Miracle Treat Day raises \$27,746 in Moosomin

Miracle Treat Day raised more than ever in Moosomin this year. Moosomin DQ sold \$27,746.21 worth of Blizzards on Miracle Treat Day Thursday, up from \$23,714 last year, \$11,000 in 2022, \$8,000 in 2021, and \$2,700 in 2020.

DQ had sold 4,356 blizzards last year and set a target of 5,000 for this year. Community supports believed them

of 5,000 for this year. Community support helped them exceed that target, selling a total of 5,118 Blizzards Thursday.
All proceeds go to the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital

in Saskatoon.

Morgan Kerr of Moosomin Dairy Queen says Miracle
Treat Day was a success. "It turned out very good. I set a
goal of 5,000 Blizzards for this year and at the time I did
think the goal was very high especially when I woke up
and the weather was quite cold out and I thought that wouldn't help when trying to sell Blizzards for Miracle Treat Day, but it was really good." Kerr says lots of Blizzards were purchased as dona-

"I would say, of 5,100 Blizzards—close to a third of that was donated to other people. So, purchased from one business and donated to another, or bought for schools for September, day cares, the Kin-Ability centre, or Bryant house. Anything people could find to buy blizzards for. We had some purchased for Kennedy School too."

Kerr says she couldn't believe the support from Ester-hazy businesses and people. "Esterhazy blew my mind too. We had a lot of Blizzards sold in Esterhazy."

In Moosomin:

Community Fridge opening this Thursday

This Thursday, a grand opening is being held for a new community fridge that will be accessible behind the Moosomin

Food Share.

The fridge will house dry goods, refrigerated foods, and frozen foods, and will allow anyone in need of food to access it quickly and immediately, no questions asked, and without the need to sign up for food hampers. It will also allow

up for food hampers. It will also allow people to donate food by simply opening the fridge, freezer or pantry, and placing food inside for people in need to take. Samantha Campbell Samantha Campbell Samantha Campbell, Administrator and Manager with the Moosomin Food Share, says the fridge was made possible by a grant. "I was actually applying for a grant and they give you a list of eligible projects and that was one of them, and when I started researching it, I thought it would be a good fit for our community" she says. "The only others I know of are in the cities, so I started researching it and the cities, so I started researching it and thought it was a good fit and that Moo-somin could benefit from having one in our area.

"It's basically a shed that has a fridge, freezer, and a pantry in it, so people can put acceptable food or hygiene items in it. The concept is take what you need,

leave what you can, so it's basically leaving food and taking food as you can, and we are calling on the community to help rally and fill the fridge. It's a way to tack-le foods insecurity in the community."

Campbell says it took almost two years to set the fridge up.

"I got told I was getting it in September of 2023, I had applied for the loan at the beginning of 2023. We have a shed located at the back of the food share in the back

alley. It was kind of the perfect spot. We already had the plug ins where we could run power to it so we got a shed built. It's 4 x 12. Basically there are three doors made out of wood, there is siding, there is linoleum, we have it all insulated, and it's shingled. We're going to have a heater in it so it can be open throughout the winter as well. And then we purchased a fridge, a freezer, and we also have shelv-fide. fridge, a freezer, and we also have shelving so it will be a pantry as well."

Campbell is hoping people come out on Thursday to see the new fridge.

"We are just finishing up on some finishing touches there so we are hoping that next week we can unlock the doors for people to start using it. We are go ing to have it fully stocked for the grand opening. We are advertising to tell people to bring something to stock it and come on down and check it out. We also might purchase some donuts and coffee from Tim Hortons for people to have while they come see it. We are going to do a rib-bon cutting with Mayor Larry Tomlinson and I'll say a few words on the project." Campbell thinks the fridge will be well

"We have quite a few of food clients that come to us, but we also know that there are so many people struggling that won't come to the food share due to pride or for a number of reasons, so we are hopor for a number of reasons, so we are noping that by having this open to everyone in the community, it will get used a lot more. It's also one way people can give back, so instead of throwing their garden produce they can't use into the compost, they can put it in the fridge for someone else to use." else to use

The grand opening will be at 12:30 pm on Thursday, August 15 behind the Moosomin Food Share.

Day.

"We're calling and asking. Sometimes it is just a matter of asking.

"They can purchase coupons for the Blizzards, too. I had a lady come in and buy 25 Blizzard coupons for Christmas presents or birthday presents throughout the year. People are just thinking of any reason to buy Blizzards that day. I am go-ing to be busy in September with deliver-

ing to schools.

"I got an email yesterday from Rhonda, who was our old Dairy Queen rep, and she lives in Saskatoon. My picture is in the Saskatoon Children's Hospital with Blaze, and with a cardboard frame around us that says Moosomin DQ. So, Moosomin's name is in the Saskatoon Hospital. It is incredible how a small town can raise big city numbers, and actually beat big city numbers.

Kerr is thankful for the amazing sup-port from the community and surround-

port from the community and surrounce ing area.

"We just get amazing support. Thank you, thank you, thank you! We can't even begin to thank people enough in our community and in the area for their support with any project. Any project, people in Moosomin get behind—it doesn't matter what it is, they get behind it. We have a new day care going in and it will be paid for soon—it doesn't take long, because people iust want to help. People really people just want to help. People really

step up when they're asked. It is just a matter of asking."

Kerr says the Moosomin Dairy Queen staff enjoyed having Blaze Dunn, an ambassador of the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital in Saskatoon, again this year.
"Blaze was great. He has so much energy. He was a great help and we loved having him again this year. It is nice to be able to help kids like Blaze, and help people who need the hospital."

Kerr is already thinking about her goal

Kerr is already thinking about her goal for Miracle Treat Day 2025. "I am thinking next year my goal is 5,500 Blizzards. I think we can beat this year. We approached some businesses this year that said, 'Oh, we will get you next year.' There was a business in Esterhazy, Bridgeview Manufacturing, sent a little note on a \$100 bill for their donation saying, 'We didn't know, we will get it next year!' So, I think we should be able to do even better next

Kerr says they looked to other community business to help accommodate the many Blizzards for Miracle Treat Day.

"On Wednesday night before Miracle Treat Day, we looked in our freezer and realized there was no more room and called Cory Coutts at Borderland Co-op and he let us use their freezer. There was close to 65 milk crates full of Blizzards at the Borderland Co-op. It takes a commu-

"It is a great day. It is a good cause. It is so good seeing kids like Blaze and helping kids like him. It is all about helping people and that is what I think life is about, helping people."

larity.


"The public is advised to avoid swimming and in-water activities at rec-reational areas while the beach continues to be mon-

"Advisories will be lifted when sampling indicates that the water is considered safe.



Studio Twenty-Five open in Moosomin

A new hair studio opened last week
in Moosomin. The hair studio is called
Studio Twenty-Five and is located in the
Esso strip mall beside Dairy Queen.

Keysha Horn, the owner of Studio Twenty-Five says she has decided to move back home to open her business in town.
"I am a hairstylist and I worked for

about seven years in Regina and now I am ready for home. I am bringing more hair services and a little bit of esthetics into services and a little bit of esthetics into Mossomin. I specialize in women's cuts, colours, hair extensions, but I do men's and kids' as well. I am educated in lash extensions, facials, pedicures, but I am not offering those at the moment as I am just starting to get open. I am planning to stick busy with hair first and see how it goes."

