke to a female driver who admitted to consuming alcohol the day prior. A

breath sample was obtained at the scene, which resulted in a fail. As a result, the driver was arrested and charged with operation while impaired (alcohol) of motor vehicle, and operation while over 80mg% (alcohol) of motor vehicle. A breath test was conducted with results of 100mg% and 90mg%. The 54-year-old female was later released on an appearance notice and will appear in court later this summer.

Broadview RCMP Report

66 traffic tickets

The male was intoxicated and placed under arrest. The male provided samples of his breath that were nearly three times the legal limit. Found van stolen from Grenfell

On June 23, RCMP were called to Kahkewistahaw First Nations where a female was assaulted by another female. The victim had injuries to her face and arm. The suspect was located and charged. The suspect then spent the night at the RCMP Bed and Breakfast until she could be taken to court.

Boating safety tips

With the summer here in full swing, here's a few safety tips for you boaters out there!

- Before heading out on the water, boaters should make sure their boat is equipped with enough approved lifejackets to fit themselves and everyone on board.
- Wearing a life jacket or PDF is the best defense for surviving cold-water shock and hypothermia.
- Everyone who operates a power-driven pleasure craft must carry proof of competency on board. Proof of competency includes a Pleasure Craft Operator Card or proof that you passed a boating safety course in Canada before April 1, 1999.
- Drinking and driving, whether on land or water, is illegal and punishable under the Criminal Code.
- Beware of fatigue, sun, wind and boat motion. All can dull your senses and impair fine motor skills and judgment.
- Watch your speed. Don't race to the lake, and don't race on the lake. Speed is a major contributor to incidents on the roadways and on the water. Slow down.
- Boaters, tubers and swimmers alike should always wear life jackets or personal floatation devices when on the water.

It is illegal to consume alcohol on a water pleasure craft!

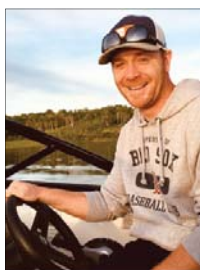

Bulls and Broncs Saturday in Moosomin

The idea to donate to the cause, helping the daycare fund the building of a second location was easy, according to Beckett.

"We feel that it's something that is needed in our community, and we have a lot of families on our committee who take their kids to daycare," she said. "It'll definitely help and hopefully it takes them a bit further in their project."

The Bulls and Broncs event is also sanctioned by Bull Riders Canada with more than \$6,000 up for grabs, enticing some quality talent to the lure of lasting eight seconds after that chute opens. In fact, Whitewood is hosting a BRC event as well with their Pipestone Bull Bash on the night before the Moosomin event—something that Beckett believes will draw more riders and spectators alike.

"Being BRC, both Whitewood and Moosomin could really pull in some extra riders just so they can ride both nights," she said. "It's definitely helped us, and it's helped our crowd as well that they can see it two nights in a row."

Some of those on the BRC circuit have local roots, so not only do fans get to see some hometown heroes, but also enjoy a high-calibre event with those familiar faces.

"It pulls people from all over the place and I think just because they know that instead of only watching five or six bull riders, and maybe none of them stick a ride, they can watch 20 or so bull riders and a percentage of them will stick their ride," Beckett noted.

Expect to see a lot of folks in town for the July 12/13 weekend as numbers tend to swell for the event.

"Since we started doing the Bulls and Broncs rough stock events, we can see anywhere from 900 to 1,200 people in a night," Beckett said. "With our cabaret afterwards, that pulls in a few extra people, but definitely around that 1,000-people mark."

Lots of events

It's going to be a busy weekend with pre-Bulls and Broncs activities kicking off on Friday. Head down to the Town Office between 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. for a barbecue served up by members of Moosomin Town Council with proceeds going to the Playfair Daycare.

It's been awhile since this particular barbecue has happened, marking a return this year for the first time since before Covid, so it's bound to be a popular kick-off to Rodeo Weekend.

