2021 summer events roundup

Events in Southeast Saskatchewan are back this summer, with organizers in various communities excited to once again be hosting rodeos, community days, parades and so on . . .

Following is a list of some of the events in Southeast Saskatchewan that are planned for this summer in different communities in the region:

Moosomin Reopening Celebration

Moosomin • July 17

Moosomin is looking forward to having some fun on Saturday, July 17 with three events that day: The Moosomin Chamber of Commerce parade in the morning at 10 am, the Moosomin Community Market starting at 11 am and running into the afternoon, and the Moosomin Bulls and Broncs event in the evening starting at 7 pm.

The theme of this year's parade is "Goodbye to Covid/Celebrate Reopening" and anyone and everyone is free

to join in the parade to help celebrate a return to normalcy this summer!

The Moosomin Community Market runs every Saturday through the summers and will feature a number of local vendors that day.

And the Bulls and Broncs event will take the place of a full Moosomin rodeo this year with bull riding, saddle bronc and bareback riding, as well as beer gardens. The Moosomin Rodeo Committee is planning to be back with a full rodeo in 2022!

88th annual Moose Mountain Pro Rodeo Kennedy • July 24 & 25

This huge annual event, and one of the only pro rodeos in Saskatchewan, is back for the 88th year after being forced to cancel in 2020.

Organizers are excited to be back in action, and are planning to have as normal a rodeo as possible this year.

¹ Because the Moose Mountain Pro Rodeo takes place a week after the Calgary Stampede, the Moose Mountain Rodeo receives many of the same competitors as the Stampede.

The weekend will include a parade on Kennedy's main street on the Saturday starting at noon, followed by a demolition derby and trade show that day. The rodeo will start at 5 pm Saturday.

On Sunday there will be a pancake breakfast from 9 am to noon at the Kennedy Friendship Centre, a cowboy church service at 9:30 am at the rodeo grounds, and the rodeo will start at 2 pm that day.

This exciting event features some of the best bull rid-

The big draw at Spy Hill Sports Days has always been the chariot and chuckwagon races, and organizers are hoping that they will be able to bring the races back to town this year.

President of the Spy Hill Community Club Jeff Odgers says that the club is planning Sports Days for August.

"We are going to go ahead with the Sports Days rodeo on August 14 and 15. We're going to have a slow-pitch tournament, a tractor pull, a kids rodeo, team roping, and the chuckwagon and chariot races are not ruled out either," Odgers said.

"We're really excited with the community to get going. This is one of the longest-running sports days and rodeos in all of Saskatchewan and we're excited to keep this going and be a part of it."

Moosomin Regional Park prepares for a busy year

Moosomin Regional Park is gearing up for another busy year.

other busy year. In 2020 when Covid restrictions began to affect travel, many across the country looked for creative and local ways to enjoy the summer. Because of this, parks saw an increase in bookings and use.

Park Manager at the Moosomin Regional Park Wayne Beckett says this year has already proven to be busier than last, which was busier than the average year before.

"We're considerably ahead of last year's schedule as far as the



tions like that. As far as the washrooms and the playgrounds and laundromats, everything is open.

"It looks like it's going to be busier, so that's pretty nice. I'm thinking it will be a good year. Just looking at the booking program here I'm guessing we're up about 20 per cent from last year, and last year was the busiest year we've seen in a while."

Beckett notes that while the annual fireworks show was cancelled this year, with all restrictions set to lift on July 11, the park is still looking at having some kind

number of bookings and the length of those bookings. It looks to be another busy season for sure, and that's just following Covid last year. People did more camping because they didn't have many other options and some people bought campers for the first time and used them, and now they're using them again this year," Beckett said.

He explained that last year there were Covid restrictions in place that impacted campers that have since lifted which he attributes to an even busier 2021 season.

"Last year when Covid hit there were a lot of restrictions with spacing between campers and playgrounds weren't open and none of the facilities were available to the public. So it was very restricted when it came to anything to do other than camping. So far this year we have no restric-



of event or events.

"We have a pretty nice stage area set up here and whether we host a band or a series of bands or something, I think we will try and do something," he says.

will try and do something," he says. Beckett says that the park is also working on establishing eight 50 amp sites for larger campers that will be made available by July 1.

"One thing we're working on this year is we're designing some 50 amp full-service sites, which is something the public has been asking about over the years. It's becoming more and more of a question that people want to know about if they're traveling through the area with big motorhomes or big campers. They want more power than our regular 30 amp sites and they want full service," said Beckett.







Discover history at Moosomin's museum

The Moosomin Museum is a perfect space for any history buff to check out a few of the historic items of southeast Saskatchewan.

The museum is located just off Park Avenue in Moosomin—stop in for a trip to the past!

The museum features history from Moosomin and the surrounding area with two old churches, antique automobiles, and a shop with vintage artifacts to display.

According to Museum President Dennis Barry, "The artifacts range from old farm equipment to furniture originally built in Moosomin, and various others."