Before moving home

Horn says she was a part-owner of a hair studio in Regina for the last several years.

'I went to Moose Jaw for hair school in 2016 then came back to Moosomin and worked for that summer. Then, I went back to Moose Jaw again in the fall of 2017 for esthetics.

or esthetics.
"I moved to Regina in 2017, and I worked under a lady at Saffyre Salon and Spa. She had a whole business there, and had seven of us stylists in there—it was a very busy salon. I learned a lot from them and then six months down the road she wanted to sell the business because she was moving away from the city, so I jumped in and actually bought the business from her. I actually bought affire the barriend. Saffyre Salon is in east Regina by Browns Social House. I was part-owner in Regina at Saffyre for five years. We just sold it about a month ago so it is all quite new and crazy."

In the beginning

Horn says she wrote in her grade six journal that she wanted to be a hairstylist. "I honestly don't know where hairstyling even came from. I have no family members that do hair, but in grade six Mrs. Stanhope, my teacher, had us write journal entries just about what we thought of high school, what we were nervous about, and what we wanted to be when we grew up—stuff like that. I wrote that I wanted to go into hair and esthetics. Then she kept them and gave them to us in grade 12, so I feel like I knew from a young

age, and right out of high school I went straight to hair school."

It has been in the works for the last three months of just getting everything readv.

New business
Horn says she is excited to have her own space and new business in town.
"My new business is located at 502 Park

Avenue in Unit 6. Right beside DQ on the very end of the strip mall. I was curious to go into another salon here in town which would have worked perfectly fine, I am just used to making my own decisions and having my own products, and whatever I want to carry. I just wanted to have a little suite to myself, just really small and personal, not loud and crazy, so I decided

to go on my own."

She says she plans to start small. "It will be just myself for right now, but I may think about expanding later on. I definitely have a lot of room, it is quite big. Right now I do have two chairs set up so I do have room for a chair renter if I want to have someone. In the future there is room for three stylists."

Horn says she opened for the first time last week and already has many bookings. "I actually just started today! (August 7).

Horn says she opened her studio in Moosomin to be back home.

"It is home. I never really thought of going anywhere else. If I was not in Regina then I would be in Moosomin. Lalso hear there is still high demand for hair stylists in town, which worked perfect for me once I decided I wanted to move back. My first day there were lots of people walking in and booking appointments. It was a good

Horn says she enjoys seeing her clients happy after styling their hair. "I like the change. I like seeing the little

and drastic changes, but also making people feel good. They always feel good when they leave.

"I am leaning toward getting gift-wear, pottery, and things like that, not just hair products for retail. I am trying to find something that Moosomin doesn't have

business is because of her age.
"It is called Studio Twenty-Five. It is twenty-five because I am 25 years old when I'm opening up my business. I wanted to keep studio in there knowing that it was

keep studio in there knowing that it was smaller not a big salon and spa."

She says they renovated the space to accommodate the new function of the building. "Trudi and Travis Holmstrom had it before me and they had their showroom in there so there is new flooring, new paint, and the reception desk was already there. It was more just moving a little bit of electrical and making. moving a little bit of electrical and making it my own. It was pretty good. It has really nice south-facing windows with good lighting.'

Excited to start something new

Horn says she is excited to be in Moosomin and start something new.
"I am all the emotions right now, but mostly excited. Just changing towns, houses, and businesses has been a lot, but all exciting. I'll get comfortable with the new changes, it'll be good. I don't have any specific hours at the moment. With the sale of the Regina location. I have to the sale of the Regina location I have to go back every once in awhile so I am not going to be full-time here yet."

Horn says she is seeing lots of support from the community already.

"Already I am booked through until September for the days I am at the salon. The community needs more hairstylists and I am excited to see where it takes me. Now, I can be more about my clients and myself running my own business. It is easy now just chatting with clients. I am excited to see new and old clients from the community and area come to my salon.

A modern voting system, built on service, integrity, and innovation

Elections are the cornerstone of democracy. They give citizens an equal voice in choosing their government. This October, the people of Saskatchewan will get their chance to make that choice. At Elections Saskatchewan we believe ensuring every eligible voter has convenient and easy access to casting their ballot is fundamental to a free and fair election. For that very reason broadening access to the vote is the foundation of Elections Saskatchewan's election modernization initiative that is built on our val-

ues of service, integrity and innovation. So, what does modernization mean exactly? It means a more efficient, effective and inclusive electoral process for the benefit of voters, stakeholders and all those living in Saskatchewan. It means a system that is more sustainable, transparent and accountable. It means a system that uses technology to improve the voting experience while ensuring election integrity and improving voters' access to the ballot.

to the ballot.

Although we're taking major strides in the upcoming election, the process of improving our voting system has and will continue to unfold in stages. A key factor has been the impact that a global pandemic had on the 2020 election. The challenge then was how to make voting easier and more convenient for people faced with the restrictions imposed due to the presence of COVID-19. To deal with that reality we introduced vote by mail. More than 56,000 Saskatchewan voters took advantage of that option. We also expanded the length of time that early

option. We also expanded the length of time that early voting locations were open.

In the upcoming election we're taking important next steps in removing barriers. Last month we launched our public campaign to raise awareness by emphasizing the importance of voter registration. Most voters will already be on the voters list, but new residents and others voting

be on the voters list, but new residents and others voting for the first time can speed the process and save time at the voting locations by registering in advance.

We're taking a further step by expanding the vote by mail option. We're also formalizing "voting week" for the October 2024 election. What this means is instead of a specific election day with some limited advance polls, we're instituting six full days of voting, expected to begin on

October 22 and end on October 28.

The creation of voting week is a crucial step in acknowl-The creation of voting week is a crucial step in acknowledging the need to place the voter at the centre of our system. By so doing we broaden voters' access to the secret ballot, introducing multiple days, multiple places, and multiple methods of voting that offer greater convenience for eligible voters in choosing their leaders.

We're also creating greater convenience for voters in both urban and rural constituencies. Aside from vote by mail the introduction of voting week which includes

mail, the introduction of voting week, which includes extended hours from 10 am to 7 pm during the first five days, means greater convenience and access for voters. On the final day of voting, all voting locations will be

open from 9 am to 8pm. In rural Saskatchewan we're maintaining the 30-minute rule, which ensures no vot-er is more than a 30-minute

drive from a voting location. Underpinning these changes will be the introduction of electronic poll books at voting stations in our urban centres. An electronic poll book is a laptop computer that contains the list of eligible votis a laptop computer that contains the list of eligible vot-ers. Barcode scanners linked to voter information cards will quickly identify people on the voting list when they arrive at the voting station. It will not only speed up the voting process by reducing paperwork, but also provide political parties with real time information on who has voted, assisting their "get-out-the vote" efforts. In 2023, three by-elections provided the opportunity to

test our modernization measures in real time in real elec-toral circumstances. The results were uniformly positive. At the same time, we have also worked closely with

Art the same time, we have also writed toberly with First Nations to ensure they have the information and resources necessary to identify and eliminate barriers that inhibit their participation in the democratic process.

