Moosomin leads growth according to health numbers

Saskatchewan Health Covered Population numbers for 2023 show continued growth in southeast Saskatchewan, with the community of Moosomin leading the way in growth across the region.

The number of active Saskatchewan health cards in the Moosomin Region is 17,611 in 2023, up 200 from 2022, and

up 812 or 4.83 per cent from the total of 16,799 in 2012, according to Saskatchewan Health.

Moosomin has showed the most growth in health card numbers over the last 12 years, growing from 2,961 to 3,302, an increase of 341 or 11.52 per cent.

The other larger communities in the region all showed some growth as well, according to the Saskatchewan

Health numbers.

Esterhazy grew by 83 or 2.76 per cent from 3,013 to 3,096 over the last 12 years. Redvers grew by 66 or 4.88 per cent, from 1,354 to 1,420 over the last 12 years, and Kipling grew by 64 or 5 per cent over the last 12 years, from 1,279 to 1,343.

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Campbell tells council food share usage way up

Moosomin Food Share has gone from 18 to 43 food hampers in less than a year

Food Share plans new Community Fridge

Samantha Campbell of the Moosomin Food Share told Moosomin town council at their last meeting that the Food Share is seeing a lot more demand over the last few months, and is looking to set up a Community Fridge where people can leave food for those in need.

"I can't release publicly who gave us this but I did receive a grant for \$20,000 to put a Community Fridge here in Moosomin," Campbell told council members.

"I don't know if you're familiar with community fridges—they do have them in the city. Basically it's a shed that is insulated and shingled, that has a fridge, a freezer and some pantry space. Basically it's for if you have extra zucchini, you put it in the fridge and if someone is in need of that zucchini, they can go and grab that zucchini out of the fridge.

"My reasoning for this is that at the food share we used to do 18 hampers a month and we're up to 43 a month.

"It has way more than doubled in a few months. So this is a way to help relieve people during trying times that need a little extra help. It's a community thing, so everyone can access it with no obligations whatsoever. I was planning on putting it behind our building—we have the room. But because it's a community fridge I wanted to double check with the town.

"The shed will contain a fridge, freezer and shelving, so if you had something like canned tomatoes you could put it in there."

Council members told Campbell that as long as the shed is 100 square feet or smaller, it will not require a building permit.

She said the Food Share is planning to add a shed for the Community Fridge because the building is out of space.

"We use the back storage area for our extra seasonal stuff. Honestly we were considering buying the liquor store building because they thought we'd never fill our

space and now it's beyond full. It's not big enough for what we can hold."

One benefit of the Community Fridge, Campbell said, is that people can simply access the fridge without going through the food bank, saying she believes some people would rather remain completely anonymous if they need to access food assistance.

"They're really popular in the city. I've talked to people who have used and dropped off stuff."

Campbell said everything for the shed will be purchased as locally as possible.

"Everything is being bought locally. We bought Co-op lumber, Jeannot will do the electrical, and the appliances are being bought at Zaylie's.

"My question is if you guys are ok with it being back there and can I count on you guys to remove the snow so it's accessible?"

mand for the food bank developed very quickly this year. "There's a reason and it's that people are struggling.

"From February to now we've gone from 18 hampers to 43. It has skyrocketed."

"When I was there at the barbecue I got a tour of the building and what you have. Are you keeping up with the stock?" Councillor Murray Gray asked.

"There was a pretty decent stock there at the time."

"No," said Campbell. "November and December is our usual busy time of people donating but we have not had any food drives lately come in and we've been buying all of the groceries. People are not donating because times are tough and they need it to buy their own groceries.

"We're okay so far. Before we could give out a little bit extra, but now we're slowly putting back what's going in the cupboards. I like to do the fresh produce and fresh vegetables, things like that, because I don't think cookies and stuff are as essential. So we're buying fresh produce and vegetables. It quickly adds up, especially when you're at 43 hampers. Then we also have the backpack program for kids."

Campbell was asked what the cost of the hampers is each month.

"We're doing 43 hampers and one hamper would probably be about \$300.