In addition to the collection of quality vintage vehicles, there is also an array of old farming machinery—including tractors and combines.

A highlight of the museum's collection is the restored Fundge Snowplane.

Snowplanes were built to glide over the snow, powered by a rear propeller. Two of the major snow plane manufacturers in North America were at Moosomin and Spy Hil. The Fudge snow plane, started by Robert Fudge, was made in Moosomin in a factory at the corner of Main and Broadway. Lorch snow planes, named after Karl Lorch, were made in Spy Hill.

The snowplanes were a popular mode of winter trans-

portation when it was more difficult to clear roads in winter.

Inside the museum, you can check out many historical relics including photos, Second World War gear, classic books, hospital equipment, military items, and uniforms.

All items have been donated by members of the community.

The museum is open Wednesday to Sunday afternoons from 1-5 pm in July and August.



Welwyn Centennial Regional Park anticipates a busy summer

The Welwyn Centennial Regional Park opened for registration in early May and is already nearly booked full.

Caretaker Orville Harper says he is expecting this year to be as busy as last year was.

"I think we'll have another busy year again. We had a busy year last year with the whole Covid thing and I think we'll be just as busy this year. We're already three-quarters full already on our electrical side. We will be filled up over the weekends," said Harper.

"We were really busy last year. We were pretty well full right through the camping season. The camping season started on June 1 last year, that's what the provincial government had said we could do, and from then on we were right full. Even in September people were still camping."

Harper says that he has been camping in the park for many years but has seen an increase in campers through the ongoing pandemic.

He says that in 2020, more people turned to camping in the face of restrictions that prevented travel.

"It's been quite busy. I think more people have got campers and I think they want to camp with them. I've been camping down at the Welwyn lake for about 40 years and there are always lots of people camping, but I think there's been a few more now."

He says in 2020, the Welwyn Centennial Regional Park was not affected by the restrictions due to the large sites the park offers, which allowed for adequate distance from other campers.

"We have large campsites, they're 40 feet wide, some campgrounds your awning is nearly touching the other guy's camper, but here you don't need to worry about that. We're well spaced apart and we're pretty lucky there," said Harper.

Harper says he is looking forward to the rest of the season and remains excited for a busy summer.

Walk through history at Rocanville Museum

For those interested in prairie history, you won't be disappointed with a stop at the Rocanville and District Museum. This large agricultural museum boasts an extensive collection of gas and steam engines, a restored CPR station, a school building, general store, an old church, and antique farm machinery and tools.

The museum also sells the famous Symons Oilers as souvenirs. Based out of his machine shop in Rocanville, Ernie Symons sold his oilcan, the Symons Oiler, throughout North America and around the world. Starting with his first 24 oilcans in 1924, production reached its peak during the Second World War. In 1943, Symons delivered 65,000 of his oilers to the Department of Defense for use on military vehicles, including ships, planes, and submarines. With 32 workers on the job that summer, he usually had orders for 50,000 to 60,000 units to be filled.

Symons then spent \$500 securing patents in Canada, the United States, Great Britain, and France. Containers of different sizes with different features were added in later years. With its "wire fence" handle and trademark design, Symons developed an oilcan that is still considered the standard by many today.

On display at the museum are steam engines, threshing machines, stoves, washing machines, grain mills, chinaware, small personal items, household items, tools, switchboards, First Nations artifacts, military items, school desks, and many other items of former years.

There are all sorts of interesting displays at the Rocanville Museum, including a display from when the Kraft Celebration Tour came to Rocanville, and a display dedicated to the time that Rocanville Museum participated in the world record breaking Harvest for Hunger in Langen-

burg.

The old school at the museum has also been modified and turned into an active and historical kids' area with lots of fun stuff for kids to do.

Rocanville Museum also hosts a Museum Day every year to help with finances in September. The day starts with a pancake breakfast and ends with a barbecue beef supper. Demonstrations of pioneer life will be held throughout the day, and there will be entertainment and a threshing demonstration in the afternoon.

The Rocanville Museum is open in July and August from Monday to Saturday from 10 am to 5 pm and on Sunday from 1 pm to 7 pm.

Esterhazy has lots to offer!

Esterhazy is a beautiful and bustling town located on Highway 22. From its diverse business sector to numerous local attractions, Esterhazy is a town with a lot to do over the summer months, or all year round!

Some of the major attractions in Esterhazy include a golf course, regional park and campground, pool, potash interpretive centre, walking trails, museum, historic flour mill, and Kaposvar historical site.

There is also a farmers market every Friday on the south side of Highway 22.

Both the golf course and walking trails run through the valley on the north side of Esterhazy, making them scenic and enjoyable and the campground at the regional park is

located right between the pool and the golf course, so it's in the perfect spot!

The town also has a new dog park located right along Highway 22 and next to the historical park. There are benches to sit on and trees for shade. The park has an area for smaller or timid dogs and an area for dogs that like to play and roughhouse, with separate entrances for both kinds of dogs.