Make no mistake, these changes are designed for one

purpose—to strengthen public trust and integrity in our voting system through greater access, accountability, and transparency. We're doing this by removing barriers and improving access for citizens to perform the civic duty at the heart of our democracy.

To understand the importance of these changes, one needs only to look around the world at the erosion of

needs only to look around the worid at the crosson of public trust in the electoral process of many nations.

Saskatchewan's democracy is strong. It reaches back more than a century and has proven its resilience over and over. We have had 29 general elections, some held in the most difficult of times. In 1917 and 1944, for example, the control of th Saskatchewan held its elections despite the sacrifices required by the two world wars. In 1934, the province held an election in the midst of the Great Depression. And in 2020, our provincial election was held during the CO-VID-19 pandemic, before public vaccinations were available. Time and again, the people of Saskatchewan have exhibited an unusually strong commitment to governing themselves democratically.

themselves democratically.

At Elections Saskatchewan we not only recognize but honour this public commitment. It is why we are dedicated to upholding and strengthening the values that lie at the heart of Saskatchewan's democracy.

Rail strike could begin next week if talks fall through

CIRB rules services 'non-essential

A long-awaited decision from the Can-ada Industrial Relations Board came last strike a little further into August. Before announcing his departure from the Labour portfolio, federal minister Seamus bour portfolio, federal minister Seamus O'Regan sought clarity from the CIRB about essential services during a work stoppage. On Aug. 9, the CIRB officially ruled that a work stoppage by union employees of Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Kansas City railways would not cause an immediate threat to public health and safety. As for strike action, the CIRB pushed pause while the agency can evaluate whether certain commodities must be kept moving during a strike or lockout.

According to the Canada Labour Code, during a strike or lockout not prohibited by Section 87.4(1) of the code, the employ-

during a strike or lockout not prohibited by Section 87.4(1) of the code, the employ-er, union, and employees in the bargaining unit must continue the supply of services, operation of facilities, or production of goods to the extent necessary to prevent immediate and serious danger to the safe-ty or health of the public. The Teamsters Canada Rail Conference sees the Aug. 9 decision as robbing the union of leverage in negotiations, noting the worker's right to strike has been tem-porarily suspended in light of last week's

orarily suspended in light of last week's

ruling.
"From the very beginning, rail workers have only ever sought a fair and equitable agreement," said Paul Boucher, TCRC president. "Unfortunately, both rail companies are demanding concessions that could tear families are part or isopardize rail safety. Rail are definations contesting that count ear families apart or jeopardize rail safety. Rail workers have fought for a safer and more humane industry for decades, and we will not accept moving backwards."

If a decision cannot be reached, the earli-

est a strike could be called is August. 22, with the Teamsters providing 72 hours notice prior to any such action.

Back to the tablePrior to the CIRB decision, it seemed as though some positivity in the ongoing dispute was rising. Last Wednesday noted a return to stalled contract talks as federal government mediators Labour Minister

Steven MacKinnon and Transport Minister Pablo Rodriguez met with representatives from CPKC, CN, and the TCRC.

"Since the beginning of negotiations, CN's goal has always been and continues to be to negotiate in good faith with the Union to reach a mutually beneficial agreement that maintains safety and stability for its team, customers, and North American supply chains," said CN in an update on Aug. 6. "CN has made multiple offers to the TCRC that we believe address employee issues. We also believe that a negotiated outcome is best for all involved and are eager to get back to the bargaining

At the end of June, nearly 10,000 workers employed by the two rail companies voted to reauthorize strike action. Overall, voted to reauthorize strike action. Overall, 89.5 per cent of those eligible voters cast their ballot with 98.6 per cent in favour of walking off the job should the opportunity arise. According to the union, sticking points revolve around the companies seeking concessions around crew scheduling, rail safety, and fatigue management. "CPKC has made two distinct offers to the TCRC, both of which provide significant benefits for our employees and fully

the TCRC, both of which provide signifi-cant benefits for our employees and fully comply with new regulatory requirements for rest. They do not in any way compro-mise safety. To say or suggest otherwise is patently false," said CPKC in an update on negotiations last week. One strong suggestion from CPKC is to move negotiations to binding arbitration, claiming that process would vastly speed

claiming that process would vastly speed up the process.

"We also reiterated our standing offer

to resolve this matter through binding arbitration should negotiations be unsucarolitation should negotiations be unsuc-cessful. Binding arbitration is a reasonable and fair path forward that would resolve this dispute without causing unnecessary harm and disruption to supply chains and our economy. The uncertainty could be ended today if the TCRC would agree to hinding arbitration?

binding arbitration."
Several industries across Canada and the U.S. have voiced concerns over the impact of trains coming to a halt—especially as producers prepare for the harvest season. Rail workers have been without a con-

tract since Dec. 21, 2023.

Premiers in a fight for federalism, not funding

Premiers demand true partnership in federalism and want an end to federal funding with strings attached

The recent Premiers' Council of the Federation meeting in Halifax had a bold new tone

Instead of begging for federal handouts, they talked about rejecting

Is this the start of real change?

During the meeting, the Premiers expressed intense frustration over the lack of federal support and partnership in healthcare, which remains their top priority.

This frustration comes just four months after Quebec signed its own side deal with the federal government, finalizing details from last year's \$196.1 billion healthcare funding agreement.

Since the Council was formed in 2003, meetings have centred on money and control.

Provinces want more federal money with less federal control, while the federal government wants more control and to pay as little as pos-

This year, discussions seem to have gone beyond funding to address deeper frustrations.

Alberta Premier Danielle Smith highlighted the provinces' rejection of federal funding for boutique programming, noting that provinces end up funding the "lion's share" of operational costs.

Historically, provinces have grumbled but accepted federal funding—

bribes designed to build unaffordable programs—with one exception.

The final pillar of medicare, the Medical Care Act of 1966, came with an offer from the federal government to fund 50 percent of medical services through a new 'social development' tax.

This tax would increase regardless of whether provinces accepted the new funding. Ontario Premier John Robarts criticized this move, calling it "the greatest Machiavellian fraud ever perpetrated on the people of Canada.

The current group of Premiers rejects federal bribery cloaked in the constitutionally questionable use of federal spending power.

If they stick together, the provinces can neutralize federal power. The federal government is aware of this dynamic, which might ex-

plain why it used "side deals" in the 2023 federal-provincial funding agreement mentioned above.
In fairness, not all funding is bribery.

It hinges on how it is structured.

Nova Scotia Premier Tim Houston, Chair of the Council, sent a letter to Justin Trudeau on behalf of the premiers, calling for "true partnership to revitalize co-operative federalism in Canada.'

A true partnership, according to Peter Block, an organization develop ment expert, includes an exchange of purpose, the right to say no, joint accountability, and absolute honesty.

This means provincial and federal leaders should meet to build a

shared purpose before planning new programs.

Each party should have the right to stop plans, share accountability for performance, and be honest about resources and intentions.

True partnership captures the essence of what federalism was meant to be in Canada.

Federalism provides a foundation for negotiation, not a power play for forcing governments to take actions they otherwise wouldn't.