Money raised will be going to the new building project that the Playfair Daycare is working on, an 8,000 square foot, single-level building to answer the need for more spaces. Playfair's current facility has room for 71 spots, and the new building will add another 90 to that, bringing capacity up to 161 spaces.

Movie in the park

Friday evening is a Movie in the Park at the Nutrien Sportsplex with doors opening at 8:30 p.m. and the feature presentation hitting the screen at dusk.

"I always loved going to the drive-in, and I thought it'd be a good idea if we could have one in Moosomin, because there's not really any close around," said Jasmine Davidson, coordinator of Moosomin Communities in Bloom.

Exactly which movie playing is still up in the air as Davidson posted a poll on the Communities in Bloom Facebook page, providing three options to choose from. The title with the most votes will determine what hits the outdoor screen.

"It'll be all free, and you can bring your snacks, blankets and whatever you would like," she said.

With the event being hosted by the local Communities in Bloom, residents interested in the program have the opportunity to meet with committee members—a chance to find out some of the unique initiatives happening this year.

One of those exciting projects currently underway is a virtual garden tour, which the Communities in Bloom team has been quite thrilled with producing.

"You put your you sign up, you give me your address we get drone footage of your garden," Davidson explained. "We're going to compile them all together so they're like a big virtual garden tour. We've done one and it looks so cool!"

The drone footage also provides a

unique perspective, adding to an already beautiful garden display.

"The last one we went, I drove by that house a million times and I didn't know how beautiful it was until I actually got the opportunity to look at it and showcase it," Davidson said.

Another exciting venture is the 2024 Scotts Miracle-Gro Best Garden contest, which runs until August 20. Nominate yourself and others in the contest, and a dozen lucky people will win signage, a jug of Miracle-Gro Shake n Feed plant food, and a container of Miracle-Gro water soluble all purpose plant food.

Pancake breakfast

On Saturday morning, the Moosomin Volunteer Fire Department is serving up a pancake breakfast (starting at 7 a.m.) over at the fire hall—a tradition that's held for decades in town.

"People line up and have their breakfast on the morning, and then go do the parade," said Moosomin Fire Chief Rob Hanson. "It's been a tradition for many years."

The firefighters typically serve up between 200 and 300 plates, with proceeds from the special breakfast going back to the local fire department's equipment fund.

"Parrish & Heimbecker donated the pancake mix to us, and then we just buy the sausages from the Co-op, syrup and whatever and get at 'er," Hanson said.

With rising costs on everything, fundraisers like the annual pancake breakfast help the Moosomin Volunteer Fire Department afford updated gear, equipment, and continual training for firefighters.

"I'm going to blame it on COVID, all this stuff has doubled in price since the early 2020s," Hanson said. "Prices of trucks have doubled, turnout gear's up considerably. Even a helmet is \$350 now, so it's astronomical the prices."

Hanson estimates to fully outfit a firefighter with all the gear they need to do their job safely can easily run \$5,000.

'Candyland' theme of Chamber parade

After you've loaded up on breakfast, why not take in the Moosomin Chamber of Commerce parade, which will begin winding down the streets at 10 a.m.

"For a small town, Moosomin always has a big parade—and this year is not going to be any exception," said Moosomin Chamber of Commerce president Kevin Weedmark.

Many local businesses will be entering floats this year, with a 'Candyland' theme, and there will be a large representation of Shriners.

"We've got four different Shriner units that are going to be part of it including the

Moosomin Shrine Club's go-cart patrol, which is always always a hit," Weedmark said. "We'll also have the Indian Head Shriners Steel Drum Band, the Brandon Shriners will be here with their mini Mustangs and the Carlyle Shrine Club will be coming with their vehicles, including a mini ambulance and a mini semi truck."

Expanding on the this year's theme, Weedmark highlighted the tradition of tossing candy in a small town parade.

"We just went with a really fun parade theme this year," he said. "Candy is always a big part of small town parades; tossing out candy to the kids along the parade route. This year, we thought we'd made that the theme and let people have fun decorating their floats in that theme. I've heard back from a lot of people who are having fun with it."