The town has been putting a big focus on beautification lately, especially at their historical park. The park features lots of flowers and trees as well as a beautiful walking trail, and the town has been beautifying its main street as well.

Some of the attractions that Esterhazy offers include:

ESTERHAZY WALKING TRAIL The Esterhazy Regional Park took ownership of a trail which was a collection of old roads and bridges and paths cobbled together to form a loop around the Esterhazy Golf Course. The Park board decided to try and revive the trail and used the services of a professional trail builder to do so.

ESTERHAZY FLOUR MILL

This is the only fully equipped flour mill remaining in Saskatchewan that combines an elevator and a mill. Designated as a provincial heritage property in 2005, it also joined the family of national historic sites in 2007 with its designation as a National Historic Site of Canada. A major project to restore the siding on the flour mill is underway this summer.

KAPSOVAR HISTORICAL SITE

Kaposvar, one of the first Hungarian settlements in Western Canada, was established in 1886. Kaposvar Historical Society preserves, restores and maintains the Kaposvar Historic Site.

ESTERHAZY MUSEUM

The museum houses the tourism office for the area and is involved with town promotions. Tours are offered. There are also seasonal and specialty displays to compliment local interest and activities.

Saskatchewan Potash Interpretive Centre




Restoration under way on flour mill

Work was under way in June on re-siding the Esterhazy Flour Mill. The Esterhazy Flour Mill was built by James Saunders from 1904 to 1907. There were many hold-ups in the construction of the Esterhazy Flour Mill due to delivery delays for materials, and milling began on June 18, 1907. Saunders, from Whitewood, was a small operator who serviced consumers in the area that surrounded his mills, and sold surplus flour for export. Renovations on the historic building began Monday, May 17. Some wood under the original siding had to be replaced early in the restoration. The Town of Esterhazy received two grants, in the amounts of \$100,000 and \$49,000, to re-side the Flour Mill. The flour mill is a provincial and national historic site, and can be found in Esterhazy's historical park along with the town's museum and potash interpretive centre.

Old George's Museum and Hidden Village is owned by George Chopping and is located on the outskirts of Whitewood, just off Highway 1. It all started in 1984 when Chopping bought an old house that he thought would be perfect for a museum. The house became known as Old George's.


Chopping put a lot of work into making Old George's what it is today. The house, which has 17 rooms and four fireplaces, is also his home. The rooms, from the basement to the attic, are comprised of intricate displays of nearly every antique you can imagine.

"Eighty per cent of the items are from Saskatchewan, 15 per cent are from Manitoba, and five per cent are from Alberta. A few other things are from B.C., the Harbour in Toronto, and other travels I have been on," said Chopping. His oldest item is a 1636 land title deed from England.

"I have a passion for learning about their history, and sharing that knowledge with people who come here," he said. "I also like to show off what I have. We're all big kids, but not everyone wants to admit that."

Nestled behind the house, there is also a 'hidden village' comprised of 30 buildings, including a chapel, saloon, blacksmith shop, Chinese laundromat, a clothing store and much more. There is also a stage people can perform on.

Located at the crossroads of Highways 1 & 9 in southeastern Saskatchewan, Whitewood is close to Round Lake in the Qu'Appelle Valley (to the north) and Kenosee Lake and Moose Mountain Provincial Park (to the south). Whitewood proudly boasts a modern campground, a swimming pool and a splash park, and a second-to-none nine-hole grass green golf course. The pool structure underwent extensive updates in 2020 and is ready for the new season. A list of attractions in Whitewood includes:

Larson Park

Larson Park is home to the swimming pool, a splash park, newly renovated ball diamonds, modern campground, kiddies' playground, and picnic area. The golf club boasts a challenging (and immensely enjoyable) nine-hole layout well known locally for its high quality greens. Flat and easy to walk, the course has fairways of average width that are bordered by thick growths of trees and affects a player's strategy on the most difficult hole—the par four 9th.

Walking Trails

Whitewood is home to the award-winning Merchant's Bank Heritage Centre in historical downtown Whitewood. The Archive Building and Historical Library is located at 503 3rd Ave. and is housed in an old restored Methodist church. It is open by appointment only. Contact the Town Office at (306) 735-2210.

Heritage Walking Tour

What better way to explore Whitewood than at your own pace, assisted by the award winning Heritage Walking Tour Guide, where you'll see Whitewood's historical buildings. Stop by the Town Office or Whitewood Museum for a copy of the guide.

Flag Garden

Located at the north end of Lalonde St., the flag garden is comprised of 14 flags standing amidst a beautiful flower garden. The flags represent the ethnic diversity of this area. It's a great place to take a few snapshots, as well as have a picnic.

Museum/Tourist Booth

Whitewood's Historical Museum also houses the Tourist Information Booth and is located at 603 North Railway. Open from mid-May to early September, it features a rural school and an agriculture building. Visitors will find historical information about the early settlers and artifacts from the people of Whitewood area.