In his book American Covenant: How the Constitution unified our

nation—and could again, Yuval Levin makes a similar point about the

It exists to facilitate peace and co-operation despite diverse interests. Though different from American republicanism, Canadian federalism serves the same purpose—peace and compromise, not power and force exerted by one government on another.

The Premiers' call for "true partnership to revitalize co-operative fed-

eralism in Canada" will require compromise from all parties.

We cannot tolerate one level of government wielding power over the other. Governments must embrace true partnership, or Canadian federalism will become a charade

The Premiers have taken the high ground and asked for change. Will Justin Trudeau listen?

Aaron Grandguillot, the owner of Skout Brewing, says he and his wife had always days and the surrounding area.

dreamed of owning a brewery.

"Skout Brewing was a dream of my wife's and mine. We got to learn the business through my wife's family who business through my wife's family who runs the hops farm outside of Moosomin. A few years ago we decided to get serious about it. We made plans for the brewery and we started building. I went to school at Niagara College, the Canadian Food and Wine Institute to learn how to make beer. They have a brewmaster program that I completed in 2022. Then, we moved to Moosomin and in April of this year we opened the brewery. We have been going strong for four months. It is hard to believe we have only been open for four months.

strong for four months. It is hard to believe we have only been open for four months. It feels like it has been longer."

Grandguillot says the community has been supportive of the brewery. "It has been good. The town has been very supportive. We have had good crowds and we're starting to get our feet under us in terms of when we're busy and when people like to come. We have made slight adjustments to our hours to reflect that. We have started doing some off-sale with our cans and we have done a few special events. It has been going very well."

Grandguillot says the brewery has attracted people from out of town.
"If I am ever working behind the bar, I always like to ask people, 'Where are you from?' and people are usually pretty excited to mention when they're out of town because it is a unique place, there is no where else like this in this area of the province so people like to come out see province so people like to come out, see what we have to offer and have a good

Grandguillot says he is constantly working on improving the brewery. "I never ran a business before so I am learning something new every day. It is

much different from a 9-to-5 job compared to my previous career. Now, I am the business owner so I am thinking about the business 24/7—my wife and I seem to have an endless amount of new ideas for the brewery. I am in here almost every day. It has been a big learning curve of knowing all the ins-and-outs of what you should be doing and keeping on top of ordering ingredients, stock, and making sure all of our bills are paid. It has been a big learning curve to make sure we don't miss anything."

big learning curve to make sure we don't miss anything."
Grandguillot explains, "When you're planning—you try to plan for various outcomes, but when you're running the business you just take things as they happen. If something breaks or goes wrong you can't really plan for that, you

just have to resolve the situation. For example, I have been having some trouble with our canning machine. We bought it as used equipment and there are some parts that are broken on it. So, we haven't been able to can as much beer as we have expected. I have had to do repairs on the Saskatchewan isn't always easy so I am just figuring it out as I go. When those things happen it slows you down. So that is why you haven't seen any of our beer in any of the local liquor stores yet."

A place to socialize

Grandguillot says he enjoys seeing his customers socialize and enjoy their time at the brewery.

"I enjoy making beer and seeing how it turns out, but also just to see people come in, enjoy themselves, and have a place to meet with friends, just come and have a place to socialize. I get a nice feeling from being able to add that to the community because it is a great community already, but it is nice to see people come in. They may run across someone they haven't seen in awhile and they're chatting and two tables get pushed together, you see things like that happen and it is just a good feeling. I know there are other places in town people can do that, but I think it is just nice to have another additional option. People seem to appreciate having another spot to come spend some time."

option. People seem to appreciate having another spot to come spend some time."
He says the work is rewarding.
"It is a lot of work, but it is very satisfying and a lot of fun. The hardest part is taking a day off because you're just always thinking about your business."
Grandguillot says Skout Brewing is working on a collaboration with another local business in Moosomin.

We're raising money for the new day care. Everyone will start at the gym and the brewery is the finish line. That is coming up September 7. Now other than our day-to-day at the brewery, we want to start supporting our community in other ways too besides people just coming to see us. We want to start doing more events and that is one of our first events we're and that is one of our first events we're doing, collaborating with Jill and Spencer over at the gym. They approached us with the idea and we thought it was great so now we're working to make that happen. Hopefully we can do more things like that in the future as we go."

Growing locallyHe says Skout beer is available at some

local businesses.
"Our beer is at Red Barn now on tap and we have been able to supply the golf course with some beer, but moving forward we definitely want to start being in the liquor stores. They have approached

us and we would love to sell them some beer—once we get some of the problems with the canner ironed out—we also want to reach out to some of the surrounding communities too. We sell the occasional keg to Pile of Bones Brewing in Regina, we have some of their beers on tap so they have some of ours, but for the most part I want to stick to local businesses in Rocanville, Maryfield, just our area of the province because that is what the brewery

province because that is what the brewery is for.

"We're happy with how things have been going. The town has been very supportive. People are coming out and taking our beer home."

Grandguillot says more people have heard about the brewery and they're receive mere people asach time.

"There has been a couple people out from Regina who have heard of us and are craft beer fans. After we served our beer at Waving in Canada Day at the lake, lots of people tried our beer and then came to the brewery to check it out. Just this last week, someone had one of our beers at Red someone had one of our beers at Red Barn and then the next day they came to check it out. We're getting more and more people all the time. We want to get some highway signs put up too so people know we are here. We've had people stop-in on their way to Winnipeg and one was from Edmonton and they made sure to come through and stop." through and stop.'

The evolution of Skout

Grandguillot says they chose the name Skout Brewing after considering themes significant to Saskatchewan. "When we were looking for the name

for the brewery—we knew we would be in southern rural Saskatchewan—a very outdoorsy area. So, the SK in Skout stands outdoorsy area. So, the SK in Skout stands for Saskatchewan, but we were originally looking at more of a camping theme, but there are a lot of breweries that have camping names already. In a thesaurus, scout and scouting out were some themes associated with camping. So, we explored that and added the SK for Saskatchewan, and we like the fox logo as it is an animal that is always out there scouting around that is always out there scouting around. We went with an orange logo because we went in a liquor store and were looking at a whole bunch of other beers and there was a lot of red and blue cans and no orange

a lot of red and blue cans and no orange cans. So we thought it would stand out so we went with orange."

Grandguillot says he is enjoying running his own business and seeing the community's support behind the brewery. "I didn't know how rewarding it would be. I always guessed it would be, but you don't know until you actually do it and see what you have built. We've added a couple jobs to the community.

"It is a lot of work and a lot of long days, but I don't mind because I am enjoying doing it. It has been a lot of fun and rewarding to put the work in and

Provincial policy in place against cellphones in classrooms

The province has announced a policy for this upcoming school year, with cellphones being banned in Kindergarten to Grade 12 classrooms.

Jeremy Cockrill, Saskatchewan's Minister of Education,

says the purpose of the ban is to allow students to focus on their education with no distractions.

We interviewed Cockrill Wednesday and the full interview follows:

Can you explain the new policy for cellphones in the

The overall policy is we want to make our classrooms the best learning environment possible, free of distractions. Starting this school year we're working with all 27 school divisions to make sure that during class time for kindergarten to grade 12 there are no personal cellphones allowed in Saskatchewan classrooms.