"They get bread, milk, eggs and every month they get a bin with a few cans of soup, a box of cereal or pancakes and a dessert, juice, coffee or tea. Then you get two meats that are frozen, so chicken or beef or something, you get canned tuna or ham. Or you'll get perogies and sausage one month—we try to give them meals. Then you have frozen vegetables and all of that."

Council told Campbell the town will do whatever they can to help with the Community Fridge project.

New businesses in the community: New fitness centre, sports retail store, and flower shop in Moosomin

The owner of a new fitness facility in Moosomin—Iron Prairie Strength Lab—told members of the Moosomin Chamber of Commerce about the new business in town, at last Tuesday's monthly meeting.

"I'm the owner and coach of Iron Prairie Strength Lab," said Jill Dowling to Chamber members. "We offer a style of fitness called functional fitness, it's a combination of gymnastics, weight lifting and conditioning."

"Our goal is to build a broad level of fitness to improve your overall quality of life. "Something that I love about this fitness style is that it doesn't matter what your skill level is, it doesn't matter what your fitness level is, everything can be modified to try to meet you where you're at."

"On Saturday Sept. 23 is our grand opening event, it will be running from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. It's family friendly, we're going to start with a pancake breakfast in the morning and Crate House will be providing snacks in the afternoon."

The centre will offer personal fitness coaching, commercial gym use, and group fitness classes.

Jill and her husband, Spencer, moved to Moosomin at the beginning of 2020.

Since their move, Dowling has been offering fitness classes to people in the community from her home, and decided to expand her business by opening a fitness centre in Moosomin.

"It's different from a conventional gym where you come to classes, this is a big open space. We don't have machines, we use dumbbells and barbells, you are the machine," said Dowling.

"It's a different style of fitness, it's fun because in the classes you are a part of a fitness community. I really encourage people to drop in and come see what it's all about."

New sports store in Moosomin

Moosomin Sports Excellence, a new sports equipment store, is planned to open in town by October 1.

The new business will be located in the former government liquor store building in town, on South Front Street.

On behalf of the new owner of the store, Tyler Thorn told Chamber members the different types of items Moosomin Sports Excellence will be selling.

"Angela Hales will be the owner operator, and managing partner of the new sports store," said Thorn.

"About two years ago, my sister-in-law Randi did a survey about shopping local and I think the very last question asked what we're missing in town for retail."

"About 55 per cent of the responses said sporting goods and shoes. This started two years ago because of that. We first needed a building, and when the old liquor store building went up for sale, we bought it."

"The second thing we needed was someone who wanted to be in the sporting goods business, Angela and her husband Jeff had an interest in that."

"Then the third thing we needed was someone who knew what they were doing in sporting goods, and we went out and found some folks from Portage la Prairie who own a sporting goods store there."

Thorn spoke about the different items the store will be selling once it is opened.

"Hopefully by October 1 we'll have the shelves stocked. We'll sell some shoes, sporting goods, and some apparel, those will be the top three items," he said. "We'll also do some custom stuff, like customized shirts for your business."

"We'll be selling stuff for year round, obviously hockey will be a big one, but baseball, lacrosse. We'll see as we move forward and fill the store accordingly."

Why a balanced approach to energy transition is crucial for our future

In today's climate-conscious world, the term "energy transition" of ten stirs strong sentiments. The phrase has become shorthand for an urgent pivot from fossil fuels toward renewable energy sources like wind, solar, and hydroelectric power.

But as we navigate this crucial juncture in our quest for a more sustainable future, it's important to remember that transition is not the same as abrupt termination. Achieving a balanced energy transition is not only prudent but essential.

We believe it is critical to avoid inflaming the conversation with heated rhetoric and instead focus on the multifaceted complexities of our energy dilemma.

In today's rapidly changing climate landscape, there's an understandable urgency to transition to sustainable energy solutions. It's tempting to simply label the fossil fuel sector as an outdated relic.

However, this viewpoint neglects to acknowledge the complex global energy matrix in which fossil fuels still play an indispensable role.

The reality is that switching to renewable energy is not as straightforward as flipping a switch. We need to consider the nuanced infrastructure that underpins global energy supply. Projections show that by 2040, 77 percent of global energy needs will still be powered by fossil fuels.