Old George's

Whitewood is home to Old George's Museum and Hidden Village with its 1900 period home filled with antiques. Old Geo's is located along the Trans-Canada Highway at Whitewood.

Whitewood Chacachas Rodeo

Golf in the Heart of the Prairies

Golfers have no shortage of opportunities to play the game they love in Southeast Saskatchewan and Southwest Manitoba.

The Pipestone Hills Golf Club by Moosomin is a nine-hole, par 35 facility in the hills of the Pipestone Valley, located along Highway 8 several kilometres south of Moosomin. The rolling hills of the valley and the blue waters of Moosomin Lake create a picturesque setting for a quick game or a day at the club, and this year a new and beautiful clubhouse has opened at the golf course. Only a 40-minute drive south of Moosomin, the Redvers & District Golf and Country Club welcomes golfers with a beautifully redone clubhouse. Contact (306) 452-3345 for more information.

The Carlton Trail Regional Park golf course is located about 40 kilometres north of Rocanville on Highway 8. Carlton Trail has nine holes on rolling terrain with PGA style grass greens, and is located within the beautiful park which features bird-watching, nature trails, fishing, and swimming. Call 306-534-4724 for more information.

Esterhazy Golf and Country Club is a nine-hole golf course located on the northeast side of the town of Esterhazy. The course features a club house with a great restaurant and reasonably priced golf cart rentals.

To the south, golfers are just an hour away from the Golf Kenosee in the Moose Mountain Provincial Park. Sitting in a 40,000 hectare park on the highest plateau in the southeast, Golf Kenosee is nestled in a forest of poplar, ash, fir, and white birch in Moose Mountain Provincial Park.

White Bear Golf Course is nearby. When you "Challenge the Bear," you play one of the top-rated courses in Saskatchewan in the scenic Moose Mountains near Carlyle. The 18-hole championship track is famous for its white silica sand—trucked in from Golden, B.C.—and its white birch forest. This soft spike course opened in 1985 and is part of White Bear Lake Resort located near the shores of White Bear Lake.

Both courses are accessible from Moosomin by going south on Highway 8 to Highway 48. Turn west and travel through Wawota to Highway 9 and turn south.

Further east, enjoy a round at Oak Lake Island Resort's 18-hole championship golf course, or head north to charming Sandy Lake for nine holes in the morning, followed up by nine holes in the afternoon on the rolling greens at Elkhorn Resort at Clear Lake.

Well known for its high quality grass greens, Whitewood Golf and Country Club offers a challenging and enjoyable experience that even the most avid golfer will enjoy. A thick growth of trees lining most fairways and strategically placed water hazards add to the challenge of this nine hole course.

The Virden Wellview Golf Club was established in 1892, making it Manitoba's oldest active golf club.

The Pleasant Valley Golf Club, nestled in the Pembina Valley near Pelican Lake, is an 18-hole championship course that offers elevations rising up to 125 feet. this course is proud of its rolling greens, tree lined fairways, and winding creek!

Last Oak Golf and Country Club is nestled in the beautiful Qu'Appelle Valley in Saskatchewan and is proudly owned and operated by Cowessess First Nation. Lush tree-lined fairways, set among rolling hills, demand controlled drives and approach shots. Families or novice golfers will appreciate the encouraging, laid-back atmosphere.

Moose Mountains made for summer fun

Trees, hills, lakes, hiking trails, campsites, golf courses, restaurants, a casino, and a large waterslide complex these are just a few of the attractions that draw visitors from a wide area to the Moose Mountains.

Moose Mountain Provincial Park, the resort village of Kenosee Lake, and White Bear Lake on White Bear First Nation provide the perfect destination for a summer getaway.

Located less than an hour southwest of Moosomin on Highway 9, the area is an easy drive for a day trip or a weekend.

Westling says the city will also have its playpark programs starting after the Canada Day weekend. This drop-in programming for children includes crafts in the morning, and fun in the paddling pool in the afternoon. There are also two free audio tours of the area available for tourists and residents to enjoy. The Backroads of Estevan Audio Tour hearkens back to a long-time Sunday tradition in Saskatchewan. Participants who take the tour will see areas of Estevan and the surrounding communities along the backroads which are filled with historical sites, fantastic lookouts, and local folklore. From learning about the massive drag lines that mine coal in the area, to historical stories of murder, mine strikes, and treasure, the tour is a vivid treat for the imagination.

The city of Estevan and Souris Valley Museum also offer a Historical Walking Tour of the city. "Participants can walk the streets of Estevan where the fascinating history tells extraordinary stories," says Westling. "On this tour participants will learn about the buildings in the city and listen to stories of who built them. They can learn where the first school was built and immerse themselves in the coal miners strike."

Both tours with instructions can be found online at Estevan.ca

Westling also says visitors can mark their calendars now for an event coming up in March of 2022—the Energy Dash and Splash which includes a winter foot race at Boundary Dam capped off by a polar bear dip!