There are two major rules to abide by when it comes to this perennial tradition as Weedmark noted, "the rule here is throw lots of candy, and the other rule around the parade is have fun. Those are our two rules!"

There's also a special thrill for horse lovers as some beautiful equines will be front and centre, as Weedmark explained.

"Leading the parade will be a team of Appaloosa horses from Doug Sauter, who has led the Calgary Stampede parade for the last years," he said. "He comes up from Oklahoma with these beautiful Appaloosas and he'll be waving the Canadian flag, leading our parade this year."

Marshalling for the parade begins at 9 a.m. in the McNaughton High School parking lot.

"It just keeps getting bigger every year," Weedmark said of the parade participants. "We line the floats up in banks and then have them peel out one group after another, and the rows usually fill that parking lot and then down Ellice Street and onto Gertie Street. It's quite a lineup!"

"It's always a lot of fun, and it's always without fail, the hottest day of the summer that Bulls and Broncs weekend," Weedmark said, noting the forecast of 30°C for the day.

Homemade treasures at the Makers Market

Also starting at 10 am is a Makers Market over at the Moosomin Visual Arts Centre (701 Ellice Street), running until 3 p.m.

This outdoor event will feature homemade goods, arts, and crafts with folks from in and around Moosomin participating.

There will also be a bounce tent, cotton candy, a lemonade stand, and popcorn on offer from 11 am to 3 p.m.

"We have tables booked from local and surrounding area artists/makers, and the market is exclusive to selling homemade goods and crafts," explained Merissa

Lantz of MVAC. "We still have room for anyone who would like to sign up."

Anyone interested in a \$25 table can text me(306) 434-7095 for more information.

"This is a free event, and anyone is welcome to come and check out the Market," Lantz said, adding "we will have a table for any donations that the public would like to make to MVAC."

Since officially opening the doors back in February, MVAC has been a flurry of activity with classes, events, and kids programs—a prime example being the upcoming summer camp 'Passport Moosomin' starting on July 22.

As for the Maker's Market, it's an event MVAC intends to repeat throughout the year.

"This is our first official Makers Market we have had," Lantz said. "We have had lots of interest from local vendors that could not make it this weekend, but are interested in future dates. We hope to follow up with a Christmas Market in November."

Scrumptious lunch, great cause

If you're looking for an amazing lunch that can help make a difference for a local family, head over to the Moosomin Armoury Hall for a Filipino lunch with entertainment! There will be two seatings at 11:15 a.m. and 12:45 p.m. with proceeds going to the Lladones family, who recently lost their home and business in a fire on the morning of June 21.

Thankfully, the Lladones family was able to escape the building and only had a brief hospital stay as a result of the tragic event. Since that time, the entire community has rallied around the family, and this special lunch event is another testament to that support the Lladones family have so graciously received. Tickets to the Pinoy Lunch for a Cause are available at GL Apparel and Promotions (or call Leo at (306) 435-4222), Adair Farm and Ranch Supply, and the World-Spectator.

Diners can expect lots of rice, pansit, spring rolls, and delicious puto (rice cake) for dessert.

"We're going to have like a Filipino band that's going to play pop music, maybe some Filipino songs too," said Michael Vantomme of the Filipino Community. So far, Blair's tour has seen him play many a rodeo, and the Moosomin show will be fresh off a two-night stint at Country Thunder in Craven.

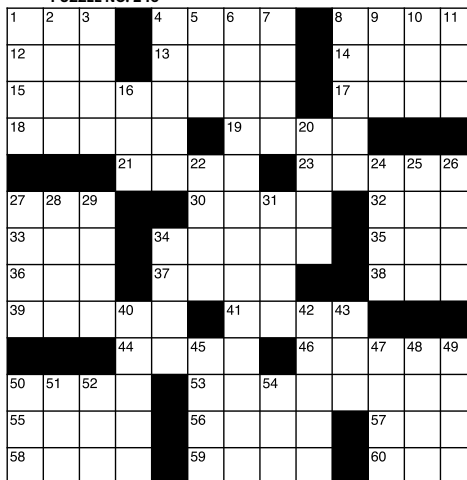