These aren't just numbers; they're road signs indicating the magnitude of the transition we must undertake and why a balanced approach is crucial.

Alberta's oil sands, often singled out for criticism, are not just an energy source but a significant cornerstone of the Canadian economy, supporting jobs, revenue, and international trade.

An overnight exit from fossil fuels, without considering the viability of alternatives, could have profound economic ramifications, hitting everything from employment rates to governmental revenues.

Why? Because energy systems are complex beasts, intricately tied into every facet of modern life – from the cars we drive and the homes we heat to the industries that provide our jobs and the public services that underpin our society.

A sudden, uncompromising move toward renewables could introduce a host of problems: job losses in traditional energy sectors, destabilization of energy grids, and even increased energy prices that disproportionately affect lower-income communities. These socio-economic considerations can't be ignored in the race toward a greener planet.

But the value of oil and gas isn't limited to powering our cars. They are critical components in the production of countless products, from everyday plastics to essential pharmaceuticals and fertilizers. As long as these sectors remain, so will the demand for fossil fuels.

Moreover, certain sectors like aviation and heavy industry still lack viable renewable alternatives. Simply put, fossil fuels will continue to have a role, albeit a diminished one, in our near mid-term future.

Natural gas also merits a mention here. Often overlooked, it acts as a bridge fuel, emits half as much CO2 as coal, offers a cleaner alternative and can complement renewables, ensuring a smoother transition to a more sustainable future.

Prioritizing renewable energy sources is crucial, but so is optimizing the efficiency of our current energy grid. Innovations in infrastructure, such as modern pipelines, can significantly reduce environmental risks and waste.

Shifting towards renewable energy is an admirable pursuit, but it comes with considerable costs.

As we strive for a cleaner future, we must also recognize and navigate the financial challenges, especially for everyday citizens. Until renewable options reach cost parity with fossil fuels, it's vital to optimize current systems for efficiency and to minimize waste.

Let's shed the simplistic rhetoric and embrace complexity when discussing energy.

Industries and infrastructure are not static; they evolve, adapt, and find new roles over time. In our rush to brand something good or bad, we risk losing sight of the intricacies that define these systems. The fossil fuel industry still holds relevance and will continue to do so for years to come.

As we forge the path to sustainability, let's not overlook the assets we already have but instead learn to use them more wisely.

Ultimately, as we champion a sustainable future, we must base our strategies on today's realities.



Health card numbers show once again that growth is happening in the southeast

If you haven't noticed, we are in a growing area. The latest numbers from Saskatchewan Health show 3,302 active health cards in Moosomin in 2023, up about 200 from 3,109 in 2015, and up 341 from a dozen years ago, when the number stood at 2,961.

That increase of 341 represents 11.52 per cent growth over the last 12 years. That kind of growth leads the region, and is unique in rural Saskatchewan.

With Cobblestone House now open with 42 housing units, some of which will house couples, there is no doubt Moosomin's population will be up by 50 or 60 again next year. And with two new apartment buildings planned by Keller Developments, expect it to go up by another 60-80, because the only thing keeping the population from increasing more quickly right now is a lack of housing.

Justin Young, GM of Nutrien Rocanville said at the Moosomin Chamber of Commerce meeting last week that more new hires at the mine would settle in Moosomin if there was more housing—they want to settle here but we just don't have enough housing.

Other larger communities in the region are also growing. Esterhazy is up 83 or 2.76 per cent over the last dozen years, Redvers is up 66 or 4.88 per cent, and Kipling is up 64 or five per cent.

Taking a look around the area, there is little doubt the growth will continue.

In the Kipling-Kennedy area a massive new wind farm is under construction.

In Esterhazy, a massive new regional water treatment plant is under construction.

In Rocanville, a massive amount of work is going into upgrades at the Nutrien Rocanville potash mine.

In Moosomin there are multiple projects under construction right now, the \$14 million water plant expansion that will allow growth up to a population of 4,600, the \$10 million airport expansion project, a new gym, Anytime Fitness, new RM shop, new Johnston's Grain building, new Mantl building to serve the oilfield, new Sunny Transport building, and new microbrewery. Planned projects for the near future include two apartment buildings planned by Keller Developments and a cardlock and bulk fuel facility planned by the United Famers of Alberta. And in recent months

the 42-unit Cobblestone House has opened, as has Ecol Electric, a new business to the area, located in a brand new building.