There are two caveats to that, number one, we are going to be working with school divisions and families to establish medical exemptions. For example, if someone is living with diabetes and has a continuous blood glucose monitor they're going to need their cellphone with them because that is an important tool for them to manage their health. That is an exemption to the policy. Also, there is an exemption for grades 9-to-12 if the teacher can present an intentional instructional purpose for having a cellphone in the classroom they can get approval from their principal. Then cellphones will be allowed in the classroom, but only if they can present that intentional instructional purpose and their principal approves. Other than that, we don't want to see any cellphones in classrooms across Saskatchewan. going to be working with school divisions and families to

What were some of the deciding factors for putting this policy in place?

this policy in place?
We're not the first province to do this. If you look across the country we're probably the ninth province to move in the direction of restricting cellphone usage in classrooms. This is a discussion that is happening on a national level and so our decision to go ahead with this policy brings it home to Saskatchewan.

I am hearing from teachers, EAs, and other school off that the province publishers were here heaven with a contract the contract of the co

staff that managing cellphone usage has become quite a challenge in the current school environment. Cellphones have proliferated in a big way in our society and people younger and younger are getting cellphones. I think I had my first cellphone in grade 9, but I am hearing students much younger than that who are having cellphones and bringing them to school. The reality is there are more cellphones around and they're causing a distraction, and a post to mention was understand the mental health inpact. not to mention we understand the mental health impact that cellphones and social media have on our students. When kids are at school we feel they should be focused on learning and that is really the driving force behind this

Why is this issue of cellphones in classrooms being talked about now as opposed to when cellphones were first a distraction in classrooms?

Different provinces have moved to having a policy position over the last several months. This is something that I have been thinking about since the fall. I met with every single publicly funded school division in the province over the fall and spring and had this discussion with many of them. We canvased feedback from all of them through the Saskatchewan School Boards Association just to understand where the current policy was at with the school boards, and what they thought about it. To be honest, I was a little disappointed this wasn't more of an urgent issue through school boards in the province, and that is why I felt there was a need to act on a provincial that is why I felt there was a need to act on a provincial level. This is something that parents are talking about and when parents are concerned about it on behalf of their children and their families, I think it is something that we need to act on. Cellphones have been around for several years, but the use has proliferated and they have added a lot of convenience to our lives, but we also have to acknowledge that there are some drawbacks or negatives to having cellphones in our lives as well and certainly when it comes to young people, our community, and our province, we need to make sure there are appropriate usage guidelines especially in school so we can focus on learning.

You said you reached out to the school division directors, but has the province reached out to teachers in the classrooms and hear their experiences and thoughts? We haven't spoken to the Saskatchewan Teachers Federation (STF) formally, but I have spoken to several teachers all around the province in different communities. Where current policies were at, it was very difficult for individual teachers to enforce, because if teacher

"A" says no cellphones allowed in my classroom, but then teacher "B, C, and D" in the same school have no restrictions on cellphones then you have to be a fairly confident and strong teacher to hold your students to that standard. So from listening to teachers and principals around the province that was a real challenge with the around the province, that was a real challenge with the current policy framework. Some teachers were saying they wanted no cellphones in their classroom, but that it is so difficult to enforce when other teachers in the same school are allowing cellphones in the classroom. I think this provides a minimum standard of where we should be at with cellphone usage around the province.

When you formulate a new policy like this what is the process? Do you start with engaging with the school divisions or do you start with looking at what other provinces have done? What is the starting point for

coming up with a new policy like this?

With the age of politics of where we are at right now, people think that policy development is this very nebulous thing that is done in some far away place, but it comes down to talking with teachers and parents and

it comes down to talking with teachers and parents and hearing from them saying cellphone usage is a problem. I spent a fair bit of time driving around the province thinking about what we can do about cellphones then talking to education professionals around the province and obviously ministers in other provinces were also thinking about this and moved onto policies so you have discussions at a caucus level and cabinet level to ask if this is something others have also been hearing about in different communities and when it is being talked about then I work with officials in my ministry to formulate a then I work with officials in my ministry to formulate a policy proposal, we go to caucus, we go to cabinet, and

at the end of the day we come forward with this policy, at the end of the day we come forward with this policy, certainly engaging through the process with teachers and school divisions over the last several months. It really is a much more grass roots process than I think a lot of people just assume, and some of the best policy ideas brought forward to my colleagues and government officials honestly come from discussions at the doorstep. discussions with people at different community events, and understanding the problems that we're all facing and how do we address that.

How do you implement a policy like this? Do you just send it directly to all the school divisions?

We are requiring all 27 school divisions to have a formal policy restricting cellphone usage during class time in their classrooms. We're going to be working with all 27 school divisions, public, Catholic, and Francophone to make sure that they have that policy ready to go for September and making sure that they have a way to enforce that

Thad the opportunity to tour several classrooms around the province—this is already happening in several classrooms and schools around the province. I remember being in Lloydminister for example there was a box by the front door of the classroom and every student put their cellphone in the box, came into the class, sat down, and focused on their work. Then on their way out they picked their cellphone up out of the box on their way out of the classroom.

That is a very reasonable approach under the policy and certainly where we are trying to get to in terms of putting the phone away and focus on what the teacher is saying so every student can get the most out of school.





need. "I've taken my dog up there a few times," said Mayor Ron Reed. "It's nice for them to have somewhere that they can go off leash and run around. A lot of people have been, in the past, using the ball diamonds, which isn't ideal. You have to make sure that people are picking up after animals, but this will take that risk away."

The new dog park is on the east side of Arthur Street across from the baseball dia-

arounds. It's also connected to the current walking trails already in place.

Aside from the parking and general tidying up Strandlund mentioned, all that's left from the town to do now is to install signage and have an official dog park bylaw on the books.

"We're working with lawyers as far as getting the dog park bylaw in place," Reed said. "But it's open for use."

Kahkewistahaw breaks ground on new fire hall, O&M building

There's a piece of land just north of the Chief Joseph Crowe Governance Centre on the Kahkewistahaw First Nation that's been cleared. Black dirt, plus the odd tree root and rock or two can be seen, but not much else . . .

The piece of land will soon be bustling with activity as construction on the Kahkewistahaw Fire Hall and Opera-

construction on the Kahkewistahaw Fire Hall and Operation & Maintenance building begins.

"In the next few weeks, Wright Construction will pull in their stuff and put piles in the ground, and away they go," Chief Evan Taypotat said moments before speakers took to the podium at last week's groundbreaking ceremony on the site.

"Come of the grees on the 120 million dellar project."

Some of the specs on the \$30 million dollar project include 10 bays on the O&M side, plus two for the fire hall. Hydraulic lifts capable of hoisting a semi will make maintenance and repair work much easier as well.

maintenance and repair work much easier as well.

"It was really important to build this because right now, our operation and maintenance guys are down in the valley," Chief Taypotat explained. "That's where our graders are, our semis, our backhoes. It's a really old, ugly building. Our fire department, which is really a world-class fire department, they need something because they're in an old, outdated building as well."