Bow Valley Park

Once a soon-to-be-abandoned CPR. station, citizens of Oxbow banded together to create a small prairie town museum that has received attention and interest from individuals across Canada, and from as far away as Australia and the UK.

The museum's collection includes numerous historical artifacts of Oxbow

and area, featuring the area's main industries of agriculture and oil; railroading and other forms of transportation; medical equipment; geological and archaeological items; telegraph, newspaper and other modes of communication; and a wide variety of artifacts of domestic and community life, from pioneer times to more recent years.

The former train station building also has historical significance in that it was the former childhood home of Ralph Allen, one of Canada's top-flight journalists, war correspondent, magazine editor and author. Ralph Allen's father, Glenn, was the Oxbow CPR Station Agent from 1923-38.

Oxbow Community Pool

The Oxbow Community Pool is new outdoor facility (2019) with a swimming pool and paddling splash park. Red Cross Swimming Lessons are offered in June, July and August. Public



Swimming is offered in the afternoons. Check out the Facebook page for schedules.

Moose Creek Golf Course

Moose Creek Golf Course is a beautiful grass green nine-hole golf course. Power cart rentals are available. Moose Creek Golf Course is located 4 miles north and 1.5 miles west of Oxbow.

History of St. Lazare & RM of Ellice

St Lazare got its beginning as a Roman Catholic mission in the 1820's. It was founded by Oblate Father Jules DeCorby, who had immigrated from France in 1867.

Father DeCorby was at this time attached to the mission at Lebret, Saskatchewan. Father DeCorby named this new mission St Lazare to commemorate the place in France from which he departed on his journey to Canada.

The mission was located at the junction of the Qu'Appelle and the Assiniboine Rivers, approximately 3 miles north of the Hudson Bay Company's Fort Ellice. Church services in those early years were held in the homes of these early settlers, which were mostly Métis families. Since

Father DeCorby was very nomadic, traveling from mission to mission, other missionaries from Lebret helped with the St Lazare mission, namely Fathers St. Germain, Campeau and Lepage.

In 1880, a log Church was built and Father DeCorby became the first resident priest. At about this time, a French Canadian, Delphis Chartier and family, arrived at Fort Ellice via steamboat and settled at the mission. He eventually opened a post office, October 1st, 1895, and various other businesses. In 1895, Father DeCorby was replaced by Father



Léon Favreau and in 1898 a new stone Church was constructed under the supervision of Mr. Chartier. The new Church was blessed by the Archbishop of St Boniface Adelard Langevin, in 1899. A stone rectory was also built at this time.

In 1900, Father Favreau conducted a census of the mission. The census which included men, women and children was 89 families, 456 souls in all broken down as follows. Métis 342, French Canadians 34, French 15, Irish 30, Scotch 19 and Germans 18. On May 13, 1909, the mission of St Lazare was declared a parish by the Archbishop of St Boniface Adelard Langevin.

On July 7, 1883, the Rural Municipality of Ellice was born, with its headquarters at Fort Ellice. With the decline of the fort and the emergence of St Lazare, its permanent headquarters were moved to St Lazare with the first meeting in the space rented from Father Favreau on January 6th, 1902. In 1905, the merchants of the mission anticipated the coming of the railway and began relocating to what is the present day location of the Village of St Lazare. Records indicate the railroad opened in 1908.

Many businesses sprung up at this new site, general stores, barber shop, pool room, blacksmith shop, hotel. Eugene Fouillard started a Massey Ferguson dealership. In 1911, a grain elevator owned and operated by the Atlas Grain Company opened its doors.

Take a drive back in time at the Elkhorn Antique Automobile Museum

The Elkhorn Auto Museum, located just off Highway 1 in Elkhorn, Manitoba is a good place to stop for a quick drive into history.

The museum has been running each summer since 1967. Most of the automobile collection was donated by Isaac Clarkson, who passed away in 1971 at the age of 58.

There are over 90 vehicles on display, ranging from a 1908 Reo to a 1976 Jaguar. Automobiles aren't the only items to see at the museum. There are First Nations artifacts, guns, licence plates, spark plugs, tools, oxen yokes, bicycles, and household items on display.

A separate building houses farm equipment such as tractors and threshing machines. Most of the tractors have steel tires.

There is also an old farm house from the early 1900s that has been restored by the museum committee and moved onto the museum grounds, as well as an old school building at the museum where people can view old maps, desks, and posters.

One of the biggest events held at the museum each year is the Elkhorn Museum Day on July 1. The day usually includes a parade, a threshing demonstration, demonstrations of pioneer life, and many activities at the museum grounds.

The Automobile Museum is wheelchair accessible and even provides wheelchairs for people to wheel around the displays.

The museum is open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. until the end of September. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$2 for students. Preschoolers are free.

Be sure to check out the Manitoba Antique Auto Museum while in the area!