By every indication, this is a growing, vibrant corner of the world.

The fact that we produce so much for export in our little area, from potash to agriculture products to energy products, to farm equipment, bodes well for the future of this area.

When the local economy is underpinned by the two largest potash mines in the world, you have a solid foundation on which to develop the local economy.

So we are seeing growth, but there is absolutely no doubt that we could see more growth, simply by building more housing.

There are areas of North America where economic development authorities are desperately trying to attract new industries to diversify their local economies.

Here we have the industries, all we have to do to see more growth is to build more housing, since some people coming to the area to work cannot always find housing where they want, so we know without any doubt that simply making that housing available will grow our population.

It's exciting to be in an area where the population is growing and investment is ramping up.

BRIDGE ROAD INVESTING IN AREA'S FUTURE

As we reported last week, Moosomin's Pipestone Villas has changed hands, with Bridge Road Developments buying shares from the local shareholders who helped get the project built and established.

While that was always a potential exit strategy for the local investors, Bridge Road's purchase shows confidence in the future of this community and this area.

The purchase is the largest single real estate transaction in Moosomin's history. It's great to see Bridge Road show such confidence in Moosomin's future.

So far, 15 residents have moved into the facility.

"We officially opened our doors on August 1. We had our first resident move in that day, and then a couple other the next day, then they've just been slowly moving in ever since," Hintz told members.

"We currently have about 15 residents spread between the three different floors.

"We offer different care levels that one might need, which allows us to offer that aging-and-place concept. Once you move in whether your needs

change while you're there, you never have to move, which is fantastic."

Hintz spoke about the details of the grand opening event.

"I wanted to talk about the grand opening we're having on Wednesday Sept. 27, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.," she said.

"We welcome everyone to come. We're going to have a barbecue, burgers, a cake, refreshments out in the parking lot.

"We are also going to be offering home tours. The doors will be open, people can just come in and wander through. If you have questions there will be lots of staff, as well as Heather and Jim who are coming, and Travis.

"There will also be live music, we did secure someone for live music."

Hintz said she hopes to see people from the community at the event.

"It's going to be really

good for our residents too, to have the community members come into our home," she said.

"It's beautiful, I can't say enough about it.

"We welcome everyone, young, old, and in between."

Construction for the new assisted living facility began in April 2022, and

had residents move in at the beginning of August this year.

Hintz said the facility has the capacity to be home to more than 42 residents.

"We have 15 people right now, we can occupy 42, plus double occupancy," she said.

"We still have a long way to go, but considering we opened up on the first of August, and 14 of those rooms we just opened up the other day, I think we're doing pretty good.

"The second level is our assisted care level and it is the most full. We have nine out of 14 rooms filled on that floor. That's definitely the need in town, we can see it right away.

"If need be, we will move that assisted care level up to the third floor as well. We have lots of room for opportunity there."

Daycare board, council discuss tax break
Board says if taxes waived, funds would go to future capital investment

Members of the Play Fair Daycare board met with Moosomin town council at the latest council meeting to discuss property taxes on the day care building.

Jalisa Miller, Samantha Campbell and Jill Jones of the day care board met with council.

"First we would just like to thank the town council for the \$1,500 per new daycare spot that you guys committed to back in May," Miller said. "This will help us with a portion of the renovations that we'll need to do to the building in order to accommodate those spots, if or when we receive those. It is very much appreciated. We are requesting a property tax exemption for our facility.

"As you are aware, property taxes alone this year for the daycare were \$21,000. This is a huge amount for any non-profit organization to have to come up with year after year. We have recently navigated a few very difficult years with Covid and now the new government funding program.

"We are really proud that we have managed to come out close to break even every year and throughout all this uncertainty we have been able to manage to do a number of upgrades to the building, we put in a new kitchen, bathroom sinks, and this summer we did flooring throughout the whole facility. The next on the list is the backyard.