Chief Taypotat says the decigion to combine both fire

Chief Taypotat says the decision to combine both fire hall and O&M operations under one roof sets the stage for continued development in the area as further plans will be taking shape in the coming years.

"We started about 18 months ago deciding what the community needed next," said Chief Taypotat, noting the community had just finished building their governance centre in 2022. "It was this or a hockey rink and community centre. But this one won over right now, because the hockey rink we use is Ochapowace's rink, and our gover-nance centre is our community centre. Once this building starts, we're going to start planning for a hockey rink and community centre.

The nearly five acre footprint for the new building will also mean installing new utility lines, plus decommissioning the old fire hall once the new

structure is complete. Initially, there were three possible locations for the new buildthree possible locations for the new build-ing before choosing the final site. Chief Taypotat noted a lot of planning through several meetings over the past year and a half, pointing out that "any time we are adding something like this, it's not just by accident." Construction projects like this are also about leaving a legacy for fu-ture generations and ensuring well-built facilities will serve community members. "To build something like this and get

"To build something like this and get something like this, that's one thing our council agreed upon is no more second class stuff for our citizens," he said. "Our constituents deserve the best as do constituents anywhere else

Dignitaries break ground

A jovial shout of "dig deep—dig right to China!" was heard as dignitaries donned hardhats and simultaneously collected a shovel full of soil each. The symbolic gesture marked the mid-point of the project, closing 18 months of planning and beginning 18 further months of construction

While both the firehall and O&M op erations will have their own stand-alone spaces, there will be certain shared ser-

rices such as laundry, showers, and change rooms. There is one shared situation that Fire Chief Stan Bobb is looking forward to ending, though—one that plagues the 17 firefighters in their current abode.

"As you may or may not know our current situation, the fire hall's in the old O&M shop and we share it with about 800 pigeons right now," Bobb joked. "We're hoping that we can leave them there and move over to our new building!" building!

building!"

During his opening remarks, Chief Taypotat spoke of the importance in having facilities and equipment that are safe for people to utilize.

"Leadership agrees that we should have first class, first rate facilities, and this is going to be the best of the best. The reason why we're doing this is because those buildings are old and outdated, and no-one should be working in those types of spaces," he said. "I always talk about the 'Blue People' I call them, the Blue People of our First Na-

tion. That's the Fire Department, that's the O&M guys; the Blue People of our First Nation are the ones that are in the trenches and we're doing this building for them." Chief Taypotat also referenced other construction happening at Kahkewistahaw First Nation, including 15 housing units and the Elder's Building, which should be finished this month.

finished this month.

"It's always about putting the Tetris of everything together, so that it fits properly with financing and revenue streams," he said. "This building behind us is a \$30 million dollar building. We hope that once this build is done—February, 2026—that spring/summer, the hockey rink and community centre is going to be next."

O&M Manager Les Sparvier was grateful to all levels involved in the project, telling the crowd that the plans included everything he was hoping to see.
"Our community is growing, so it's a much needed addition to the O&M operations," he said. "Thank you for everyone who was involved, and we look forward to the finished building."

everyone who was involved, and we look forward to the finished building."

The Saskatoon architect company AODBT was tapped again for this project, continuing their relationship with Kahkewistahaw that started back in 2018 when planning began on the governance centre. They're known for designing such works as the Wanuskewin Heritage Park in Saskatoon, the Woodland Wellness Centre in Lac La Ronge, and the Dakota Dunes Resort on Whitecap Dakota First Nation.

kota First Nation. "Working with Chief and Council, I always talk about the PMT meetings where they're full of jokes, people are engaged, and that's such a key part to delivering a project." said Dustin Braun, an architect with AODBT. "We were very excited in 2023 to begin working with Kahkewistahaw on the O&M Fire Hall.

"We kept hearing the requests of the community." Braun continued. "We kept going back to Chief and Council, and what we kept getting was, 'we want it to be right for the people', and in the end, I think we're going to deliver a project that is going to be right for the people."

On the construction side, Wright Construction will be

bringing their equipment on site shortly.
"This is our second project with your first nation, and we are very honoured to first nation, and we are very honoured to have another opportunity to work with you," said company president Lorne Wright. "During our first project, we were warmly welcomed, and had the privilege of integrating ourselves into your community. Through this experience, we learned about and gained an appreciation of your rich culture and traditions. We've been moved by the strength and unity of your nation." and unity of your nation."

Councillor Micheal Bob—whose port-

Councillor Micheal Bob—whose port-folio on Council includes O&M—spoke of the positive growth the new project will bring to the community. "The fire department was very small, they didn't have much, they were in a small building—if we had a building," he recalled of those early days of the fire ser-vices when equipment was stored when vices, when equipment was stored wher-ever they could find some room. "Over the years, we've had smaller buildings for our Fire Department and our O&M. I always wanted to see something where they could have a good building to function and to provide the service to our people. That's the number one thing: providing service to our people."

Moosomin Rodeo committee honours Angus Turpie

The Moosomin Rodeo grounds is renamed after local family in honour of Angus Turpie

The Moosomin Rodeo Committee honored the Turpie family at the Bulls and Broncs rodeo July 13, with the announcement they are renaming the rodeo grounds after Angus Turpie.

The Turpie family owns a family farm

just south of Moosomin, and family members say Angus was driven by family, agriculture, and community.

Keith Turpie and Diane Jamieson say the family is honoured by their dad and family's recognition at the rodeo grounds in Moosomin.

"He was very community minded and always had been," Turpie said. "He wanted to help. He wanted to see things get done. He wanted to see Moosomin grow. He was very focused on agriculture, that was a big deal for him and his family." Turpie says the family has owned the

land for decades, purchasing the land after his grandpa was a guard working at the Moosomin Jail years ago. "My grandpa, Angus' dad, was a guard at the jail when there was a provincial jail in Moosomin. The provincial jail closed in '48 and the option for my grandpa was to go to Regina, but grandpa proposed to them—instead of taking that option—if he could

'At that time they were living straight At that time they were riving straight south of here," Jamieson explains. "They lived where the fir trees are and then he just walked to work at the jail." Turpie adds, "So they lived there for

about a year then the jail came up for sale. So dad, his two brothers, and grandpa they were able to purchase it on condition that the jail was to be torn down, demolished.

They told us stories of it being demolished. They blew it up with dynamite and bricks would come flying off close to the house and down to the barnyard, and still the odd time you can find bricks that's worked its way through."

Jamieson says there is a coat of arms at

the family farm from the provincial jail.

"He wanted to leave it as a historical site,

but they wouldn't allow it so what is left

that was all they would leave."

Turpie says his dad, two uncles, and grandpa worked together on the farm, building it to what is it today. "They built up the farm over the years. They never had a loan until '93 when we started PMU. That was the first loan they ever had and purchased land. Just three brothers and grandpa working together."

The family farm started small. "They literally started with one cow. They bought the cow from Redvers. There were stock yards over by the buildings they're putting up by the tracks, and they bought the cow and her calf there. She got out during the night and went all the way back to Redvers. They had to take the horse and bring them back. Unbelievable the stories they told."

Family dedicated

The Turpie family donated land to the town for recreational development.

