"Whenever a Shrine patient goes in for an appoint-ment, all of the travel expenses are paid for by the pro-vincial organization and all of the medical treatment that they get is taken care of by the Shrine hospitals which the provincial clubs donate to as well.






Association of Churches holds Annual Community Service in historic church

Sask recruiting health care workers from other provinces

That's where there's a finite amount of people to fill these very important positions, highly trained individu-als who we are very grateful for having in our province, working in the healthcare portfolio, and we just simply can't find enough of those people as quickly as we would like

We are again hopeful that through the recruitment incentives that we have a new permanent full-time posi-tion we have created, with some of the recruitment being done by the Health Recruitment Agency. Following up on some of the previous work that has been done in the Philippines and elsewhere, continuing to look for each and every worker in our province that is interested in working health care and trying to find them a position in a facility. Whether it is full time—and some aren't, some are looking for part time positions for a variety of reasons—but making sure that we really leave no stone unturned when it comes to this. Adding more training

seats, 550 more training seats this fall, 18 different health-care designations. We know we're not going to see the care designations. We know we're not going to see the benefits of that for a few years depending on what that profession might be and how long the training is for that particular profession. That being said, we are seeing the benefits of some of the previous expansions that we've done in the earlier years, for example for a combined lab and x-ray tech, we have expanded some training in that regard and we are seeing more graduates come through that program. We are trying to make sure that we do this as quickly as we can so that the people can have the health care in their communities that they need and de-serve. serve.

When you look at this whole recruitment initiative, do you look at it and say okay, this is working, the more time we give it the more it will work, we got it cased, or is it a case where even more needs to be done to solve the issue?

I would say it's always continuous improvement, we I would say it's always continuous improvement, we are always looking at our various programs. What is it we are doing to try to recruit, but also repay health care workers in our province, we need to continue to do that. As an example, the rural position incentive program which had been in place for a number of years, we made some adjustments to that this spring in the budget by in-creasing the amount of funds available in that particular incentive up to \$200 000 for five years now. Initially that program bad been working year year program had been working very well, but you are al-ways looking at how do you best meet the needs of those that are looking to work in health care knowing that it is very competitive, not just in our country but elsewhere

very competitively to the they are in high demand right across the globe I would say. For us we are always looking at what is working and what can we do to make sure we continue to be com-petitive here in our province when it comes to training, retaining and recruiting health care workers.





Sask delegation preparing for national health care worker recruitment

The Saskatchewan Healthcare Recruitment Agency (SHRA) and the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) will kick off its first National Health Care Recruitment Tour later this month to promote employment opportunities, benefits and incentives available in the province.

"As part of our recruitment efforts, we will continue to promote our province as the great place it is, offering a lower cost of living, excellent wages and benefits, plus strong health care teams and wonderful communities to join," Health Minister Everett Hindley said. "With the health care career opportunities and incentives in place, there has never been a better time to consider a move to Saskatchewan." The newly established SHRA, led by CEO Erin Brady, will be joining SHA recruiters for the first time to meet with health care professionals, students and post-secondary institutions in Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfound-

land from September 22 to October 6. "I look forward to being a part of the team to recruit professionals from various in-demand health-care occupations to meet current and future resourcing needs, as well as showcase Saskatchewan," SHRA CEO Erin Brady said.

Current trends indicate young adults, families and new graduates are interested in moving to or returning to Saskatchewan due to the many advantages the province has to offer including more affordable living, opportunities for full-time employment and higher health care wages.

somin community is that people pull together, they try to do the best thing for their neighbors," he said. "If you've ever been to Unity, there's a sign that says 'God smiles on peo-la that live in Unity' and ple that live in Unity,' and I think that's what really

happened here." "Every time we had a problem in Moosomin, someone would say 'we can solve that,' whereas in other places, someone would say 'that's not our problem you fix it.' Well, it's not something that can be fixed by a board or by an owner, it has to be fixed internally.

Funk said Bridge Road is open to the possibility of investing into future devel-opments in the community.

"We're always interest-ed in a community that's strong," he said. "Moving forward, if we

continue to draw people here, there is a going to be growth, whenever you have a hub, it's going to draw more people. "Anyone from this re-gion who doesn't want to

go to Regina or Saskatoon or Brandon, is going to say they want to be here, in

Being able to turn over the ownership of Pipe-stone Villas to Bridge Road Developments was very rewarding, said Wayne Beckett, who served as president of the Pipestone Villas board until the pur-

"It feels really good, the satisfying part is that it's going to be a smooth and seamless transition," Beckett said.

"Because Bridge Road has been a part of this since day one, the tenants know of them, and they're wellreceived in a lot of similar

communities. "Between Bridge Road being part of it and it carrying on with the staff, in-cluding Bernie and Brad (Nosterud), it will make the transition almost seam-

Beckett spoke about why the original investors of Pipestone Villas decided to sell their ownership.

"There was never a target, but most of the investors were at the age where it wasn't a 20 year plan, it was 10 years or less," he said