"As a board it is super important for us that we continue to maintain and upgrade our building because we know how important daycare is to families in the community and for economic growth of the town as well. We have 36 infants on the wait list for 2024 and 26 already on the wait list for 2025.

"If our taxes were waived, we are proposing to take this money and set it aside in a separate account, we would use this money in the future to invest in upgrades and expansions of the facility, which at some point may result in a second daycare building.

"We are very limited on what we can pay our current staff and as a result we see a lot of turnover of staff. By using this separate fund for building maintenance and upgrades, we would be able to use this operating cash to give the staff higher wages to better support staff attraction and retention in the future.

"We have provided a list of communities in Saskatchewan that are currently receiving tax exemptions," she adds. "This information came from a survey that was done about four years ago so it is a little bit old but the list of communities is likely even larger now.

"There are also a number of childcare centers that are currently bringing forward the same request that we are tonight to their councils, and from what we've looked into even the facilities that are paying taxes especially in the local area, they are paying significantly less than we are.

"Lastly, most if not all other non-profits in Moosomin are currently receiving tax exemptions, our daycare is one the most important facilities that we have in our community, so why would we be treated any differently than the other non-profits?

"Without a daycare facility that can attract and retain employees, expand as necessary and stay current with renovations and maintenance required, the town's economic growth will be limited. The future of the town is dependant on having childcare facilities that can accommodate the development and growth in the community.

"Both the town and the daycare need to work together in order to achieve success. Our final ask is that the town help support our facility and its continued growth that is so important to our community, the same way that you have been supporting other non-profits by waiving our taxes."

Mayor Larry Tomlinson said he agrees that more daycare spaces are needed.

"I sit on the Health Care Foundation Board and this is a major problem for our nurses who are going back to work," he said. "If they can't get their kids into daycare, they can't go to work.

"I think there are four nurses right now that want to come back and can't because they don't have any child care."

Councillor Murray Gray said the Economic Development Committee has been working with the daycare board on adding spaces.

"We may have made some headway with that and then they changed the ministers again, but I still feel as though, from anybody that I've talked to, that in the ministry below the minister they realize that it's important because with everything we've added here, the number of daycare spaces that we have is the same as the number of spaces ten years ago," he says.

"We're working on trying to get those extra spaces. From an economic development standpoint it is important to add spaces. You're trying to attract new people to your community and you're trying to attract new busi-

nesses and we've got lots of other plans to add more businesses and we've got nowhere for the kids. It's hindering the growth."

"I like what you said about the money not going into general revenues how it and gets used to operate the daycare," adds Gray.

"The money that we collect as taxes is how we run the town. There's a lot of things that need to be done and there are a lot of people that come to us saying we need this, we need that. There's a lot of ask, but I think the suggestion you made tonight is good and I think that needs to be considered from our standpoint as well.

"The daycare is near and dear to my heart just because of my involvement and my nine years as chair. I am hearing a lot about it from the Economic Development side. Anyone we talk to wants to know about your school, healthcare, daycare and recreation facilities. Anybody you talk to that's talking about coming to our community—those are the four asks."

Town council has the authority to cancel taxes on properties for economic development purposes.

"In this case it really is economic development," said Gray. "It is 100 per cent. There's no gray area to that. There is no gray area to whether that is economic development or not."

The issue will be discussed again at a future town council meeting where the whole council is present. Two councillors were away from the last meeting.

Outdoor Hockey Club film wins award

Winnipeg filmmaker Randy Frykas recently won an award for his Outdoor Hockey Club videos.

Frykas was one of the three winners in the Outside Awards video category who was awarded a \$5,000USD cash prize, and will be taking part in the upcoming Warren Miller film tour.

Frykas's film featured outdoor rinks across Canada, including Moosomin's outdoor ice rink.

The ten-episode documentary series captured different outdoor rinks on scenic lakes, frozen rivers, extraordinary backyard rinks, local community clubs, and more from all across Canada.

Frykas said he was excited when he found out he won the award.

"It was a pleasant surprise to end August and come into the fall with that excitement," said Frykas.