Historic Kirkella church finds new home

There is not much left of the community of Kirkella, located just west of Elkhorn on the Trans-Canada Highway. At one time it had a grain elevator, school, store, post office, a community hall and band and a church. Today there are a few homes and the church is still standing, but time and mother nature were taking its toll on it.

The Kirkella Anglican Church was built in 1906 and held its last service in 1971. Since its closing, the ownership was passed onto the Chrisp family of the community.


Just down the road heading east is the village of Elkhorn, with its antique auto museum and other museum display buildings, that show the turn of the century history of Southwest Manitoba and Southeast Saskatchewan. The members of the museum's Restoration Club felt that the church would make a good addition to the museum site displays.


Last fall the building was moved and a cement foundation built for it. During the winter months work was started on the steeple and bell tower, that had been removed during the move.

At the workshop of Lynn Tutthill, volunteers worked on restoring the church, with local building contractor Blaine Kliever doing some of the more technical repairs. Lifelong village resident and active volunteer, Lee Hodson, took on a special restoration task. Using the original ornate wooden cross from on top of the steeple, he made a replica replacement that is now in place.

Westwood Ranch and Garden Centre a unique prairie destination

If you take a drive southwest of Elkhorn, Manitoba or southeast of Moosomin you will come across a unique business unlike any other in the region.

At Westwood Ranch and Garden Centre you can shop for plants in the greenhouses there, or spend your time hanging out with zebras, lemurs and ostriches, or let your children play on Westwood's indoor 30-footlong assault course, a large bounce tent with obstacles.

Westwood Ranch and Garden Centre is just what its name suggests—it's a greenhouse that also features exotic animals as well as a range of other activities for people to have fun with.

"It's a double stop shop," says owner Mark Humphries. "The parents usually go off with the kids and pick plants and then they can be entertained afterwards with the animals and everything else. It makes for a good day out."

In addition to the greenhouses at Westwood, there is a small zoo on site that features everything from exotic animals to farm animals, as well as a gold mine where kids can sluice for gold, an assault course, a full outdoor play area, a model train display, and a small gift shop and concession. While the assault course, outdoor play area and some other activities will likely be restricted this year due to Covid-19, the animals will still be on display.

Westwood's animals include zebras—which Humpries says are the only zebras in Manitoba or Saskatchewan—lemurs, ostriches, emus, parrots, lots of different farm animals, including sheep, pigs, goats, and horses, miniature ponies and foals, exotic birds, fish, a rabbit village that kids can go into, jumping horses, donkeys, a bearded dragon, and wallaroos.

Westwood Ranch has grown in popularity over the year. Aside from daily vistors, Westwood Ranch also does school and corporate tours, as well as tours for people with disabilities, as the location is wheelchair accessible. Humphries says they have had up to 9,400 visitors some summers. Westwood Ranch is open seven days a week. Virden full of heritage buildings

Virden is well known for its many restored heritage buildings, dating back to the early 1880s.

Architectural styles are varied with most of the heritage being of either fieldstone or brick construction.

Many of the structures are unique in Western Canada, in architectural style and purpose.

Examples include the Aud Theater, which is unique in style as an example of a restored turn of the century opera house.

Another example is St Mary's Anglican Church, whose unique fieldstone construction exemplifies 1800s English style construction using abutments and high pitched roofs.

Virden's unique history as an early railroad center has also left the community with a central business district, rich with heritage brick buildings, constructed at the turn of the century.

Following is a bit more detail on just a few of the heritage buildings that make Virden unique:

Canadian Pacific Railway Station

Located at 425 - 6th Avenue S, the Canadian Railway Station was constructed in 1900 after the original wood frame station burnt in 1899.

It has been restored and declared a heritage building in 1994. Its unique fieldstone and overhanging eaves style was common with many rail stations in larger centers.

In the early years, many new immigrant farmers and businessmen would have first disembarked from the train at this location and passed through the doors of this station.

Today, it houses community based organizations including the Virden and Area Arts Council and the Virden Chamber of Commerce. Also included is an art gallery and a separate board room area.

The Aud Theater 228 Wellington Street

The Aud Theatre was built in 1911 as part of the municipal building. The building was open to the public on February 29, 1912. The building consisted of a government telephone exchange room, new court room, three large offices, and the opera house, costing \$32,500.

The population at this time was about 1,500. The Aud Theatre was built by W.T. Manser. The comedy "the Misogynist" was the first to play in the theatre. The Great Eastern Sign

Painting Co. of Toronto supplied the 22x30ft curtain. During the '30s and '40s the Aud was a movie theatre.

The ceiling on the stage was originally 40ft high but it was lowered to 24ft to save heat. The building was originally heated by steam which was replaced with electric heat in 1984-85 after the renovation and re-opening in 1983. When the theatre fell into disrepair it closed as a movie theatre and the town council was preparing to demolish it.

A local steering committee was formed to save it, and after substantial renovations, it was re-opened in 1983. The lower level consists of 257 seats and the upper level consists of 210 seats. The majestic curve of the balcony gives the audience a panoramic view of the stage. On either side of this are two double decker boxes or loges which add an air of sophistication.