"As far as we were told was in the '70s they donated part of the recreation area where everything is now, for town expansion," Jamieson said.

expansion," Jamieson said.

"There used to be old sports grounds north of the highway, by the cemetery, and part of the deal that the Department of Highways offered—when they tore those sports grounds down the town had to buy other land for it," Turpie said. "We always thought that the land where the Communicients is 2nd Don and Lawrence. Communiplex is, Dad, Don, and Lawrence donated it, just the original square where the Communiplex was built."

The Turpies also provided land where

The furples also plovided that where the Southeast Integrated Care Centre now stands. "They did the same with the hospital. They sold it at assessed value which was basically the bare minimum for that piece of land," Jamieson explained. "They provided the land to help the community." community.

Turpie adds, "They wanted to see things grow. Dad was a big force behind the hospital, it was very important to him. He wanted to see it happen.
"It was probably similar with the sports grounds, he just wanted to see it happen.
They didn't depart the wheal thing by

They didn't donate the whole thing by any means, but sold it at a reduced rate and part they did donate just to make sure it happened. They were very reasonable, they wanted to see things move forward in Moosomin."

in Moosomin."

Turpie says he remembers helping build posts for the rodeo grounds when it first was built. "When those rodeo grounds were built, we helped put posts in one night. It wasn't rodeo grounds originally. It was for 4H and gymkhana and then I don't know what was it switched over to rodeo but it. vear it switched over to rodeo, but it

year it switched over to rodeo, but it has been improved. Gordon Gibson I think spearheaded it getting it going for gymkhana and the 4H club."

Jamieson says the Moosomin Rodeo committee contacted her in February to let the family know their plans to honor Angus. "Bobby Stevens called in about February and asked for permission to do it. Then they called again about a week before the rodeo. We weren't for sure until a week before the rodeo whether it was even happening." even happening."

Heartwarming feelings

Turpie and Jamieson say the recognition for their dad at the rodeo grounds is a

humbling feeling.

"It is pretty special. Dad would be pretty proud to see it." Jamieson said.
"It is pretty humbling," Turpie said.
"It should be known—his name is out there, but my mon, Irene, and my uncle, Donald—with dad being so busy—had to pick up the slack on the farm. Their names stand to make the property of aren't up there, but just to point out they did so much. They were at home working the land. Mom was a definite farm wife working the tractor and everything so when dad was away they were responsible. They should have recognition as well."

Jamieson says being presented with the sign in honour of her dad was heartwarming that night at the rodeo.

"It was pretty emotional that night. It was a huge honour. It was very nice of the rodeo committee to think of us and do that for our family. It was a great honour."

Fire department has gained reputation for its search

and rescue expertiseDeputy Fire Chief Clinton Bobb points to a multi-coloured bar attached to the left breast pocket on his formal firefighter

"These are Government of Canada med-als issued for community service, long service, fire service," he explained, adding that he also has some from his military service. "These are for 20 years' service, but most of us have like 25 or 28 years. So at

most of us have like 25 or 28 years. So at 30 years, you get a little pin that goes right onto the medal itself."

For the Bobb family, being a firefighter is in their blood. From nine brothers, eight have taken their firefighter training and seven are still active on the department. "We are third generation now into our fire department," says a proud Stan Bobb. "We work side by side with our children and now our grandchildren. It is amazing, and it's a legacy we hope will continue!"

There's also keen interest from the younger generation to serve as firefighters, some even participating at the hall

ers, some even participating at the hall through a cadet program where they re-

ceive training.

"In order for us to have a succession plan, we need to introduce that to our plan, we need to introduce that to our young people. I'm proud to say that we have a number of young people on our team, we are preparing for them to take over. And I tell you what, for them to work out of a first class building is something that they deserve," Stan said. "We look forward to moving into the new building. It's state of the art. We've toured a facility in Saskatoon that will have many of the same features that we will have out here. same features that we will have out here. We're very pleased that we'll be sharing the building with O&M, and it's some thing that we really look forward to."

One thing that sets the Kahkewistahaw Fire Department apart is their drone team, which is often called to communities all over Saskatchewan.

"We provide more than just fire services to our community—that was our initial mandate—but the question that our team has always asked is, 'what else can we do?' From there, we moved into medical services, which we started out with just basic First Aid, and for at least nine years now, we've had first responders as part of our service; we've also branched off into a drone team," Stan said. "We have federally licensed pilots, and we assist in search and rescues, missing persons all the way from way up north in Red Earth down to Carlyle, White Bear, and way over to

Nekaneet by Maple Creek."

Through their role in assisting search and rescue efforts by drone, the Kahkewistahaw team have built a reputation in the

provincial firefighting community.
"It's quite an area; it's the whole province, basically," Stan continued. "And you know, I'm very proud to say that our drone

team, they've gained a reputation for the ability to just produce. We have never turned down requests for assistance, and our Chief and Council again have been

supportive of that."
The Yorkton Tribal Council has assisted the Kahkewistahaw FN Fire Department with training, and assistance in events such as mock disaster preparation. A recent example took local firefighters to some very remote areas on the first nation.

"We put two people out there some-where in the wilderness, and it was up to the search and rescue team to locate them," Stan explained, adding that the team was given some information such as last known location and circumstances relating to the individuals participating in the exercise. "We are very proud to say that within three hours, the drone team and the ground crew were able to locate the missing people."

The training exercise highlighted the importance of continued, regular training sessions for the team

"Hand in hand with that is now the search and rescue portion of our training, and we have a number of team members who are certified, and we are in the process of certifying more," Stan said. "We always look to improve, and partnerships are very important. We work very well with the Broadview Fire Department, we work well with EMS, we work well with Whitewood Fire Department, and STARS Air ambulance. We've landed STARS in our community on numerous occasions to assist with critical incidents. So it's just to assist with critical includes. So it is just a matter of keeping the ball rolling, never being satisfied with where you are and being able to ask what else could we need? What else could we do?"

Equipment upgrades on the horizon

An important factor for fire departments across the province is ensuring they fall within the minimum standards guide--a challenge for smaller communities who have been relying on used trucks and turnout gear as a means to get by.

"We've been there and done that, and we have gratitude for anyone who's helped us along our way," Stan said. "One of the brightest parts of this whole project is that we did an assessment on the state of our equipment, and a lot of it is due for replacement. Hand in hand with the new hall will come the opportunity for proper funding for updated equipment. It's a win/win situation for the fire department, for the community and for the whole

Chief Taypotat agreed, reiterating the importance of the firefighters' ability to safely do their work.

"We have a really good volunteer fire department that goes above and beyond, and we're excited to get them this new building because they deserve it," he said.

Paying for the new building will take some time as some money was received through Indigenous Services Canada (\$1.5 million), but the bulk will be covered via a 25-year loan.

25-year loan.
"Economically, we're always trying to add businesses," said Chief Taypotat. "So then if you can add that, it's a revenue stream to pay for the loan."

Ultimately, breaking ground on the new site is about a dream coming to fruition—one that will support future generations in the community.

"It's a day that's been long, long coming," Stan said. "Our Chief and Council have been very supportive of our team, and they have given us all the tools we needed, whenever we've requested them. The last thing that we really needed was a proper building. This certainly is a dream come true."