"Honestly, I was super surprised. If you look at a lot of the content on Outside Magazine and Warren Miller films, they focus on skiing. I wasn't sure how hockey was going to fit into the mix with everything else, it's an American based company so hockey isn't as popular down there as it is here in Canada.

"The focus is more on skiing, ice climbing, more adventure related stuff, I was surprised to hear the hockey footage won, but the feedback I've heard from them since was the story was so strong, and

the characters were very compelling and the emotion and feeling was quite clear with the film.

"The judges loved it, I'm surprised, but at the same time, I'm very confident and very proud of the short film that I made."

Personal meaning behind creating the film

The video series Outdoor Hockey Club was created to capture the special moments families shared at different outdoor hockey rinks in communities across Canada.

"What I did with the short film is I went back and took some of the moments from the entire winter that I felt worked together," said Frykas.

"I wanted to convey the importance of outdoor hockey, and just being outdoors, and enjoying the love of the game. The film highlights different characters and settings from across Canada.

"Moosomin is in there a couple of times, with a couple of the folks that I met when I was there."

Aside from Moosomin, Frykas included Beaver-creek Farms near MacGregor, MB, Jeff Nash's backyard rink in Edmonton, AB, Washiyeh and Andrew Jeannotte's rink in Maniwaki, QC, Moe's backyard rink near Smiths Falls, ON, Hillcrest Community Rink in Whitehorse, YT, Lions Park Rink in Newmarket, ON, and a special season ending episode in Stonewall, MB, in his series.

Last winter, Frykas travelled across Canada to capture different outdoor hockey moments. He came to Moosomin in December 2022, to film the episode focused on Moosomin's outdoor ice rink.

"For me, sometimes it's easier to put what I want into a film instead of me saying it myself," he said.

"I feel like everyone who I met along this Outdoor Hockey Club journey so far, it felt like I knew them already just because of our love for hockey, and our love for being outdoors.

"The fact that I was able to construct how I was feeling through other people's thoughts and in their words, it was a very special connection.

"Even when I met Hadlee McMullen, the hockey player in Moosomin. That day I was pretty much ready to pack it up. I had a great day filming at the rink, and there was something inside of me where I was like maybe I should just go back to the rink to see if I could find one other person to talk to.

"I walked back to the outdoor rink, I saw Hadlee and her dad, Jesse, getting ready to skate around the trail. I walked up to them and said, 'hey this is what I'm doing, I came from Winnipeg and just wanted to see what your thoughts were on outdoor hockey, and why you're doing it.'

"Lo and behold, Hadlee is such a well spoken girl and everything she said was pretty much what I wanted Outdoor Hockey Club to symbolize.

"I look back at all of

those experiences, and my time in Moosomin, and it feels like it was yesterday, the memories are still clear and vivid.

"To put all of it together into a film memorializes it, now it's out there not only for people to see in Moosomin, but it's going to be out there in this tour.

"I just hope more people get to understand and share the message of what's so good about outdoor hockey. Also to get a bit of an educational tour, but also to meet new people and see a part of Canada."

Hopes to share the love of the game with others

Frykas was asked what he wishes people take away when watching the short film.

"In general, organized hockey gets a lot of the spotlight with the NHL, competitive hockey, the registration and tryouts, there's so much focus on that, that I feel the peer version of the game sometimes gets left in the shadows," said Frykas.


"Ultimately this film is a way to show that hockey doesn't have to be so serious. You can just grab your stick and a ball, and play road hockey with your friends or even some strangers.

"Everyone who plays hockey has done it, you can end up being on an outdoor rink or pond with

complete strangers and before you know it you're high-fiving because you scored a goal with a guy you just met.

"Outdoor Hockey Club is more focused on the pure love of the game.

Hockey is a great game, and sometimes everything around it puts some negativity that doesn't need to be there, but deep down there's a beautiful game out there that people should not forget about."

Moosomin leads growth according to health numbers

Town of Moosomin numbers up 11.5 per cent over last 12 years

Moosomin Economic Development Officer Casey McCormac says she sees evidence of growth in the area every day.

"This fits with what I'm seeing," she said. "I think that this shows that Moosomin is definitely growing even faster than the rest of the region, but it also shows that our region is overall growing as a whole."