St Mary's Anglican Church 633 9th Street

This structure is a great example of fieldstone construction.

Much of the stone for the fieldstone construction came from along the top of the Assiniboine River Valley.

The first church was a frame structure built by Clayton and Sons in 1885. This was the first church building in Virden.

Masonry work was done by Mr.

Walter Chesterton, a Winnipeg architect, designed this notable structure while building the school across the street.

The cloister and fence were added in 1952.

The church features two stained glass windows created by famous artist and sculptor Leo Mol.

The church also features a stained glass medallion window.

This window was presented by the city of Brugge, Belgium to honor the 12th Manitoba Dragoons.

Goulding House

Located at 677 - 9th Avenue, this house is today a private residence.


Built in 1893 by Dr. Goulding, the fieldstone house represents a prime example of early prairie architectural designs with bi-level verandas and upper look out.

Virden Pioneer Home Museum

Located at 390 King Street, and Established in 1970, the museum holds over 6,000 items relating to the Victorian era of Virden's history as displayed in the main house.

The original home itself was constructed in 1888 and the three additional annexes were constructed at a later date to display items from subsequent eras depicting our local heritage and culture.

Summer fun in Virden!

The Town of Virden is located at the junction of the Trans-Canada Highway and Highway #83, placing it at the halfway point between the major urban centers of Winnipeg and Regina.

Virden is a regional hub in Southwest Manitoba. Serving a population of over 13,000, the area is home to over 200 local business. Here are some things to experience in Virden this summer:

The Aud Theatre

In 1911, Virden was Manitoba's ninth largest centre and the civic buildings were inadequate for a community of 1500. W.T. Manser, Virden's foremost builder at the time erected a building that housed municipal offices, a courtroom and a larger opera house. With its outstanding acoustics and classical style, it has been recognized as one of the best concert halls of its size in Western Canada. Today, the Aud is home to an annual music and arts festival, local theatre productions, school Christmas concerts and a performance by top notch travelling performers from across the country. (204) 748-1982.

Arts Mosaic in the Historic CPR Centre

Nestled in a beautiful restored train station, Arts Mosaic Gallery and the Mosiac Market were named one of the top 10 galleries in the Province by Travel Manitoba. Hosting a different artist every month, this gallery offers one-ofa-kind works for sale. The gallery is open year round and welcomes visitors to view the talent of display.

Virden Farmer's Market

The Virden Farmers Market is a very successful rural market. It launched in 1989 and has maintained a very solid nucleus of vendors since its inception. There is a wide variety of items available including baking, fresh produce, honey, meat, jewelry, wood furniture, cleaning products, etc.

Virden Wellview Golf Club

Started in 1892, the Virden golf club was the first organized golf club, and is currently the oldest continuously operating golf club in the province. This 9-hole course is classically designed with wide fairways, deep windswept grassy roughs, sand bunkers and water. The club has a driving range and a brand-new clubhouse opened in 2019.

Virden & District Swimming Pool

The Virden & District Swimming Pool is an outdoor heated pool that is located at 900 - 5th Ave, near the agricultural grounds at Tundra Oil and Gas Place. The pool is open from June to the end of August.

open from June to the end of August. The pool consists of a children's area with a toddler's lion slide and at the mid-depth area a large double loop waterslide. We offer swimming lessons, lap swim, aquafit classes and private rentals throughout the season.

Virden Pioneer Home Museum

Established in 1970, the museum holds over 6,000 items relating to the Victorian era of Virden's history as displayed in the main house. The original home itself was constructed in 1888 and the three additional annexes were constructed at a later date to display items from the subsequent era's depicting our local heritage and culture.

Summer is the perfect time to venture to the outdoors and take advantage of the warm weather for a few months. Many people head to the beach to soak up the sun while others gather family and friends and set up tents and RVs in the woods.

Riding Mountain National Park in Western Manitoba has something for everyone.

The park has back country trails for those people that like going out in the wilderness and experiencing nature first hand, there's a townsite where there are shops and restaurants for those who don't like getting their hands dirty, there's a beautiful lake for the beach bums, and there is natural beauty everywhere you look.

The main campground includes more than 500 campsites and there are five other campgrounds within the park.

¹ Upon driving into the township of Wasagaming at Clear Lake, small shops, businesses and cottages sit on either

side of the street. Once reaching the lake, just to the left is a lawn where families and friends can be seen tossing a frisbee to one another. Just beyond is the main beach where beach towels and children with sand toys spread across the shore. A pier lies to the left, leading out to the marina, where The Martese, a 95-passenger tour boat is anchored.

Other activities include golfing, boating, horseback riding, and hiking on more than 400 km of trails.

The Wasagaming area offers mini-golf, tennis courts, bike rentals, boat rentals and fishing. The Visitor Centre offers a junior naturalist program called Critter Camp for younger patrons. The Clear Lake Golf Course features 18 holes, some of them tough but all providing a scenic view.