Bekevar wind project part of major plans to increase wind and solar

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER The construction phase of the Bekevar Wind Energy Project near Kipling is nearing completion and will soon be contributing power to the provincial grid. Once finished, 36 wind turbines will have been ssembled and ready to produce energy by year end.

"The plan is for that facility to be online
by the end of the year providing power to
the grid," explained SaskPower spokesperson Joel Cherry. "Out of a 200 megawatt project, you expect the capacity to
be about 40 per cent. So, it's not the same as a 200 megawatt gas plant, for example, where you can get the maximum out

whenever you want."
SaskPower uses that 40 per cent number as a factor over the life of a facility contributing cost-effective, clean energy to the

greater power supply.

"We look at the grid kind of being like a pool," Cherry explained. "So each of the facilities that we have on the system—whether that's a wind farm, or a solar facilities that we have some the system—whether that's a wind farm, or a solar facility as a solar facility as a solar facility as a solar facility. facility, or a natural gas plant, or a hydro facility, for example—they all kind of add

water to the same pool."

Despite wet and windy conditions through spring and summer, the Bekevar project remains on track for meeting construction goals.

struction goals.

"We are targeting the start of energy production later in August," said Michael Capaldo, Vice-President of Construction and Engineering with Innagreen Investments, the company building the project. Capaldo also noted during peak construction at Bekevar, around 250 people were employed at the construction site.

In addition to the wind turbines being constructed, 18 km of new road has also been included, with 3.5 km becoming municipal roads. Under the soil, a network of

nicipal roads. Under the soil, a network of 106 km of medium-voltage cables connecting the turbines are included in construc-

SaskPower planning for major increases in wind and solar

Wind and solar
Currently, wind energy makes up 11 per cent of the overall power mix in Saskatchewan, contributing 617 MW to the total generating capacity of 5,355 MW. Solar power accounts for about two per cent (95 MW), but those numbers are expected to climb with some ambitious targets coming over the next decade.

over the next decade.

"We're looking at adding up to 3,000 megawatts of wind and solar generation by 2035, which is pretty significant," Cherry said. "Our entire capacity of all the resources on the system right now is only around 5,000 megawatts, so that's a sig-



nificant increase.

In addition to that jump in green energy reliance, Cherry pointed to an ultimate target of reaching 'net zero' by the 2050s, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions by at least 50 per cent from 2005 levels within six years

"Wind is definitely cost effective," Cher-ry stated. "It's not exposed to the federal carbon tax. So when we burn coal or natu-ral gas, there's the cost of the fuel, but then there's also the carbon tax on top of that. When it comes to wind power, the fuel is the wind itself, and there's no tax on it. Generally, it's our lowest cost option for generating power. If we could generate all of our power from it, it would be very cost

effective." For now, wind and solar energy are a complement to the larger energy producers. Natural gas still reigns supreme at 39 per cent of generating capacity (2,065 MW), followed by coal at 24 per cent (1,281 MW), and hydro at 21 per cent (1,155 MW). With a federal government mandate to retire coal by 2030, there's a real crunch to roll out alternative sources. to roll out alternative sources

to roll out alternative sources.

Conversations are also ongoing regarding nuclear energy, with two possible sites being considered in the Estevan area for a small modular reactor, and the Elbow area also being considered. According to Sask-Power's SMR projections, actual site prep is not planned to happen until at least 2030, but they are interested in the GE-Hitachi BWRX-300 boiling water reactor with each unit capable of producing 300 MW.

"We've shared our concerns with that

because for us to replace all of our fossil fuel facilities with non-emitting generation, and especially for that period of time, it's just not possible in terms of logistics and cost and we just don't have the technology here." Cherry remarked.

Another factor is the extreme tempera-

Another factor is the extreme temperature shifts in the province, combined with increasing draws on that energy grid.

"We came within about 14 megawatts of our summer record just recently on July 11," Cherry said. "With the heat really cranking up here the next couple days, I wouldn't be surprised if we got close to a summer record again. So it's because the province is growing too, and more the province is growing, too, and more and more, we're going to see more things electrifying, too—more and more electric wehicles and other aspects of industry are going to be electrified—so we'll need to accommodate that, too."

Wind facilities seem to be popping up all over the south, which is the most favourable part of Saskatchewan for wind. In 2022, a pair of facilities were constructed near the communities of Assiniboia and Herbert, expected to add 375 MW to the grid. The Bekevar project will contribute a further 200 MW once online (enough to power 10,000 homes across the province), plus a further 400 MW is expected to be produced from a pair of wind power projects currently in the planning stage for south central Saskatchewan.

Natural gas projects will also see more

Natural gas projects will also see more energy produced through two projects currently under construction—the Great Plains Power Station in Moose Jaw (377 MW) and the Aspen Power Station near Lanigan (370 MW).

"It's a pivotal time for the province," Cherry concluded.

Scheffler's Olympic gold ends all POY arguments

After Xander Schauffele won the Open championship at Troon for his second major championship of 2024, the major conversation among golf insiders was about PGA Tour Player of the Year.

The debate percolated for a couple of weeks—does Schauffele's two majors trump Scottie Scheffler's six victories, including the Masters, the Players and the Memorial—or was Scheffler's sterling record enough to give him the POY title.

It was a legitimate argument for a couple of weeks, but it ended abruptly in Paris when Scheffler roared back to win the Olympic gold medal with a final round nine-under-par 62 while Schauffele, who was tied for the lead entering the final round, faded to a tie for ninth with a two-over-par 73.

Ladies and gentlemen, let us introduce you to the Player of the Year—Scottie Scheffler.

When you consider Schauffele has finished in the top 10 in 13 of his 19 tournaments this year, and has gone 52 events in a row without missing the cut (dating back to the Masters in 2022), his POY credentials were certainly solid. Most years, the player of the year winner is obvious. And going into the Open Championship, the runaway leader was Scheffler. But Schaffele's win muddied the water until Scheffler abruptly ended the debate with his victory in

Schauffele may still have a whisker of an outside chance.

There are two playoff events to be played in August, along with the Tour Championship for the Fed-Ex Cup Aug. 29-Sept. 1. Schauffele running the table on those last three events could give him the title, but winning all three is unlikely. But let's say Schauffele wins the first playoff event and Scheffler takes the second one. If that were the case, the Player of the Year would be the one who won the Fed

Ex Cup.

Twenty years ago, this award had almost an automatic winner: Tiger Woods was POY 11 times in a 17-year period. If Scheffler were to win in 2024, that would give him three in a row and create more talk of elevating him to Woods'

Who will win the honour this year has been the popular topic on various golf sites since Schauffele thrust himself into the conversation at Troon. One wise guy predicted the

winner would be someone whose name started with 'Sch'. Another said Bryson DeChambeau winning the other major title this year (the U.S. Open) prevented a 'Grand Schlam.' All joking aside, other than a bonus from their equipment companies for winning the POY, there is nothing at stake except the honour involved. For a while after the Open, the discussion was lively, and legitimate. But the gold medal in Paris probably clinched the third consecutive Player of the Year for Scheffler. Pretty hard to beat one major, one gold medal and five other titles, including the Players and Memorial. morial.