Why does she think that is? "I think more and more people are realizing that small town living is better than big city living because the cost of living is getting so much more expensive in the cities. It's easier to live in a small town because it's a little bit cheaper but Moosomin still has all of the amenities of a big city."

What makes a difference in Moosomin? "I know that we do have a lot for the size of our town, so you can have most of the services of a city in a small town, but we also have that sense of community that you wouldn't find in a city that makes life so much better. "Everyone gets behind causes that are important to the town. Also, everyone steps up to help people, such as like when the Ukrainians were moving in here or like fundraising for East Side Playground or MacLeod's playground and stuff like that. In Moosomin you can have a lot of the services of a city, but still have that real sense of community. That's why I'm here."

McCormac said she sees a lot of potential for growth in Moosomin, noting that Justin Young, GM of Nutrien Rocanville, told the Moosomin Chamber of Commerce

Tuesday that more new hires at the mine would settle in Moosomin if they could find housing in Moosomin.

"The lack of housing has been preventing us from growing faster, but with Cobblestone House opening with 42 units, and the apartment buildings about to be built, we're starting to address that issue, and we're applying for the Housing Accelerator program.

"I think if we can build more apartments and houses in Moosomin there's huge potential for growth. We don't need to attract a new industry, we just need the houses.

"We could have so many more people—I know there's lots of people that work at the mine that want to be in Moosomin but can't because there's no room. So I think as soon as we start building the apartments and houses, more and more people will come."

Ryder Cup pressure on visiting Americans

Which side is facing more pressure this weekend as the biennial Ryder Cup — one of the most exciting events on the professional golf calendar — takes place at the Marco Simone Golf & Country Club near Rome, Italy?

Twelve golfers from the United States face 12 of the best golfers from Europe and if history repeats itself, the Europeans will win back the Cup won in 2021 by the Americans at Whistling Straits, Wis. The Yanks demolished the Europeans 19-9, but when the event is held in Europe, the Americans turn into pussycats. They haven't won on European soil since 1993.

So the Europeans have the most pressure, right? Hardly. Captain Luke Donald's team rarely, if ever, loses at home. Any team featuring Rory McIlroy, Jon Rahm, Viktor Hovland, Ludvig Aberg and Tommy Fleetwood can't possibly lose, can it?

The Americans aren't exactly fielding a team of 12 handicappers. The best golfer in the world — statistically, anyway — is Scottie Scheffler and he leads the way for captain Zach Johnson's Dangerous Dozen. But because of a few controversial choices by Johnson for his captain's selections, the pressure is on a couple of Americans to shine. Case in point: Justin Thomas. Ranked as high as seventh in the world as recently as last February, Thomas had been on a steady decline until finding his game again at the recent Fortinet Championship, where he finished fifth. Before his rebirth at the Fortinet, the two-time major champion had only one top 10 since February, and had fallen to 24th in the world rankings. But he was selected ahead of potential Ryder Cuppers Keegan Bradley and Lucas Glover because of Thomas's past performance in Ryder Cup play and reputed leadership qualities.

Cynics suggest that Thomas is on the team because he is a card-carrying member of the Old Boys Club, and other members of the 'club' — Jordan Spieth, Rickie Fowler,

Xander Schauffele, etc. — lobbied hard for his inclusion.

Anybody ranked 24th in the world can never be categorized as a terrible pick, but for a guy like Glover, who's 42 and will likely never get another crack at a Ryder Cup, his exclusion must have been heart-breaking.

If Thomas plays like a bum at Marco Simone, Johnson will be heavily criticized for the selection. Thomas's reputation as a clutch player in big events will get a big boost, however, if he performs well and garners a few points for the American side.

As for the Europeans, their only pressure is connected to home-course advantage. Not since the U.S. won at the Belfry in England in 1993 have the Europeans tasted defeat on home soil. They won at Valderrama in Spain in 1997, at the Belfry in 2002 (postponed a year because of 9/11), at the K Club in Ireland in 2006, at Celtic Manor in Wales in 2010, at Gleneagles in Scotland in 2014, and at Le Golf National in France in 2018. Now it's in Italy, and the wise money is on another European victory.