Please note, some of these activities may be off limits for a time being until Covid-19 restrictions lift.

Wasagaming offers a variety of restaurants ranging from Italian to a lounge-style setting. Clothing shops and specialty shops line the streets.

Recently, Lynn Tutthill brought in lifting machinery to place the bell tower and steeple on the church. He had to wait for two days because of the high winds that blew through the area. Due to the ongoing Covid-19 restrictions, no completion date is known, but club members are restoring some of the original furniture that was left in the church. A work crew of volunteers with mops and brooms will be needed at a later date to clean up the inside of the building and do some painting and decorating.

The warmer weather will allow a local contractor to start work on replacing the roof and windows.

However, most of the work on the overall project has been done by volunteers from local communities who have put in hundreds of hours on the project, with many more needed to complete the restoration of the historic church.

The funds for the project have been raised from fundraisers by the Restoration Club and from government grants and many personal donations. A recent development that will add to the project is the donation of a suitable bell. Historic research showed that the church did not have a bell, but the Chrisp family of Kirkella are going to donate the old Kirkella community school house bell to the church project that they had saved.

Volunteers also hope that the church baptismal fount that disappeared a few years ago will show up!

The end result of all these efforts will be to bring the church as close as possible to what a turn of the century prairie church looked like. And perhaps it might bring back memories of the many services and people whose ancestors attended the church!

Expansion continues at West End Resort

A new camping and boating season is here and Willie Kuzub, the owner of West End Resort and Campground at Round Lake is excited about the addition of 80 new seasonal sites to his campground. The addition marks a significant expansion for the resort, which now has 150 seasonal sites and 30 sites for short-term campers, for a total of 180 campsites.

The seasonal sites in the new expansion have already sold out for the summer or 2021, and Kuzub is now working on Phase Two, a second expansion that will see even more sites added to the resort, with bookings to take place in August this year for the summer of 2022.

Kuzub has big plans for West End Resort, and the addition of the new campsites is just one more step toward realizing a larger

vision. Last year, after years of work deepening an inlet on the lake, Kuzub opened a new marina at West End Resort with 50 boat slips that allow campers and boaters to keep their boats on the water all season long. He has since added more boat slips to accommodate the extra campers since the expansion.

The new sites that Kuzub has added are large—50 by 60 feet, and include sod, a large area to back in a camper, ample room for a deck and fire pit, and even room for a shed if campers want it.

Kuzub says his new marina has been a draw and with an increase in campers last year across the Prairies due to Covid-19, he expects another busy season at West End Resort.

"Our marina is making a big difference," he says. "When people can put their boats there and leave them tied up and come and go as they please, and when it takes five minutes to jump in your boat and go out onto the lake versus going through the motions of having the hassle to load it and unload it, it makes a big difference for people."

Aside from the new marina and the new seasonal sites, Kuzub also wants to increase the activities that are available at the resort.

"There are a lot of other things we are going to do this year," he says. "We're going to start a kids' club where every Saturday the kids can come down around 9 o'clock and we are going to have crafts for them to do, maybe a nature hike-stuff like that. We will start with an hour every Saturday, but we will probably bump it up a bit.

"We are actually going to have a food truck that's going to be on site all year-Lizzie's Prairie Fields, out of Round Lake. She will offer some traditional food truck menu items as well as some healthier stuff. She plans to provide culturally diverse food choices that are locally sourced. She wants to use locally grown stuff whenever possible.

"And then we are going to have a few different variations of yoga a few times a week. The yoga started last year and it went off well for the last few weeks of the summer. It was still into September when they were doing yoga.'

Kuzub says he has also started to develop a gravel walking path along the marina and wants to continue to lengthen the path so it can be used by walkers or golf carts. He also has added wifi to the campground, as well as the ability for boats to fuel up right on the lake, and is also planning on holding outdoor movie nights with a large inflatable screen a few times a month, as well as a flea market on Sundays. In 2022 he hopes to add swimming lessons to the list of activities offered at the resort.

"We are really trying to create more things to do so you're not just going camping, going out on the lake then coming back to eat and go to sleep," he says. "We are trying to create more activities. Pickleball might be an option down the road. Maybe a tennis court or volleyball nets. Whether it's walking trails, or golf cart trails, or quad trails, it just gives people stuff to do." Kuzub says West End Resort has evolved to have a

community-like atmosphere over the years.

"It is like a community and everyone watches out for everyone's kids down there, it doesn't matter who they are. Everyone is kind of raising everyone's kids down there."

He says there are also lots of people who come out for a day trip.

"We've been getting a lot of folks from all over the lake coming by just to go for a walk and get out and it's kind of neat. The atmosphere down by the marina is kind of unique because it's something that has not been on our lake ever, so now you get people just bringing their boats in to go on a country cruise. They will come and idle through there and then with the turtles and other wildlife there too, it's kind of a sightseeing experience and relaxing drive."
